## Two area teens were killed this weekend in separate accidents

Two area teenagers were killed in separate one-vehicle rollovers this weekend.

Seventeen-year-old Amy Proctor, a Springlake Earth High School sophomore, who had been active in the Wolverine Band and the youth group of the First Baptist Church at Earth, was killed Saturday morning.

Amy lost control of her 1978 Chevrolet pickup, and the vehicle crashed into a bar ditch, rolling over once and partially ejecting her, according to the Department of Public Safety.

She was driving north on Lamb County Road 504 around 9:30 a.m. on Saturday when the accident occurred two miles north of Dodd, a community

northwest of Earth.

Amy's parents are Duncan and Loanne Proctor of Earth. Her three sisters are Lesa, Erica and Sheryl Proctor, also of Earth.

On Sunday morning, nineteen-year-old Troy McBroom, a 1994 graduate of Lazbuddie

## Eleven people injured in two vehicle accident

### Country roads are proving dangerous to area drivers

A rash of accidents seems to have visited the Muleshoe area since the July 4th holiday, with two traffic fatalities, a train-pickup collision and two other wrecks.

Saturday morning, July 8, eleven people were involved in a two vehicle accident at an intersection six miles northeast of Muleshoe. All

eleven people were injured but fortunately only one passenger sustained serious injury.

Nina Galindo, 23, was traveling east on County Road 1018 in a red Ford Ranger pickup and failed to give right of way to a Suburban traveling north on the YL road.

Teresa Mendoza, 37, was the driver of the Suburban that was struck in the side by the pickup. The Suburban slid into a concrete culvert

and toppled onto its top.

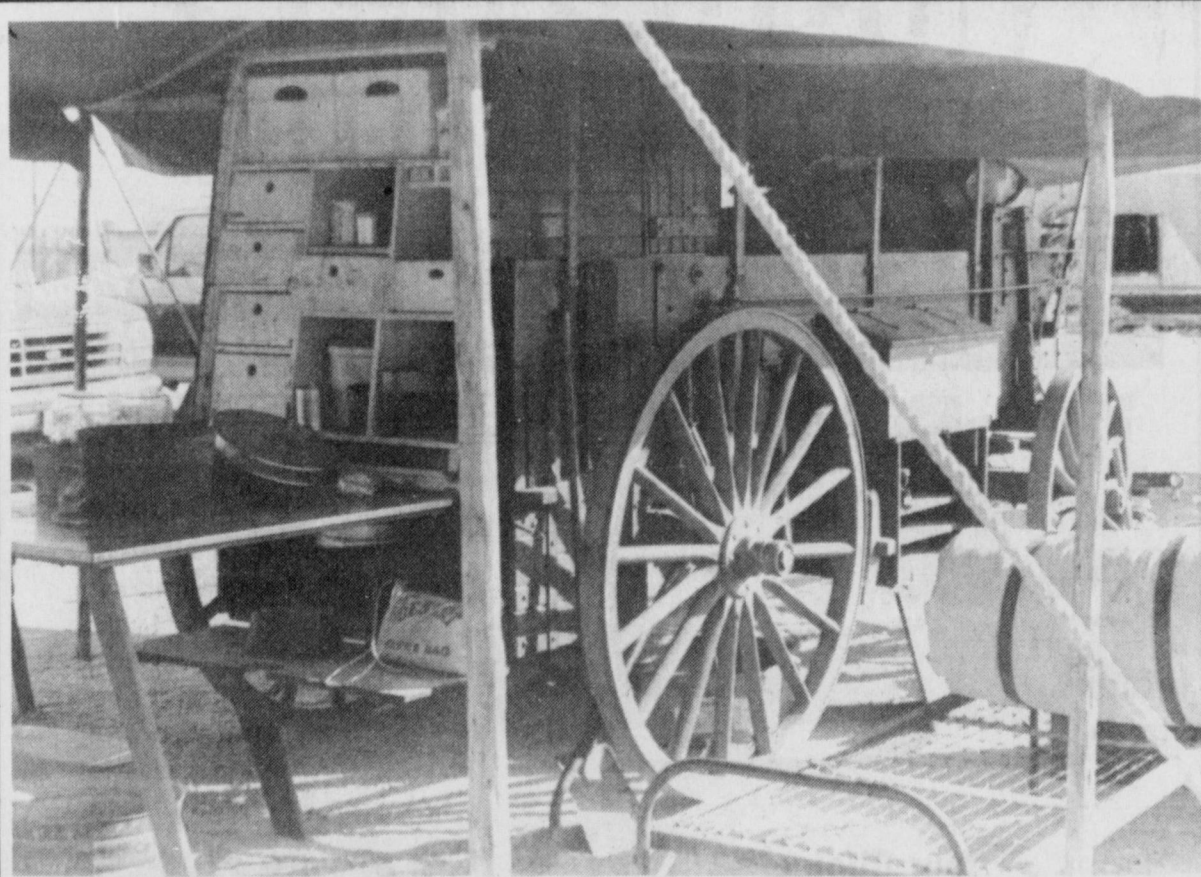
A Muleshoe fire truck had to be dispatched to the scene as a precautionary measure because of gas leaking from the overturned Suburban.

