

Mayor pro-tem resigns

The Muleshoe City Council accepted a letter of resignation from the mayor pro-tem and city councilman of District #2, A.V. Wood, during a meeting on Tuesday. The resignation took affect on Jan. 14.

Wood has served seven terms on the city council and was chosen mayor pro-tem in 1993 by the city council, to

Kennedy, Hahn win top barrow awards

Leaner, lighter packages were the preference of judge Dirk Aaron of San Antonio during the Junior Market Swine Division of the annual Bailey County Junior Livestock Show, held Jan. 13-14 at the Bailey County Coliseum.

Ky Kennedy's 198-pound Cross barrow was chosen by Aaron as the Grand Champion, while a 176-pound Duroc exhibited by Kyle Hahn was judged the Reserve Grand Champion.

Aaron, the Bexar County Extension agent, selected the trimmer pigs on fairly consistent basis. Even in the cases in which a champion or reserve champion came from the heavyweight class, most were

among the lightest in their respective class.

Aaron broke the mold in the Chester class however, where Bryce Embry's 215-pounder was the champion. Johnathan Bennett had the reserve champion at 165.

In the gilt division, Kimberly Griswold had the champion with her 175-pound entry that came from the lightest weight class. Aaron stepped up for the reserve champion, choosing Ben Angeley's 222-pound heavyweight as the reserve champion.

The Hampshire breed saw both top prizes come from the same weight class. Ben Angeley had the champion at 185 pounds, while Joshua

Tooley had the reserve champion at 180.

In the Berkshire class, Kyle Kindel had the champion with a 177-pounder, while LeAnn Altman had the reserve at 165.

Kyle Hahn had the champion Duroc (also the Reserve Grand Champion), while Johnna Cleavinger had the reserve champion at 183 pounds.

Kindel also had the champion Poland at 187 pounds, while Daniel Morris exhibited the reserve champion, a 168-pounder.

Kasey Wright won the Spot class with a 166-pound entry, while Cody Altman had the reserve champion at 180.

Hospital board to hear about audit

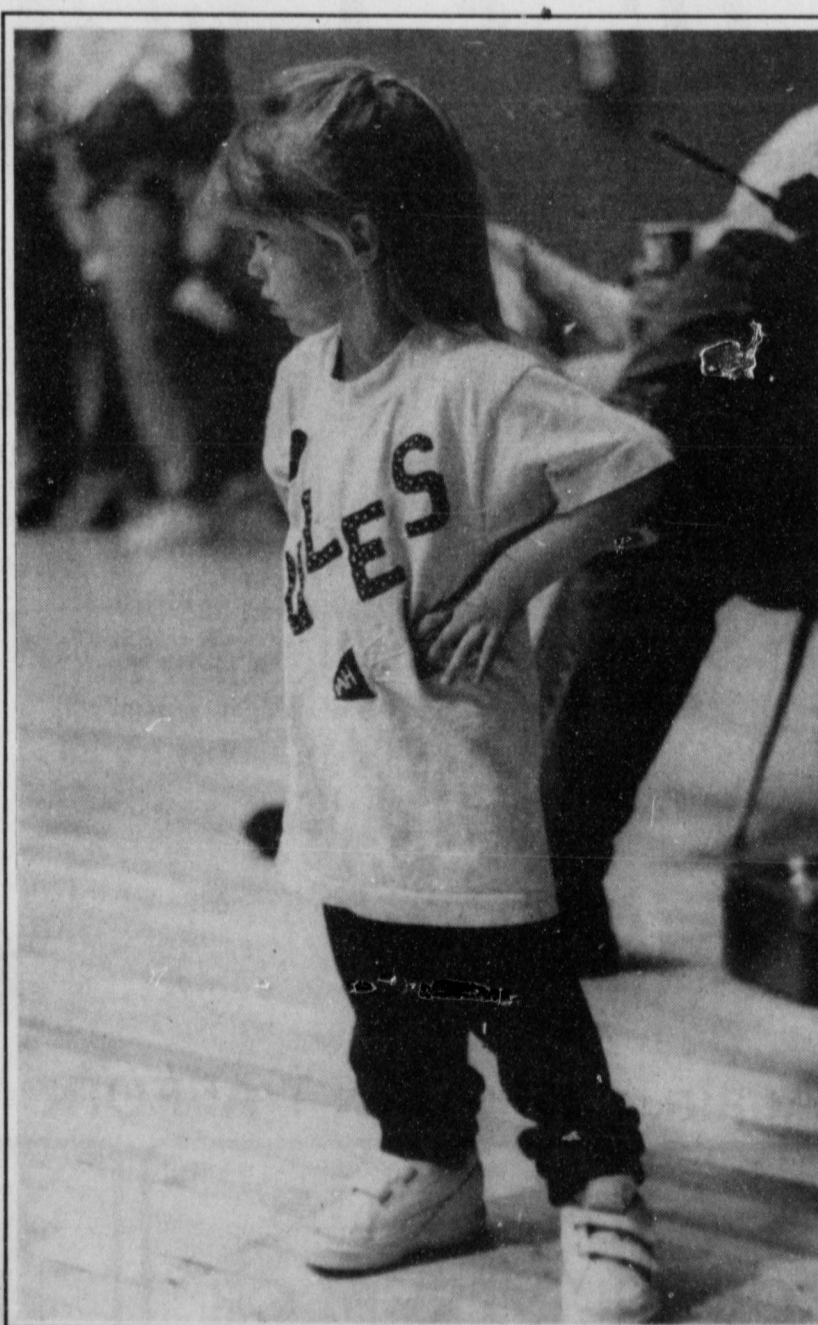
The Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board of Directors will meet Thursday, Jan. 19 at 6 p.m. in the dining room at the hospital.

