CALLAHAN COUNTY OFFICIALS ASK FOR FARM TO MARKET ROAD

AUSTIN: A delegation of Callahan County officials appeared Monday before the State Highway Commission to ask for a new Farm-to-Market road connecting Baird-Clyde-Eula and Clyde Lake.

Commission chairman DeWitt Greer noted that the cost estimates for the proposed road were divided into five sections.

The proposed road would run from IH 20 west of Baird, south and west to intersect with 603

at Eula, with a spur to Clyde Lake.

The estimated cost of the road would be \$749,200.

Callahan County Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr., said that the existing roads serve two school routes, but that neither school bus nor mail routes can cross the Pecan Bayou when it runs high. "We feel that the Farm-to-Market road would help the county and help the citizens to carry on their normal business."

\$5,173 Savings Bonds Sold In Co.

BAIRD — Mr. Howard Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee, reported today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Callahan County totaled \$5,173 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$49,330 for 38 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$130,000.

July sales in Texas amounted to \$15,434,922 compared to \$15,058,788 during the same period of 1969 - an increase of 2.4 per cent. Year to date sales were \$106,206,174, while the 1969 sales totaled \$104,261,845 - a 1.8 per cent increase.

National sales during the month were \$402 million - 1.2 per cent above 1969 July sales. During the first seven months sales were \$2.9 billion for 62 per cent of the national goal of \$4.7 billion. Exchanges of Series E and H Savings Bonds amounting to \$23 million were reported for July, compared to last July's \$19 million.

1320 Callahan County Men Served Between WWI and Vietnam War

BAIRD — There are 1,320 veterans in Callahan County and 1,354,000 in Texas, according to Veterans Administration figures released today based on America's 27.3 million former servicemen as of the beginning of 1970.

According to the latest available figures, of the 181,000 veterans who have served during the Vietnam era, 220 were from Callahan County.

World War II veterans make up the largest group of veterans with 640 from the county, and 738,000 from the state as a whole.

The number of Texans serving in the Korean Conflict was 290,000, and 190 came from Callahan County.

Some 190 Callahan men saw military service only between the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam era, and 154,000 from the entire state.

Of 73,000 World War I veterans in Texas, 140 are from Callahan.

An estimated 176 of America's 5,000 Spanish-American War veterans live in Texas.

Veterans with questions on benefits are urged to contact their nearest VA office. Those who served since Feb. 1, 1955, may be eligible for G. I. Bill training. Those who served since July 27, 1950, may be eligible for home loans.

School Bond Election Called for September 26

BAIRD — The Board of Trustees of the Baird Independent School District, meeting in a called session on Thursday, August 27, 1970, voted to call a bond election.

On September 26, 1970, citizens of the Baird Independent School District will be asked to vote on the issuance of \$275,000.00 school house bonds for improvements of school facilities.

Deficiencies in some of our facilities and lack of other facilities have been noted by many over the past several years. However, in March, 1970, the Texas Education Agency made an accreditation survey of our school. A number of deficiencies were observed, and the school was advised that steps must be taken to correct them if accreditation standards are to be met.

The proposed improvements, estimated by the architect to be \$275,000.00 are:

1. New junior high library — the old library is not large enough to accommodate a normal size class. Present room to be converted to principal's office and teachers' workroom.

2. Science laboratory for junior high — At present there is no junior high science facility.

The district presently owes \$176,759.00 maturing through 1985. By adding \$275,000.00 in new bonds maturing over a 23 year period, it has been determined that a tax rate of 45c will service all principal and interest requirements on all bonds based upon present valuation. This is an increase of 25c over what is presently needed. A computation of taxes is outlined below which will allow you to determine within a few cents of what

your share of the new school building program will be.

GOVERNOR SMITH ISSUES APPEAL FOR SAFE DRIVING

AUSTIN — Governor Preston Smith today issued a strong safe-driving appeal to all Texas motorists for the upcoming Labor Day weekend.

"Once again, most Texas motorists will be using our streets and highways over a long week-end holiday period," the Governor said.

"Once again, I, as Governor, and all those with traffic safety leadership will urge motorists to DRIVE FRIENDLY. Only this time, the theme of 'We'll see you Tuesday' has been added."

"For the past year, most holiday weekends have recorded lower traffic deaths than the same period for the prior year. I feel that this has resulted because of the outstanding effort made by enforcement agencies, press, radio, television and citizen groups in keeping safety before motorists and because motorists themselves have responded."

"I am encouraging use of our highways, parks and public and

private facilities by Texas citizens during these holiday periods. The threat of traffic crashes should not have to be a deterrent to highway travel."

"Colonel Speir will have maximum Department of Public Safety patrol coverage during the period from 6 p. m. Friday, September 4, to midnight Monday, September 7. DPS officers will be on duty to insure that motorists will have all proper protection from irresponsible drivers, and those who do not drive like responsible citizens may expect firm treatment from these officers."

In addition to these news and enforcement activities, the Governor cited other aids to motorists:

The Texas Motor Transportation Association and its Council of Safety Supervisors who will provide road patrol to motorists in difficulty.

The Texas Jaycee organization which will conduct its effective roadside Rest Stop program.

AAA which will continue its effective "Bring 'Em Back Alive" radio spot program.

The many more local communities and organizations throughout the State which have developed their own programs to support traffic safety to motorists passing through their communities.

