Speed limit up in area

Two lanes remain at 55 m.p.h.

Last week, President Clinton signed the national highway system bill, repealing the federally-mandated 55mph speed limit.

The 70 mph speed limit, which applies to interstate and divided highways, went into effect in Texas at 12:01 a.m. Friday, Dec. 8.

The first 70 mph signs outside Muleshoe on Texas Highway 84 have been posted just past the city limit signs near Barrett Produce on 84 East and Robert Ruiz, Inc. on 84 West.

"As long as people drive responsibly, Highway 84 is not a problem at 70 mph," said Texas State Trooper Bill Horton. "The highway is nice and wide, well-constructed and

smooth."

The 70 mph speed limit applies only to passenger cars in the daytime—the night speed for trucks will be 65 in the daytime and 60 at night, Horton

Muleshoe Assistant Police Chief Jay Livingston sees no problem with the 70 mph speed limit. "People have been driving 70 anyway," he said.

But the Department of Public Safety is not expected to grant any leniency to driv-

ers exceeding the posted limit. Plans are, in fact, to strictly

"If the sign says 70, the limit for cars is 65. The speed limit is not 71," said Lacie Kirk, DPS Trooper IV. "Drive what the sign says, if you can find the sign.

> "Motorists should obey the posted signs because we won't know until next year whether some of these roads can be driven safely at 70 mph," explained Carl Utley, district engineer for the Texas Department of Transportation.

About 6,500 miles of rural interstate and divided highways will go to 70 mph based on state law.

The law allows the Texas Transportation Commission to set speeds less than 70 mph if the limit can be justified by engineering and traffic stud-

The commission has identified about 350 miles of rural interstate and divided highways where the speed limit will be less than 70 mph.

As motorists driving 70 mph approach Muleshoe from the east on 84, they are warned of a speed reduction. Just before the city limits, signs slow them from 55 to 35, before the junction of US 70 and Texas 214.

Approaching from 84 West, motorists also are warned of a speed reduction, and they are slowed from 65 to 35, with two school crossings reducing speed to 20 and 25 when

Accidents compared to speed limit

AUSTIN — A look at the Texas speed limit since the 1960s and total traffic accidents:

1964

The Texas speed limit increased from 60 mph during the day and 55 at night to 70 mph during the day and 65 at night

Crash related deaths increased from 2,729 in 1963 to 3,006 that year.

1974

The national speed limit took effect, lowering the legal limit in Texas from 70 mph during the day and 65 at night to 55 mph.

Traffic deaths fell from 3,692 in 1973 to 3,046 in 1974.

1987

In May, the national speed limit rose from 55 mph to 65 mph.

Crash fatalities increased from 3,261 in 1987 to 3,395 in 1988.

1995

On Friday, the national speed limit was eliminated, putting Texas' former 70 mph speed limit back into effect.

State transportation officials acted to allow the 70 mph speed limit to take effect on some parts on interstate highways and four-lane and larger divided roads.

A Science Spectrum van from Lubbock brought a portable planetarium-called Star Lab-that was big enough for an adult to stand inside. The large silver bubble measured 22 square ft. by 11 ft. high.

Second grade teacher Toby King's students were surprised that such a big bubble could come out of the tiny case it was taken out of before it was inflated.

Kids crawled into the bubble on their hands and knees and sat around the inside edge of it, pretending to be astronauts in a space shuttle, listening to something much more interesting than an ordinary old lecture—something more like a planetarium presentation,

State drug testing policy affects County employees

County employees who drive road repair vehicles requiring a commercial drivers license will be required by law to undergo random testing for drugs and alcohol after the first of the year.

The policy, a result of new Department of Transportation Drug and Alcohol testing regulations effective Jan. 1, will affect 10 employees and three commissioners who are qualified to drive County trucks.

Bailey County Commissioners discussed Monday the details of the policy they plan to write soon and adopt at their Dec. 21 meeting.

During departmental reports, Jackey Wayne Burris reported 43 ambulance calls in November, with \$12,953.55 billed and \$7,695.83 collected.

Of the 43 calls, there were 24 emergencies, 4 no transports, and 15 transfers. The average cost per call was \$301.24.


The Lady Mules fretted away five-point lead in the last 35 seconds, with Mandi Culwell's 3-pointer from the top of the key sending the game into overtime.

Garbarino selected for postseason honors

Daniel Garbarino, who has caught the eye of several Division I football programs, also gained the attention of voters of two postseason all-star teams.

The Muleshoe High School senior recently was selected as a defensive back on both the Lubbock Avalanche Journal's Class 3 A All-South Plains team and the All-District 2-3A team.

The 6-foot-3-inch, 170pound Garbarino was second on the team with 82 tackles, including a team-high 44 solo tackles. He also led the Mules (0-10) with three interceptions and recovered a fumble.

Teams often used a spread formation to get Garbarino out of the middle of the field to limit his effectiveness.

Garbarino, expected to be one of the top receivers in the South Plains, was switched to quarterback four games into the season when academic eligibility problems sidelined the starting quarterback.


Littlefield's Michael Benton was named the All-South Plains Player of the Year and Colorado's Bill Grissom the Coach of the Year.

Benton, a 5-8, 175-pound senior, rushed for 1,467 yards and scored 32 touchdowns for the District 2-3A champion Wildcats.

