4-H Achievement Day Program November 12

An Achievement Program honoring Briscoe County's outstanding 4-H Club Members will be held at the Court House on November 12.

Medals will be given for Meat Animal Demonstrations, Garden Demonstrations, Poultry, Field Crops, Achievement, Leadership and Soil Conservation. Ribbons will be awarded to members that won recognition at the County Encampment held last summer.

4-H Council members consisting of John Schott, Carolyn Garrison, Freddie Edwards of Silvertown and Johnnie King, Melvin Cobb, and Murray Morrison of Quitaque and Harry Thompson of San Jacinto—have planned and are responsible for the program. The 4-H Achievement day is a National 4-H Club observance.

During the year Briscoe County Club boys and girls exhibited and showed 16 steers and 40 hogs at five stock shows, and many other demonstrations that will be recognized at the awards program.

The Land and Livestock Judging Teams placed second in district competition, and a grass team won several banners.

This club will receive a State award for being one of the outstanding counties in the State in Farm Safety. 4-H Club work is carried on by the Texas A & M College Extension Service through its extension agents and the Briscoe County Commissioners Court who will be special guests. All club members and their parents are urged to attend.

The accident occurred about a mile and a half east of the Sky Hi road side park and near where a car left the highway and rolled into the canyon, fatally injuring Harvey Courson, of Floydada about a week previous.

Fire of unknown origin was discovered about 8 o'clock Tuesday morning by employees of the Harvest Queen Elevator at South Plains. The flames spread rapidly from the elevator to a warehouse housing approximately 150,000 bushels of wheat. The elevator was full of milo which was destroyed. About eighty cars of milo stored on the ground and waiting for box cars for shipment to facilities of Harvest Queen Mill & Elevator Company,

escaped with little damage. The elevator and the warehouse were completely destroyed.

The Silvertown Fire Department answered the call and spent much of the day at the scene of the fire. They were unable to fight the fire effectively due to frozen pipes which carried the water supply. Chemicals were applied, but the grain was still smoldering Wednesday.

Approximate damage of the

fire would be between \$300,000 and \$400,000. W. T. Graham formerly of Silvertown, now of Amarillo, owned the building and elevator, but it was leased and operated by Harvest Queen Elevators of Plainview. Earl Porter of Silvertown is local manager of the plants at Silvertown, Whiteley and South Plains.

The grain was covered by insurance with reports that the build-ings were about 50% covered.