For the information of Labor Day Weekend highway travelers, Governor Smith highlighted the most frequent accident causes experienced during previous holiday weekends:

Drunk driving
Fatigue
Running off road
Excessive speed
Improper passing
Failure to yield Right of Way.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE . . .

WASHINGTON, D. C. — As Americans, we have justifiable reasons to be thankful and proud. Traveling and visiting again in Texas during the Congressional recess, it seems strikingly evident that we in this part of the country have particular cause for confidence.

Perhaps too long we have magnified our problems and taken too seriously the obstacles that hinder us.

Unemployment is considered beyond tolerable limits when it reaches 3 1/2 to 4 percent of our total population. The figure nationally is now approaching 5 percent. In our area of Texas, though some are certainly unemployed, the figure is not near that level.

The growth is not spectacular, nor does it reach our hopes, but comparatively we are less affected by day to day fluctuations in interest rates, consumer demands and employment than more highly industrialized and specialized areas which do not enjoy such a dependable base.

Our lakes, farms, ranches and "open spaces" provide places for our people to enjoy life without the distractions of crowding, noise, and pollution. Here at home, we can take time to think and make calm decisions concerning our own lives and actions we choose to help others.

Our churches are well attended and reflect the stable faith and moral integrity of our people. By comparison, in some places in our country, lack of interest has resulted in financial disaster for heretofore strong religious groups.

The great battle of the future will not be solved on the battlefield, in halls of government, or workshops of commerce. The decisions that really count for lasting good are those of the spirit: how to be happy, how to adjust to change - how to get along with our fellowman.

The advantages we see about us here in the 17th Congressional District provide the climate for producing clear thinking, solid citizens with moral integrity - who seek proper values to solve the problems of our time.

Our several colleges and universities provide a wholesome climate for our young people coming from good public schools. Here they receive sound academic training that further equips them for challenges that are all about us.

These, our young people, are our greatest blessing. To continue opportunity for their development is the greatest contribution we can make to insure the future of our great land. In a world of turmoil, doubt, and fear - there is reason for encouragement and basis for genuine hope.

Compared to any other section of this Nation, our assets here at home, both materially and in the character of people, are indeed great.

Seven times Jesus used the expression, "There shall be weeping and the gnashing of teeth," with reference to the eternal suffering of the wicked. The entire 25th chapter of Matthew is given to warnings about the judgment and the punishment of sinners. The lesson of these parables is clear: A reckoning day is coming. There will be a separation of men. Many will be lost, eternally lost. Few will be saved! Everything is NOT going to turn out alright for those who have failed to obey God. As the scripture says, "For we know him that said, Vengeance belongeth to me, I will recompence. And again, The Lord shall judge his people. It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God." (Heb. 10:30, 31) Overlooking, condoning or mollycoddling sin will not make it go away. The justice of God must be met and sinful living must be purged. "And thinkest thou this, O man, that judgest them which do such things, and doest the same, that thou shalt escape the judgment of God?" (Rom. 2:3) Prepares for the judgment of God!

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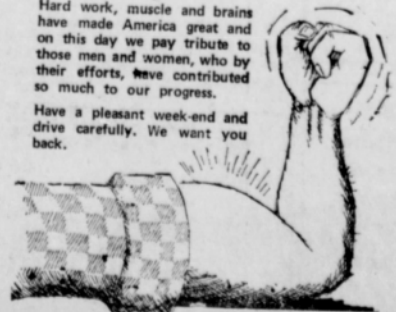

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the BAIRD INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT deem it advisable to issue bonds under the provisions of Chapter 20 of the Texas Education Code by submitting (at an election called for the purpose) the proposition hereinafter set forth; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE BAIRD INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: That said election shall be held on the 26th day of September, 1970, at the American Legion Hall, Baird, Texas, and the entire District shall constitute one election precinct for said election.

SECTION 2: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:
Jon Hardwick, Presiding Judge
Mrs. Claud Holley, Alternate Presiding Judge.
The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than three qualified clerks

to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M.

Mrs. Frances Greenway is hereby appointed as the Clerk for absentee voting for said election, and the Business Office in said District, Baird, Texas, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted from Sept. 8 thru Sept. 23 for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00 A. M. to 4:00 P. M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

SECTION 3: That at said election the following proposition shall be submitted.

"SHALL the Board of Trustees of the BAIRD INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT of Callahan County, Texas, be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$275,000) for school building purposes, to wit: the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor, and shall there be pledged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due, said bonds to be issued in one or more series or issues to mature serially or otherwise not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine?"

SECTION 4: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with V. A. T. S. Election Code, so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:
"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"
The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left

of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 5: All resident qualified electors of the District, including those who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. At said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election and said notice shall be published one time at least ten (10) days prior to the date set for the election in a newspaper of general circulation in the District.

Seedbed is now being prepared for sprigging coastal bermuda grass next spring on the Lewis Fortune farm.

Kleingrass, an improved pasture grass, has been seeded on James Hickman, Lewis Fortune and Blan Odom. Kleingrass pro-

duces a high protein forage under proper fertilization.

Recent rains provided moisture for fall application of fertilizer on bermuda grass and weeping lovegrass. The addition of nitrogen now will provide a high protein level this fall and winter.

Basic recreational facilities agreement between the Soil Conservation Service and the City of Clyde has been let on the Clyde Lake, a multi-purpose structure. The agreement calls for 1.5 miles of gravel base access road, 1 mile of fence on the north side of recreational area, clearing of trees, and for a temporary project entrance sign.
