Measurements indicate decline in county ground water level

Bailey County ground water levels declined an average of 1.54 feet in 1994 in 102 privately-owned wells in the observation well network maintained by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 539,625 acre service area within the county.

This represents a decrease of

124,653 acre-feet of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Bailey County within the Water District boundaries.

"Dry soil conditions during the past two years have increased the demand for ground water. In some heavy water use areas, there was a greater amount of decline in 1994

than in previous years," said Don McReynolds, High Plains Water District Technical Division Director.

Ground water levels within the Water District's Bailey County service area declined 0.32 of a foot during the 10-year period from 1985 to 1995. An average annual decline of 0.70 of a foot was recorded

during the five-year period from 1990 to 1995.

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the 6.7 million acre Water District service area had an average dept-to-water measurements with those taken the previous year, McReynolds said Technical Division staff members can determine what changes

have occurred in the ground water levels.

Of the 15 counties or portions of counties making up the High Plains Water District, only Randall County recorded an average rise in dept-to-water levels in 1994.

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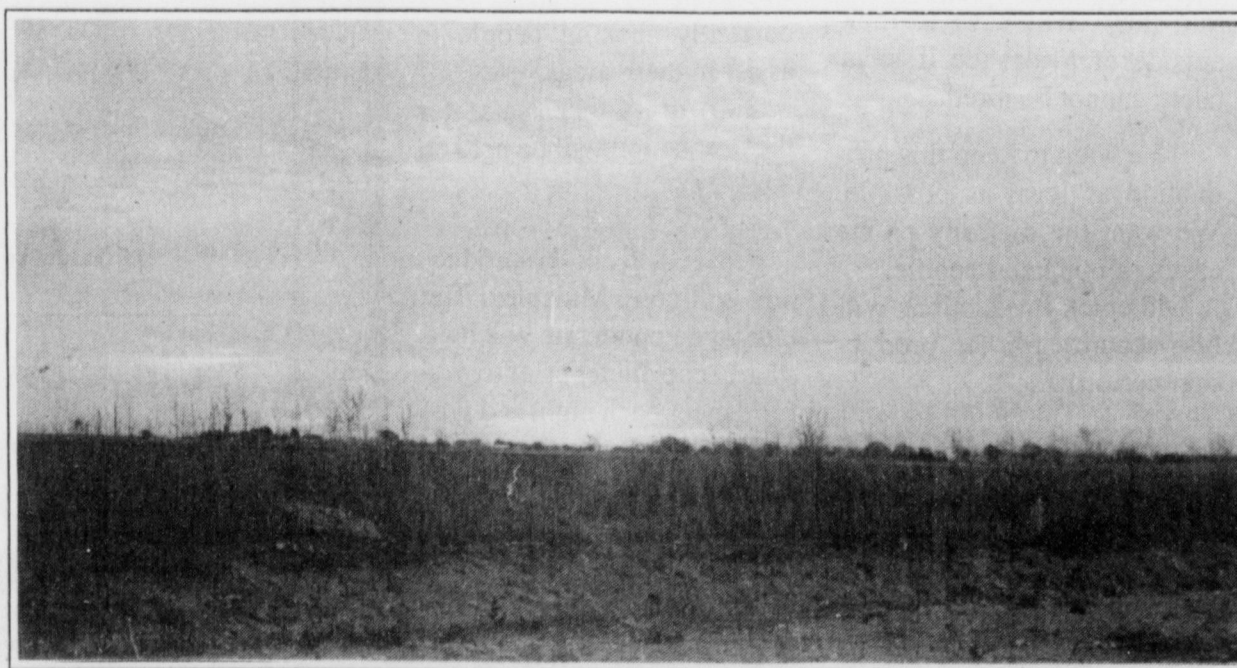
Stinnett to be witness for Farm Bill hearing