In addition to the two Muleshoe ambulances, a Lazbuddie ambulance was dispatched to the scene to help transport the eleven injured to the Muleshoe Area Medical Center. Nine passengers from the Suburban and two from the pickup were transported by the fleet of ambulances.

One minor was transferred to Lubbock in serious condition after being treated at the local hospital.

Galindo and three minors were kept overnight for observation and released on Sunday.

The other six passengers were treated and released on Saturday.

## Authentic cowboys cook breakfast from the past

Among the many interesting activities held in the community of Muleshoe over the 4th was an old fashioned chuckwagon breakfast cooked up—without electricity—by Jerry Slayton from Lubbock and Jimbo Humphreys of Dickens, TX.

The chuckwagons, parked across from Joe's Boot Shop, were part of week long "party" and tent sale hosted by Joe Rhodes.

Stepping back into the past, guests enjoyed campfire biscuits stirred up from scratch; steaming hot coffee, cowboy style; and all the trimmings, served around an authentic chuckwagon setting.

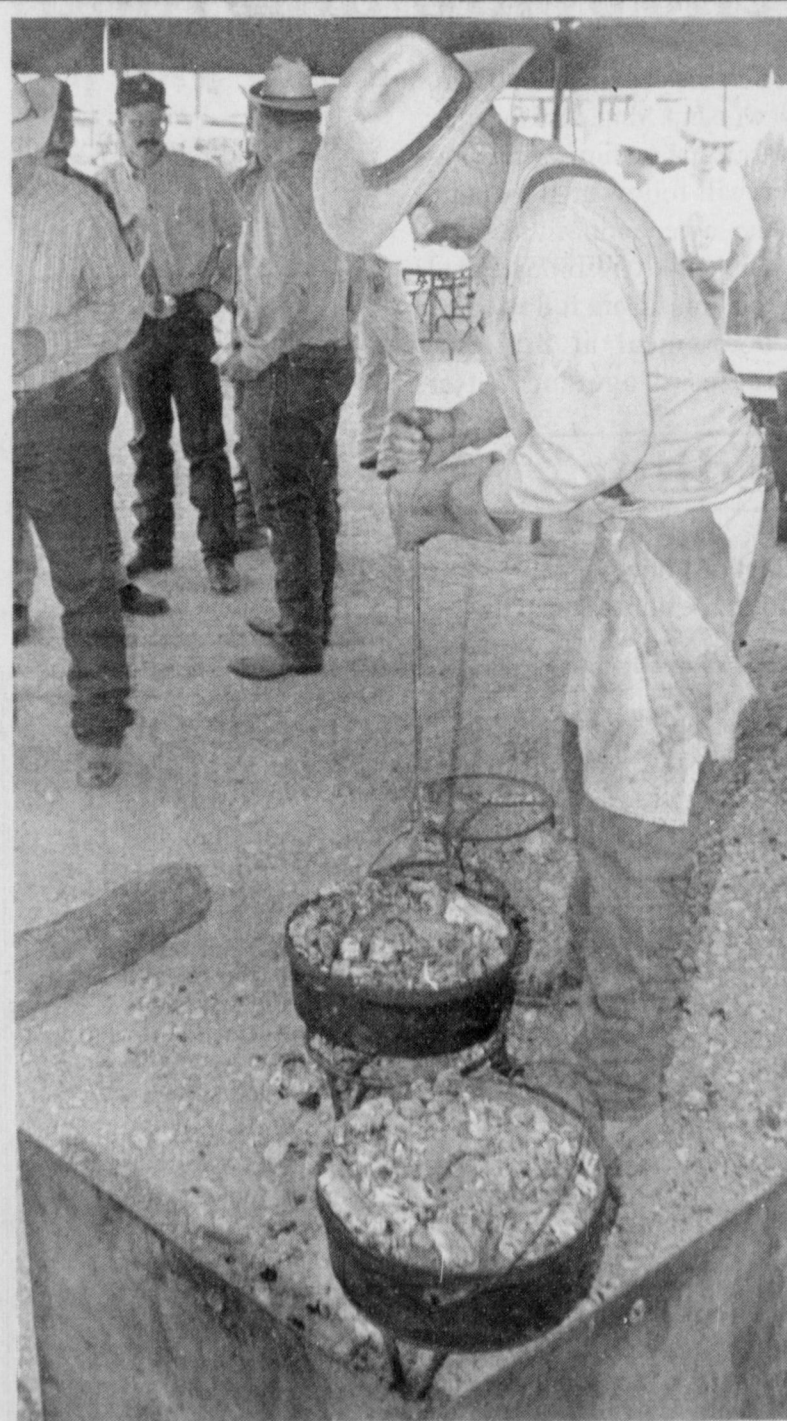
The wagons can be found on occasion at gatherings across the Panhandle, preserving a portion of history for modern day Americans.

Jerry Slayton is a retired Ag teacher who bought his wagon from Jimbo Humphreys. They

have taken their trade to cook-offs and Ag expo's across the Panhandle, but from February to June they become real chuckwagons serving real cowboy grub to real cowboys on real ranches during roundup and branding time.

