

Services Conducted For Mrs. Northcutt

Funeral services for Mrs. Artie Irene Northcutt were conducted Saturday afternoon in the First Methodist Church in Silverton of which she was a member. The pastor, Rev. Carl Nunn, officiated.

Mrs. Northcutt died at 12:30 p.m. Thursday in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo after an illness of several months and a three-week hospitalization.

She was the wife of a prominent Silverton rancher and bank director, D. T. (Chick) Northcutt. They were married on June 30, 1924.

Born in Briscoe County on October 6, 1905, Mrs. Northcutt was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank B. Lowrey. She finished high school at Wayland College in Plainview and attended West Texas State College. She taught at the Milo school one year. With the exception of a few months in Armstrong County, Mrs. Northcutt had lived in Briscoe County all her life.

She was a long-time member of the March of Time Study Club, having served as president in 1945-46. She was appointed chairman of the Diamond Jubilee Committee of the Caprock District T.F.W.C. last year, but was forced to vacate the appointment earlier this year due to failing health.

Pallbearers were Jack Strange, Sammie Smith, Wayne McMurtry, Carl D. Bomar, Jim Smith, jr., and Don Burson. Interment was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of Silverton Funeral Home.

The State Committee that formulates policy for the Great Plains Conservation Program held part of its annual meeting in the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District on Friday, June 25.