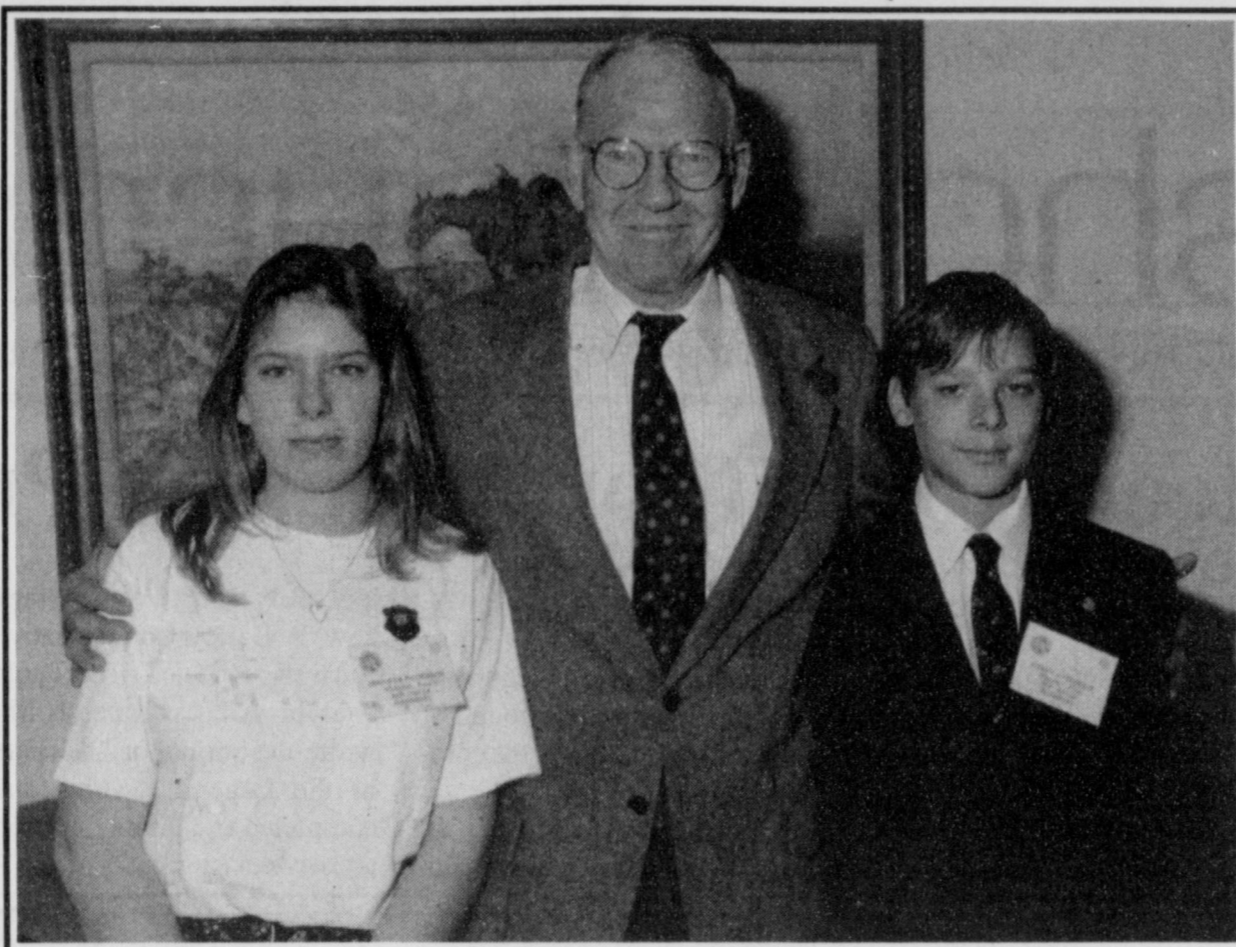

13 major speaking roles in the musical, consisting of 10 men and three women. Two women have already been cast in these positions he said. But a host of other cast members are still needed.

"Everybody will have to sing a little bit but we are mainly looking for local talent," Finney said. "There are only six roles that will sing solos, but all the cast members will sing in the chorus."

Auditions for the production will be scheduled by appointment throughout the month of May, Finney said.

He said a cast of about 40 people of all ages is needed. This includes some square dancers and 22 characters with actual speaking lines. Other characters will serve as extras or in minor speaking and non-speaking roles.

"We badly need men," Finney said. "There is roughly about the same number of women and men in the total cast. We need more men to show an interest and volunteer."

Long-billed curlews can now be seen migrating in area, by wildlife refuge

Anyone even slightly interested in birds is probably aware that this is the time of year that birds migrate northward but may not know what a long-billed curlew is.

A long-billed curlew is a large shore bird with a long slender body and a long curved bill. They are a buff color with traces of cinnamon color on their wings. Their call is a loud whistling sound.

Long-billed curlews were historically found throughout Central America. Since much of their natural habitat consisting of vast open prairies has been destroyed, they now are only seen in the western

half of the United States. They winter in the southern parts of the southwestern United States as well as Mexico and nest as far north as British Columbia.

