## Muleshoe bands together at Zia Festival

Muleshoe's Mighty "M" Band, directed by Rob Lovett and Martha Anthis, won five Class A band awards—including outstanding Class A band—at the Zia Marching Festival last Saturday in Albuquerque.

Band member Kandy Wilcox said, "I knew walking out to the field that it was going to be a good show."

The MHS band finished 11th among 29 Class 4A, 3A, 2A and A bands. Muleshoe's band topped four of Albuquerque's high school bands, as well as other bands from schools with 1,200 to 2,000 students, such as Santa Fe, Gallup, Hobbs, Farmington and Roswell.

"It was the highest a Class A band has ever scored in the Zia competition," Lovett said. "We had a performance we knew the kids had in them. We knew they could handle it, and they finally did."

Band member Kristi Bennett wrote in her journal, "When we walked off the field, Mr. Lovett looked up at us, smiled, and yelled, 'Yes!,'



which let us know that we had really done it—we hadn't messed up..."

Beating out New Mexico bands of their class from Clayton, Cloudcroft and Dexter, Muleshoe's band won trophies for outstanding flag line, outstanding music performance, outstanding marching performance and outstanding total show general effect.

Lovett said the band's strength is in its marching perfection and in the complexity of its music.

The Mighty "M" Band spreads out and marches like a big band, Lovett said, so there is no chance to hide. "Everyone has to march and play a nearly perfect show."

Lovett attributes the band's outstanding performance partially to "good use of time on a

limited time schedule."

(Band class lasts 45 minutes, and it takes five minutes to move to the field with all the equipment and five minutes to move back, leaving only 35 minutes of actual practice per class period.)

Lovett describes his MHS

band students as "intelligent, creative and self-motivated kids" who have the support of the school board, administration, parents and community.

Drum major Samuel Villareal, who has been in the band for seven years, playing percussion, French horn and

tenor saxophone, said he appreciates the support of a community that gives a lot to the band.

As for his leadership role, he said, "No matter what happens, you can't be affected. No matter what, you have to hold up and do your best."

For Villareal, the best part about the trip to Albuquerque was getting to be with his friends.

For Kandy Wilcox, it was when a white limousine pulled up, the window rolled down and an elegant man with an English accent asked them, "Excuse me, ladies, would you like some Grey Poupon?"

Forty-seven band members, two drivers, nine adult sponsors and a few "roadies" (dedicated eighth-grade band members who help load and unload equipment) left after the home game Friday and spent the night on the floor of the Moriarty gym—girls on one side, boys on the other, according to Bennett.

Wilcox said the girls in the band took a community shower in their swimming suits Saturday.

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## MISD awards contracts

The MISD Board of Trustees Monday night awarded bids for the construction of a weight room and new tennis courts on the Muleshoe High School campus.

Although bids for the tennis courts were higher than anticipated, the trustees voted to move ahead with the project.

Quicksilver Construction of Lubbock will serve as the general contractor for the tennis court project, and the bid for the weight room facility was awarded to Vinson Construction of Amarillo.

Although the Quicksilver bid was \$93,985, the company estimates it will be able to complete the tennis court project for \$81,500—complete with synthetic surface—if the fence is lowered from 12 feet to 10 feet and lighting is not installed.

A company representative at the meeting recommended

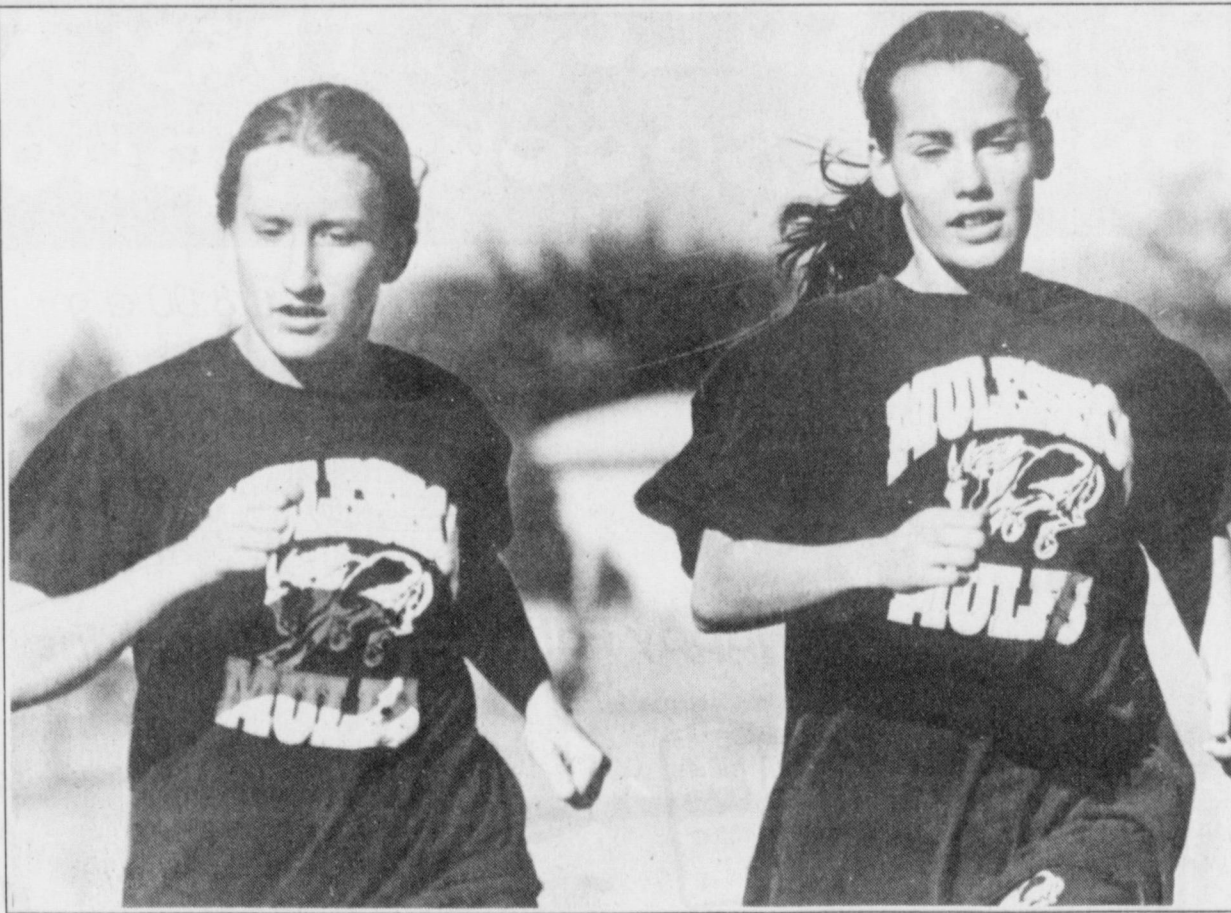
Costumes are encouraged as long as they are "not evil looking," according to Ric Peterson of the Christian Center.

