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County Commissioners deal with fire and flood

Rural landowners often are forced to watch their grassland or crops burn as fire trucks seek a water source.

The Bailey County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday, Sept. 11 at 10 a.m. to consider water usage agreement forms to be signed by all property owners willing to provide "dry hydrants."

The hydrants will be connected to irrigation wells so that water can be readily accessible

to fight fires in rural areas and for other uses with the landowner's permission.

The county agrees to keep the hydrants accessible by giving needed care the property:

"Bailey County will complete all excavation work so that the surrounding areas and the surface of the ground will be smooth, and present a pleasing appearance," the agreement states. Area fire departments will erect the stands and pro-

vide materials.

In other business, the 1995 budget was amended to allow certain line item transfers from office expense to capital expense.

Commissioners reviewed and approved payment of county bills and reviewed and approved a county treasurer's report for the month of July.

A departmental report from Jackie Wayne Burris of Bailey County Emergency Medical

Service resulted in the commissioners opening an inactive account for delinquent debts rather than writing off as a bad debt uncollected ambulance call bills.

Commissioners approved investment policy revisions in line with current legislation, and they considered sheriff's fees and EMS rates. Both remained the same as last year.

After the meeting, County Judge Marilyn Cox said that

recent rains have resulted in a need for maintenance of the old Bailey County Cemetery.

Although the cemetery does not belong to Bailey County, a county employee is providing some of the maintenance.

Cox said the cemetery once was owned by a non-profit cemetery association—all or most of whose members have moved or died. Cox said

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Local Angus breeder recognized

Glenn and Barbara Lust, Muleshoe, own one bull listed in the 1995 Fall Sire Evaluation Report published by the American Angus Association headquartered in St. Joseph, MO.

Issued in both the spring and fall, the new report features the latest performance information available on more than 4,400 sires.

The information is in the form of Expected Progeny Differences (EPDs). It is compiled from Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) submitted by breeders to the American Angus Association.

EPDs are excellent indicators of the genetic merit animals have for specific traits, says John Crouch, director of performance programs for the American Angus Association. When using EPDs with high accuracy values, cattle producers can depend on EPDs for predicting performance.

Traits in which EPDs are available include birth weight, weaning weight, milk, yearling weight and height, and scrotal circumference, as well as carcass traits including carcass weight, marbling, rib eye area and external fat thickness.

Beef is highlighted at Tri-State Fair

AMARILLO — Did you know that one steer can help make 144 baseballs? Clothing, chewing gum and steel ball bearings are made from beef by-products, too.

In fact, the 15.1 million head of cattle and calves in Texas can produce more than juicy, tender steaks.

Beef by-products allow 99 percent of the animal to eventually be used, according to the Texas Beef Council (TBC).

TBC, the promotion and marketing arm of the Texas beef industry, will be displaying its

2,500-square-foot interactive exhibit, called "Come See How Cattle Shape Your World," Sept. 16-23 at the Amarillo Tri-State Fair.

The exhibit will be open daily from 10 a.m. until 11 p.m. in the Rex Baxter Building and will depict the pervasive influence of cattle, beef, and their by-products in North American life.

TBC spearheaded production of the huge 95 by 25 foot exhibit. Over the next two years, more than one million people will see the educational exhibit

in Texas, Colorado, Kansas and Canada.

Video and audio stations allow the visitor to participate interactively in each of seven sections which explain cattle and beef's role.

An interactive wall and "Riddle Tree" is an added treat for children, providing hands-on entertainment and education for both youth and adult visitors. It includes a life-sized Dallas Cowboy Jay Novacek nutritional poster and a coloring

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Morning altercation ends in gunfire

No one was seriously injured in an early Monday morning altercation that resulted in gunfire in the 1800 block of West American Boulevard.

The Muleshoe Police were called to a fight in progress about 1:25 a.m. They arrived to find the fight broken up and the persons believed to have fired the shots gone from the scene.

Five men, including four Mexican nationals were later arrested in Cochran County for public intoxication. Four of the men, Gonzalo Espinoza Adame, Noe Escarsesa Gandara, Julio Caesar Gandara and Arnoldo Abyud Gandera

were all released to the U.S. Border Patrol for deportation.

A fifth man, Luis Alonzo Anaya, who was also arrested for public intoxication, paid a fine and was released.

Cochran County Sheriff's Department officials confiscated a 9 mm handgun from under the passenger seat of the white station wagon driven by the five men. The gun, reported stolen in Levelland, was not claimed by any of the men. The matter remains under investigation.