represent the mayor during any absence.

In his letter of resignation, Wood cited a major reason for his resignation was due to a change in his lifestyle and lack of time. Wood is reportedly commuting to Farwell, where he is considering moving.

Upon accepting Wood's resignation, the council discussed whether or not to appoint a replacement. Under the Texas Election Code, someone may be appointed to fulfill the remainder of Wood's term, which expires in May, and must then seek election to that office thereafter.

However, since there are only a few months left on Wood's term and the next

scheduled election cannot be held until May, the council may not appoint somebody. Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr said that a decision will be made by the next city council meeting whether or not to name an appointee.

City councilmen Tom Bonds and Juan Chavez both said they would like to see somebody appointed to fulfill the remainder of Wood's term.

In addition to serving as mayor pro-tem and city councilman, Wood also represented the city council by serving on the Bailey County Appraisal District Board. The city council must now also appoint another city councilman to fill Wood's seat on that board.

Tooley, the reserve champion senior showman, was selected from his division because the senior showmanship champion, Carolyn Schuster, had won the Jimmy Dale Black

award at the 1994 stock show and was not eligible to compete. As the 1995 champion, Claunch will not be eligible for the 1996 Jimmy Dale Black contest, but will be eligible to compete in the individual showmanship contests.

Barrett was the lone junior selected, having won the junior division and overall showmanship contest in the swine division.

The Jimmy Dale Black contest requires the three contestants to show a lamb, a pig and a steer while Gerhart evaluated their work.

City council discusses annexation of airport

The Muleshoe City Council discussed an annexation schedule of the Muleshoe Municipal Airport during a meeting Tuesday. The proposed annexation of the airport, which is located on Highway 84, east of Muleshoe, will give the city jurisdiction over that property and will give the city authority to develop that area.

Dave Marr, Muleshoe city manager, said that a public hearing would be held, which is routine, prior to the annexation being approved by the council.

The annexation will include the airport itself and a small strip of land on the right side of the airport.

In other business Tuesday, the council authorized the city manager to work with a negotiator and with Wes-Tex Feedyard, Inc., in order that the city may sell a piece of land to Wes-Tex in which Wes-Tex currently has an encroach-

ment on.

Marr said that when Wes-Tex Feedyard bought their current property they built a fence over their line and onto city property. The encroachment was spotted by a surveyor and the city wants to correct it.

