TheJennyslippers typically invited 4th grade students to celebrate with them to help teach them about Texas history. Entertainment will also be provided, as well as cake.


Youth baseball equipment needed

Athletic boosters hope new program will turn local athletes into winners

The Muleshoe Athletic Boosters and Muleshoe Schools Athletic Department are currently implementing a new strength and conditioning program for Muleshoe Schools. But it is more than just a winning team they are aiming for - they want to create a winning attitude.

The boosters club and athletic department discussed a new Bigger Faster Stronger program with the Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees during a meeting on Monday night, seeking to update the board on the program and gain the

The BFS program is being implemented into the MISD Athletic Departments follow-

ing a seminar this past weekend whch was deemed a motivational success. Approximately 300 local athletes reportedly participated in the seminar.

"The Bigger Faster Stronger Program is a unique program designed for the improvement of each athlete," said Randy Adair, Muleshoe High School Athletic Director. "The program does not put the athletes in competition with each other. It challenges athletes to challenge themselves."

"We have already committed to this program and think it will make a difference. We are not asking the board for anything right now, except to watch and listen and support the program," Adair said.

Adair said the BFS program is similar to what MHS already uses. However, he noted a big difference in techniques which can make a big difference from the way a kid lifts weights to the way they are trained.

Dr. Barry Cowart is president of an Athletic Boosters new committee formed to develop long-range goals for MISD. Cowart said that MISD has had a large number of athletes recently and during football season who had accidents or injuries. He said most of these accidents probably could have been prevented through better training techniques.

Also, a major disadvatage and potential cause of these accidents, Cowart said, is the lack of year-round training for athletes. A summer training program was offered this past year but no students participated in it.

Cowart said, "Studies have

shown that for an eight-week period a kid does not workout, it takes them about twice that amount of time to get back to the level they were at before."

Adair agrees with this philosophy and feels implementing a summer youth program to encourage athletes to keep in shape during the summer, would make a big difference.

To support this philosophy, many members of the Athletic Boosters visited Stephensville, a town with a school deemed a success by using the BFS pro-

Gary Glover, president of the Athletic Boosters, said the main purpose of the trip was to observe the school. He said the Athletic booster were impressed, but not by any kind of "state-of-the-art" facilities. It was an "attitude that filled the building" at the school in Sephensville.

Glover said, "Through the BFS program, the enthusiasm will generate itsef."

A major approach the BFS program will instill in young athletes is an enormous amount of motiviation and direction.

Adair said that MISD has already begun to implement the program. The program will not cost the school district any additional funds at this time, nor will it change the current schedule of students in athletics.

Adair said, "The major kind of change we are talking about right now is teaching kids to burn fat, learn better lifestyles and how to be better athletes." The BFS program will include nutrition. It will not include

Resident says more school facilities are needed

A Muleshoe resident, Dave Faver, addressed the Muleshoe School Board of Trustees on Monday night and expressed a perceived need for more school athletic facilities.

During the open forum part of a meeting Monday, Faver said there is a "lack of faciltiies" at Muleshoe Schools, in particular, tennis courts.

Favor said that prior to go-

ing to the board, he visited with two differnet groups of people, people with children in Muleshoe Schools and people with none. He said they

all seemed to agree that more tennis facilities were needed.

"Tennis is becoming a

popular sport and in order for our students to be competitive in the school system, new fa-

cilities are needed," he said. "We presently have two courts and that is not enough to hold a tournament."

He said, "On behalf of these people, I hope the school board will consider adding more tennis courts."

Cindy Purdy, MISD board of trustees president, said the board will discuss options.

In other business on Mon-

day night, the school board approved an Update 48 policy, with the exception of a drug

testing provision. This provision will be reviewed at a later date. The board also approved

the adoption of textbooks from the District Textbook Committee and approved administrative staff contracts following a closed session.

Texas Panhandle.

The name for the unit, Jericho Road, was chosen from a Bible story about the good samaritan in the Book of Luke. That story took place on Jericho Road. This also follows with the good samaritan society philosophy.

The center's "E" wing has been redesigned and renovated. It now includes a lounge room, extra kitchen and dining area, a nurses station, walk-in shower and other features.