## Lady Mules peaking at right time

An intense rivalry with Dimmitt makes an otherwise predictable District 2-3A cross country meet interesting Saturday for the Muleshoe Lady Mules.

Dimmitt and Muleshoe are clearly the top two teams in the district.

Still, plenty is on the line during Saturday's meet at Mae Simmons Park in Lubbock, which also serves as a qualifier for next week's state regional meet. The top two teams and top five individuals from the district meet advance to the regional.

Muleshoe is looking to take back the district title which now

belongs to Dimmitt.

"We have a big rivalry with Dimmitt," Lady Mule coach Jacinda Langen said. "It's real important to win district and it has been for years."

The Muleshoe boys, and the junior high boys and girls team also run in Saturday's district meet. The meet starts at 11:30 a.m. but no specific race times have been set yet.

The Lady Mules won the Buffalo Stampede in Canyon two weeks ago, beating Dimmitt by 10 points, and appear to be peaking at the right time.

"I was real pleased with the way we ran against Dimmitt," Langen said. "The girls ran well at Canyon, but I don't think they've done their best yet."

Muleshoe, which doesn't have any seniors, is led by junior Cari Faver.

Faver and Dimmitt's Shawna Kenworthy are the favorites for the individual title.

"She's worked hard, running all summer," Langen said. "I think Cari has a good chance of qualifying for state."

Faver said she going to have to go out strong and maintain the pace to hold off Kenworthy, who has a strong finishing kick.

"I went through a time when I didn't run too well," Faver said. "I was just tired I guess."

Langen said the team title will come down to who can bunch up its 3-4-5 runners.

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## NAFTA traffic clogs major highway arteries

AUSTIN — "As the major trade gateways to Mexico, Texas' major border crossings are already among the busiest ports of entry in North America, and they are about to get even busier," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

"And anybody who regularly travels on I-35, I-10 or U.S. 59 has witnessed a dramatic increase in traffic in the last few years, particularly since the implementation of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). These three highways are the major trade routes through Texas," Sharp said.

"The state is racing to meet demands for improved highways and border crossing facilities to accommodate the ballooning volume of truck and rail traffic hauling goods to and from Mexico.

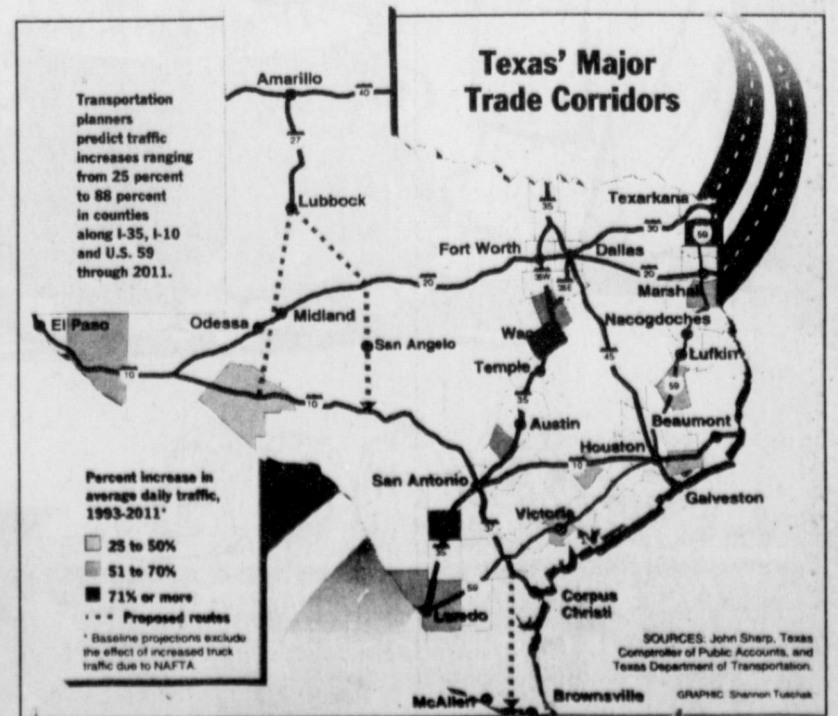
"In the next two years, Texas will spend roughly three-quarter

of a billion dollars in state and federal funds to maintain and improve the three main highway corridors. In addition, almost \$80 million dollars in projects to improve access to international bridges are either scheduled or underway," Sharp said.

U.S. trade with Canada and Mexico—both exports and imports—reached record levels in 1994, jumping 17 percent to \$348 billion, according to the October issue of "Fiscal Notes," a monthly publication of the Comptroller's Research Division.

More importantly for Texas, U.S. trade with Mexico exceeded \$100 billion for the first time ever, averaging almost \$2 billion per week during the first year of NAFTA. More than \$1 billion per week of that trade passed through Texas' five

post-stressed concrete, which he considers more longlasting than regular concrete.

