

Vandiver holds off challenge

With a turnout of 684, approximately 19 percent of Bailey County voters, Bob Dole won the Bailey County Republican party's nomination for President with 111 votes out of 192 who voted in Tuesday's primary.

Bailey County Democrats gave Bill Clinton 260 of 492 votes. Ninety-four votes went to the other presidential nominees, with 138 Bailey

County Democrats abstaining. County Republican party chairman Bruce Barrett said Tuesday night that many County Republicans told him they voted at Democratic party voting boxes because they wanted to participate in the vote for County commissioner.

In the only contested primary race at the County level, incumbent Democrat Commissioner Precinct 1 Floyd J. "Butch" Vandiver defeated challenger Jack Dunham 139

to 113, with the early voting tally 23 to 6 in favor of Vandiver, who is serving his first term as Commissioner.

Unopposed incumbent Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks received a sound 415 votes, County Tax-Assessor Collector Kathleen Hayes received 401 votes, and State Rep. District 85 James E. "Pete" Laney received 355 votes of the 492 Democrats who voted.

Incumbent County Repub-

lican Party Chairman Bruce Barrett received 23 write-in votes, winning his party's nomination.

In the presidential primary election, nominee Pat Buchanan received 27 County Republican votes, Steve Forbes 22, Lamar Alexander 3, Alan Keys and uncommitted 2 each; and Phil Gramm, who dropped out of the race, still got 1 vote.

County Democrats gave Lyndon H. Larouche, Jr. 30

Hometown heroes

Teens come to aid of Maple neighbor

MAPLE — Kyle Kindle wasn't thinking about being a hero Jan. 12 when he saw a car had run off the road and hit a tree. He was just "doing what anybody else would have done," Kindle said.

Recognizing the car as that of neighbor Jo Ann Reeves, he sent his friend Delia Ruiz off to his cousin's house and stayed with Jo Ann, treating and comforting her.

"I could feel him shaking the whole time," said Reeves, who is still recovering from extensive injuries to her right arm and leg. "It was really something the way he acted. I knew he was as scared as I was. It was amazing he still remained composed and could still be in charge."

Reeves, a dispatcher and jailer for the Cochran County Sheriff's Department, was on her way to work about 10:30 p.m. when she lost control of her vehicle on FM 596, just outside Maple. She was pinned under the dashboard and bleeding profusely from cuts on her head when Kindle reached her.

Kindle was returning home from a basketball game at nearby Three Way High School.

"I was scared for her," Kindle said. "I just tried to stop the bleeding and held her hand. I don't feel like a hero."

Ruiz returned with Kyle's cousin, Keith Kindle, a little later, and together the cousins talked to Reeves and kept her awake until help came. Local paramedics arrived about 25 minutes later and took her to Morton, where she was flown by helicopter to the University Medical Center in Lubbock.

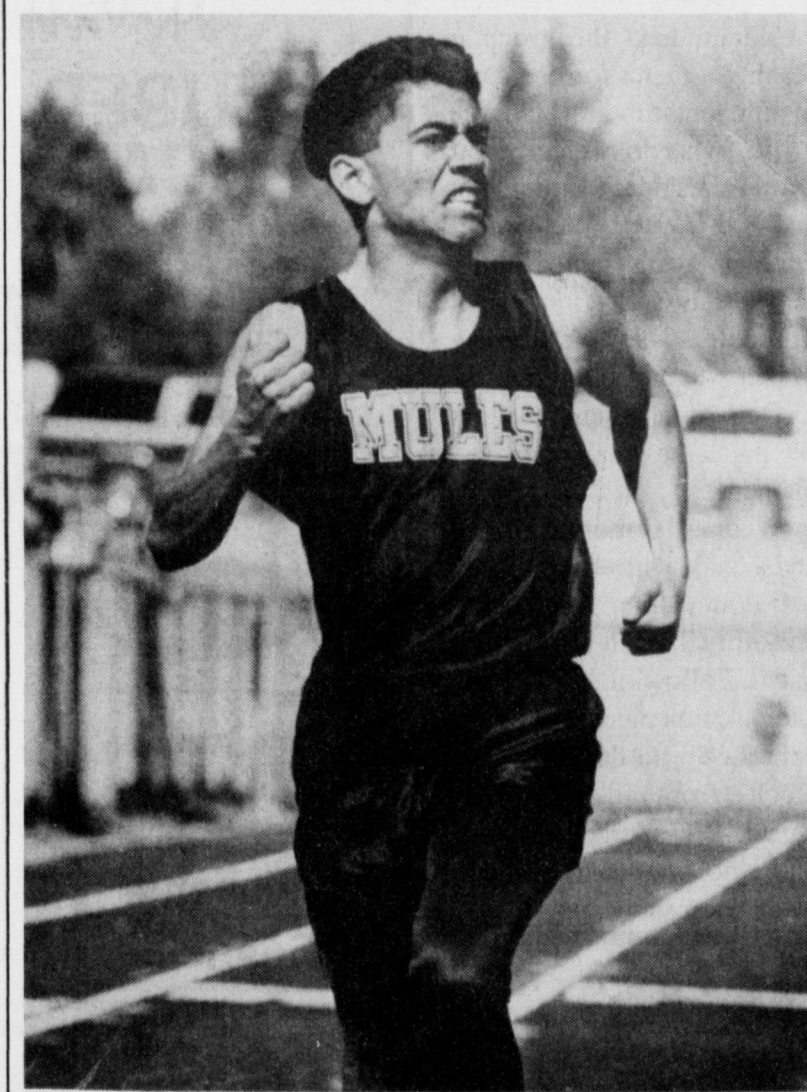
The cousins were honored during an assembly at Three Way School Friday, and were featured on the hometown heroes segment of CBS' *This Morning* in February from Reeves' hospital room.

