

Muleshoe man plays key role in Oklahoma City recovery effort

Ellis helped devise plan for rescue workers to locate victims in rubble

A Muleshoe man made his mark in the rescue efforts following the bombing of the Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City, helping devise a system that rescue workers successfully used to locate victims in the mass of rubble.

The system, which involved mapping of personnel in correlation to their relative locations within the nine-story structure, was so successful, it is expected to become part of training for federal emergency rescue teams.

Todd Ellis, who with his father Frank operates Ellis Funeral Homes in Muleshoe, Friona, Sudan, Morton and Earth, was called to Oklahoma City two days after the bombing as part of the Region 6 Disaster-Mortuary team, one of the divisions of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

The Region 6 'D-Mort' team, headed by Jack King of Huntsville, is composed of funeral directors, security personnel, forensic pathologists, forensic anthropologists, fingerprint experts, forensic odontologists and computer experts, serving a region made up of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas. Benny Clifton of the Bailey County Sheriff's Department is also a member of the Region 6 team, but was unable to make the trip

to Oklahoma due to being hospitalized with an illness.

Such teams are formed nationwide and trained to respond on 24-hour notice to such disasters, aiding local authorities in times of need. When a mass fatality disaster occurs, such as the bombing in Oklahoma City, a determination is made by federal authorities to designate it as a federal disaster and FEMA operations are initiated. Typically, local and state resources are implemented first and if the disaster is of a certain magnitude, the state's governor normally requests such federal aid.

The Region 6 D-Mort team was activated on Friday, April 21, two days after the Oklahoma City bombing. Ellis, along with 18 other team members from three states, was called to Oklahoma City and initially attached to the Oklahoma State Medical Examiner's office. The team began assisting with supply and tracking and processing bodies for identification.

Two days into the operation, Roy Heim, a veteran homicide detective with the Tulsa Police Department, assigned Ellis and Chuck Smith, who works for the Office of the Medical Examiner in Baton Rouge, LA, to get a set of plans

Friona damaged by a twister

FRIONA — Damage from a tornado that hit Friona around 7 p.m. on Friday is estimated at \$24 million, with reports that the damage to Hi Pro-Feeds alone has reached almost \$300,000.

Employees of Hi-Pro reportedly spent Monday clearing the facility of rubble.

The tornado was accompanied by winds of from 160 to

210 mph which did \$500,000 worth of damage to about 40 residences in Friona, with 17 being completely destroyed and at least 23 other homes sustaining damage.

Most of the power, telephone service, running water and gas have already been restored to residents.

Thirteen people were treated for injuries, and E.M. Bailey,

69, was reported in critical condition on Monday from injuries he suffered when his mobile home on the southeast edge of town was shattered.

Bailey, who was found beneath the rubble by rescue workers, suffered a crushed leg and internal injuries, according to reports.

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for the Murrah Building.

"We ran up against a problem that hadn't happened before in a major disaster," said Heim. "We had a lot of unidentified children and people throughout the building. Because of the extent of the damage to the building, the rescue workers were basically sifting the rubble a five-gallon bucket at a time for fear they'd miss something. They didn't want to bring in heavy equipment and take the risk of an incident that might be blown out of proportion by the national news media."

Ellis and Smith found a set of blueprints that had been updated in 1994 from an architect in Oklahoma City. With the help of the architectural firm, a computer disk was located with the blueprints on it. They used the computer to eliminate the nonessential factors on the blueprints, then plotted areas of the building that remained.

Ellis and Smith then tracked down the building manager. They interviewed the manager and his to document what agencies were on each floor and where they were located. The pair also contacted survivors from various agencies to determine the location of the personnel within each agency and attempted to pinpoint the locations of the personnel at the time of the blast. Families of the missing persons were also interviewed for accurate descriptions.

After plotting the location of each missing person on the blueprint, Ellis and Smith briefed the rescue operation commanders and convinced them they knew the locations of the bodies in the rubble.