He said post-stressed concrete—usually slightly more expensive than regular concrete—is presently about the same price.

The weight room "bare bones" low bid was \$63,000. However, this did not include any type of surface to cover the concrete slab.

Also discussed at the meeting was the upcoming visit of the Texas School Improvement Initiative (TSII) team scheduled for Nov. 28-30. Trustees also adopted an employment policy that complies with Senate Bill 1.

Superintendent Bill Moore discussed the Academics 2000 Grant to be used at the elementary level for intensive training in math and science.

Board member Curtis Shelburne discussed an audiotape he helped produce, describing the DeShazo Muleville project—a school-run store, bank and post office.

Assistant Superintendent Adrian Meador said bids (\$96,650) were accepted from Hemphill Bus Sales, Inc. of Denton for two new school buses to be delivered in approximately 120 days.

Meador said that teachers have been volunteering their

time at night to tutor students taking the math TAAS and he indicated that the practical parenting program is working well.

It was reported that the Children's Support Fund received \$1,166.58 as a result of the district's garage sale held on Oct. 14.

Trustees discussed the possibility of an alternative campus in the future especially suited for the educational, physical, psychological and disciplinary needs of students who have severe behavior problems and must be expelled from area schools.

Moore said he envisions the school as an isolated, extended

day "boot camp," for students with "serious and persistent misbehavior."

It would function from about 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. and become an entity in which the school, the county and the juvenile justice system would cooperate to make an attempt to turn students around.

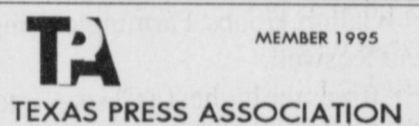
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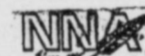

major border crossings: El Paso, Eagle Pass, Laredo, Hidalgo and Brownsville.

In addition to long-haul shipments of goods, Texas' border traffic is boosted by numerous short-haul shipments to and from more than 600 maquiladora industrial plants located along the Texas-Mexico border. These plants receive unfinished products from the U.S., assemble them and ship them back to the U.S.

Trucks carried 90 percent

of the value of U.S. exports to Mexico and 83 percent of the value of goods imported from Mexico in 1994.

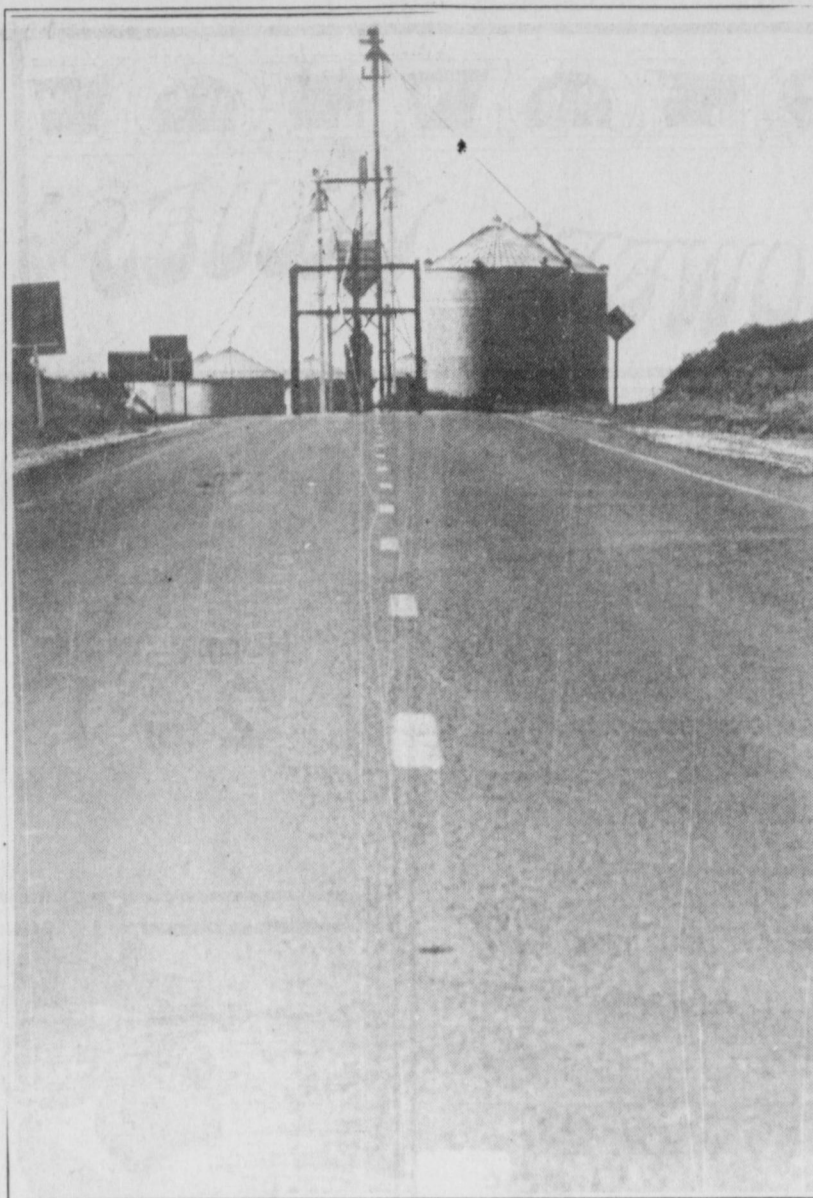
The Texas Department of Public Safety has obtained federal funds to construct seven new truck-weighing stations and to upgrade two existing stations.

DPS officials estimate that 15 percent of the Mexican trucks entering Texas exceed U.S. weight limits, and that only about 10 percent of those trucks have been inspected in the past.

"Several studies have shown that Texas highways cannot withstand the weight of Mexican trucks. The weight limit for trucks on U.S. highways is 80,000 pounds. The Mexican Transport Ministry estimates that overloaded five-axle trucks from Mexico often weigh as much as 108,000 pounds, and six-axle trucks might weigh up to 130,000 pounds.