Grissom led Colorado to a 7-3 record and a share of the 8-3A title in his first year. Colorado was 1-19 the two years before he arrived.

Two Mules were named to the All-District 2-3A second team.

Senior Jake Adair was selected as both a running back and a punter and senior Chad Johnson was selected as an of-

fensive lineman.

Adair rushed for 856 yards and scored four touchdowns and averaged 41.8 yards on 15 punts after taking over halfway through the season.

Johnson, one of four returning starters on the line, helped the Mules average 190.5 yards rushing per game.

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Lazbuddie falls short in Farwell title game

FARWELL - Already emotionally rubber-legged from two big wins, Lazbuddie didn't have much left Saturday for the championship game of Farwell Tournament.

Trailing by 12 points midway through the third quarter. Lazbuddie took its only lead of the game, 60-59, on Heath Brown's jumper with 1:45 remaining.

But Farwell (5-5) regained the lead when Nic Ketcherside scored inside, and held on for the 63-60 win.

Lazbuddie turned the ball over without getting a shot three times in the last 1:38. Chris Smith's 3-pointer to tie with three seconds left was off.

The Longhorns (5-2) fell behind 12-4 in the first four minutes of the game and spent the rest of the time catching up.

"Obviously, the first quarter killed us," Lazbuddie coach Gary Grahn. "And we turned the ball over so much, even when we had a chance to win the game."

Lazbuddie, which beat Texico and upset Class 3A Friona to reach the finals, was playing its fourth game without senior point guard Josh Warren.

"It was a monster win," Grahn said about the Class 1A Longhorns beating Friona, 65-59 in the semifinals. "It was unbelievable. I was so concerned about playing without

"It might have been too big a win because we came out flat (Saturday)," Grahn added.

Lazbuddie beat Farwell, 67-56, 11 days earlier.

Junior Justin St. Clair carried the Longhorns most of the night along with help from 6-6 freshman post Jason Thomas. St. Clair slashed his way along the baseline for 26 points and Thomas added 18 inside.

Chase Hardage and Josh Littlejohn led Farwell with 15 points each.

Thomas scored 22 against Friona, with Smith and St. Clair adding 14 and 11 points respectively.

Quint Ellis led Friona with 21 points.



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Livestock quarantine lifted in NM

Ranchers may have happier holidays, since New Mexico animal health authorities have released their state's last quarantine for vesicular stomatitis (VS).

A viral infection, VS causes affected livestock, particularly horses, to develop blisters in and around the mouth, nose and teats, and above the hooves.

Dr. Terry Beals, head of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), announced that a veterinarian's "VS" statement is no longer required on health papers for livestock coming form New Mexico. The statement had been required since early summer on certificates of veterinary inspection to indicate that animals were not showing symptoms.

Dr. Beals said dropping the requirement will make it easier for West Texas ranchers and livestock market operators to conduct trade with New Mexico producers

This summer, Texas and Arizona each had a confirmed case: in Texas, a rodeo horse from McCaulley, near Abilene, contracted the disease after being hauled to events in New Mexico and Colorado. The quarantine was released in late August.

In October, a horse in Henderson County was quarantined, but released after laboratory results could not be re-

produced. This year's VS cases are the first since a major outbreak in

1982-83. Infection was detected initially in New Mexico in mid-

Soon after, individual cases were confirmed in Arizona and

Texas and by late summer, infection spread to Colorado, Utah, and Wyoming. As of December 4, Colorado has 18 cases, Utah has three, and Wyoming has two.

State official issues citrus aphid warning

Rick Perry today advised Texans who travel to Florida to avoid bringing back citrus plants, budsticks or any part of a citrus plant taken from residential areas following the Nov. 3 detection of a very serious citrus pest — the brown citrus aphid — in Fort Lauderdale.

"Along with damaging citrus trees by causing young leaves and die prematurely, the brown citrus aphid also is very effective at transmitting the citrus tristeza virus," Perry said.

The citrus tristeza virus comes in mild forms and severe forms. However, the se-

Agriculture Commissioner vere form of the virus has not been detected in Texas.

In addition to the brown citrus aphid, the Asian strain of citrus canker also has been detected this year in Florida.

Citrus canker, an extremely virulent bacterial disease, was detected in a Miami residential area in Sept.

Brown citrus aphids were found initially in Fort Lauderdale during a routine inspection of fruit fly traps by a U.S. Department of Agriculture inspector. More brown citrus aphid populations have been found in several additional locations in the Fort Lauderdale and Miami areas.

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

flashing.

Horton doesn't expect the speed limits within Muleshoe to change with the new state limits on speed.

Motorists are now slowed to 30 mph as they pass through Muleshoe from the north or south.

New signs have not yet been posted on US 70 and Texas 214. "They will probably finish putting signs up on 84 first," Horton said.

The first phase of new speed limits—interstate and divided highways—covers about 10 percent of the total state highway system but carries more than 60 percent of the state's traffic, according to a Texas Department of Transportation spokesman.

The Texas Department of Transportation started posting signs at 8 a.m. Friday from the Swisher County line to the Lubbock city limits.

As many as 3,000 signs will be changed along the interstate and divided highways. The cost for sign changes on the 77,000mile highway system is expected to run into millions of dollars.