"I was really in shock when I found out it was someone I had know for so long," said Keith Kindle, who lives just a half mile from the site of the accident. "We were just trying keep her awake and stop the bleeding. It seemed like forever while we waited for someone who could help her to get there. We didn't want her to know how bad it was."

In a side note of the God-acts-in-mysterious-ways category, doctors discovered a cancerous tumor in one of Reeves' kidneys while they were x-raying her for injuries suffered in the accident. The kidney was removed.

Reeves was told by her doctor that by the time most people start showing symptoms for that type of cancer, it's too late.

"I feel twice blessed," Reeves said.

MISD staff changes expected March 25

Despite rumors to the contrary, the Muleshoe Independent School District Monday accepted no resignations, hired no new personnel and made no personnel changes.

MISD Superintendent Bill Moore said Tuesday that March 25 will be the date for acting on contracts, yes, including the coaching staff.

The Board discussed the financial implications of the 1996-97 teacher salary schedule, which must be in line with Senate Bill 1.

The salary of beginning teachers will range from \$18,500 to \$19,950, with the salaries of teachers with 20 of more years of teaching experience ranging from \$32,080 to \$35,510.

Also pulling local policy in line with Sente Bill 1, the district is adding the input of parents, community members and business representatives to its district forum composed of teachers and non-certified personnel.

The Board approved changes to the graduation policy discussed at the last meeting.

In order to graduate from Muleshoe High School, students must meet credit requirements and pass all portions of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS).

Although three-year graduates who meet grade-point average and honor course requirements can be recognized as honor graduates at MHS, three-year graduates will not be considered for valedictorian or salutatorian honors.

To be considered for valedictorian and salutatorian, students must have attended high school four years and must have attended MHS their last two years.

The Board will request a waiver from the Texas Education Agency concerning attendance policy.

Presently, students may miss no more than 10 days for extracurricular activities. The

Man killed in plane crash

Pilot apparently lost when he clipped power lines

A student pilot apparently lost and nearly out of gas, was killed Saturday night when his plane crashed along Highway 84 one mile east of Muleshoe.

Hesham Said, 31, an Egyptian citizen, was killed about 8 p.m. when the single-engine plane he was piloting clipped power lines and slammed into the ground on the shoulder of the west-bound lane of U.S. 84 near Valley Grain. The left wing actually struck on the edge of the highway, according to Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks.

Hicks was told that Said was a student pilot who was on a solo flight, but Hicks did not have

any other personal information on the victim.

Steven Bernstein of Levelland is listed as the owner of the plane.

Said apparently got lost making a return trip from Hobbs, NM, to Levelland, Hicks said. He is believed to have flown under Southwestern Public Service lines, which are less than 100 feet high while flying parallel to the highway. Said also got lost on his initial flight from Levelland to Hobbs, needing help from the control tower to find the airport.

The investigation has been turned over to the National Transportation Safety Board.

The death of a child is one of the most devastating life experiences, regardless of the age of the child. There is no way to prepare parents and surviving children to cope with the tragedy.

But, The Compassionate Friends, an international support group for bereaved parents and siblings, offers friendship and understanding to bereaved parents and surviving siblings. We, of the Compassionate Friends, have learned that the death of our child has caused a pain that can best be understood fully by another bereaved parent.