Humphreys is a colorful cowboy with an incredible collection of stories. He grew up on the Pitchfork Ranch near Dickens.

Born a generation too late to have worked the cattle herds



when the chuckwagon was a familiar fixture, Jimbo inherited the cowboy tradition from his father, Jim Humphreys, who was general manager of the Pitchfork for more than 25 years.

Jimbo tells an interesting story of how his chuckwagon legacy began. After having done cowboy work for a while, he decided it would be profitable to contract fence-building

on the ranches near his home. As with most new businesses, the owners learn from experience. It wasn't the fence-building that Jimbo lacked experience in, but keeping employees.

He would gather up the hands in town on Monday and take them to the ranch to build fence. But, by the second or

## Leps accepts Brownfield baseball job

Muleshoe High School head baseball coach Ted Leps, who led the Mules to the playoffs in three of his four years on the job, has resigned to accept the head baseball job at Brownfield High School.

Leps compiled a 68-40 record (.630) and won District 2-3A championships in 1992 and 1995. The Mules went 20-8 during the past season and won the bi-district title before being eliminated by state semi-finalist Graham in the area round.

Leps takes over a Brownfield program that has produced numerous district championship teams over the years. The Cubs have made the playoffs from District 3-3A the last nine years in a row.

Leps replaces Wendell Brown, who will become an administrator in the Lubbock Independent School District.