At the time of the briefing, the rescue teams "were basically digging blindly with jackhammers and five-gallon buckets," Ellis said.

By checking office furniture, documents and other items against the map devised by Ellis and Smith, the recovery workers could determine what floor the stratified rubble was from and what victims they could expect to find.

Mike Shannon, the chief of special operations for the Oklahoma City Fire Department, commented that prior to the mapping being done, he saw

"no light at the end of the tunnel." The operation plans were changed at that point and the rescue teams began bringing out 10-15 victims per day instead of two or three. Prior to that time, the rescue operations were being conducted from a set of blueprints dating back 20 years.

"It was the first time the rescue people had a road map to follow," said Heim. "As a direct result of the work of Todd and Chuck, at that point the big equipment could be brought in. In essence, they were controlling the recovery operation and were able to move the recovery teams around and away from areas where no one was."

When a victim was located in the rubble, Ellis was called to the area to determine the identity. His determinations were based on the research of age, sex, weight and race done by Ellis and Smith. That information was provided to the medical examiner's office and identification was rapidly achieved. Without the mapping, a review of more than 100 records might have been required to determine identification of a single body.

"When a body was located, we pretty much knew who it was," Ellis said. "We were told later that the process would change the way recovery operations are conducted in the future and that training would be changed to include this process."

Dr. Fred Jordan, the Oklahoma State Medical Examiner, praised the work of the D-Mort team for "a superb job of assisting local authorities." He said if there is ever another

disaster of this magnitude, he would immediately activate the D-Mort teams because they are able to do not only specific tasks in their field, but any job they are asked to.

Even after the Region 6 D-Mort team was released to go home after 15 days on the job, the plans created by Ellis and Smith continued to be used. Due to the danger from the instability of the Murrah Building, the determination was made to implode the remainder of the structure. Two bodies still remained in the rubble at the time the building was brought down, but their location had been pinpointed by the mapping procedure. That area was marked and protected by a layer of Kevlar. The bodies were recovered after the building was brought down.

During the recovery, Ellis was also documenting the process for the future.

"It's a new process that's being developed," said Heim, who is part of one of the FEMA national training teams. "Their work will be recognized in this field by experts all over the country. You can bet it will become a part of FEMA training and we will implement it into our Oklahoma disaster

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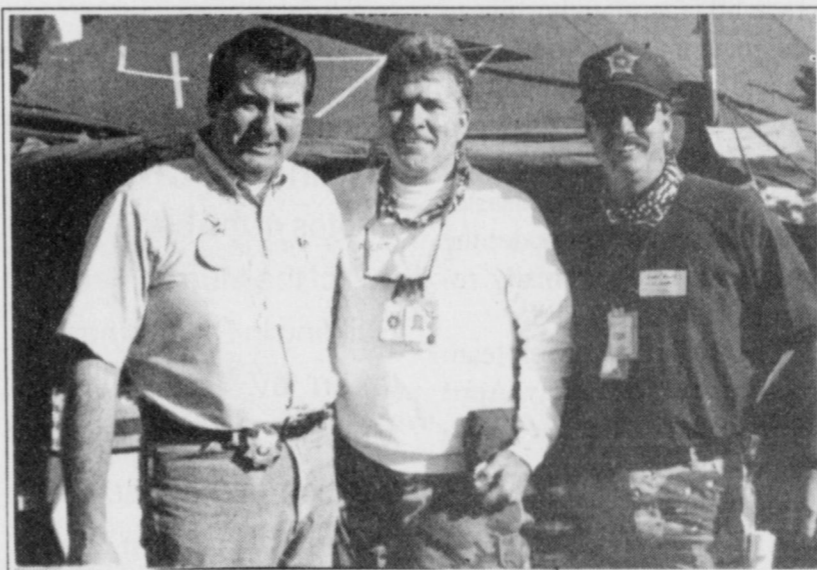

The twister also did extensive damage to Friona's water treatment plant. Crews worked Monday to restore pumps at the facility so that waste could be pumped into lagoons.

