Lessons on Monday focused on teaching children to say no to drugs as well as on safety.

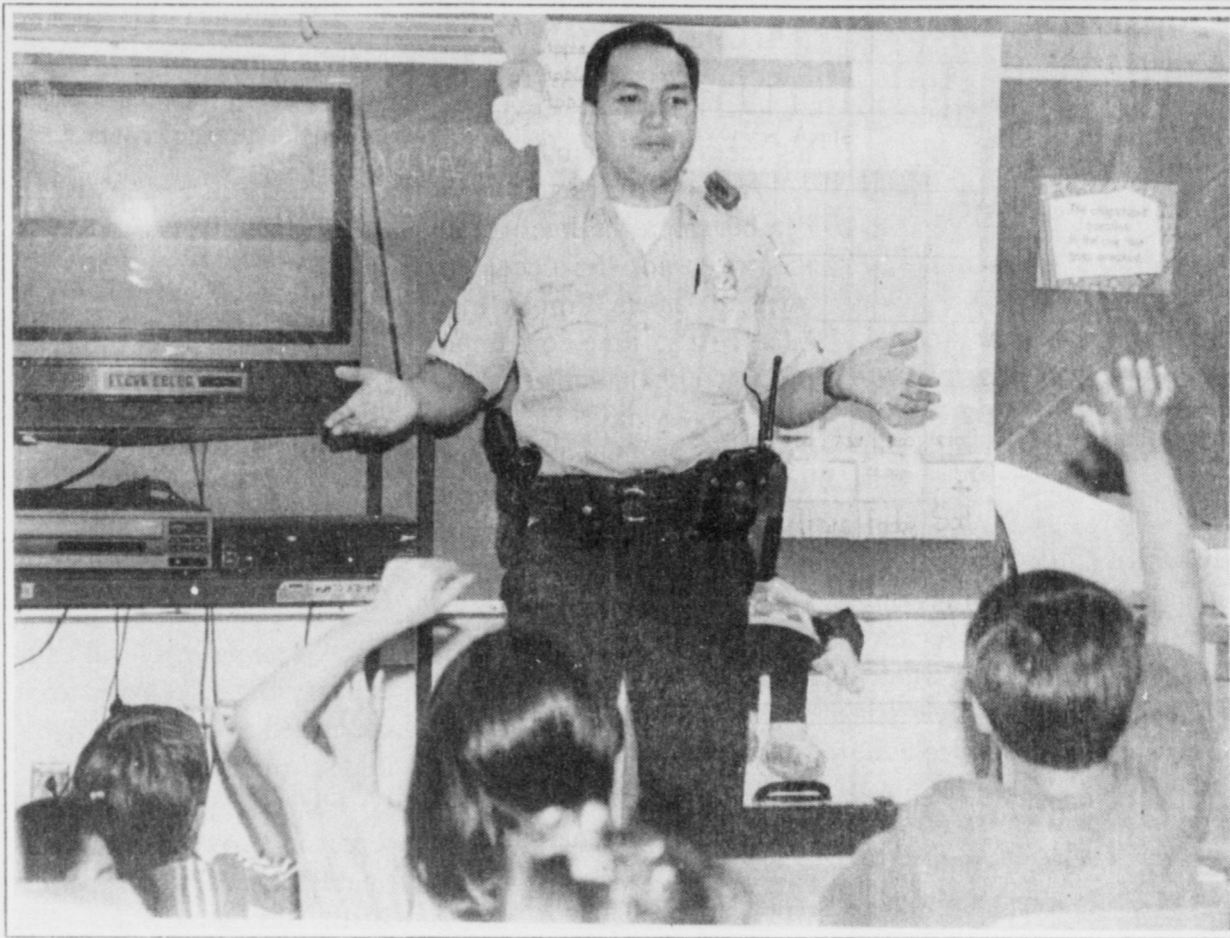
Muleshoe Police Chief Julian Dominguez said the po-

MISD discusses five-year facilities plan

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees discussed a five-year facilities plan for the school district and heard a report from Hubert Kidd, Manager of Five Area Telephone Cooperative.

Kidd asked the board to keep the co-op in mind as they plan out their five-year facilities plan and discussed the possibility of Five-Area and MISD incorporating a distance learning program into the

schools.

Kidd reported on the status of the current acquisition process of GTE by Five Area. The acquisition has yet to be approved by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). But Kidd said that if and when the acquisition is approved, Five Area already has money set aside to incorporate the distance learning program at MISD.

Kidd said distance learning

would essentially tie a lot of school districts together and allow the school to offer classes via technology which the students would otherwise not be able to take.

Kidd said the schools would also have to come up with the classroom space and some kind of security system for the hi-tech equipment.

MISD held a workshop recently in which they also discussed the five-year facilities

plan.

In other business Monday night, the board discussed and approved a school calendar for the 1995-96 school year. Major changes include a three-school day holiday during the Thanksgiving break. This year students will get off a Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Comp days have also been set to correspond with the local and San Antonio Livestock Days.

This means students will get those days off of school unless they have to be used as bad weather make-up days. Another bad weather make-up day is Good Friday, which they will have off if it is not used.

Board member Arnold Price expressed concern over what he felt was too early of a start in the upcoming school year. The 1995-96 school year

Pets for adoption



FIVE IS A COMPANY - The Muleshoe City Animal Shelter is looking for a home for this cuddly set of five puppies which are only a few weeks old. The pups, along with their mother, were found beside a road abandoned and brought to the shelter.