They normally lay four "olive buff" colored eggs. The nest is normally found in damp grassy areas or near water and consists of a shallow earthen depression lined with grass.

Their diet is varied and includes various insects, spiders and berries. The young, long-billed curlew soon mature to become fast and adept at

avoiding numerous predators. Long-billed curlew often fly

in large flocks when migrating. They can presently be

seen in small numbers in this area and on the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge.

will be held after 6 p.m.," Finney said.

Besides the cast, Finney said at least 50 volunteers are needed to help with the production, build sets, help with costumes, help with advertisements, help with makeup, backstage help, ticket sales, help with choreography and a number of other tasks.

"Our biggest thing right now is getting people interested in helping out," Finney said. "We will also be doing a lot of publicity in area newspapers and running commercials on television and radio."

Finney said, "We expect that 60 percent of the people who see this production will not be from Muleshoe, but from the surrounding areas. For these promotional reasons, it will bring money into Muleshoe."

The play is a fictitious and entertaining story with a lot of history of Bailey County incorporated into it.

"We hope to have several hundred people attend each night," Finney said.

The production will incorporate traditional West Texas styles of music with some contemporary and ballads. Paula Paul wrote the lyrics for the 11 songs which will be presented during the production and Finney has written the music for them.

Muleplex Productions will hire a crew to do the lighting and sound to insure the quality of the performance. Cowboy Connections of Muleshoe has

been hired to do this.

Muleplex Productions also hopes to get support and help from the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture, particularly with the selling of tickets. They also hope to solicit local business sponsors.

Muleplex Productions is also seeking local musicians to play in the band but Finney said they will have to look outside of Muleshoe if local talent cannot be hired.

"We want to keep this production as local as possible. We want the majority of the cast to all be local people."

Muleplex Productions will hire security for the production performances.

"We need lots of help and support from the community,"

Finney emphasized. "We want to have a complete cast by mid-

May and hope to begin very serious practices in July."

Muleplex will be using live animals for the production, including horses, a mule and a dog. Some of the cast members will be required to ride the horses and the mule. They are

currently seeking people to assist in these areas. Two dress rehearsals for the production will be held on Aug. 2-3.

Proceeds from the production will go to Muleplex. The Heritage Foundation will hold a barbecue dinner prior to performances each night and proceeds from that will go to the Heritage Complex.

decline of 2.15 feet from January 1993 to January 1994. This is a net decrease of about 2,160,750 acre-feet of ground water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District service area.

A zero average annual change in ground water levels was recorded for the first time in the Water District's history in 1985. Dept-to-water measurements revealed an average ground water level rise of 0.50 of a foot in 1986; an average rise of 0.90 of a foot in 1987; an average decline of 0.51 of a foot in 1988; an average decline of 1.06 feet in 1990; an average decline of 0.73 of a foot in 1991; an average rise of 0.14 of a foot in 1992 and an average decline of 1.46 feet in 1993.

A network of 1,184 privately-owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in

the Ogallala Aquifer within the High Plains Water District.

The dept-to water measurements are taken in January and February of each year in order to allow water levels to stabilize from the pumping during the previous growing season.

By comparing the current declines in dept-to-water levels in 1994 were: Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer and Potter Counties.

Maps showing the location and well number of observation wells in each county or portion of a county served by the Water District will be published in the April issue of *The Cross Section*.

Tables listing observation wells in each county within the district and the dept-to-water levles at one-, five- and 10-year intervals are also printed.