Knowing that all need love and support, we reach out as our own grief subsides to those who still feel alone and abandoned.

We believe that bereaved parents can help each other toward a positive resolution of their grief. We also understand that each parent must find his or her own way through the grief experience.

Expressing thoughts and feelings is part of the healing process. This recitation was discovered by Reverend Simon Stephens in Coventry England in 1969. He was a hospital chaplain, and was called upon to comfort two bereaved families in the hospital.

He discovered they had far

more to say and share with each other than he could ever say to comfort them.

Consequently, Rev. Stephens began working with families to set up an organization they named, "The Society of Compassionate Friends." In the United States, "The Compassionate Friends" was incorporated in 1978 and a national headquarters was established near Chicago, Ill., where it still resides today. Since then TCF has grown to over 700 chapters organized by bereaved parents who volunteer their time and effort in their communities.

Membership in The Compassionate Friends is open to all parents and siblings who have experienced the death of a child.

A chapter of The Compassionate Friends has been established in Lazbuddie to accommodate the community and all surrounding areas. The organization meets the second Thursday of every month, at 7:30 p.m. at the fellowship hall of the Methodist Church in Lazbuddie.

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Commissioners approve yearly audits

Bailey County Commissioners heard and approved the Bailey County Sheriff's Department audit as well as several departmental and other reports in regular session Monday.

The commissioners approved the Sheriff's audit of felony forfeitures for March 1, 1995, through February 29, 1996. The beginning balance was \$4,082.10, and disbursements for operating expenses were \$1,405.35, with an ending balance of \$2,676.75.

Forfeiture income was derived from a money forfeiture of \$450, sale of a 1983 Buick for \$277.05, and sale of a 1987 Ford pickup for \$3,932.05.

Expenditures for law enforcement included \$299.95 for closed circuit TV for the jail, \$299.95 for a monitor and camera for the jail, two additional cameras valued at \$192.40 each for the jail and \$720.60 for shirts.

Commissioner Benny Claunch reported on a meeting March 7 with District 2 Extension Director Bob Robinson relating to the Family and Consumer Education Services vacancy in the Bailey County Extension Office since the transfer in June of Kandy McWhorter to Dumas.

According to the minutes of the Feb. 12 commissioners' meeting, "to address the vacancy in the Extension office, Judge Marilyn Cox called the Family and Consumer Education Council (FC & E) and Club leaders to assure them that the leadership is working toward filling this position."