According to a witness at the scene, approximately 15 persons were in the parking lot of a local motel listening to music when a white station

wagon drive up with five to seven men inside. A loud argument ensued and a fight broke out. The car began to leave, but turned around in the middle of the street and one of the occupants began to fire a pistol into the air in the direction of the motel and the crowd.

Police were called and the white station wagon occupied by the suspects was seen heading south on FM 1731. The Cochran County Sheriff's Department was notified and the vehicle was stopped at about 2 a.m.

There were some minor cuts and bruises from the fight, but no one was hospitalized. No other charges have been filed.

Weekend shooting leaves juvenile in serious condition

A Muleshoe youth is hospitalized at Muleshoe Area Medical Center after being shot in the lower back and abdomen with a shotgun Sunday in an incident at a residence, that is still under investigation by Bailey County Sheriff's officials.

The name of the injured juvenile has not yet been released, but his condition is reported to have improved from serious to stable since he was

admitted to the MAMC emergency room Sunday at 5:12 p.m. He was brought into town in a private vehicle from about a mile northeast of Muleshoe.

The youth underwent several hours of surgery to repair damage from the wound.

A second juvenile is believed to have been involved in the incident and will be questioned about the incident. No charges are pending at this time.

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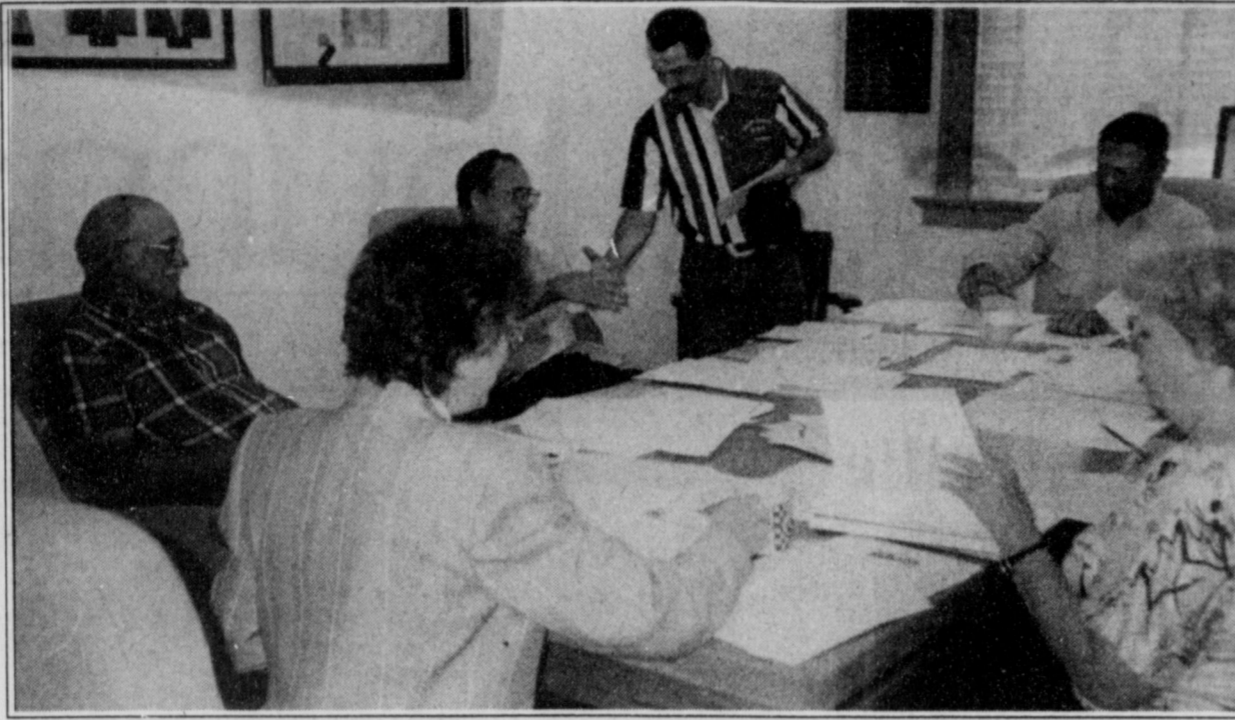
Elizabeth Harden, who was once a Bailey County judge's secretary, sold cemetery lots from her office, and the records have remained in the office.