The council agreed to sell the encroachment area, about 7/10 of an acre, to Wes-Tex

Feedyard after a surveyor comes up with an estimate, based on what the city paid for that land per acre.

Also on Tuesday, the council held a discussion on the 1995 Seal Coat Program. Marr reported to the board that the city expects to receive about the same amount of funding to seal coat roads this year as last year. The city council agreed at a previous meeting to work on roads on an area basis at a time, concentrating on one specific area, rather than do them in a scattered manner.

Gramm's "Private Property Rights Restoration Act" safeguards the rights of individuals whose land is the target of governmental regulations or policies which reduce or destroy the value of the property.

The bill requires compensation to be paid when such a taking has reduced property valued by at least 25 percent or \$10,000.

The Gramm Bill has been endorsed by the American Farm Bureau Federation,

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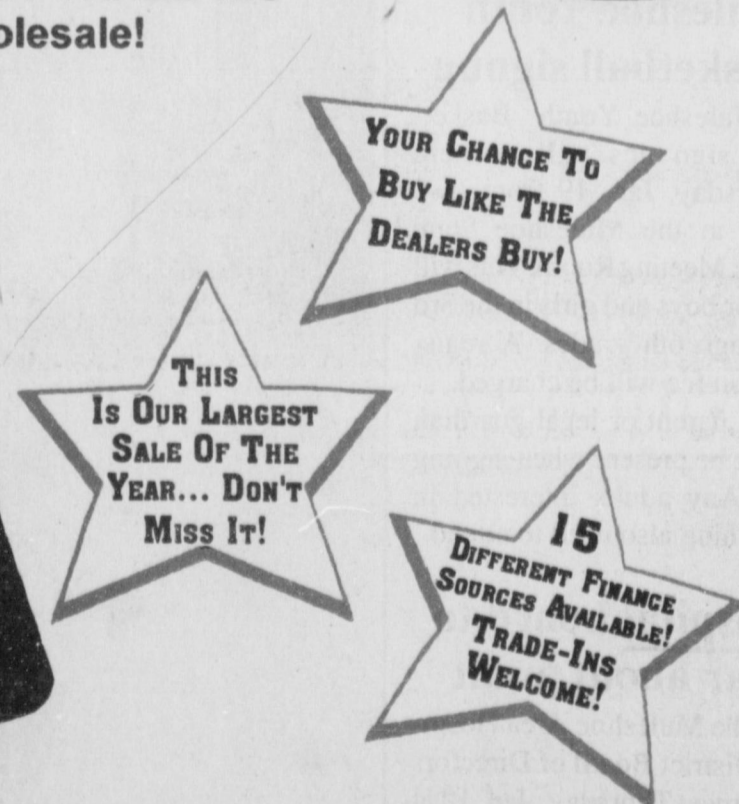
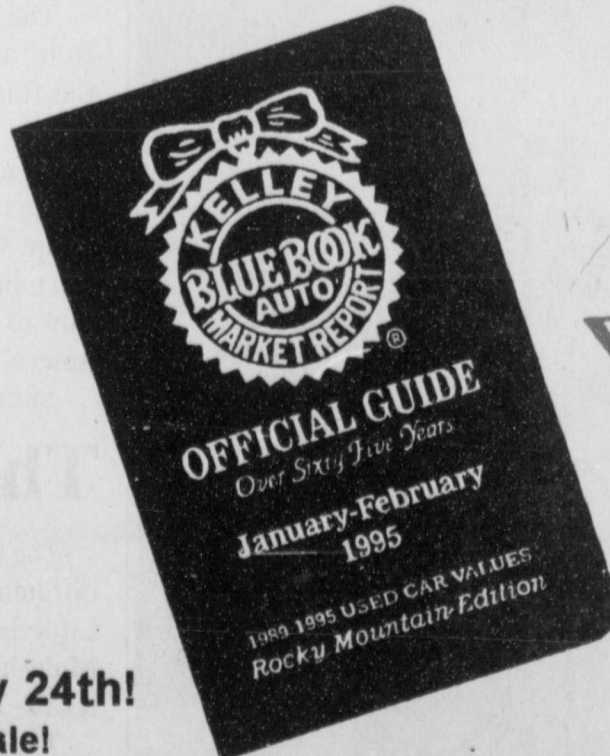
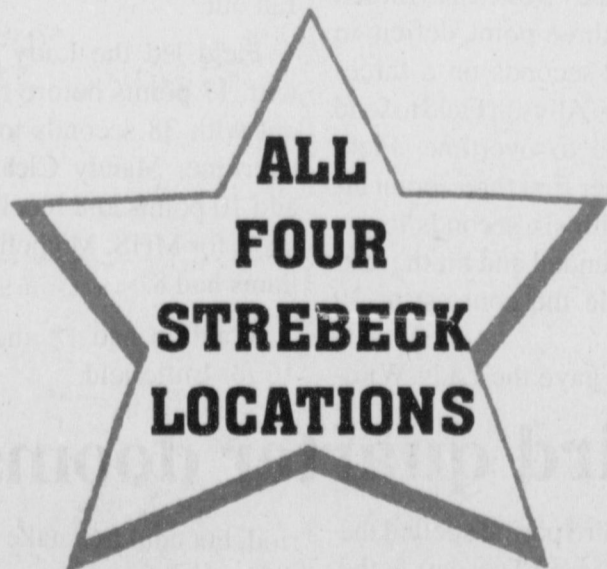