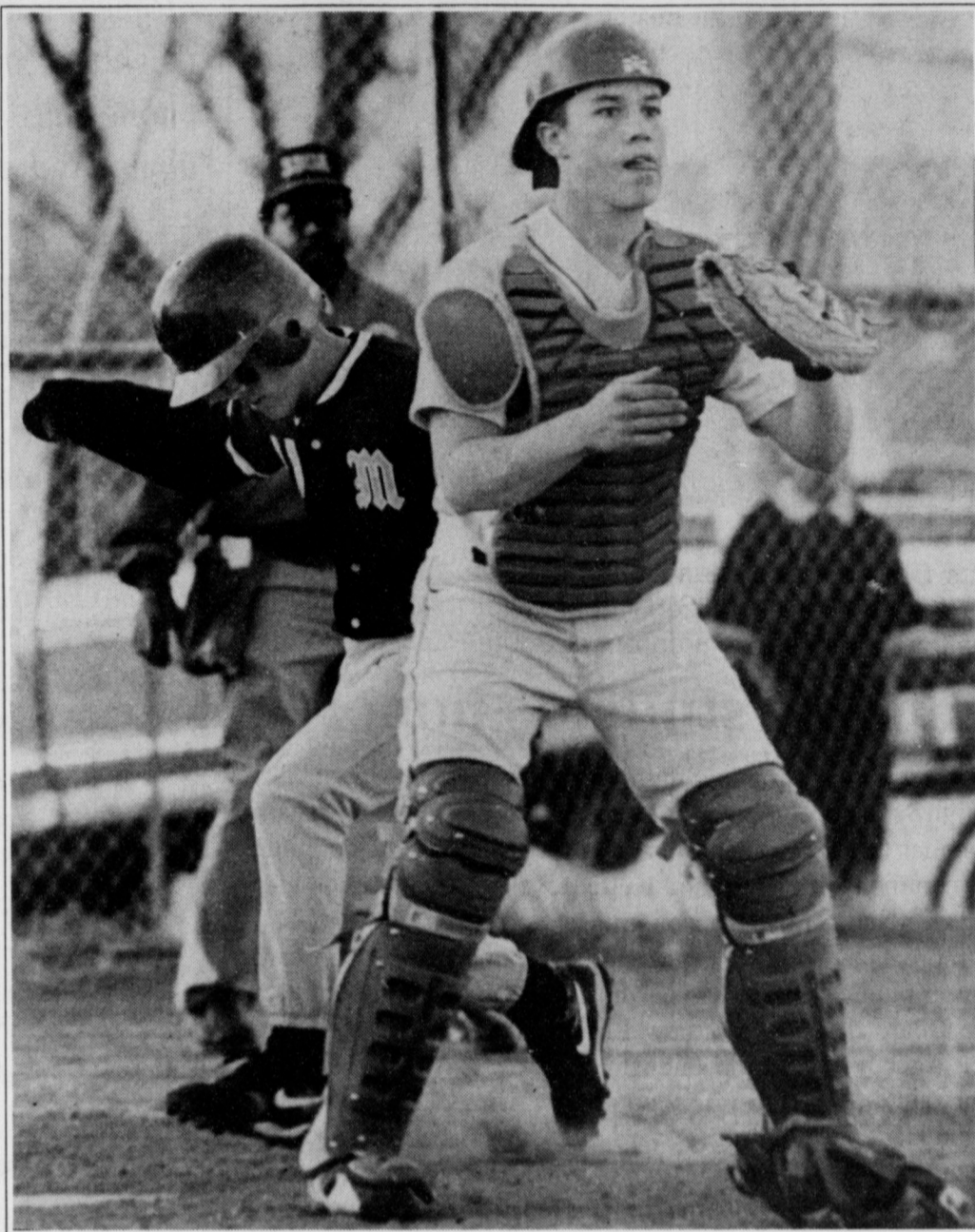
"He pitched well," Muleshoe coach Brad Hill said. "He seemed to be getting stronger in the latter innings. He did a good job setting up his curve ball."

"The tournament director thought it was unfortunate that Aaron had to play the number one seed so early," Muleshoe

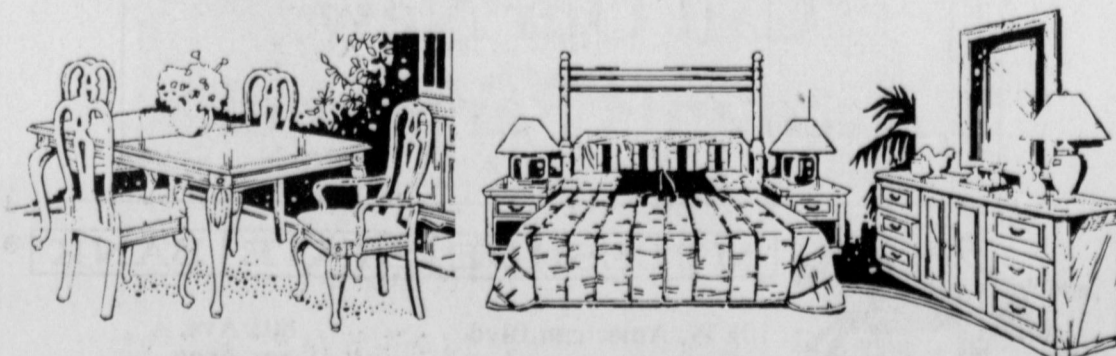

Garbarino, Lady Mules dominate MHS Invite

Daniel Garbarino dominated the boys meet and the Lady Mules won the team title at the Muleshoe Invitational track meet Saturday at Benny Douglass Stadium.

Garbarino won the 100 and 300 meter hurdles handily, plus the triple and high jumps.

The recent New Mexico State football signee cruised in his speciality, the 300 hurdles, winning by almost a 1/2 second, and was nearly two feet better than his nearest competitor in the triple jump of 41 feet, seven inches. Garbarino

won the 100 hurdles by .31 seconds with a time of 15.66 and took the high jump on less misses, clearing 5-10.

The Muleshoe boys finished third behind District 2-3A foes Littlefield and Dimmitt with 118 points. Littlefield, on the strength of depth in the sprints, edged Dimmitt, 136-134.

The Lady Mules breezed to the team title with 189 points, 49 points better than runnerup Dimmitt.

Cari Faver paced the Lady Mules with wins in the 1600 (5:47.64) and 3200 meters (12:57.39) and Jo Beth Gilleland scored 33 points, including second-place finishes in the 100 and 300 hurdles and the long jump.

