## DYESS SERGEANT FOUND DEAD NEAR CLYDE LAKE MONDAY

CLYDE — M. Sgt. Harry C. Boyer, 32, was found shot to death, five miles south of Clyde at Clyde Lake, at 1:45 p. m. Monday, according to Sheriff Grayson Miller.

Boyer's pickup was parked about one mile west of the dam at the lake. He was stationed at Dyess AFB.

The body was spotted by young men flying over in a plane, according to Miller.

The body was about 300 yards from his pickup out in a pasture among some mesquite trees. A hunting rifle was found near the body, Miller said. He had been shot in the jaw.

Miller said a ruling in the death would have to wait until further investigation, including an autopsy to determine the time of death, was completed.

Boyer was last heard from Saturday at about 5 p. m., Miller said.

An attempt to locate bulletins was sent out by Abilene police

at the request of Dyess security officials Sunday morning.

Funeral was pending according to Dyess officials. Details were not available immediately.

Boyer has been stationed at Dyess AFB since Jan. 8, 1971, where he was a C130 engine instructor with the 417th Field Training Detachment. He was a native of Indiana, Pa., and had been in the service 15 years. He and his wife, Mrs. Margaret Kay Boyer, and their three children lived at 118 New York, Dyess.

CLYDE — The Clyde Bulldogs thrashed Roscoe 35-0 last Saturday night before a record Homecoming crowd. The Bulldogs gathered 17 first downs and 344 yard on offense while holding the Plowboys to 28 yards rushing and five first downs.

In the 1st quarter, quarterback Jackie Fleming passed to Craig Loper for a 21 yard TD. Clyde came right back with two touchdowns in the 2nd period as Gary Barr hit right guard for 2 yards and one marker and Loper scooted 24 yards around left end for the other.

Mark Henager kicked an extra point and Doug Horner hit right tackle for two to give the Bulldogs a 21-0 halftime edge.

In the second half, Barr swept left end for 14 yards and a touchdown and Horner scored a 3-yard touchdown off

tackle. Barr rammed the middle of the line for two points to finish the scoring for Clyde. The second offensive unit played the 4th quarter.

Tackle Johnny York recovered two fumbles and Scott Kniffen, Robbie Tucker, Timmy Payne and Rick Gilmore shined on defense.

Blocking awards went to Barr and Henager, tackling awards to York, Payne and Tucker. Engate Hawk caught several key passes, and Jerry Anderson played well in the defensive secondary. Terry Rosinbaum recovered one fumble for Clyde.

This week, at 7:30, the Bulldogs open district 8-AA play in Clyde against the Winters Blizzards, who stomped Clyde 27-0 last year. The Blizzards are tough again, but the Bulldogs will be after a measure of revenge and have the desire to remain undefeated.





## UNDERSTANDING THE SCRIPTURES

(continued from last week)

When we are treating diseases or injuries to the body we want something that is sure and safe. When we build a building we want it to be safe. When the druggist compounds the formula for our prescription we want him to be sure it is just right. But, when it comes to the salvation of our soul (the most precious possession we have) we will accept flimsy half-truths and warped interpretations of the scriptures as being the religion of Christ.

Much of the preaching one hears today, supposedly in the name of Christ, has usually one of two equally disastrous results. Since so much of such preaching is contradictory and confusing, it drives many to refuse it all and turn to atheism or infidelity, or else accept the unreasonable position that all of it is alright with God. Both of these positions are equally dangerous and disastrous.

The one leads men to reject the idea that there is a God, or at least to reject the scriptures as being divinely inspired. The other causes men to jeopardize their souls by believing false and misleading doctrines and interpretations of mere men, and rejecting (in some instances) plain commandments and teachings of God.

The infidel reasons that if God is infinite, omniscient and omnipotent, as the scriptures teach, that He would not have given a system of hope and salvation so contradictory and confusing as so-called "Christian" religion today makes it appear. Indeed! If God had given a system so contradictory and confusing as this, it would be logical that it did not merit serious consideration from thinking and responsible men.

