MHS Thespians prove authentic

After a tragic, final, motionless scene resembling an ancient oil painting, "Blood Wedding" ends with a chilling curtain call in the fog-with the actors still in character.

Left in suspension of disbelief, the audience wonders whether to applaud the unsmiling actors or to remain silent out of respect for the fate of the unfortunate characters.

Performed by Muleshoe High School's theatre department on Oct. 30 and 31, "Blood Wedding" will have its final performance tonight (Thursday) at 7 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

Director Kerry Moore says the play about bad blood and feuding families in Spain is based on a true incident that its author, Federico Garcia Lorca, read in a Spanish newspaper in the early 1900s-about 30 years before he wrote the drama.

An underlying theme of the work is the difference between the traditional roles of men and women.

The mother of the groom, played by Chanda Weatherbie, explains to her son that he must be tough and in control with his new wife—so she will know who is boss.

But she wishes her son were a woman so he wouldn't have

to go to the vineyards with his knife—a tool which can at any moment become a weapon. (If he were a woman, he could embroider, make lace, and be at peace, she tells him.)

She wishes men had never invented the knives which killed her husband and oldest

Another theme is bad blood. The bride is described as a "haughty" daughter with a beautiful mother who "didn't love her husband." The implication is that the daughter will follow in her mother's footsteps.

The Felix family represents for the groom's mother the ultimate threat—the Felixes have killed her loved ones and now "one of those Felix brothers" is about to come between her son and his bride-to-be.

Family finances also play a role in the drama, with the Felix family struggling for success and the bride and groom's families comparing their considerable wealth. (Tyson Moncrief portrays the father of the bride as a man of breeding and good taste.)

Music sets the mood, from eerie foreboding, to wedding frivolity, to the dread of approaching death.

Byers paces Mules at 2-3A meet

LUBBOCK - With a squad that was whittled down from 13 to just five, Muleshoe finished third at the District 2-3A boys cross country meet here Saturday at Mae Simmons Park.

Friona edged Shallowater for the team title, 33-35. Muleshoe finished with 58 points.

Because of injuries, ineligibility problems and several students quitting the team, what started out as a promising season ended up in a survival scenario.

"I had real high expectations before we lost the kids," Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey said. "But I'm just really pleased with the kids that stuck it out."

Senior Riley Byers led the way for the Mules with an eighth-place finish, touring the 3,000-meter course in 19 minutes and 51 seconds.

"He's worked hard all year long and been a real good leader," Gruhlkey said, disappointed that Byers didn't qualify for the Region I meet next week.

Lady Mules get another shot at Dimmitt next week

LUBBOCK — The ex- gion I meet here Nov. 4. pected showdown with Dimmitt never materialized.

Mules managed to survive an off day and advance to Regionals by finishing a distant second here Saturday at the District 2-3A cross country meet at Mae Simmons Park.

With Shawna Kenworthy running away with the individual title and two other top 10 finishes, Dimmitt coasted to the team title with 32 points.

Led by a seventh-place finish by Priscilla Aguirre, Muleshoe (52 points) held off Shallowater (61 points) for sec-

Muleshoe coach Jacinda Langen said it was far from a good outing, with several of her top runners finishing more than 30 seconds off their normal times.

"I don't feel we ran our in how her team ran. best," Langen said. "I feel we've got a lot better performance in us."

Besides Dimmitt, the Lady Mules will be tested by Clint, Instead, the Muleshoe Lady Lubbock Cooper, Sanford-Fritch and Brownfield.

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

back to a former time in Spain, while a wedding gift wrapped in typical modern fashion seems out of its time period.

The scenery is minimal, allowing the audience to focus on the various characters.

Kermit Price aptly plays a naive bridegroom who is almost unaware of the drama unfolding around him.

The bride, played by Holly Hutton, keeps the audience off guard with ambiguity, as she waivers between two possible courses of action.

Inhisrole as Leonardo Felix, Carlos Rojas expresses emotions from confusion, anger, desire and brief joy to apprehension and fear.

Cameo roles by Kenzi

Brown as Leonardo's wife and Melissa Mata as his mother-inlaw provide insight into the place of women in Spanish family culture of the period.

Mark McGuire, as the bride's steward, adds comic relief; and Scotty Mills—often cast in comic roles—turns in a sinister performance as the Beggar (Death).

The moon with a metallic silver face, played by Adrian King draped entirely in silver, adds a poetic, dancelike quality to the performance.

"Blood Wedding" seems shorter than it really is (an hour and ten minutes). The drama moves quickly toward an expected, almost unavoidable conclusion.

Dimmitt, which beat Floydada 21-11 in its disrict opener, has played a tough non-conference schedule with games against Slaton, River Road and

Springlake-Earth.

The Muleshoe coaching staff hopes quarterback Daniel Garbarino and its new offense continue the maturation process that led to season highs in points and total offense (428 yards) against Floydada.

Garbarino rushed for 170 yards and two touchdowns and completed 5-of-14 passes for 99 yards and two more touchdowns. Tailback Jake Adair

added balance with 121 yards rushing and scored two touchdowns (31-yard reception, 9-yard run).

"That was the first time since we put in the new offense (three games) that we had the whole package in," Adair said. "The offensive line was really dominant."

Muleshoe didn't play that bad on defense against Floydada, but was burned by two big plays, a 67-yard run by McCann and a 72-yard halfback option pass that gave Floydada a 28-27 lead with 3:32 left in the game.

"Subtract two or three plays from the formula, and we win handily," Adair said. "But we had a couple of real poor plays defensively. Offensively we had one or two—and summarily, it cost us big."

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

When Daniel Garbarino scored on a 35-yard quarterback draw in the third quarter of Muleshoe's 35-34 loss at Floydada last week it was perfect.


Actually, it's a version of the Washington Redskins' infamous counter-trey, now in every playbook in some form.

Index forecasts moderate growth

AUSTIN — "The latest Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators reflects a continued strong faith in the state's prosperity from Texas consumers and business investors," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

"The August Index is 124.7. That is a 2.1 percent increase compared to the same period last year, but only a fractional gain compared to the previous month. Six of the ten indicators we track show economic growth, while the remaining four indicators show a slight slowdown in the Texas economy. On the whole, the Index forecasts moderate economic growth," Sharp said.

Consumer confidence is one of the major factors driving the Texas economy, as it has for many months. The consumer confidence index is 25.2 percent higher than one year ago, and 5.2 percent higher than the previous month. Low inflation, plentiful job opportunities and faith in the moderate growth of the national economy are feeding consumer optimism.

As a result, retail sales are up 7.6 percent compared to one year ago. The strongest sales are in cars and housing goods, while clothing sales are soft.
