County farmers urged to get spraying permits

AUSTIN – It's the time of year when pesticide applicators start using regulated herbicides on crop and pasture land. If spaying will occur in one of the state's 66 regulated counties, applicators must obtain a permit from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"The Texas Herbicide Law requires applicators to have the permit in hand before they can begin spraying," said Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry.

The herbicide law gives counties the option of being regulated. The decision is made by the commissioner's court and enforced by TDA.

Regulation provides additional restrictions on the use of five regulated herbicides and their derivatives, mainly to help prevent adverse effects from occurring on sensitive vegetation. In regulated counties, herbicides cannot be sprayed when the wind exceeds 10 miles per hour.

Regulated herbicides, which include 2, 4-D, control broad-leaf target plant species and have the potential to damage valuable non-target plant species and have the potential to damage valuable nontarget crops if care isn't taken to prevent drift of the chemical and its vapor.

"Texas agriculture is so diverse, a herbicide being sprayed to control mesquite or pasture woods might drift onto cotton, soy beans, or another crop, causing extensive loss," Perry said. "The permit requirement acts as an added safeguard to prevent this from happening."

To apply for a permit, applicators should contact the nearest TDA regional office. TDA recommends that applicators apply for the permit up to two weeks before spraying will take place. TDA has the authority to approve, deny, modify or revoke a permit.

If the pesticide staff questions an application, a pesticide specialist may inspect the application site before making a decision. Allowing ample time for processing will eliminate any reason for delaying the



Once approved, permits are good for 180 days or until the acreage covered by the permit has been sprayed, whichever comes first.

When violations of the Texas Herbicide Law occur, TDA can assess penalties up to \$2,000 per violation with a \$4,000 maximum for all violations related to a single incident.

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ORDER FOR ELECTION PROCEDURE IN HOSPITAL DISTRICT DIRECTORS ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS} COUNTY BAILEY

On this the 16th day of March, 1995, the Board of Directors of MULESHOE AREA Hospital DISTRICT, a Hospital District, convened in special session, open to the public, with the following members present, to wit:

Tim Campbell, President; Joe King, Member; Victor Leal, Member and the following absent: Derrell Jennings, Vice-President; Robert Finney, Secretary constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings had by said Board of Directors was the following:

WHEREAS under the terms and provisions of the acts authorizing the creation of this Hospital District and the Texas Election Code, an election shall be held in this district on the first Saturday in May, 1995, for the purpose of electing members to the Board of Directors;

WHEREAS the laws of the State of Texas do not fully set forth the procedure to be followed by candidates filing for said office of Directors of said District, and this Board has the power and authority to establish said procedure;

THEREFORE be it ordered by the Board of Directors of Muleshoe Area Hospital District

- 1. That an election be held in said District on May 6, 1995, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Directors of said District three Directors, Places 1,2, and 4, full two year terms.
- 2. That all candidates for the Board of Directors of said District at the above mentioned election shall file their application to become a candidate with the Secretary of this Board at Muleshoe Area Medical Center no later than 31 days before the date of said election.

3. That all of said applications shall be substantially in the following form:

- 4. All candidates shall also file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Article 6.02 of the Election Code.
- 5. All candidates shall also file with the Secretary at least 31 days before the election, a petition signed by at least 25 qualified electors asking that his/her name be printed on the ballot.
- 6. 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Cotton Marketing Workshop

LUBBOCK-The Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service will present an intermediate cotton marketing workshop April 6. This workshop is designed to help farmers evaluate alternative pricing strategies for their 1995 crop, and it is designed for those with some experience with futures and options.

Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension Economist and professor of agricultural economics at Texas A&M University, will provide an in-depth analysis of the 1994-95 crop as well as how the 1995-96 crop situation could develop. Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension Economist and Marketing Specialist at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock, will present a review of options including a simple computer program to estimate theoretical premiums. The stand-alone program will run on any IBM compatible computer and will be provided to all participants.

The workshop will begin at 9 a.m. and end at 4 p.m. with sandwiches provided for lunch. The workshop will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock.

Maybe it's just lack of attention on part...not payin' attention to details. But I've always been like this. I've never seen a memory course for cowboys with my problem. But I'm sure I'm not the only one. It could begin with a few basics, i.e. sex, number of legs, species, color, broken limbs, tuberculosis, blindness.

But I'm convinced a person with the gift sees more than just physical characteristics. They see personality, movement, ability, potential...they

see the individual. They see. They just don't look.

I admire them. I envy their gift. I wish I had part of it. But

I guess I just have to be thankful that my dog remembers me and the family cat has three legs.



The color red symbolizes the awareness of AIDS...green symbolizes the protection of our environment. But what color calls attention to the need for protecting children when they have been abused or neglected?

In 1989, Bonnie Finney, Norfolk, Va., took a stand against child abuse and tied a blue ribbon to her van as a symbol of her personal commitment to stop child abuse. The death of her grandson was tragic, and inspired Bonnie's message to the rest of the coun-

"The blue ribbon serves as a constant reminder to fight for

protection of our children. We must protect our most precious gift of all ... our children. Please put one on your car ... give one to your friends ... tell them what it means... You may be saving a child's life," said Bonnie Finney.

Since Bonnie's involvement with the blue ribbon program, many child advocacy organizations have participated in this movement. The National Exchange Club and The National Exchange Club Foundation for the Prevention of Child Abuse want to increase this participation by asking every-

one concerned about the welfare of children to wear a blue ribbon, not only during National Blue Ribbon Week, but year-round.

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
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Minding your own business