"This is a critical issue to Texas taxpayers, because one study shows that a truck weighing just 4,000 pounds above the U.S. limit accelerates pavement damage five-fold, meaning a highway designed to last 40 years would have to be replaced in only eight years," Sharp said.

Texas has asked the federal government for help in enforcing U.S. weight requirements on Mexican trucks as NAFTA expands their access to U.S. highways.

"He's worked his tail off," Gruhlkey said.

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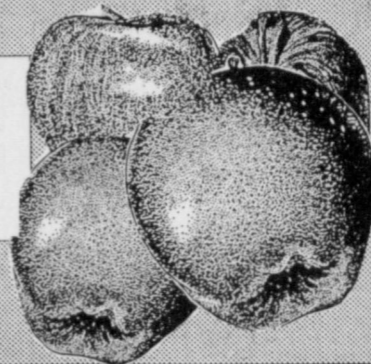

## Muleshoe finds comfort on road

Muleshoe is like a used car. They road test well. It's when you get them home that the engine starts knocking.

Muleshoe has had its three best efforts on the road this season, taking Denver City (17-14) and Littlefield (21-0) deep into the fourth quarter before losing. The Mules scored 21 points in the first quarter of a 37-21 loss at Lubbock Roosevelt.

Counting last week's 41-6 loss to Friona, Muleshoe has given up 41 or more points in four home losses.

Muleshoe coach Randy Adair can't explain it.

"We had what I consider poor tackling and too many three-and-outs," Adair said about the Friona game.

Now it's Willie Nelson time again for the Mules (0-7, 0-2), who play a District 2-3A game at Floydada (2-5, 0-2) Friday.

The Winds are coming off a 41-0 thumping at the hand of Littlefield, which doesn't bode well for the Mules.

"That's the nature of the business," Adair said.

### Mule notebook

Fans at Friday's Friona game were treated to football's version of a celestial sighting—Daniel Garbarino's comet. The senior quarter showed the speed and athleticism that has several Division I programs interested when he scored on a 60-yard touchdown run down the right sideline on a bootleg. Once Garbarino got turned up field, he was gone, making the Friona secondary look like they grew roots as he flew past...Floydada (2-5, 0-2) hasn't made the playoffs in two years after a string of five straight appearances...The Bobcats beat Lubbock Roosevelt, 34-6 the week after Muleshoe lost to Roosevelt, 37-21...Friona probably had more weapons that any other team that the Mules faced this year, except Littlefield. But Littlefield didn't utilize their weapons as well. Friona quarterback Kyle Grimsley was a lot like Denver City's Josh Smith in that he was slippery running the option and threw the ball well. What makes the wishbone so tough to defend is it isolates backs and receivers one-on-one with defenders, which is especially tough on the Mules because their biggest deficiency is team speed. Floydada also operates out of the wishbone, but doesn't have as many quality skill players as Friona...Trivia: What two former West Texas State running backs played on opposite teams in Super Bowl XI?...Muleshoe is averaging a respectable 161 yards rushing per game, led by Jake Adair (69.7 ppg). Doug Fields is averaging a team-high 6.5 yards on eight carries...Garbarino, moved to quarter-

## Amherst saddles Longhorns with 58-6 loss

LAZBUDDIE — Lazbuddie coach Mark Scisson turned out to be quite the prophet.

He told his team if they didn't play well Friday, the game would be over by halftime.

Much to his dismay, Scisson was right.

Dewayne Miles rushed for 199 yards and scored seven touchdowns as top-ranked Amherst beat Lazbuddie 58-6 in District 2-1A six-man showdown that ended at halftime because of the 45-point rule.

"I don't know who that was that (Amherst) played, but it wasn't Lazbuddie. They're real good. But we were just flat. We're not that bad a football team.

"With all due respect to Amherst, if we had played our normal game it would have been a 20-point game. We would have had to play well above our heads to beat them."

The blowout surprised many, including Amherst coach Jack Shely.

"I never would have believed this outcome," Shely told the *Lubbock Avalanche-Journal*. "We prepared hard for this game, and the kids played a good game."

Lazbuddie won at Amherst last year, 34-28, the Bulldogs' only loss en route to the state title. Amherst (7-0, 2-0) hasn't lost since.

Miles has rushed for 349 yards and scored 13 touchdowns in the last two weeks.

"He's the best I've seen since I've been here," Scisson said of the 6-2, 215-pound senior with 4.6 speed in the 40. "He's extremely strong and quick. We'd stop him for two or three plays and then he'd bust one."

"Without him, they're an average team," Scisson added.

Lazbuddie (4-3, 1-1), averaging 416 yards coming into the game, was limited to 129.

Justin St. Clair was just 6-of-26 for 102 yards with one touchdown and one interception.