Informative labels indicate in which region, or regions, each plant can be found. "Texas: The Natural Beauty" can be viewed in the Hazlewood Arts and Education Building from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday - Saturday and 1-5 p.m. Sunday.

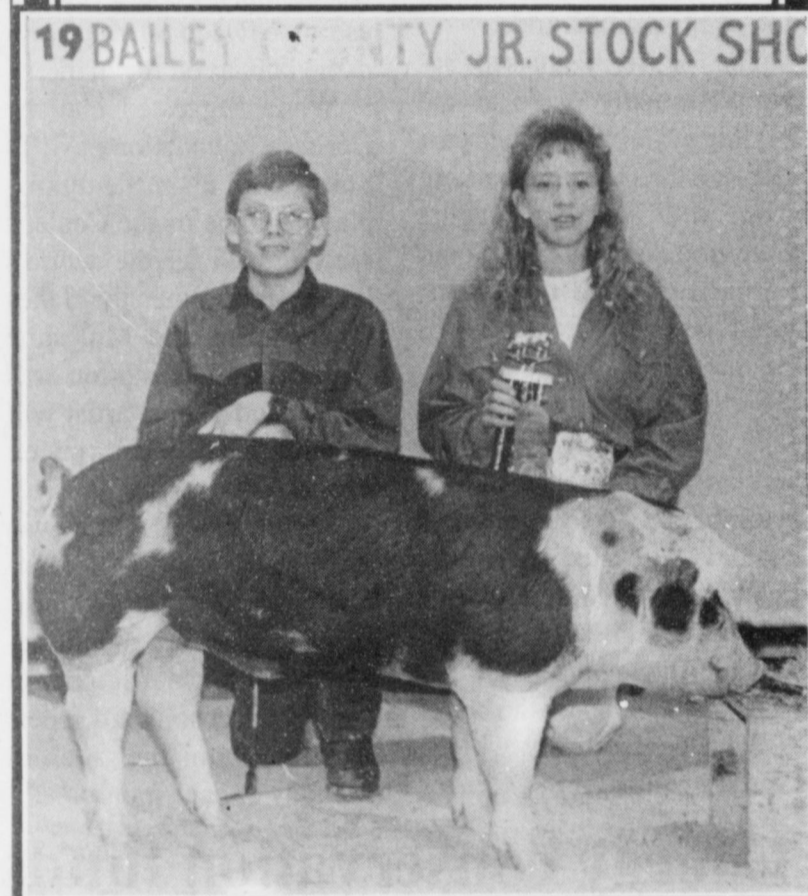

Protect Your Rights! "Render" Your Taxable Property By April 14th

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office...or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income--such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1994. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1995.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing or postmarking 1995 renditions is April 14. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 14 deadline.