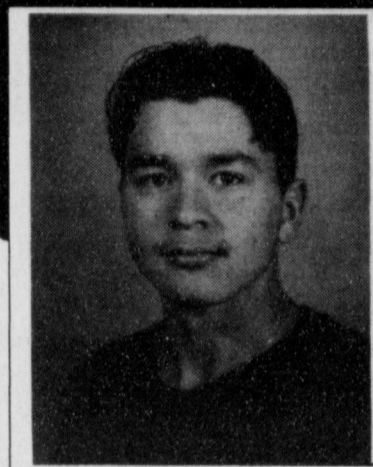
Lauri Puckett picked a win in the 100 hurdles (16.93) and Kendra Benham won the shot put (31-11). Priscilla Aguirre added a pair of seconds in the 1600 and 3200.

Chad Johnson finished second in the shot put (47-4) for the Mules and was third in the discus (140-51/2).

In perhaps the most exciting race of the meet, MHS' Joe Quintana came from about 20 yards back to win the JV 800 meters. Quintana also won the JV high jump with a jump of 5-2, but the JV Mules finished a distant fourth with 48 points. Dimmitt was first with 189.

economic impact is calculated to be over \$14 million annually.

Experts say the cattle feeding industry has been the economic salvation of the High Plains. Now we are in danger of losing this industry because of concentration in agriculture. In 1995, four beef packers controlled 87 percent of the market. Doans Agriculture Report states packers are earning 35 to 40 percent margin of profit while producers are losing 35 to 40 percent.

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman has appointed 21 people to serve on an advisory committee to study agriculture concentration. The goal of the committee is to get as many people as possible to respond

Cattlemen's group calls for investigation

AUSTIN — The board of directors of the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) is urging the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to complete a comprehensive investigation of packer concentration. The investigation is being conducted by a commission organized by U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman. The panel is due to issue its findings in June.

The investigation will focus on the fact that three major meat packing companies are buying more than 80 percent of the cattle in the United States. Packer profits have risen steadily in recent years, while prices at the producer level have dropped 50 percent in the past two years.

The ICA board voted to make its views known to USDA after a presentation by

Cuero ranchers David Warzecha and Stayton Weldon.

"As a result of a monopoly by packers, prices at the cow-calf producer level have dropped drastically since the first quarter of 1994," Warzecha said.

At that time, Warzecha said, calves were averaging \$400 a head. In January of this year, the average was \$213 a head.

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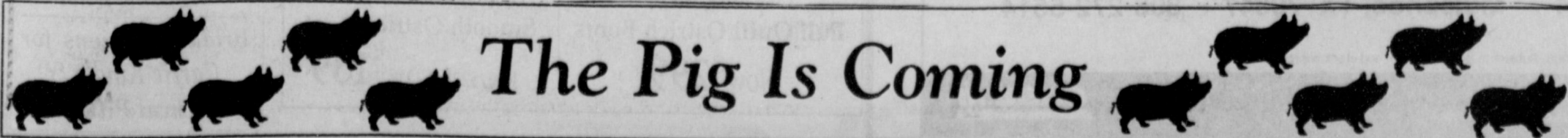

no transports and 15 transfers.

EMS director Jackey Wayne Burris said that "no transports" result when the ambulance is called by a third party, and the injured person refuses transport.

Burris reported \$10,990.70 billed, with an average \$281.81 per call, and \$13,829.26 collected in February.

The County considered changing its self-insured status and advertising for proposals for group health insurance, but took no action.

The commissioners also considered membership in the Panhandle County Judges and Commissioners Association, but took no action.

The County approved non-departmental line item transfers of \$1,491.44 in repairs to a fire truck, \$600 for an audit, and \$59 for association dues and assessments, as well as \$1.78 in property insurance (Precinct 2).

The commissioners also approved two resolutions:

- A resolution from the Texas Land Commission recognizing 2,800 volunteers from all over Texas who 10 years ago cleaned up the results of an oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico, collecting 124 tons of trash.

The Texas Adopt-A-Beach program will celebrate its 10th anniversary April 27, 1996.

- A resolution from the National Right to Life Committee supporting House Resolution 1833, the Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act.

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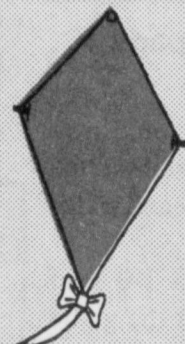
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