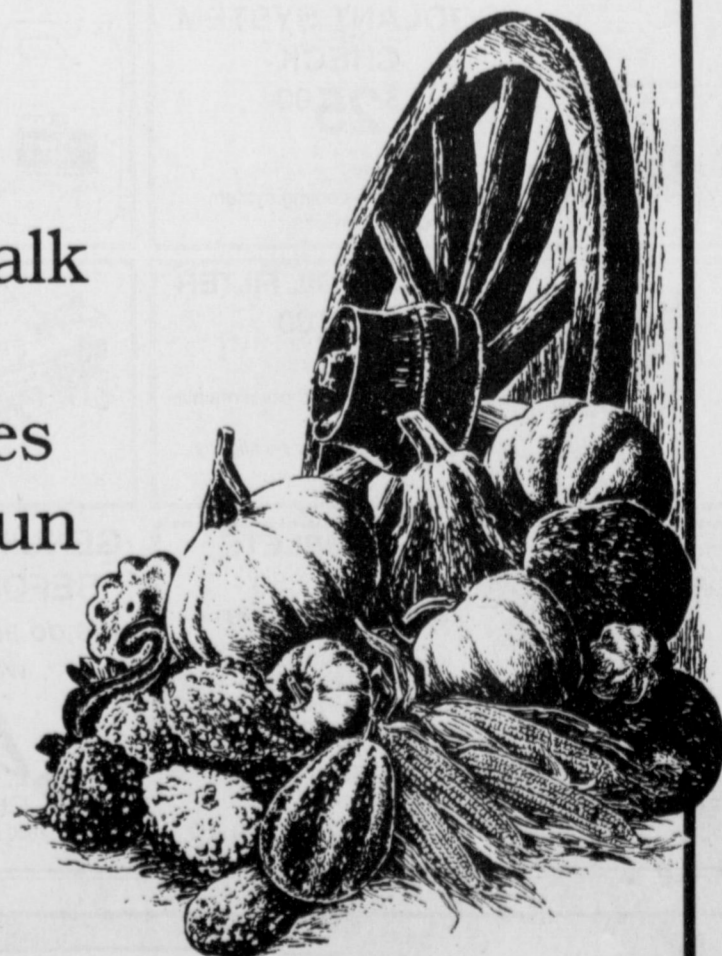
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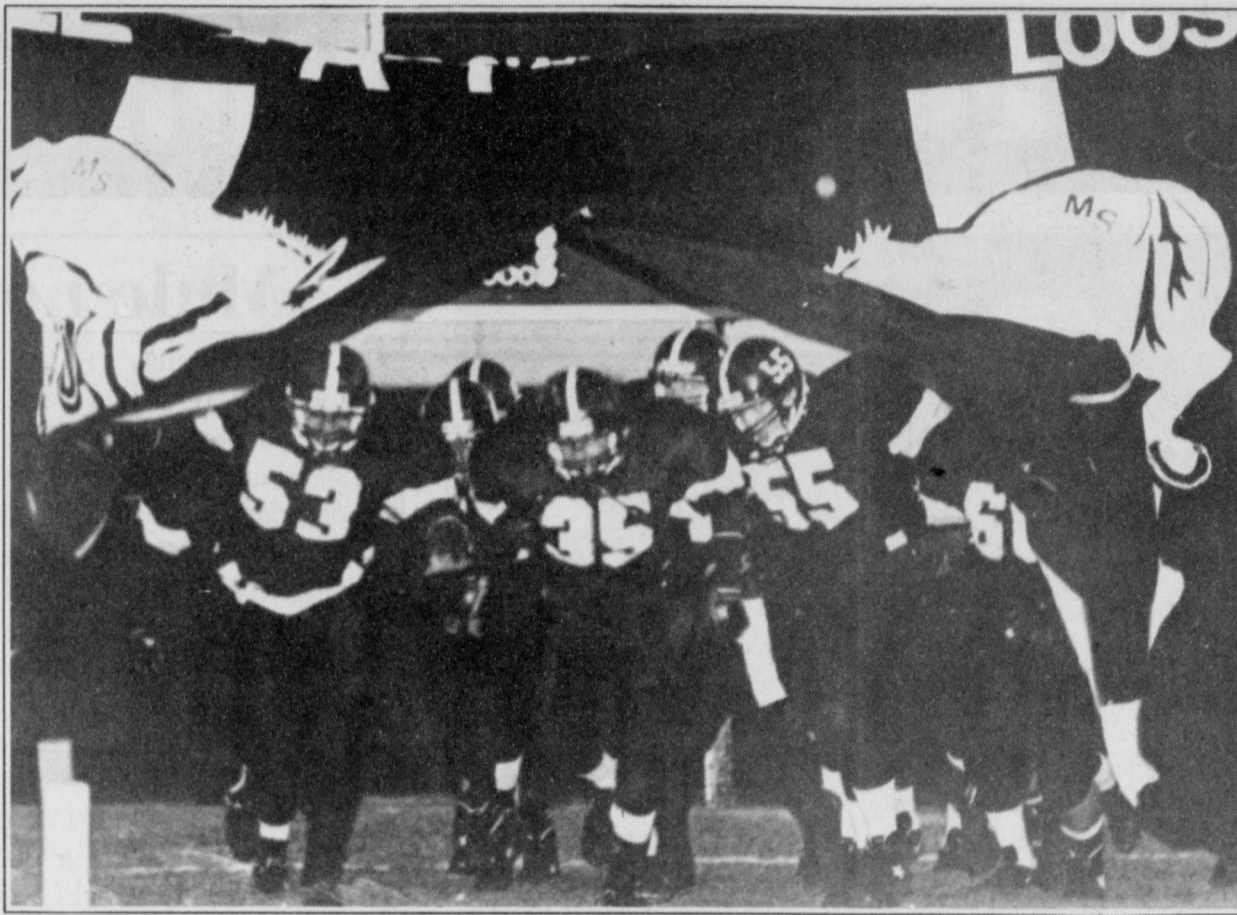

**WICHITA FALLS** — District 8 Distributed Education Clubs of America attended a leadership lab in Wichita Falls Oct. 16-17.

The Muleshoe Chapter arrived in the afternoon and recovered from the four-hour trip by going to the mall.

The students checked into the Holiday Inn and attended a meeting where they were tested on their work and leadership skills. After finishing the test, members attended a role playing event.

This is where the students showed off their communication skills to a judge. Students, acting as potential managers,

had to explain what the new employees' (the judge) duties were and what was expected of them. Students were evaluated on their explanations.

After this event, DECA members mingled in the indoor pool and fell asleep in the wee hours of the morning.