The City of Muleshoe constantly has a number of pets at the city animal shelter who have either been lost or are strays and are in need of a home. The city would like to inform and remind the public that these pets are ready for adoption. Animals which are not adopted or claimed within five days after being picked up by the city's animal control officer are then destroyed as a last option. The cost to the city of upkeeping these pets can grow over a period of time.

Many times pets are picked up as strays and cannot be returned to their rightful owners because they don't have tags or any other information to identify them.

If a person's pet is picked up by the city, there is a \$5 a day care charge they must pay to get their pet back.

The city encourages people to consider adopting a pet from the city animal shelter. To adopt a pet, a deposit is required to insure the pet is spayed or neutered. The deposit fee is returned once proof that it has been spayed or neutered is presented.

Animals must also receive rabie shots before they can be adopted and an adoption fee and \$1 fee for a tag to the city must be paid.

In addition to the five puppies, there is also an 11-month old brown Weimaraber dog available for adoption. For more information about adopting a pet from the city animal shelter, contact Raymond Martinez at City Hall.

Better Business Bureau

The newest buzz words especially for our seasoned citizens is 'living trust'. In a living trust, assets including savings accounts, real estate and securities are put into the trust while the owner is still alive. Legal title to the assets is transferred to a trustee and the trust contains instructions for handling assets during the owner's lifetime and distributing them after death.

A living trust avoids probate because at the time of death the trust, not the deceased, owns the assets. Probate may be a costly, time-consuming process although that is not true in every case. The Better Business Bureau has heard from consumers that were pressured to sign contracts on the spot and write checks for hundreds, sometimes thousands of dollars to establish a living trust.

Consumers are urged to contact a reputable local attorney or estate planner to discuss their personal situation and the BBB for a reliability report at 763-0459.

It seems that people from

all over the South Plains have been invited to attend private meetings with an offer to get involved in Gold Unlimited for a small investment in the hopes that with recruitment of more people the investor will make a lot of money. This company and its owners, David and Martha Crowe, have been investigated by the securities divisions or attorneys general of several states.

Some states have urged caution to their citizens concerning involvement with the company and their questionable marketing plan. On March 14, the U.S. Postal Inspection Service executed a federal search warrant at the headquarters of Gold Unlimited and a Temporary Restraining Order was obtained to freeze liquid

assets, real property and halts delivery of mail believed to be connected to suspected pyramid scheme activities.

PALs attend leadership conference in Austin

More than 2,000 Texas students participated in activities designed to develop leadership skills, encourage community involvement and enhance a commitment toward helping others.

Muleshoe PALs were invited to serve as facilitators at this year's conference. To prepare for this responsibility, they hosted a training workshop for themselves and Midland PALs at Muleshoe High School.

Training was conducted by Hilmar Moore from the Peer Assistance Network of Texas (PAN-Texas), the host organization of the conference.

Facilitators served as leaders of family groups. Each family group consisted of 10 to 15 students registered for the conference who would then participate in a variety of activities chosen and planned by the student facilitators.

Family groups spent approximately three to four hours together during the conference getting to know each other, gaining perspective on what it is like to live and go to school in the many and varied com-

munities of Texas.

They gained insight on getting along with and respecting others and learning how to be a peer helper.

EPA approves herbicide to control weeds in sorghum

AUSTIN - The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has approved a specific exemption request by the Texas Department of Agriculture which allows farmers to use propazine to control weeds in fields planted with grain sorghum, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said.

Propazine is found in Milo-Pro 4L Herbicide. The specific exemption became effective Friday, March 3, and expires Aug. 1.

The treatment is approved for use statewide, however, additional application restrictions apply in Mitchell and Runnels counties. Before applying the herbicide, farmers should contact their local county extension agents or dealers for information on proper application methods and restrictions.

Jerry's Homegrown Gardening Advice

Jerry Baker, America's Master Gardener, will be a guest on **Creative Living** on Thursday, March 23rd at 1:00 p.m. to talk about general lawn and garden care — or what he calls "yarden" care.

Some of Baker's advice may seem strange to anyone who has never had to improvise because of lack of time and money, or to those who feel that using common, ordinary household items is hocus-pocus. But seeing is believing; they really do work!

A well dressed home begins with a healthy and attractive lawn. If the grass is scruffy, it can make the most expensive home and landscape appear shoddy. So put your home's best foot forward with a shiny, clean, neat, green lawn.

Baker further says "To protect your lawn from sunburn, water it before 8:00 a.m. and never after 2:00 p.m. Never water your lawn in the evening. Would you want to go to bed with wet feet?"

He also advises to avoid the temptation to treat your entire lawn with a herbicide or pesticide — which would be like your mother making the entire family take castor oil when its only your brother who is constipated!

Don't spare the rod when dealing with trees! According to Baker, striking a tree trunk with a stick or rolled up newspaper stimulates sap flow in early spring.

Clean up and green up your lawn by giving it a weekly facial. Washing your lawn with soap and water removes dirt and pollution and enhances osmosis and photosynthesis. Think of thatch as the dandruff of the earth and treat it with a shampoo of beer, ammonia and dish soap.

And, last but not least, Baker says to always wear golf shoes when working on your lawn. It will aerate your soil and give your lawn a breath of fresh air.

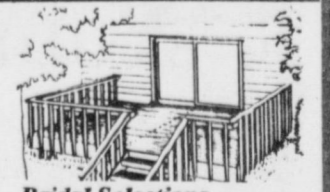