"It's a good move for me professionally, because my goal is to be a college baseball coach," said Leps, who also was an assistant football coach and junior high girls basketball coach in Muleshoe. "Brownfield is a highly-respected program and they have 60-70 baseball players come out every year. And I'll be involved in the administration of the program."

Leps expressed regret in leaving Muleshoe, however.

"It was my first head coaching job," he said. "I'll miss the kids, the coaching staff and the

## Perez, Gauna make Class 3A All-State team

Two Muleshoe High School seniors have been named to the Texas Baseball Coaches Association 3A All-State Team.

Andy Perez and Jimmy Gauna, who helped the Mules win the District 2-3A and bi-district titles last season, were selected to the squad.

Gauna, a shortstop, was chosen for the second-straight year. He hit .427 as a senior, with 32 hits and nine doubles. He also had a .946 fielding percentage.

Gauna hit .536 in District 2-3A play in the 1995 season and hit .436 with 132 hits, 32 doubles, 164 runs and 125 sto-

len bases in his four-year career. He has signed a letter of intent to play baseball next season for Sul Ross State University.

Perez was the Mules' pitching ace for the past two years, compiling a 19-9 record. In 1995, he went 11-5 and had a

3.02 earned run average while striking out 106 opposing hitters. He also hit .351 for the season and .483 during district play.

MHS finished the year 20-8.

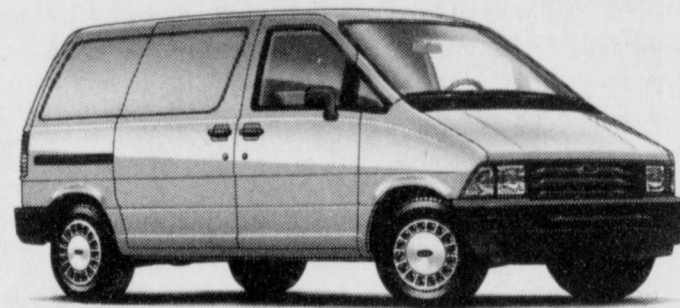

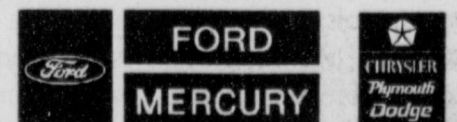

**Headed for Sul Ross**

Jimmy Gauna, a two-time All-District and All-State selection at Muleshoe High School, has signed a letter of intent to play for Sul Ross State in Alpine. With Gauna is MHS coach Ted Leps, who is leaving to take the head baseball coaching position at Brownfield.

**Gauna signs with Sul Ross State**

Jimmy Gauna, a 1995 Muleshoe High School graduate, has signed a letter of intent to play baseball for Sul Ross State University in Alpine.

A four-year letterman, Gauna was a two-time All-District and All-State selection at shortstop for the Mules. He hit .427 with 32 hits and nine doubles his senior year at MHS. He also compiled a .946 fielding percentage, as MHS won the district and bi-district championships in a 20-8 season.

Gauna hit .436 over four years with 132 hits, 32 doubles, 164 runs scored and 125 stolen bases. He also played football and basketball at MHS.

Gauna will attend Sul Ross

on an academic scholarship. As a member of the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association (TIAA), Sul Ross does not give athletic scholarships.

But Gauna, who will major in biology at SRSU, was awarded an academic scholarship after graduating from MHS with a 3.5 grade-point average.

Sul Ross competes in the TIAA against Howard Payne, Austin College, McMurry, Midwestern State, University of Dallas, College of the Southwest and Hardin Simmons. The Lobos are members of District 8 of the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Under coach Donny Randell, the Lobos finished

second in the District 8 playoffs last season, falling to perennial NAIA powerhouse Dallas Baptist in the finals.

Gauna also had interest from Lubbock Christian, Wayland Baptist, McMurry, Howard Payne and Laredo Junior College.