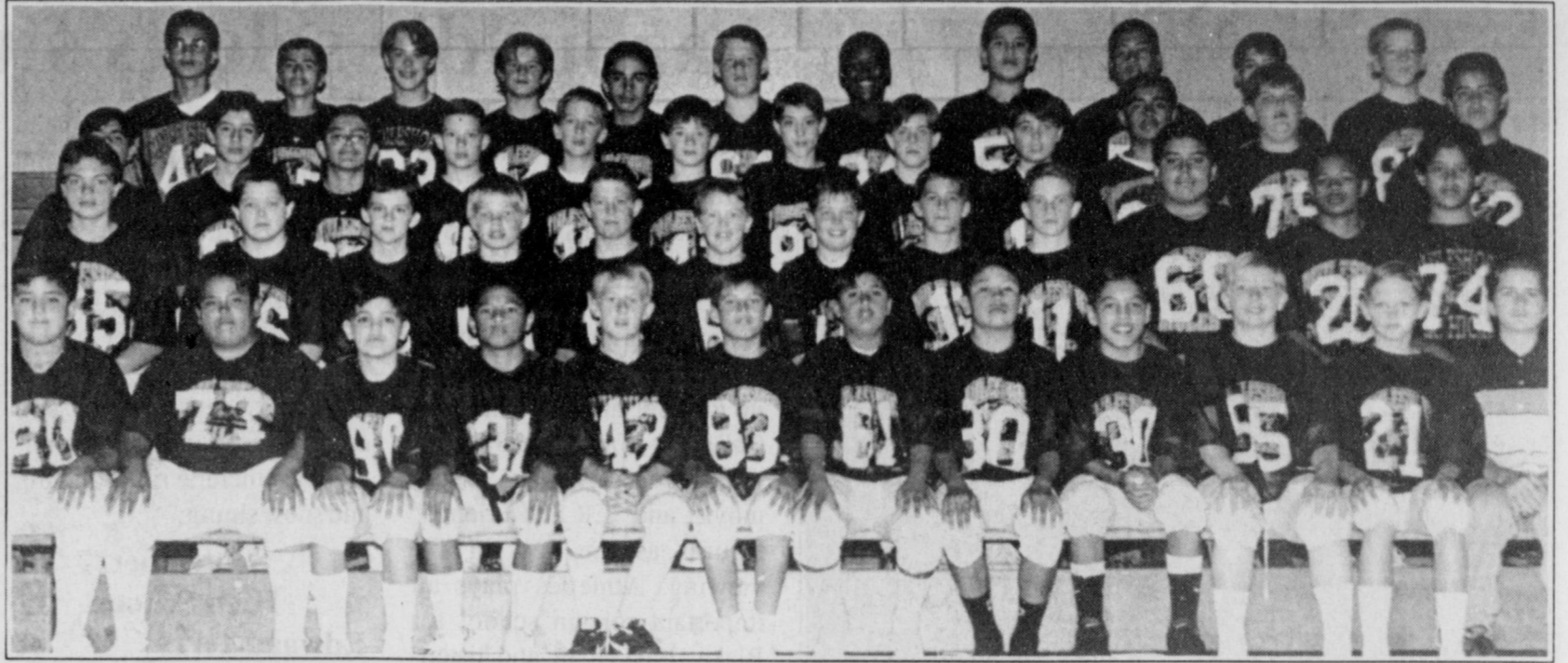
Squadron in the 30th Operations Group, 30th Space Wing is located at Vandenberg AFB CA.

## Texas health foundation reminds senior of Medicare services

Just in time for National Breast Cancer Awareness Month and the beginning of flu season, Texas Medical Foundation (TMF) is pleased to offer important information about flu shots, mammograms, and Medicare coverage of these two procedures in two new editions of its "Positive Prescription" newsletter.

Many members of the Medicare population (which includes most people 65 or older and certain disabled persons under 65) are at higher risk for developing serious complications as a result of the flu or developing breast cancer.

However, Medicare data reveals that most Medicare recipients are unaware of or simply don't use their Medicare benefits for flu shots and mammograms.

For this reason, the Medicare program and its contractors (like the Texas Medical Foundation) are working to inform Medicare recipients of these benefits through publications such as the "Positive Prescription" newsletter.

One edition of the "Positive Prescription" newsletter, titled "The Flu—It's Nothing to Sneez At," answers questions such as "What is the Flu?" and "How

can I protect myself against the flu?"

The other edition, "A Mammogram Can Save Your Life," provides general, useful information about breast cancer and mammograms.

Both newsletters include important Medicare coverage information and toll free phone numbers to call in Texas for additional information.

"Positive Prescription" newsletters are provided as a public service of Medicare and TMF and are printed in English and Spanish.

Timely and important health care topics are covered

in quarterly editions.

Medicare recipients and other interested persons may call TMF to be placed on a mailing list to receive the newsletters on a regular basis.

The minutes were approved as read, and the closing prayer was led by Alton Epting.