Farwell Convalescent Cen-

ter first opened its doors in 1976. The center presently has residents from various locations, including Tucumcari, Portales, Clovis and Melrose, N.M.; and from Texas towns including Farwell, Friona, Bovina, Muleshoe and Plainview.

any kindof use of drugs or

steroids. TheMISD Athletic Department plans a curriculum for the BFS program which will include student athletes in

grades 7th and above.

The BFS seminar held this past weekend was conducted by Coach Jim Brown of Salt Lake City, Utah. The basic curriculum of this seminar will be used in implementing the BFS program at MISD. Adair said MISD will use Brown strictly on a consultational basis at this point.

The Athletic Boosters are looking at the overall longrange goals for MISD athletics and are currently also looking at the possibility of conducting a summer youth program with possible assistance from the city.

They are also exploring other options, such as writing for state and federal grants, seeking support from the community and donations from the private sector. This will include a search for in-kind donations, such as donations of labor, service and cash.

Funds are expected to be needed in the near future because the current school gym facilities will soon be outgrown with an increase in athletes expected.

Adair said, "In part, this new program is a similar format to what we have already been using. But now, we are

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Bivins files bill to allow state to assist local schools

AUSTIN - State Sen. Teel Bivins (R-Amarillo) recently filed a bill that would allow the state to assist local school districts with the cost of constructing school buildings.

"Texas has a moral responsibility to help local school districts pay for building classrooms," Bivins said. "I believe that even in light of yesterday's Supreme court ruling. While the court vacated the lower injunction, the court made it clear the state has a duty to fully fund a school finance system that includes facilities."

The court ruling stated: "The districts must have substantially equal access to the funding for a general diffusion of knowledge for both operations and facilities needs. If the Legislature abdicates its duty with respect to either of these needs, we will have no choice but to hold that the school finance system is unconstitutional in

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its entirety."

Bivins pointed out the state's overall proportion of education funding has dropped over recent decades, putting more pressure on local districts to make up the difference. "The state should be more of a partner in funding facilities as well as educational programs," Bivins said.

Under Senate Bill 5, the state would provide supplemental funding for school districts wanting to build or renovate facilities based on the wealth of the districts.

Criminal Justice Agency to recruit minorities

AUSTIN- The Texas Department of Criminal Justice has launched an aggressive minority recruiting campaign to help fill 9,00 jobs the agency expects to staff in the coming year, including 7,000 new openings in the prison expan-

sion program.

"We intend to meet or exceed the statewide minority employment goals in every job category mandated by the Legislature in the appropriations bill," TDCJ Executive

Director James A. Collins said of the recruiting drive.

"We can do this by capitalizing on our hiring opportunities as we complete the expansion program," Collins said. "Our management and our board have no higher priority."

Collins said the agency will stress recruiting Hispanic Texans "because that is our weakest area and it is the area where we have the greatest number of new employees because of expansion, the recruiting campaign will equally promote careers in TDCJ's other divisions, including pardons and paroles, community

justice assistance, the Windham School System and the new state jails, Collins said.

The City of Muleshoe constantly has a number of pets at the city animal shelter who have either been lost or are strays and are in need of a home. The city would like to inform and remind the public that these pets are ready for adoption. Animals which are not adopted or claimed within five days after being picked up by the city's animal control officer are then destroyed as a last option. The cost to the city of upkeeping these pets can grow over a period of time.

Raymond Martinez, the city's animal control officer said that many times pets are picked up as strays and cannot be returned to their rightful owners because they don't have tags or any other information to identify them. Also, he said that often times an owner will wait until it is too late, after a pet has been destroyed, to contact the animal shelter. Martinez said the animal shelter should be contacted once a pet is missing so they can be aware of it.

If a person's pet is picked up by the city though, there is a \$5 a day care charge they must pay to get their pet back.

The city encourages people to consider adopting a pet from the city animal shelter. To adopt a pet, a deposit is required to nsure the pet is spayed or neutered. The deposit fee is returned once proof that it has been spayed or newtered is presented."

Animals must also receive rabie shots before they can be adopted and an adoption fee and \$1 fee for a tag to the city must be paid. For more information about adopting a pet from the city animal shelter, contact Martinez at City Hall.