"It was a chance for Jimmy to go to school and play for a competitive program," said MHS coach Ted Leps. "Even with what the other schools were offering, he couldn't have afforded to pay the additional cost. Most of them are private and extremely expensive."

Leps, who coached Gauna all four years at MHS, is a Sul Ross graduate.

# Minding Your Business

## Want to Start something?

Recently, I heard a story on an airplane about a man who tried to enter a posh restaurant without a tie. The bouncer (disguised as a maitre d') told him that he could not go in. The man went back to his car to search for a tie. All he found was a set of jumper cables. He tied them around his neck and went back to the restaurant. The bouncer rolled his eyes, but finally said, "OK, you can go in, but don't try to start anything."

We had a good laugh and settled back into our own thoughts as the airliner bored holes in the sky. As I thought about the "don't start anything" line, it led to thoughts on starting a business. I wondered what I would start if I were faced with that decision?

Later, during the flight I picked up an old issue of *Inc.* magazine. Inside was an article on what types of business well-known celebrities would open if they were to start something new. Some of their thoughts may surprise you. They did me.

### The expert's ideas

Ed McMahon, former Tonight Show announcer, would start a home-remodeling business. Best-selling author, Stephen R. Covey, would open character-building schools.

Remington Corporation's razor guru, Victor Kiam, would sell travel alarms to increase hotel/motel security. Debbi Fields, who founded Field's cookies and produced millions of 180-calorie-per-cookie cookies, would open health spas to teach people how to "lead a good, healthy life." (Without cookies, I assume.)

Tom Peters, author of *In Search of Excellence*, would find a dark corner in some mundance industry to attempt to offset his alleged "\$65,000-for-two-hours-work" salary. Syndicated radio adviser, Bruce Williams, would start a regional airline. Donald Trump, billionaire and former airline owner, would consider anything *but* an airline.

### The grass is greener

From personal experience I know that the grass is always greener in the idea pasture next to the one you're in. I've visited with many small business owners, and even the highly successful ones believe that most other businesses would be easier to run than the one they own.

There are of course still good businesses to start. There are still ideas that would make money and serve customers

well. However, you shouldn't ask me to tell you what those good ideas are. Like Rush, I don't know.

I would suggest that you follow these guidelines if you're looking for a business to start: First, carefully evaluate your own skills and abilities. They should match at least some of the ones you'll need in the business you're considering. Second, any business you

start should be something you enjoy doing. When work is fun, it isn't work.

The third step is to find a niche where you can solve a problem or create good feelings. I know this sounds a little vague, but it is the best advice I can give you. You can spot

profitable niches by observing what's going on around you.

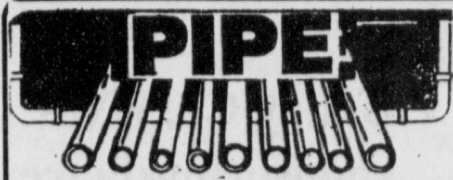
Next, put together a simple, but complete plan. You'll need to estimate revenues, start-up costs and monthly expense requirements to see if you have enough money. (Small Business Development Centers can help you with this step.) Revise your plan until you get a short, error free and easy-to-read document.

If your idea never comes together, don't get discouraged.

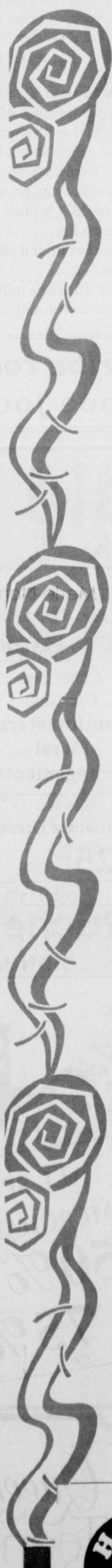

# Greene elected president of TPA

Sarah L. Greene, publisher of *The Gilmer Mirror*, was elected president of the Texas Press Association during the group's 116th annual summer convention in Austin June 22-24.