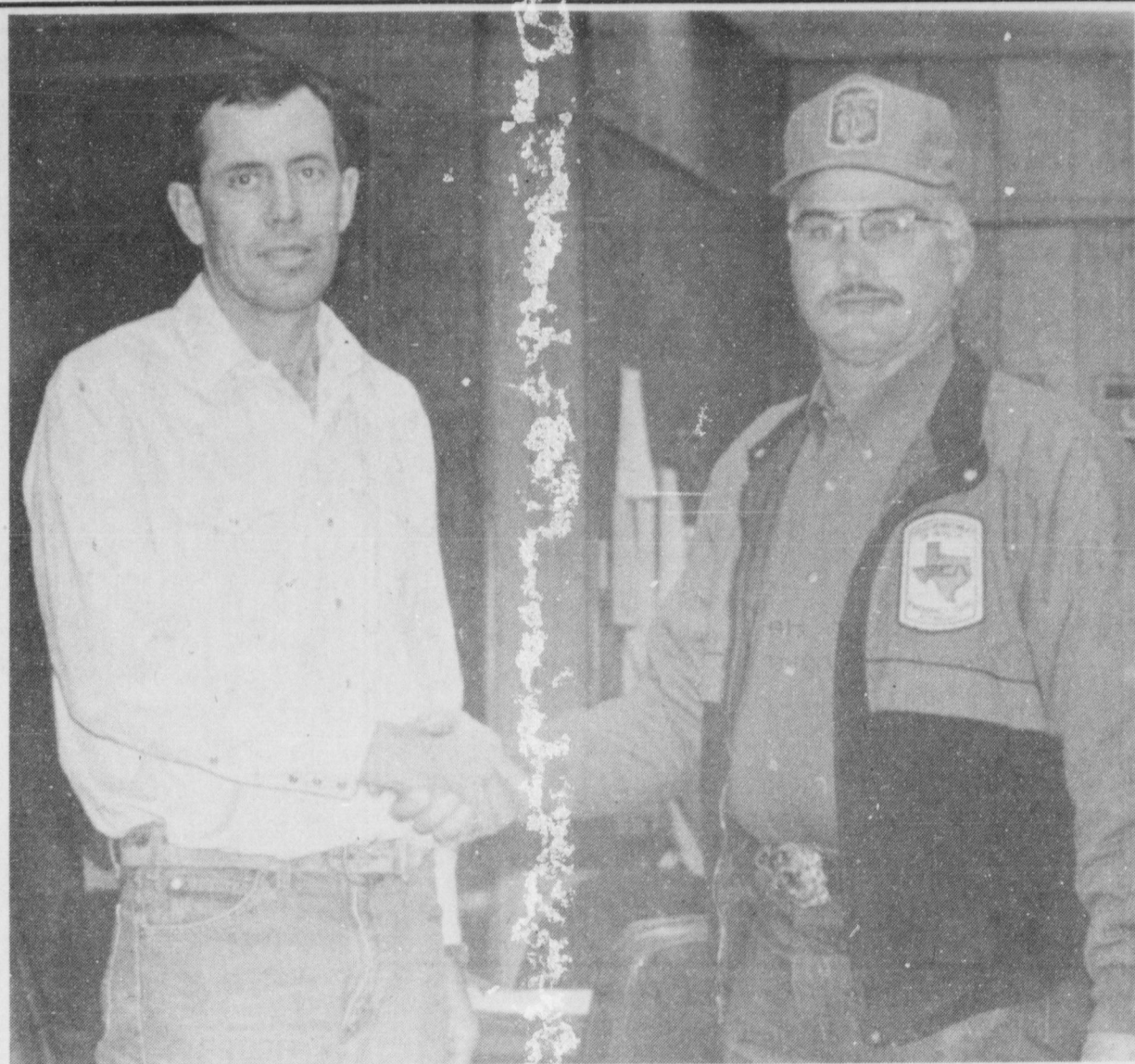

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber -- not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1995 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already received agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

West Texas A & M to offer new class

CANYON - West Texas A&M University will offer a new course in conservation biology from 11 a.m. - 12:15 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays during the spring semester.

