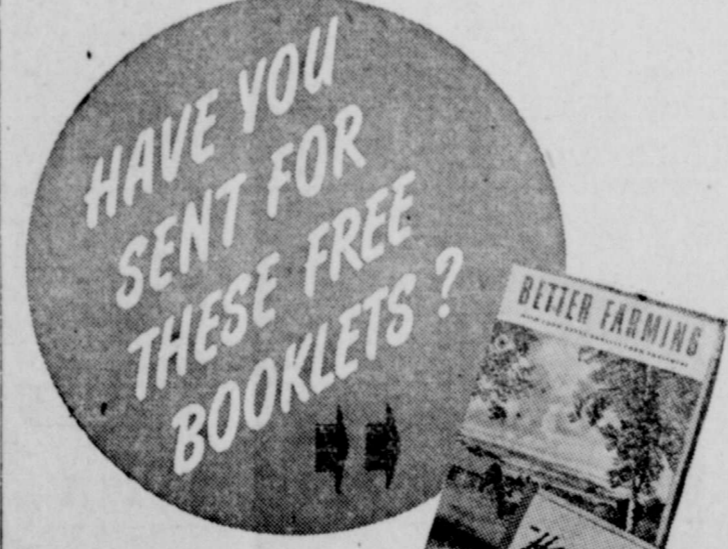
F. F. A. NEWS

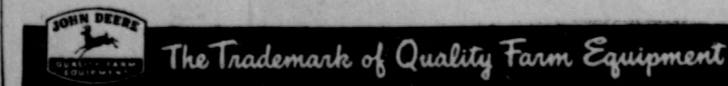

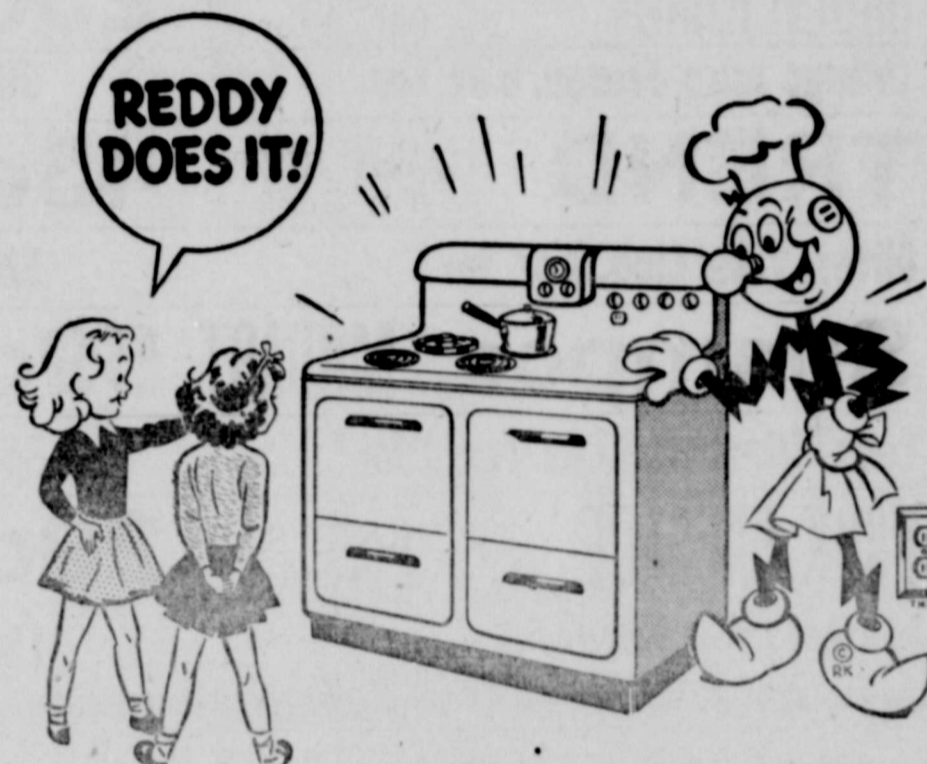