Damage also occurred at the cemetery. Fences were blown over, buildings were damaged, tombstones were destroyed and a boxcar was deposited in the middle of the cemetery.

City workers and volunteers cleared rubble and fallen trees and chopped off damaged tree branches.

At least ten businesses were damaged, including a salvage yard and Benger Air Park, a private airport. Winds also overturned a train on the tracks.

Demolition crews are clearing the way for the re-building

that will soon be commencing.

Hi-Pro Feeds has been in Friona since the mid-1970s. The company plans to build a more technologically advanced feed-production site.

It has been reported that seven people were working at the Hi-Pro site when the tornado hit. They were warned by a truck driver and had time to reach the building's basement for safety just before the disaster.

The city was in darkness Friday night until 1 a.m. as crews worked to get the power working. Several businesses distributed food and supplies after the disaster.

More than 16 twisters have been reported in Castro County since Friday. Dimmitt also suffered damage to homes and businesses.

Choking prevention week June 4-10

AUSTIN, TX— June 4-10, has been proclaimed as Choking Prevention Awareness Week by Governor George W. Bush. The goal of the week is to make people aware of how to avoid choking or what action to take when someone else is choking, especially on food.

Last year in Texas, 72 people died from choking on food. Many of these deaths may have been prevented if people were aware of and took precautionary measures.

Initiated by the Texas Department of Mental Retardation, which has done research on special techniques to prevent choking, the proclamation urges the general public as well as all staff in nursing homes, day care facilities, in public eating establishments and in residential settings for people with mental retardation

to learn skills, such as the Heimlick maneuver, to deal with choking emergencies.

Because people are more prone to choke on certain foods, caution should be used when eating foods such as gooey

pastries and bready foods like pancakes; large chunks of fresh vegetables, cheese and hard cooked eggs. Also people should be careful when eating on the run, especially meats like weiners or jerky.

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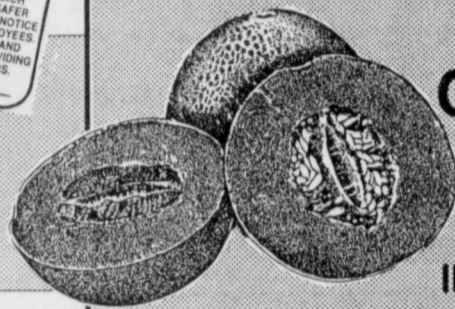
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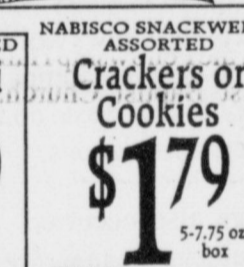
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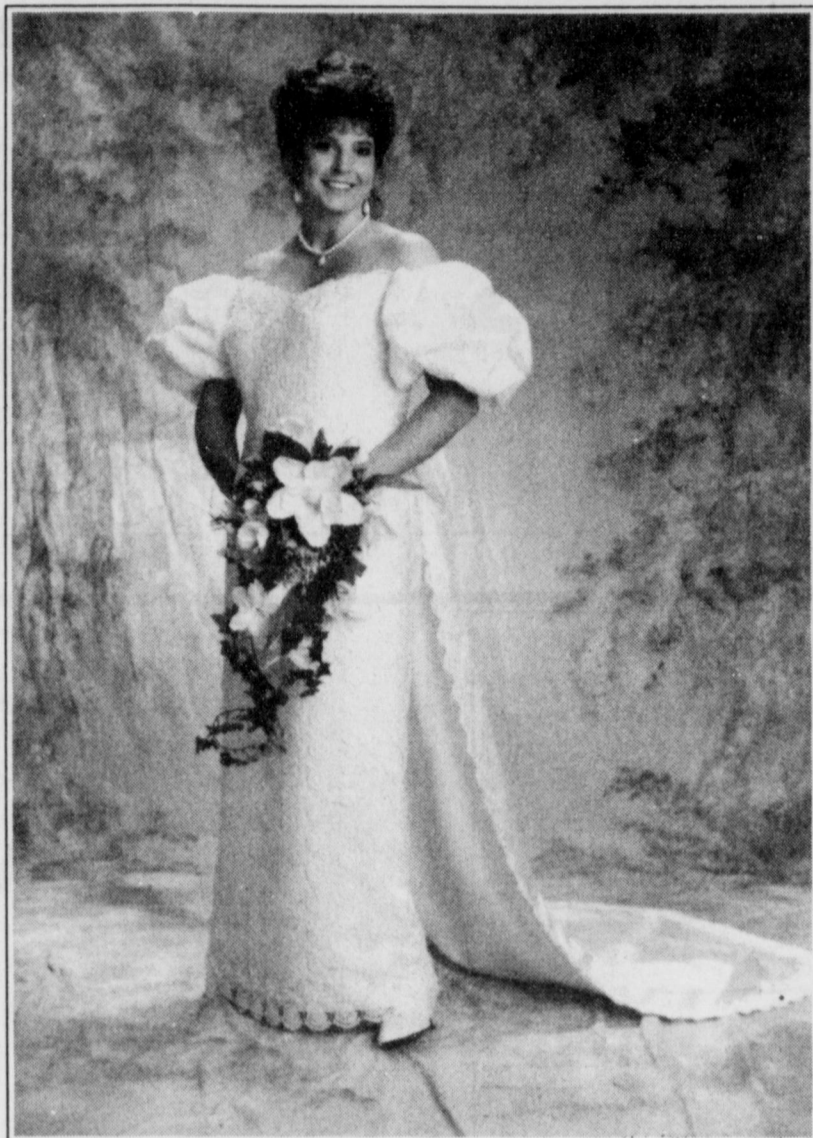

