Mules 'christen' new field with win over Portales Rams

The Mules opened their "New and Improved" Benny Douglas Stadium to their fans Friday night. The guest list also included the Portales Rams.

It only took the Mules 33 seconds to get down to business on their new Astro Turf field. Cooper Washington connected with Issac Baca with a screen pass and he utilized his blockers to sort his way through the Ram defense. The first scoring strike of the night covered 52 yards.

"Our game plan was to play error free ball tonight," said Mule coach David Wood after the game.

A fumble in the first half was the only missed step the Mules had in the first half and it came after a 41-yard gain on third down. The Mules led the Rams 42-0 at the half and cruised to a 49-8 win.

The Mules scored four times in the first quarter. Eric Orozco caught the second TD pass from Washington from 21-yards out with 8:24 left. Juan Sanchez was on the receiving end of Beau Avila's first touchdown pass of the

season with 5:15 on the clock. The play went for 16 yards.

Washington hooked up with Ryan DeLeon from 26-yards out with just 21 seconds on the clock. Saul Elizalde and his golden toe was five-for-five on point-aftertries.

Sanchez opened the second period with a TD romp of 24 yards 30

seconds into the second period. It was the only rushing touchdown of the night. Washington and Orozco hooked up for the longest scoring strike of the night for the Mules. A 55-yard pass and run put the Mules ahead 42-0 with 23 seconds left in the first half.

The Mules added one

Muleshoe resident charged in shooting

Suspect turns himself in to police

A Muleshoe man has been released on a \$2,500 bond for aggravated assault after allegedly shooting his son-in-law over the weekend.

Saturday, Sept. 4, Daniel Cardon of Dumas was transported by helicopter to UMC Hospital of Lubbock after being shot in the chest with a .38-caliber revolver.

He was released the following day, Sunday, Sept. 5.

According to information received from Bailey County Sheriff Richard Wills, Valdo Perez, a long-time employee of Irrigation

Pump and Power, Inc. of Muleshoe, allegedly shot his son-in-law, Daniel Cordon, at about 9:30 a.m., outside the Perez residence, near O&C Sprinkler, just off Hwy. 84.

Sheriff Wills said the shooting was apparently related to another incident involving Cardon, that happened about 4 a.m. that morning, also at the Perez residence.

At the time of the earlier incident, Cardon was reported to be intoxicated and belligerent.

While Cardon left the residence after the earlier incident, he apparently returned, at which time the shooting occurred.

According to the sheriff, the shooting

victim had left the Perez residence after the shooting, and was contacted a few minutes later in the parking lot of a business at the west end of Muleshoe, on Hwy. 84, by Bailey County Chief Deputy John Espinoza.

The victim was transported from that location to Muleshoe Area Medical Center, and then to UMC.

As for the alleged assailant, Perez, he contacted his employer, Eric McElroy, who drove him to the residence of Muleshoe Police Chief Brian Frieda, where Perez turned himself in.

McElroy also turned over the firearm he had received from Perez to the police chief.

MEDC discusses renovations, new PowerPoint presentation

The Muleshoe Economic Development Corporation approved the installation of heat and air conditioning in a residence at 1816 W. Avenue C, in Muleshoe, during its regular meeting Thursday, Sept. 2.

The residence, which the MEDC received in lieu of a \$75,000 payment from an area business experiencing financial difficulties, will be offered for sale after the work is completed.

The MEDC had received quotes from area heating and air conditioning companies

The MEDC board also critiqued a PowerPoint™ presentation that Janet Claborn, MEDC director, had prepared and would be using as the discussed the efforts and achievements of the MEDC at the various conventions she attends.

In other business, the MEDC board:

- Discussed various grants it had previously awarded, such as the grant issued to the Muleshoe Area Hospital District to be used in its medical clinic expansion.

Although the MAHD project has been put on hold, the MEDC board felt it was a project they needed to continue supporting.

"Let's stay with them," MEDC board president Max King said, "we know they're struggling."

However, a second — previously awarded grant that had been awarded to Bailey County to help fund the construction

Continued from page 1 of a road to the Fulmer calving operation, that went into bankruptcy prior to reaching production status, was removed.

It was pointed out that the grant was non-transferable, and that even if another business entity purchased and brought the operation into production, the original grant requirements had not been met.

Noted that a special meeting would be needed — and has since been set for Wednesday, Sept. 8,

at noon — regarding the cancellation of economic development revenue bonds initially issued for Hemink Farms, LTD.

The issuance of such revenue bonds required the adoption by a government entity, such as the MEDC, and were issued at no obligation by the local development corporation. When Hemink Farms went into default, it became necessary for the MEDC to take action regarding the bonds.

Obituaries and Death notices

Death notices will be published free of charge in the Muleshoe Journal. There is a fee of \$30 for the publication of "basic obituaries." "Non-basic obituaries" will be published at the rate of \$4.50 per column inch. In all cases, the obituary information should be submitted by the funeral home for verification purposes.

The guidelines that will be used to determine if, and how much the publication will cost is as follows:

Death Notices...