"Conservation biology is a relatively new field of inquiry that is expanding in both scope and significance especially at the national and international levels," Dr. Kathleen Blair, assistant professor of biology, said. "It is somewhat of a synthesis between theoretical ecology and wildlife management."

According to Blair, the course will address such issues as conservation values and ethics, patterns and processes in biodiversity, conservation genetics, demographics, community ecology, habitat fragmentation, conservation management, ecological restoration, ecology, politics, economics, finding common ground and

sustainable development.

"Conservation biology is the root of many state natural heritage programs and federal and international policy decisions," Blair said. "Many jobs within state and federal land management programs require employees to follow ecological management plans."

Blair said this course will better prepare graduates to enter into state and federal programs and would be beneficial to those working in the field who are required to follow ecosystem Management plans.

According to Blair, one example of ecosystem management is the desire of Yellowstone National Park biologists to reintroduce wolves into the ecosystem of the park.

"Without the top predators, the system will not function properly," Blair said. "Whereas most biologists understand this,

it is also important for them to understand how to communicate this with the public."

Prerequisites for the course include an ecology or wildlife management course or Blair's approval. Students can register for the course under BIOL 5450 or BIOL 450.

Students enrolled at WTAMU can register by phone through 4 p.m. Monday, Jan. 23 at 806/656-1222. New students can register in person from 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. Friday, Jan. 13 in the Registrar's Office in the Old Main Building on the WTAMU campus. For more information about the course, contact Blair at 806/656-2568.

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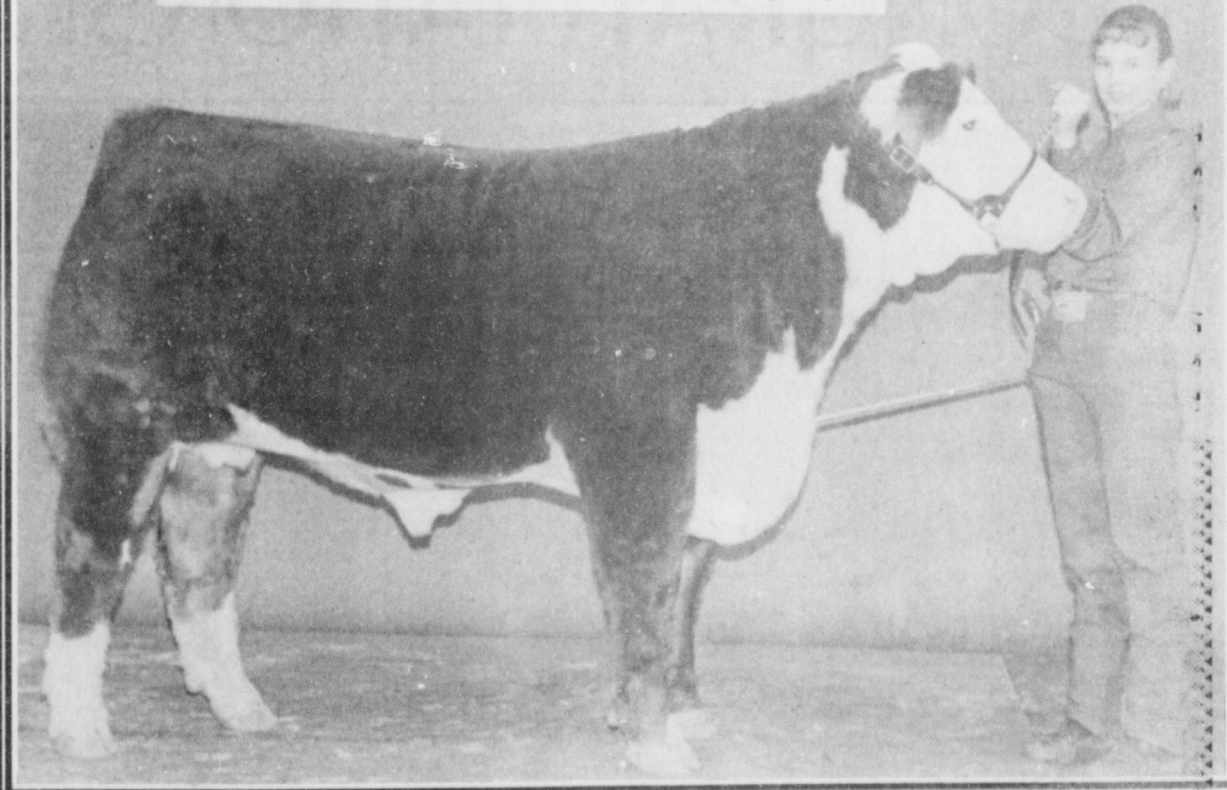