She succeeds Richard P. "Dick" Richards, publisher of the *Aransas Pass Progress*, who becomes chairman of the assoc's board of directors.

The Texas Press Association, founded in 1880, includes 514 weekly, semiweekly and daily newspapers.

Greene has served as director, treasurer and vice president of the association. She is TPA representative to the National Newspaper Association, and is a past president of the North and East Texas Press Association.

She is a third-generation newspaperwoman, following her parents, the late Georgia and Russell H. Laschinger, and grandfather, George Tucker, as publisher.

Long before high school she got experience in such jobs as collecting for subscriptions door-to-door, distributing funeral notices to stores and running with election results from the courthouse to the office where her father was

waiting to call them in to the Texas Election Bureau.

Founded in 1877 and purchased by Tucker in 1915, *The Mirror* has an official Texas state historical marker that designates it as the oldest business in Upshur County. In the interest of promoting a bond issue to finance the county's first paved roads, Tucker converted the weekly to a daily in 1916 and continued daily publication until World War II. Myriad shortages, notably of advertising and personnel, forced the Laschingers to return to weekly publication.

The wartime problems convinced Greene she wanted no part of the family business, but this soon passed. After two years at Stephens College in Columbus, Mo., she entered the University of Texas at Austin as a journalism major.

Following graduation she worked for three years as a city staff reporter for *The Dallas Morning News*, leaving for Fort Worth after her marriage to Ray H. Greene, then a *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* reporter. In 1953 they accepted an invitation to move to Gilmer and join the family business, just as her parents had done 30 years earlier when George Tucker put out the call.

*The Mirror* includes a commercial printing and office supply business. The newspaper has been published for the last 11 years as a semiweekly.

The fourth *Mirror* generation is represented by Greene's son, William R. "Russ" Greene, managing editor. Her daughter, Sally, lives in Chapel Hill, N.C., with her husband, Paul Jones, and their son, Tucker, 2. Sally is completing work on her Ph.D. in English.

Active in community affairs, Greene is past president and director of the Upshur County Chamber of Commerce, a director of the East Texas Yamboree Association, a trustee of the Upshur County United Fund, director of the Gilmer Industrial Foundation, director of the Upshur County Arts Council and an organizing director of the Historic Upshur Museum. She served nine years as a trustee of Baylor Medical Center at Gilmer.

She has twice received the Anson Jones Award of the Texas Medical Association for outstanding reporting of medical news. She has been honored as a Headliner by Professional Journalists Inc. Longview chapter, as Outstanding Woman by the Chamber of Commerce and as Woman of

the Year by Gilmer chapters of Beta Sigma Phi.

Greene is a director of Gilmer National Bank. She is a member of the Gilmer Rotary Club and a Paul Harris Fellow. A member of the First United Methodist Church, she serves on the administrative board.

On the state level, she has served as president of the Texas Folklore Society as a member and treasurer of the Texas Commission on the Arts. She is Ambassador of the Texas Folklife Festival and a councilor of the Friends of the Center of Texas Studies at Denton.

The Gilmer native is the second woman chosen to serve as TPA president. The first was Mary Judson, co-publisher of the Port Aransas *South Jetty*, president in 1990-91.

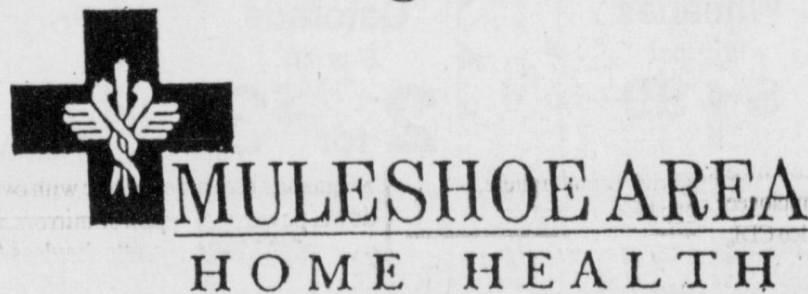

There were 21 drive off of a car tire on #8, and putting with a cue-stick on #9.