"The Bailey County Cemetery is not and never has been a perpetual care cemetery," Cox said. "The county used to water the cemetery, but the well has gone dry."

"A maintenance man does try to mow and fill in the graves when it rains, but he also cleans the court house, the law enforcement center, the district judge's office and the extension office, as well as doing small maintenance at the Texas Department of Public Health. He is behind."

County resident Carolyn Collis said the graves at the cemetery are unsafe to walk around. She suggested a community work day to alleviate the problem.

Cox said, "I think it (a work day) would be a wonderful idea. . . . The graves did sink. We have some dirt to fix it with and have been trying to find time (to deal with it) for a week."

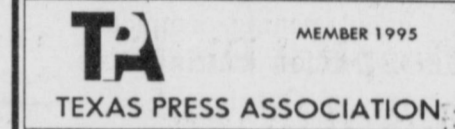

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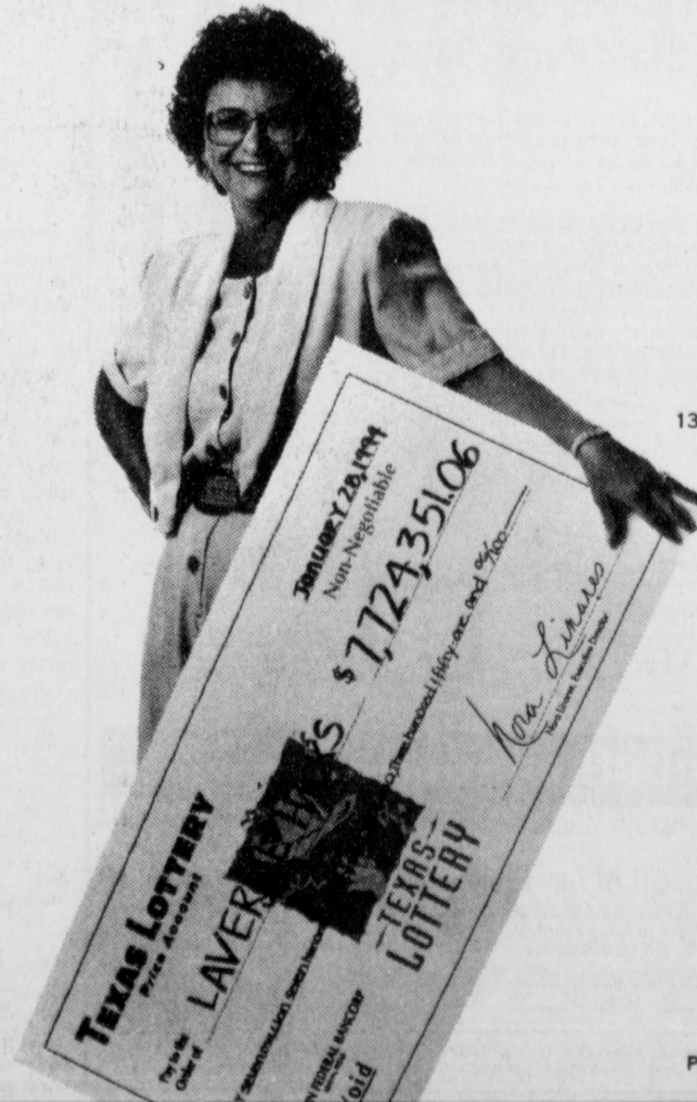