Laney re-elected to house

AUSTIN - James E. "Pete" Laney, D-Hale Center, was re-elected Tuesday as the 71st Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Laney pledged to help remove any barriers preventing people

from contributing their talents and ideas to the Texas legislative process.

"Every person should be able to make their voice heard in this chamber," Laney said.

He also noted that beginning today any citizen can have computer access to the

legislative information systems. From home computers, they will be able to track the progress of legislation.

He also plans to request committee hearings on ways to broadcast future House sessions so that all Texans can watch the proceedings of the House.

"I want the people of Texas to be a part of this process more than ever before," Laney said.

Laney also pledged to balance the state budget without increasing state taxes. "We are fortunate to

have a strong economy generating state revenues," Laney said. "But the growing demands of education, criminal justice and

federally mandated programs will require difficult decisions on

all areas of the budget. Lawmakers also will reassess the entire

structure of public education in Texas. "I truly hope this session can be devoted to im-

proving the quality of education in Texas rather than creating yet another school financé

plan," Laney said. He also called for changes in the juvenile justice system. He said we must do a better job

of dealing with juvenile offenders and protecting our citizens from violence.

Laney, 51, was first elected speaker in January 1993. A Hale Center farmer, Laney is married to the former Nelda McQuien. They have three children: daughter KaLyn Laney of Austin; daughter Jamey Laney Phillips of Lubbock; and son J. Pete Laney, a Texas Tech University student.

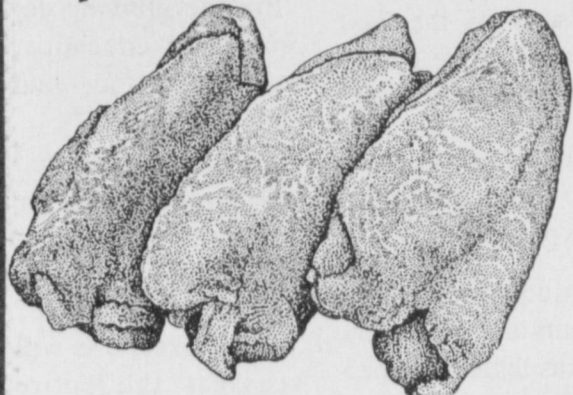

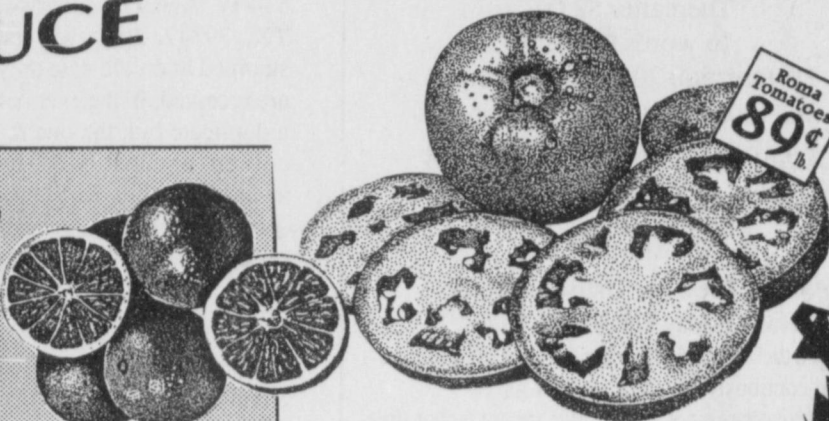