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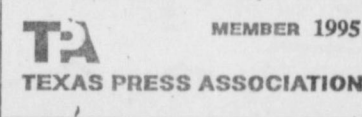
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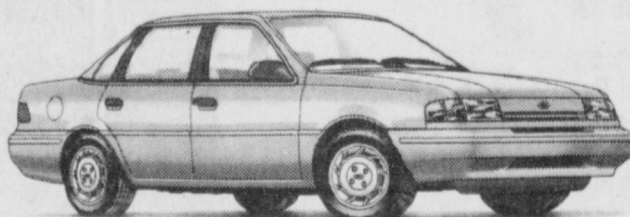
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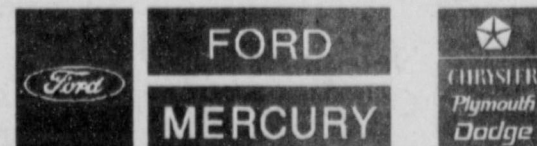
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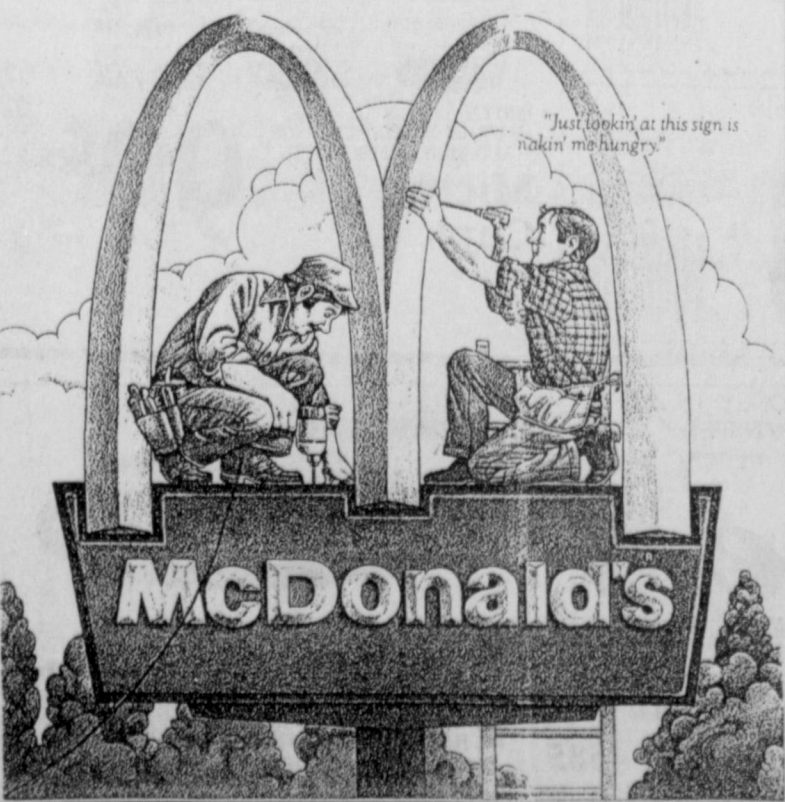
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Boys varsity track takes second in district

LITTLEFIELD— The District Championship was the goal last Friday and Saturday, April 13-14, for the Mules as they traveled to Littlefield for the District 2AAA track meet. Five Mules qualified in ten events to go to the regional meet in Odessa and both the varsity and junior varsity boy's teams finished second in the district. The varsity boys finished under Friona and the junior varsity finished second to Dimmitt.

The Regional Track Meet will be held in Odessa on April 29. Those that qualify to advance to the regional meet must place first or second in an event at their district track meet.

Taking the lead for the Mules was Daniel Garbarino as he grabbed first place in five different events to take to the regional meet. "That says a lot about Daniel considering the quality of athletes we have in this district," said Coach Johnson. Daniel will compete in the high jump, triple jump, 300 m hurdles, 110 m high hurdles and the mile relay in Odessa.

Regional qualifier in the 400 meter dash was Jesus Flores. He also placed second in the 800 meter run behind the defending state champion from Dimmitt and ran the first leg

on the winning mile relay team. With a personal best throw of the year in the shot put ring (48'3"), Chad Johnson claimed the second place district title and a chance at regionals.

Keeping in tradition with strong distance runners from Mulshoe, Charles Acosta finished second in the 1600 meter run and got himself out of district.

Edward Olivas finished 3rd in the 3200 meter run, but was bumped up to a qualifying position when the first place runner from Dimmitt became ineligible because of grades. Edward also ran the second leg of the mile relay.

Greg Cortez will be going on with the other Regional qualifiers as a member of the mile relay team. He ran his best time all year to help the relay team take the first place district seat. "This is very exciting for Mulshoe since we have not had a mile relay team qualify for Regionals since the early 80's," said Johnson. Other members of the mile relay team are Daniel Garbarino, Jesus Flores, and Edward Olivas.

"Overall we competed very well and definitely gave ourselves a chance to win. When ever you don't have depth in any sport it is hard to win," said Johnson.

Friday April 21, the re-

gional qualifiers will be going to Odessa for a practice meet. The running finals will start on Saturday at 12:15, so load up the kids and come on down to Odessa to support the athletes.