plan."

"These are good, common sense techniques that can be used all over the country for different disasters."

Heim said the work done by Ellis and Smith was unique and vital to the recovery effort.

"Their work probably sped up the process by a week to 10 days," Heim said. "If not for their work, the recovery teams would probably have continued to move as slowly as they were in the early stages. It probably saved untold thousands of dollars and days of waiting for the family members."

The teamwork and success of the D-Mort team was rewarding for Ellis personally.

"I'm proud to be part of the team and I'm thankful for having the opportunity to be a member," he said. "Every

member did an outstanding job, no matter what role they were asked to play. We were able to show that the D-Mort system works and is a benefit, even though it is still in its infancy."

The successes of the D-Mort team were overshadowed, however, by the tragedy of the bombing.

"I don't think I've ever been affected so emotionally by any incident I've ever been involved with in my work as a funeral director or in EMS," said Ellis, who is also a trained emergency medical technician. "I would say the bombing affected the country in a similar manner as Pearl Harbor, although I wasn't alive at that time."

"But we were also uplifted by the outpouring of people and good will from all over the

country. It was unbelievable."

Ellis said he felt a kinship with the people of Oklahoma similar to that of his hometown.

"I really got the feeling that people there were very similar to those in Muleshoe," he said. "They are very close knit and in times of tragedy, they come together."

Ellis also had praise for the work of federal agencies involved in the disaster.

"It was the biggest conglomeration of federal agents I've ever seen and there was never a cross word or a turf battle. It was a total cooperative effort from all involved from all over the country."

Ellis also serves as Bailey County Justice of the Peace. He and his wife Starla have one son, colt, age 5.

funds by Dominguez.

Lopez is seeking compensation for lost wages, plus compensatory damages for mental anguish and public humiliation. He also seeks exemplary damages, court costs, attorney fees and interest.

According to the lawsuit, on Feb. 3, Lopez and former reserve police officer Toby Carpenter were asked by a dispatcher to handle a call of a domestic dispute at Dominguez' home. It also says, Lopez in April reported to the Bailey County Sheriff's Department that Dominguez was improperly using city funds.