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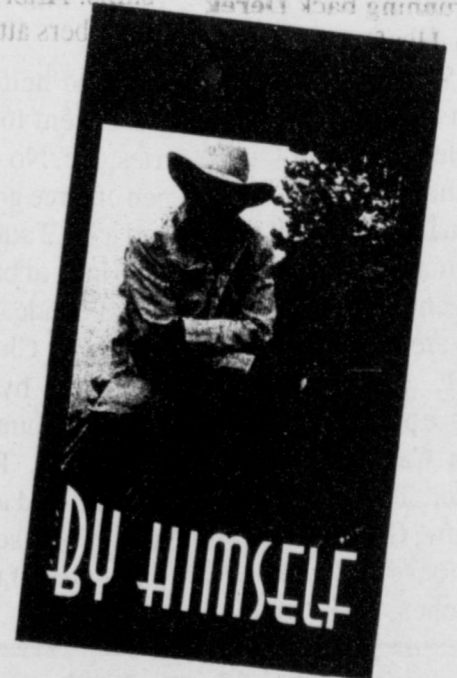
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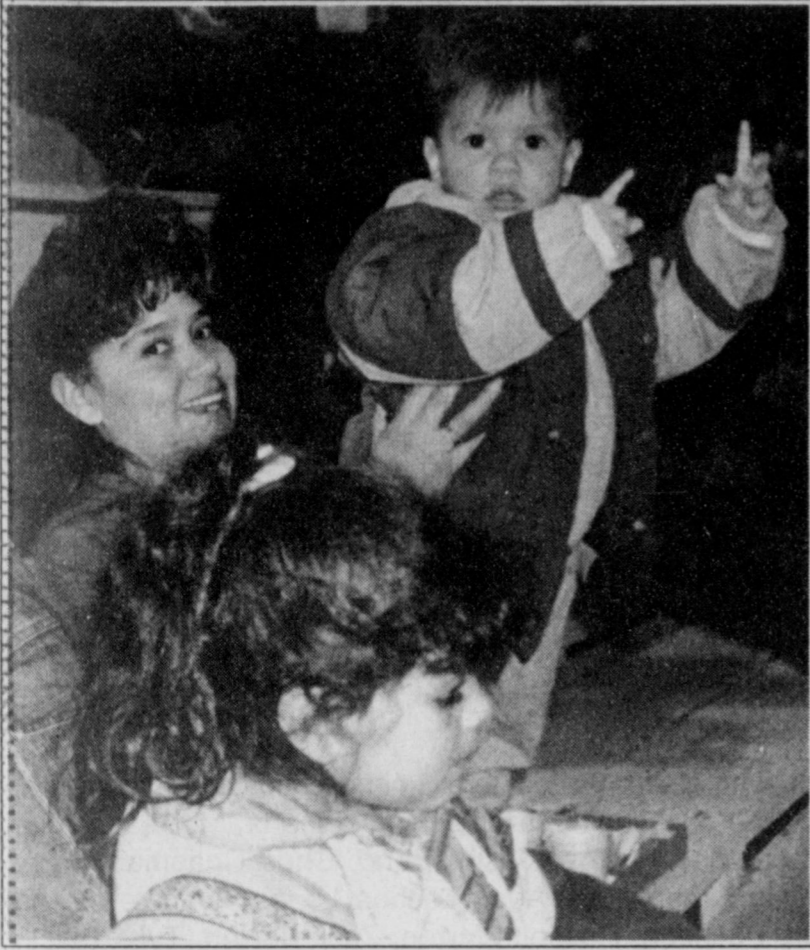

DALLAS — Cattle Feeding Country of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico has long been known as the best cattle feeding region in the U.S.

The best of the best were recognized as winners of the 1995 TFCA Fed Beef Challenge during the "New Realities" convention of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TFCA), Oct. 16 in Dallas.

Sponsored by TFCA, the Fed Beef Challenge offers more than \$10,000 in cash and trophies in a contest designed to let cattle feeders compete with one another in producing the high quality beef that consumers demand. A total of 32 feedyards entered 58 pens of top quality steers and heifers in the contest.

First place pen of steers went to Texona Cattle Feeders at Hale Center. The pen of three graded Low Choice, had an average ribeye area of 15.4 square inches, 0.04 inch of

backfat and a 2.56 Yeild Grade. Second place went to Bartlett II at Hereford with a set of steers that graded Low Choice, had a 15.4 square-inch ribeye, 0.59 in of backfat and a 2.56 Yeild Grade.

Third place was captured by Wes-Tex Feedyard at Muleshoe with steers that graded Choice, had a 13.1 square-inch ribeye, 0.44 inch of backfat and a 2.80 Yeild Grade.

In the heifer division, first place went to Caprock Industries, Inc. No. 4 at Dalhart. The pen of three graded Low Coice, had a 12.2 square inch ribeye, 0.55 inch of back fat and a 2.27 Yeild Grade.

Grand Champion Carcass was won by an entry from Carson County Feedyards at Panhandle. The entry graded Choice, had an average ribeye area of 17.2 square inches, 0.56 inch of backfat and a 1.59 Yield Grade.

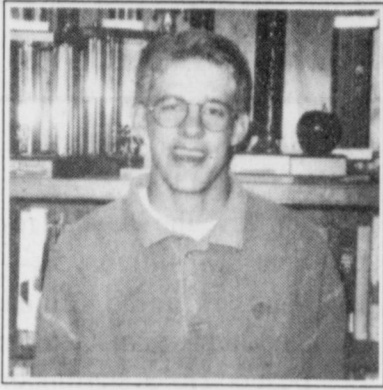

The Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District has completed their 54th year in Bailey County. E.L. Smith and N.C. Moore, directors of the District had submitted a petition requesting that a District be formed and approved by the State of Texas. On March 20th, 1941, the Secretary of State of the State of Texas certified the formation of Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District Number 111 in Bailey County. As a legal Subdivision of State government they requested technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service which is now called the Natural Resources Conservation Service. The NRCS provides all technical assistance on soil and water erosion problems to the district. Today there are over 200 districts state wide all working toward the same goal of wise use of all natural resources. Assistance is voluntary and private property rights are strictly adhered to.

The district is divided into 5 zones with each zone having a district director. Each director must own land within the zone served and serves a four year term.

The district meets monthly at the NRCS office in Muleshoe. Meeting time is 8 AM the second Monday of each month.

Present directors are Ernest Ramm, Nick Bamert, Sharon Dale, Bennie Claunch and Johnny Furgeson. The district provides services to all individuals without regard to race, color, creed, sex or National origin.