The Regional Meet is on Friday and Saturday, April 28-29. This regional meet determines who goes to the State Meet in Austin on May 11-12.

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
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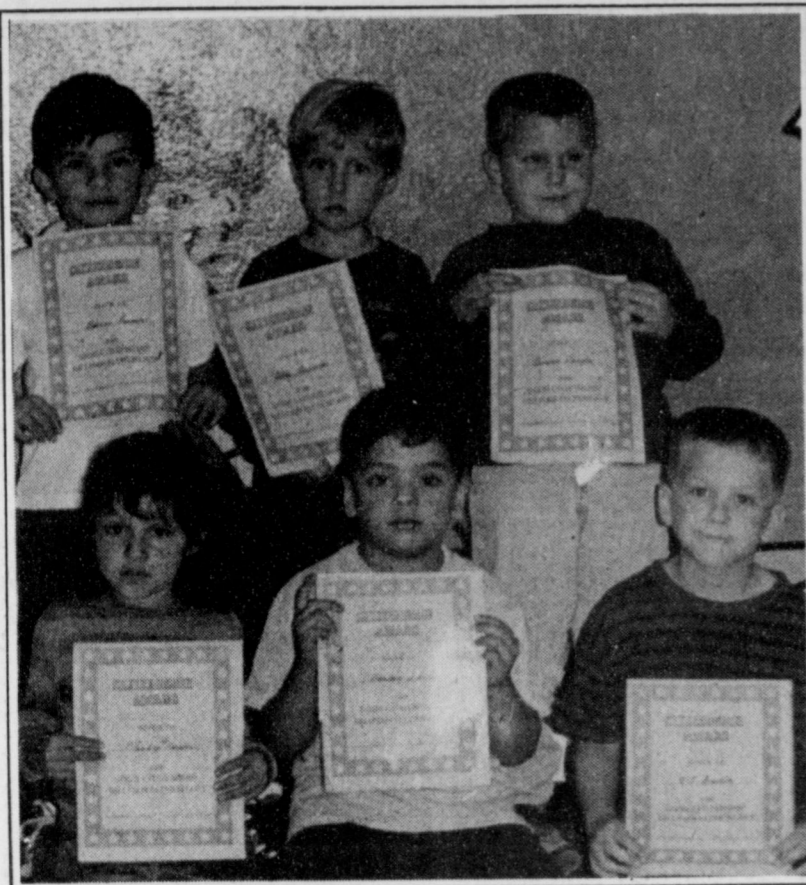
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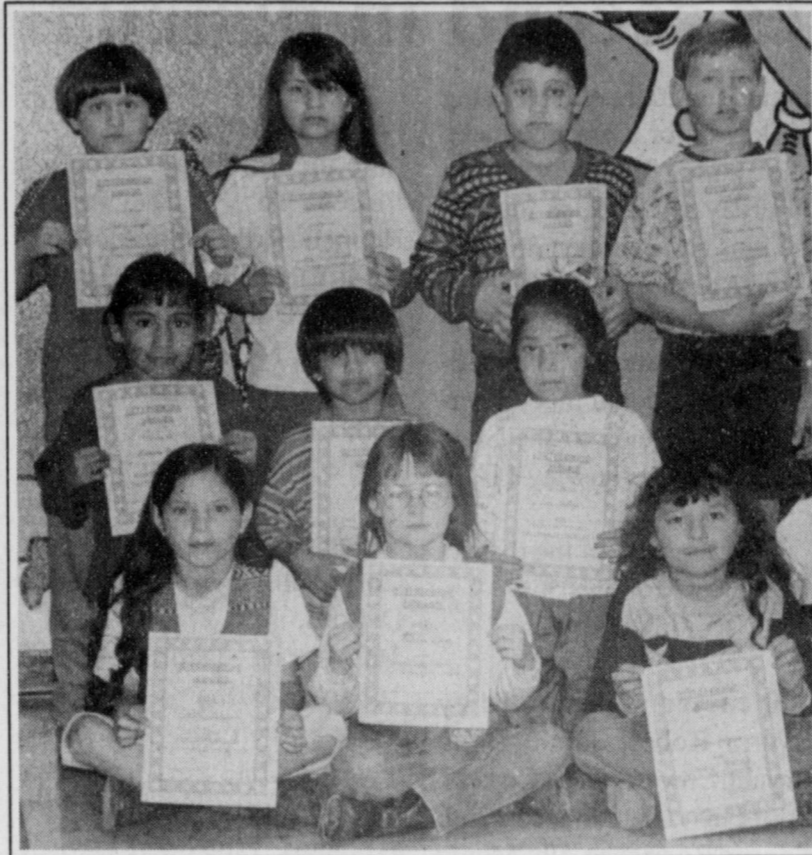