According to a story in the Lubbock Avalanche Journal, Benny Clifton, a criminal investigator for the Bailey County Sheriff's Department, confirmed that Lopez told him he thought Dominguez was misusing money.

"That was one of the allegations, yes. That part is pending. If there is any investigation, it will be by the Texas Rangers," Clifton told the Avalanche Journal.

Marr told the Muleshoe Journal Tuesday he had not received any reports of Dominguez improperly using public funds. He said he would have investigated such claims, had they been made

to him. He did confirm knowledge of the domestic call to Dominguez' home and had personally reviewed the case. He said the issue had "pretty well been hashed out."

Marr said Lopez' termination was directly related to the traffic stop in which Marr was pulled over. Following the firing, Marr said Lopez had pulled him over without probably cause and had acted in a rude and insolent manner. Marr added that all Muleshoe Police officers are expected to act in a professional and courteous manner and he had instructed

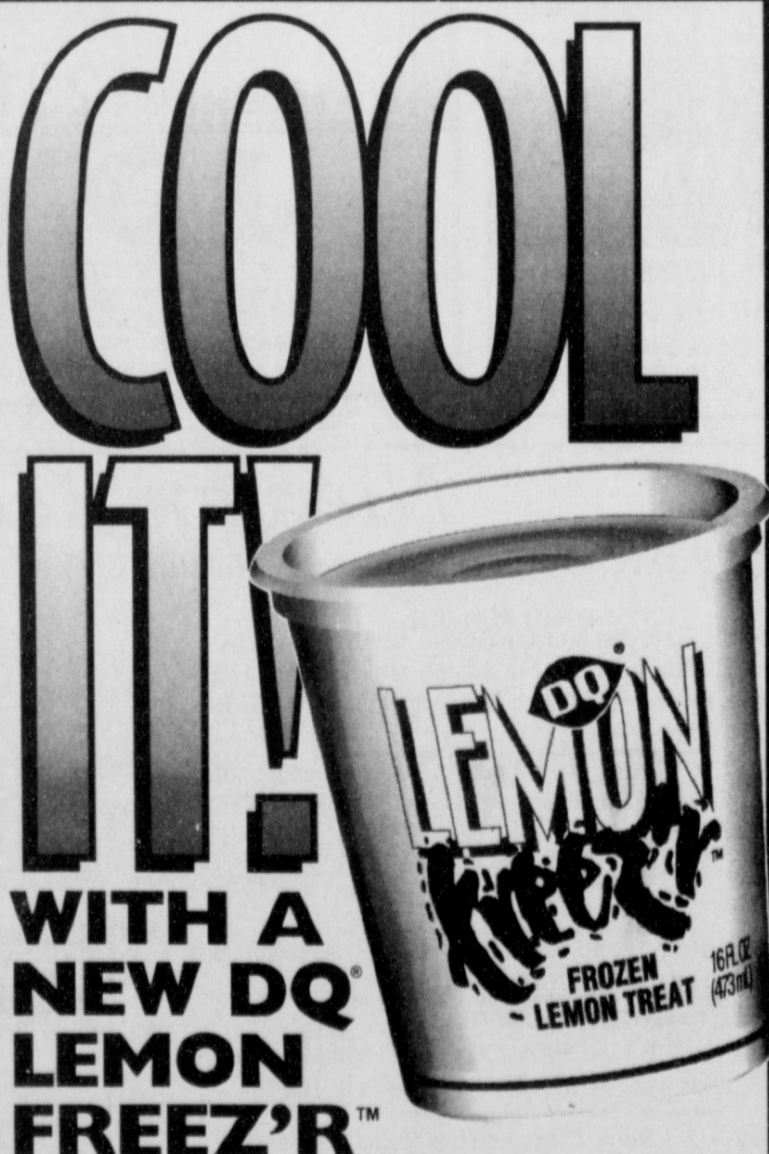