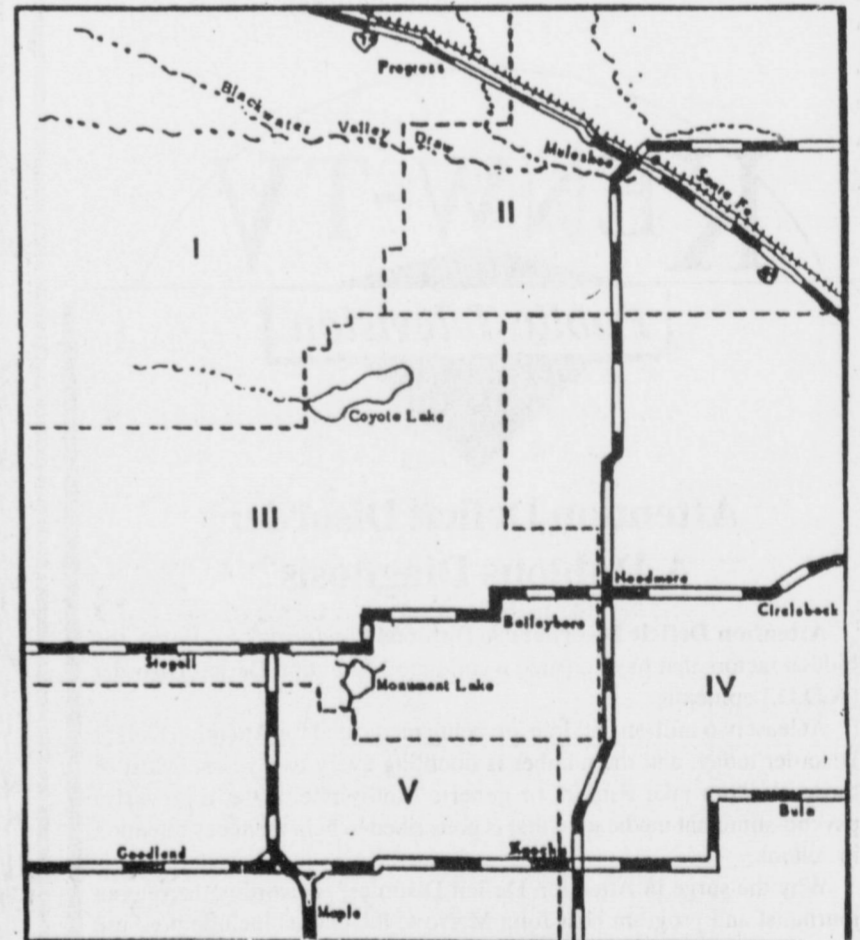

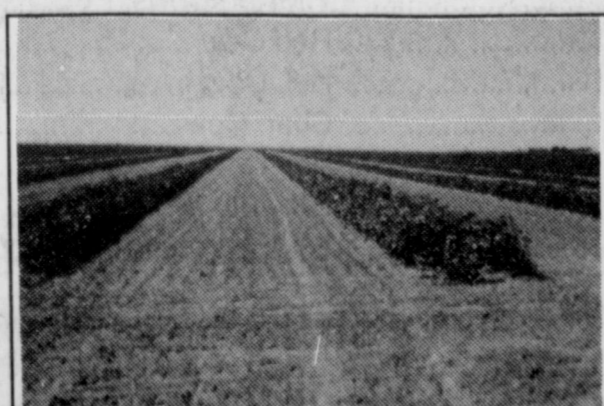

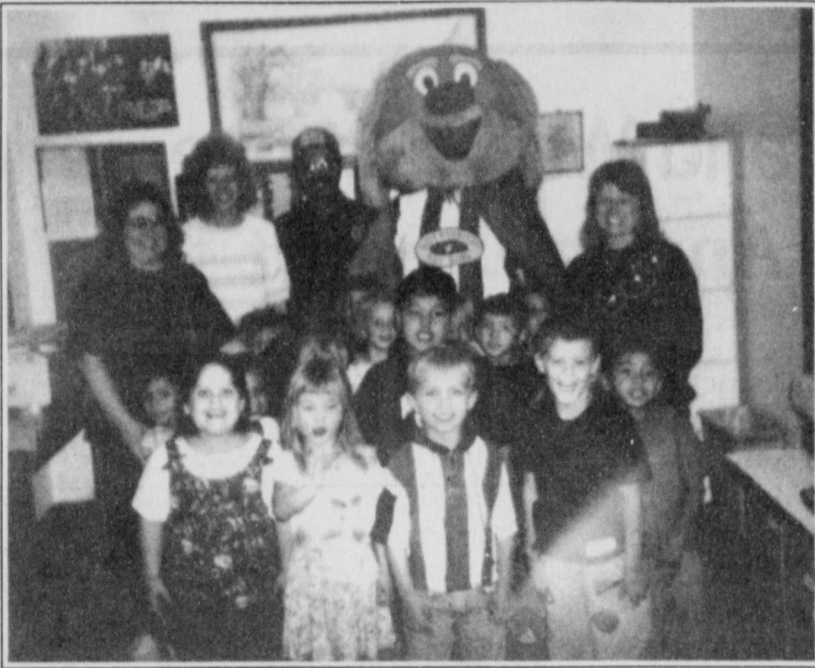


# Students learn new numbers

**Attention Deficit Disorder: A Dubious Diagnosis?**

**Attention Deficit Disorder: A Dubious Diagnosis?** examines the hidden factors that have created a childhood Attention Deficit Disorder (A.D.D.) epidemic.

At least two million children are being medicated for Attention Deficit Disorder today, and the number is doubling every two years. Most of these children take Ritalin, or generic Methylphenidate, a powerful psycho-stimulant medication that is prescribed to help them pay attention in school.

Why the surge in Attention Deficit Disorder? According to veteran journalist and program host John Merrow, the causes include pressure on parents and schools, misinformation about the disorder, and advocacy by the nation's largest A.D.D. support group, CHADD (Children and Adults With Attention Deficit Disorder).

CHADD describes itself as a parent-based organization, but, as Merrow reports, it has received nearly one million dollars in the last six years from Ritalin's maker, Ciba-Geigy. CHADD has used that money to publicize A.D.D. and to recommend medication — including Ritalin — as a treatment.

Many parents interviewed for the program use CHADD as a source of information, but none of them knew of the financial connection between CHADD and Ciba-Geigy. Most parents did not know that Ritalin's pharmacology is similar to that of cocaine; nor did they know that the United States currently consumes 85 percent of the world's supply of the drug — most of it used by children.