Lady Mules take 3rd in golf




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The Nobel Legacy

Travels from Cambridge, England, to Carlsbad, New Mexico

Although the last 100 years have been a time of intense scientific discovery, most people still don't know much about science. New insights into genetics and atomic physics continue to surface — yet few scientists are able to explain to the layperson what these discoveries mean or how they affect society. The Nobel Legacy, a three-part series, looks squarely at science and its impact on the human condition. The programs take viewers around the world on a visually rich tour of critical scientific developments using metaphors from art, music, and literature.

The hosts of The Nobel Legacy are Dr. J. Michael Bishop, 1989 Nobel laureate in medicine/physiology, who discovered the cellular basis of cancer; Dr. Leon Lederman, 1988 Nobel laureate in physics, who unveiled a sub-atomic particle; and Dr. Dudley Herschbach, 1986 Nobel winner in chemistry, who used molecular beams to study chemical reactions. Dr. Anne Carson, a poet, essayist, and classics scholar, brings humanist sensibility to each program.

"How Do You Feel, Mr. Jacobs?" the medicine program, filmed in Venice, Florence, and Cambridge, England, sets the promise of genetics and medical technology against the question, "Why does medicine have to lose the person to cure the body?" The program tells of 16th-century anatomist Andreas Vesalius, whose book, *The Composition of the Human Body*, revolutionized medicine; Mary Shelley's dream of Frankenstein as it embodies the ancient myth of forbidden knowledge; and the genetic revolution's Nobel laureates James Watson and Francis Crick, who likely began their probe of the architecture of DNA over sausages and beer at Cambridge's Eagle Pub.

"Why Bother?," the physics program, filmed in Hawaii, Death Valley, and Denmark, tackles the possibility of complete understanding of the universe. While physicists race headlong toward this goal, humanists wonder whether physics is "the only truth." The program uses sophisticated animation and striking photography to examine particle physics and tell the story of Werner Heisenberg, the 1933 Nobel winner whose work dramatically altered how atomic physics is viewed.

"Stop Forward Movement?," the chemistry program, takes viewers to Paris; Sweden; Cambridge, Massachusetts; and New Mexico's subterranean cathedral of limestone, the Carlsbad Caverns, to examine the power of chemical synthesis through metaphors in art and architecture.

The Nobel Legacy airs Saturdays at 11:00 p.m. beginning April 22nd on KENW-TV. The series repeats Sundays at 4:00 p.m.

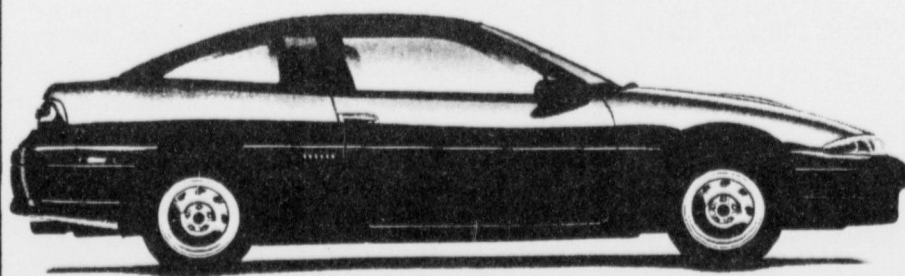
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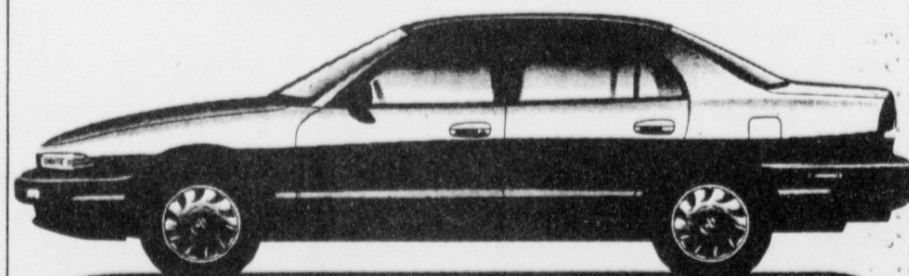