The alternative to this is equally tragic; that it, that anything is pleasing to God just so the person who does it is honest and sincere in his belief and life. This attitude makes man disposed to laugh at what God has said, to have little or no respect for God's word, and to rely upon human wisdom and feelings instead of a "Thus saith the Lord." Such utter disregard for what God says is sure to bring eternal ruin upon all who believe it!

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

## New Rates for Charged Classified Advertising

All CHARGED Classified Advertising will be 25c extra, unless billed to an established account. This 25c will include new postal rates and billing costs.

## ALL OVERDUE ACCOUNTS

Any account over 60 days delinquent will be charged an additional 25c for postal and billing costs, plus 10% of the total bill, to be added on each month until the account is paid.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### FACTS CONCERNING RE-RECORDING OF BRANDS IN TEXAS

All brands and marks on Tex-  
 as livestock must be re-recorded  
 with County Clerks after  
 August 30, 1971, according to a  
 new law passed during the last  
 session of the Texas Legislature.  
 Producers will be given a six-  
 month period, August 30, 1971  
 through February 29, 1972, in  
 which to register these brands  
 and marks and the location on  
 the animal which they are cur-  
 rently using, after which time  
 any unrecorded brand will be  
 available for use on a "first-  
 come" basis.

The law further states that  
 all such brands and marks must  
 be recorded every 10 years. Each  
 County Clerk records for his  
 given county only, so many pro-  
 ducers may need to record their  
 brands in additional counties if  
 their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the  
 right, during this six-month  
 period, to file the mark and  
 brand now recorded in his name.  
 In the event it cannot be de-  
 termined from the records who  
 first recorded the brand and  
 mark in the county, then the  
 person who has been using such  
 mark and brand the longest  
 shall have the right to have  
 the brand and mark recorded  
 in his name.

It should be noted that it  
 is illegal to brand livestock  
 without first properly recording  
 the brand with the County  
 Clerk in the county in which  
 the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands  
 are recorded, the location on  
 the animal on which the brand  
 is to be applied must be desig-  
 nated. If the brand is to be  
 applied to more than one loca-  
 tion on the animal, it must be  
 so recorded and each additional  
 location for the brand on the  
 animal shall constitute a sepa-  
 rate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the num-  
 ber of brand and/or marks  
 which may be recorded in a  
 county by a person as long as  
 requirements of this law gov-  
 erning the recording and re-  
 recording of livestock brands  
 are met. Minors may have marks  
 or brands separate from that  
 of the father or guardian, which  
 must be recorded or re-record-  
 ed as provided by the new law.

AUSTIN — Gov. Preston Smith and the State Comptroller's office hold different views on timing of a special session of the Legislature to pass the second half of the 1972-73 budget.

Smith apparently wants to wait until next June - when primary elections are over and a longer-range look at possible tax revenue is available.

Comptroller's aides voiced concern that a session delayed that long could not produce needed new revenue by September 1, start of the state's fiscal year. A sales tax increase, for example, in April would not produce money to the state from merchants until the end of July or early August.

Smith was unimpressed: "He (Comptroller Robert S. Calvert) is not the governor," Smith noted.

Smith's veto of the second year of his biennial spending bill necessitates a complete rewrite in special sessions sometime within the next year. A special session would have been required, anyway, since the 1971 Legislature did not pass a 1973 welfare appropriation.

"The people are not too anxious to have the legislature in special session," Smith said. "The longer we delay, the better position we will be in for the Comptroller to give an accurate revenue estimate (for the next year) and to determine revenue needs of the state."

The Governor indicated strongly, however, that if a special session is necessary to redistrict the House of Representatives, budgeting and reapportionment probably will be considered at the same time. He controls the timing and subject matter of special sessions.

"If we can get by with one special session, we sure don't want to have two," Smith said.

**COURT REVIEWS DISTRICTS TANGLE** — The State Supreme Court heard a barrage of conflicting arguments as to what should be done about House of Representatives redistricting.

All of these views went before the High Court:

That it should order a five-member Legislative Redistricting Board to perform "its constitutional duty" and reapportion the House in line with the 1970 census.

That it should prohibit the Board from reapportioning either House or Senate on grounds that the new census has not been completely published and that redistricting thus should be delayed until 1973.

That 150 single-member House districts are required.

That single-member districts are not required as long as they do not cause discrimination against any group.
