

# Goad Trial Starts Monday, 200 Summoned

**BAIRD** — Monday morning, Feb. 9th, at 9:00 a. m., trial for Curtis Sherman Goad Jr., will begin. He is charged with murder with malice aforethought in the death of Cross Plains City Marshall Byron Richardson. Richardson died on Friday, August 1, 1969 in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene. He had been wounded July 2, after issuing a warning ticket to Goad.

Goad was arrested by Cisco Chief of Police Brymer and Patrolman Fleming and brought to Callahan County jail, where he has been held since his arrest.

It is estimated that the court room in Baird will hold about 170 persons and all these seats will be filled, since a special venire of 200 were personally served or summoned by the sheriffs department for possible

## jury duty.

Presiding Judge will be Judge Raleigh Brown of Abilene. The court appointed defense attorney for Goad will be Charles Scarborough of Abilene, and District Attorney Ed Paynter of Abilene will be prosecuting attorney in the case.

**BAIRD** — The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$857,000 for highway construction in Callahan County during 1971-72, announced District Highway Engineer J. C. Roberts of Abilene. He said a total of 12.7 miles in the county will be involved.

This work is a part of the 1971-72 Consolidated Highway Program for the two year period just authorized by the Highway Commission.

The following projects will take place in Callahan County: Hwy. 36 from U. S. 283, Southeast 10 miles, reconstruction base and resurface, \$667,000; Hwy. 36, from Cross Plains East to Eastland Co. Line, 2.7 miles, \$190,000.

There were 86 pre-school and 215 school children at Clyde; 42 pre-school and 155 school children at Baird; Eula had 21 pre-schoolers and 68 school students; Putnam had 2 pre-school and 25 students; and Cross Plains had 32 pre-school and 127 school children.

**NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN** that an election will be held in and throughout the City of Baird, Texas, on the 24th day of February, 1970 on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said City, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said City of Baird, Texas, as follows, to-wit:

**An Ordinance Calling An Election for Local Sales and Use Tax, Fixing the Date of Election, Designating the Polling Places, Appointing Presiding Judge and Assistant Presiding Judge, Providing for Notice of Election, and Suspending the Rules Requiring Ordinances to be Read upon Three Separate Days.**

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Baird, Texas:

Section I. There came on to be considered the petition filed with the City Clerk on the 21st day of January, 1970, requesting that an election be ordered in said City on the question of the adoption of a local sales and use tax for the benefit of said City in accordance with the provisions of House Bill No. 207, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, 1967, and attached to said petition is the certificate of Tax Assessor and Collector and Registrar of Voters for Callahan County, Texas, certifying that said petition is signed by at least 32 qualified voters of said City, and it appearing that said petition is signed by qualified voters of said City equal in number to at least twenty per cent (20%) of the total number of votes cast in last preceding regular city election, and that said petition is otherwise in conformity with the law.

Section II. That an election be ordered as requested in said petition in said City on the 24th day of February, 1970, which date is not less than thirty (30) days nor more than ninety (90) days after the passage of this ordinance and this ordinance is being passed within sixty (60) days after the date said petition was filed with the City Clerk.

Section III. Said election shall be held at the following places in said City and the following persons are hereby appointed presiding judge and alternate presiding judge for said election:  
Precinct No. 1; Polling Place, City Hall; Presiding Judge, Jon Hardwick; Alternate Presiding Judge: Curtis Sutphen.  
James C. Asbury is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Mrs. Garvin Jones and Mrs. Florice Robbins are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at City Hall within the boundaries of the above named City and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.

Section IV. Ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:  
( ) FOR the adoption of a one per cent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.  
( ) AGAINST the adoption of a one per cent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.  
Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.  
The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the terms and provisions of the above mentioned House Bill No. 207, and in accordance with the law applicable to other municipal elections.  
Section V. Notice of said election shall be given by publishing a substantial copy of this ordinance on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City. The date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set for said election. The City Clerk is hereby instructed to cause said notice to be so given.

The City Clerk is hereby instructed to cause said notice to be so given.

Section VI. The rule requiring that an ordinance shall be read on three separate days, is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall become effective as provided by the charter of this City.