Death notices may include the deceased's name, city of residence, age, date and place of birth, date and place of death. If the notice is to be published prior to any services, the time, date and location of services, and location of burial may be included. If publication will be after said services, the time will not be included. An example is as follows:

Basic obituary...

Basic obituaries printed in the Muleshoe Journal are printed at the basic rate of \$30, and may contain the following information: date and details of funeral and place of burial; date and place of birth and parents names; date of marriage; limited biographical information, including the highest level of schooling achieved, service in the Armed Forces, profession (and retirement information if applicable); names of parents, spouses or children who have preceded the person in death; names of survivors, including the spouse, parents, brothers, sisters and children. Only the number of grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren will be included; and where memorials may be directed. We will run a one column black and white photo at no charge.

Non-basic obituary...

A larger photo, or content that varies from that listed for a basic obituary — such as the names of grandchildren, or additional relatives or relationships — will require the obituary to be published at a rate of \$4.50 per column inch.

Upon successful completion of the course, participants will receive an OSHA 10-Hour Construction Outreach Department of Labor course completion card.

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BCEC holds 71st annual cooperative meeting

Members of the Bailey County Electric Cooperative meet for their 71st annual meeting Tuesday, Sept. 7, receiving an "arcing demonstration" from some of its employees, along with reports of both the past year and the coop's future.

After talking about the changes in light bulb manufacturing, the eventual phasing out of incandescent lights, and the advantages of fluorescent bulbs, employee Kim Black demonstrated the dangers of arcing electricity.

As for the meeting itself, General Manager David Marricle talked

about the past year. "Overall we've had a busy and successful year, he said.

According to the figures presented during the meeting, BCEC's total operating income for the period ending Dec. 31, 2009, was \$29,255,559, of which \$25,515,351 was from electric service

sold. The coop's electric power cost \$17,851,168 and its operating and maintenance expenses totaled \$3,733,193, with along with depreciation taxes and loan interest brought the total expenses to \$24,034,775. Liabilities for the coop totaled \$51,576,944

during 2009, matching the figures for its total assets.

Marricle spoke of the new substation at Progress, as well as the new office building under construction on the west end of Muleshoe, on Hwy. 84 (North American Blvd.)

The decision to build a new building rather than renovating the current office building was tough, he said, but after learning the construction time would be significantly less, while the construction costs would be significantly more for the coop's 60-year-old current structure.

"The decision was made because of need rather than want," Marricle said.

Mark Schwirtz of Golden Spread Electric Coop, of which BCEC is one of 16 members in West Texas and the Oklahoma panhandle, addressed the members, noting that Golden Spread was just a couple of weeks

away from closing on the construction of a wind energy farm.

Schwirtz also noted that 30 percent of its energy load was from irrigation, and talked about GSEC's generation plant at Denver City.

During the annual coop elections, Dist. 4 incumbent Jerry Nichols faced off against John Hall; Dist. 5 incumbent Bob Foley faced Eugene Wittner; and Dist. 7 incumbent Larry Clawson faced Leland Lynch.

After the votes were counted, it was announced that all three incumbents were reelected to their board seats.

Writer says: Nice Pharisees can be the most dangerous of all

We need to ponder long and often the particularly fascinating truth that our Lord Jesus was the sinless "friend of sinners."

"Sinners in denial," Pharisees past and present, are seriously bothered by that. "Confessed sinners," past and present, who know they fall terribly short, love him deeply for it.

Only two types of people exist: confessed sinners and sinners in denial. The former know they need mercy and thus react to others with mercy; the latter, the opposite.

Not all Pharisees mean to be bad people. That does not change the fact that even the nicest ones are a constant danger to themselves and others. Far too nice to ever put it this way, they are beset by

two foundational beliefs: 1) I fall short in lots of ways, but the ways I fall short are better than the ways you fall short; 2) If you would just try a little harder, you could be almost as successful as I am in meeting God's standards.

Looking around, they see in our world an appalling lack of regard for God's (and their own) standards. What makes their view so tempting is the fact that our society does indeed exhibit a flagrant disregard for God's standards. What

they have a harder time seeing is that so do we all, some in ways not as obvious as others. The best of us needs God's grace as badly as the worst.

It's one thing to be one of those moral chameleons this world has in plenty who don't see anything as right or wrong and can rationalize any attitude or action. It's another—at least as bad and hurtful—to be so unable to sympathize with human weakness that we paint the whole world as black and white with little gray at all, and, by the way, almost no warmth or color. Law is always cold as stone; only hearts hold real warmth.

Into our world comes the only perfect person who ever lived, and how

does he deal with terribly fallen humanity?

At a well in Samaria he holds out hope for a gal who is a five-time marital "loser" and "shacked up" with a guy at the time.

He saves a woman "caught in adultery" lying in the dust at the feet of Pharisees.

He brings new life to a sawed-off lying cheat of a tax collector named Zacchaeus.

How would nice "righteous" folks deal with such people today? Not like Jesus did. Penance or probation would likely be involved.