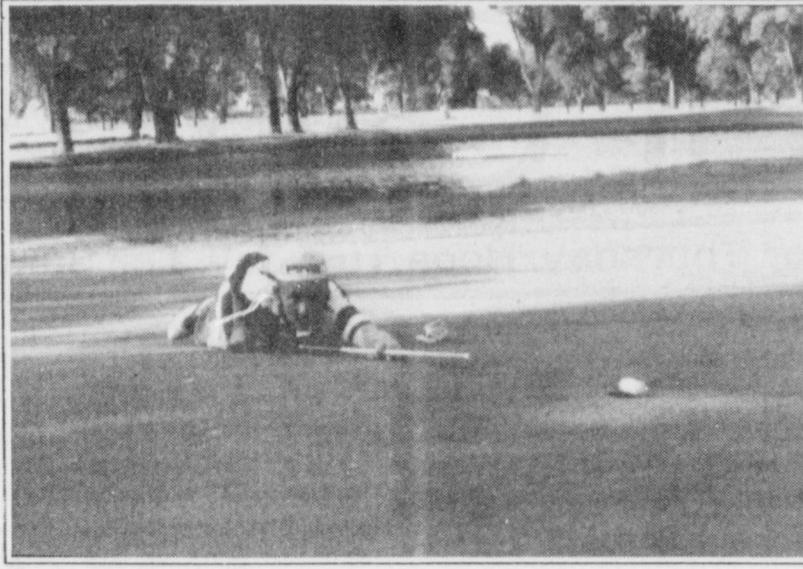
Ryan Hodge and Justin Puckett placed first, Rodger Buhman and Gerald Shanks came in second and James and Pam Atwood placed third.

A new site with permanent *puestos* and 40 shade trees is being prepared for next year's event. The bleachers will be moved by then, and a new concrete slab will be poured,

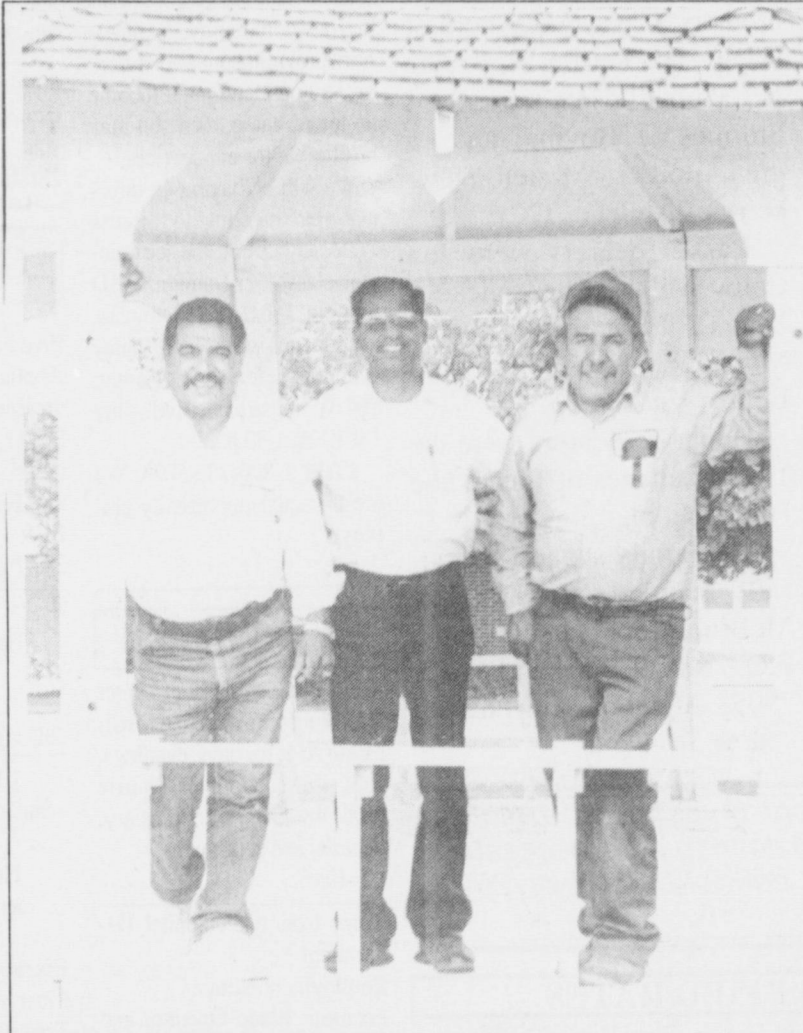
Father Augustine said.