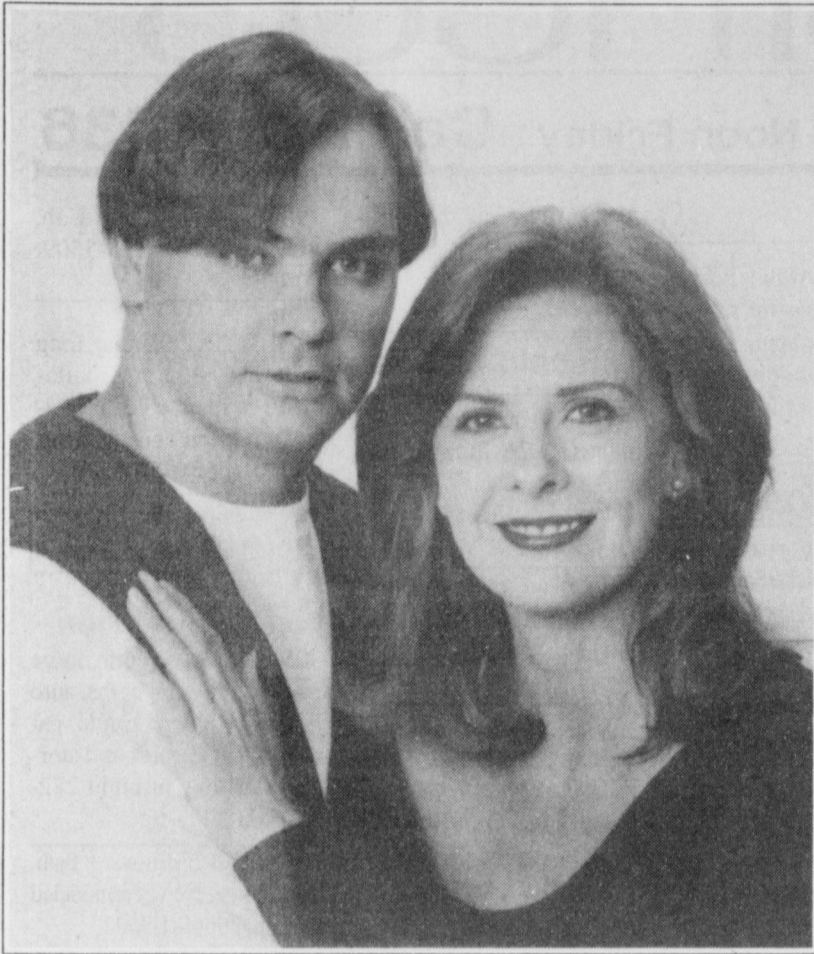

The Mark of the Maker will be broadcast Monday, September 18th at 10:30 p.m. on KENW-TV.

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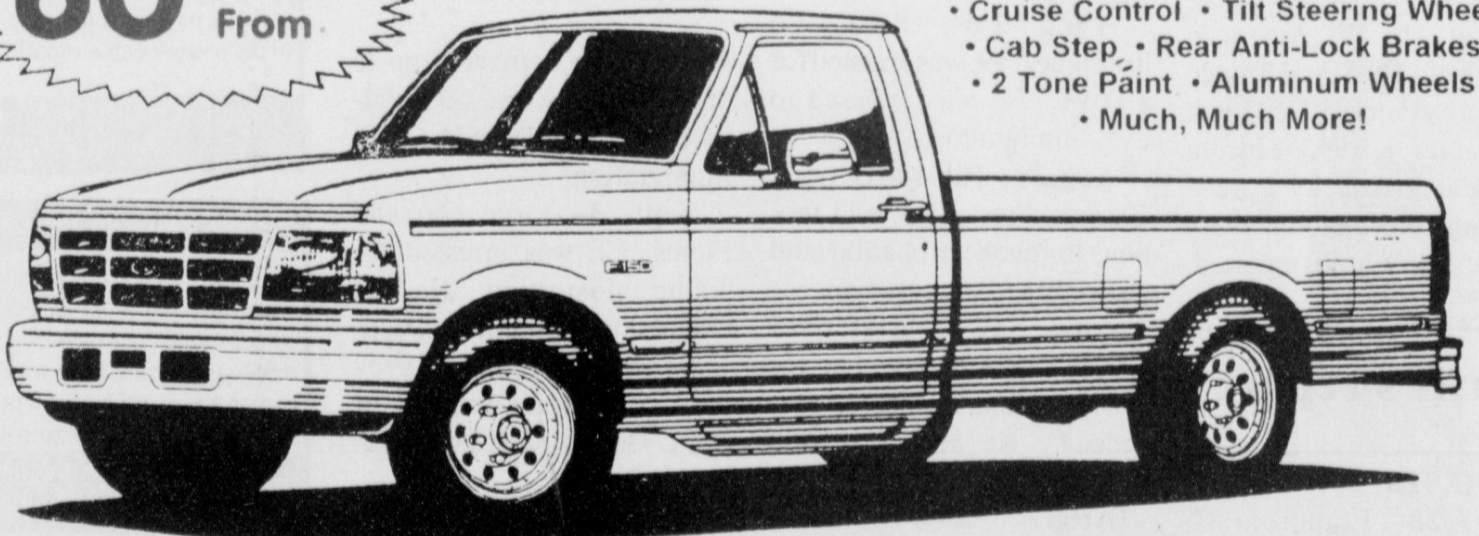

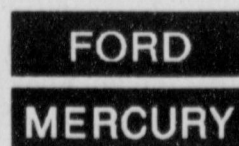