Head-shaking would abound. We'd call a meeting and opine, "As much as we'd like to show mercy, and as much as we believe in grace, if we're too loose, too lenient, we'll

be sending a message we just can't afford to send." What makes such unfailingly black and white folks so dangerous is that, not having suffered enough, failed enough, themselves, they honestly don't see how they can follow any other course. Such brittle "grace" is no grace at all.

With good intentions, they forget how precious a price was paid for sin,

that they didn't pay it, and that they're as spiritually needy as the neediest person they ever met. And "they" is, all too often, "we." And me.

Christ's suffering paid the price for sin. Until we've been broken enough to see our own deep need, we'll neither fully accept his sacrifice for ourselves or be willing to share the gift of the sinless "friend of sinners" with others.

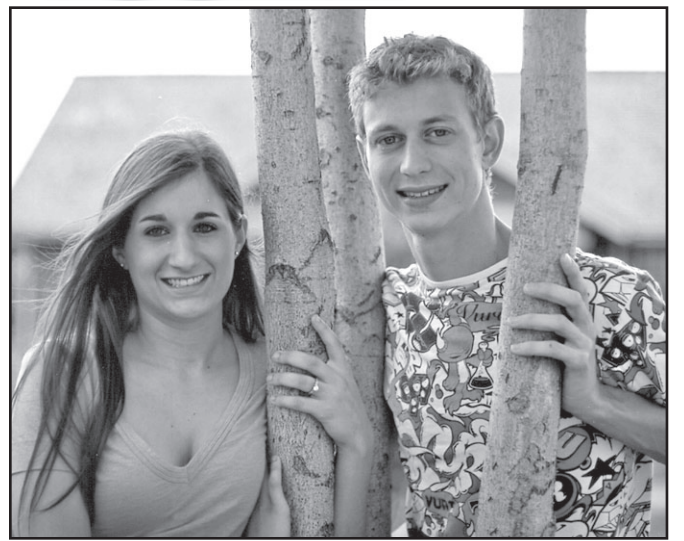

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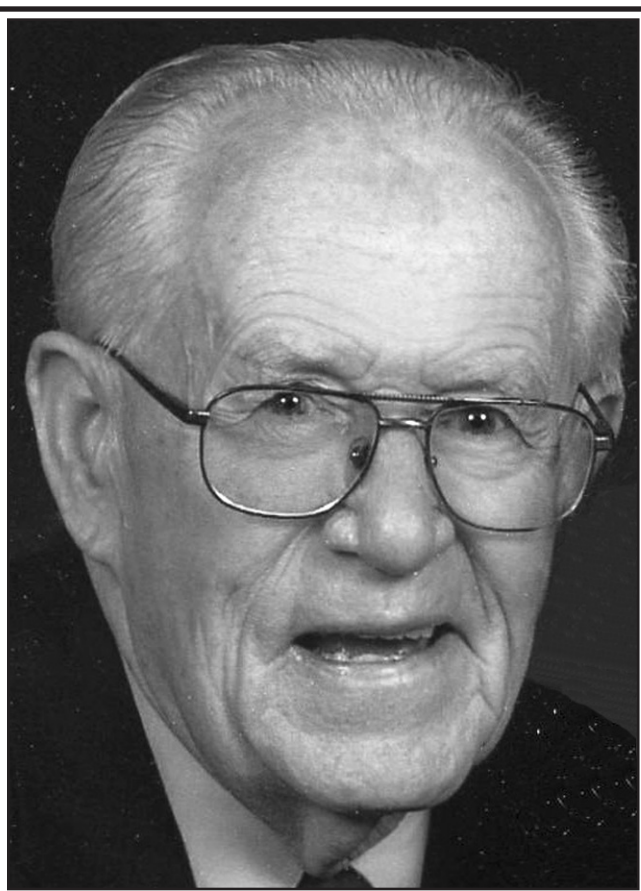

in another county. And the councilman, with others, was interested in getting the charges reduced to a lesser offense.

So when he got seated he said, "Roger, I would like to speak to you about that case."

At that point Roger slapped his fist on the table and said, "If you guys don't hush about that I'm going to call it in as the first case on the next docket."

As a matter of fact the man himself had asked that of me the night they called me down after midnight, to set bond so he could go home. He was sober then. But I don't think they bothered Roger any more.

In those years — and I

suppose it still happens — a person filed on for DWI or a similar offense would ask the judge to reduce it to a lower offense.

I mean they could make such a request and a number of times they did make it. Most times they were trying to protect their drivers license or avoid any jail time.

But for a judge to grant such a request is, in my opinion, out of order. And, once started it will adversely affect their law enforcement in general. For if such a request is granted in one case, why not in all cases?

As I heard of one party ask, "Why not treat all dogs alike?"

But more important

than that, the prosecuting attorney and the arresting officer file the case so they have the facts at hand.

But the judge does not have the facts at hand, and generally speaking, does not have access to them — nor should he have access to them — for his function (or hers) is to see that the case is conducted with grace and dignity, and that all parties receive a fair hearing.

So now, if I may so speak; despite all the requests and pressures put on me during my years of service I never granted one. I never gave serious thought to granting one. And I cautioned others to not grant one either.