Music is being provided by The Sunshiners, from Earth; Super Llama, from Tulia; and Los Estrenos del Norte, from Whitharrel.

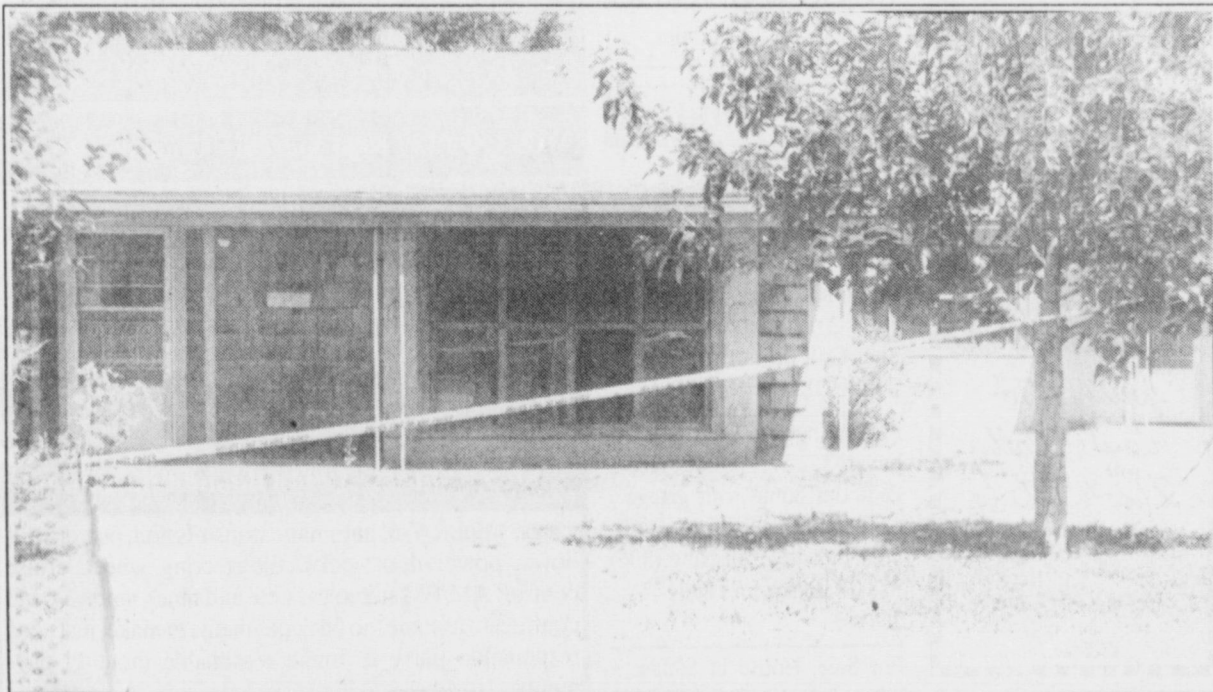
Tom Gunstream and Dave Marr will be helping with the cooking, according to Mario Flores, one of the planners.
