MISD board approves refinancing long-term bond

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees voted to refinance one of the district's two bond series that were used to finance the district's multi-million expansion program, during a special meeting on Wednesday,

Sept. 15.

Doug Whitt of Southwest Securities, who acted as the district's bond counsel in the 2006 bond issuance, appeared before the board with the recommendation the largest of the bond series be refinanced in what he estimated would save the district about \$100,000

per year.

"These refundings are time sensitive," Whitt said. "We've been monitoring this from day one. Recently, rates have come down again."

It was explained that if approved by the board and the bonds were resold, the State of Texas, which participates

in the bond payment through EDA funds, would receive half of the savings.

"If the district saw a saving of \$135,000 (net) half would go to the state," Whitt said.

However, according to Daniel Harper, the MISD business manager, there would be a benefit to the

district's taxpayers if the bonds were refinanced, estimating that for every \$50,000 the district received would lower the debt service tax rate by two cents.

Whitt also pointed out that there wouldn't be any savings from the refinance of the district's other, short-term bond

issue, because of its call date.

"We're in an extremely unusual market," Whitt said during his presentation.

Although the board approved the refinancing, it was with the stipulation that a "gross interest cost savings" of \$2,500,000

Arrest made after 'hit and run' accident

A Muleshoe resident was treated for injuries received during a hit and run accident on West American Blvd., at about 4:42 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 19, according to Lt. Benny Parker of the Muleshoe Police Department, while the alleged driver of the second vehicle found himself cooling his heels in the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center.

According to Lt. Parker, Gary Cain, 49, of Muleshoe was riding a Harley-Davidson motorcycle in the vicinity of 17th Street and West American Blvd., when he was struck by a person driving a red pickup.

Cain was transported to Muleshoe Area Medical Center, where he was treated and released.

While the alleged driver of the pickup fled the scene of the accident without rendering aid to the injured Cain, witness information received by responding law enforcement officer Sgt. Shane Kirk was sufficient to help with the location and arrest of Glidorio Alvarado Soto, 52, on a felony charge of "leaving the scene of a personal injury accident," about 40 minutes later in the 1200 block of West Avenue C.

Ribbon cutting, homecoming celebration set for Oct. 8

Friday, Oct. 8, is going to be a busy and exciting day at the Muleshoe Independent School District, Superintendent Dr. Gene Sheets announced during Monday's regular meeting of the Muleshoe Independent School District's board of trustees.

In the heart of West Texas football country, you would expect great the annual football homecoming to generate excitement, but at Muleshoe ISD there's going to be a lot more going on.

The activities on Friday, Oct. 8, will start at DeShazo Elementary, where the community and local officials will

gather for a ribbon cutting for the completed final phrase of the campus' expansion — which included the kitchen, the new administrative offices and library, and entrance.

According to Dr. Sheets, retired principal Barbara Finney will be honored at the event.

While serving as principal of DeShazo

Elementary, Finney started "Muleville," which allows the students what can only be described as a "unique learning experience." As part of the expansion, Muleville has been moved, according to the superintendent.

And, Sheets said, the daughter of former principal Mary DeShazo, after whom the building

and campus was named, will be on hand to speak and help cut the ribbon.

There will be a tour of the facility after the ceremonies.

At Muleshoe High School, the activities will begin at 2:30 p.m., with — of course — the Homecoming game pep rally, and between 3:30 p.m. and the conclusion

The man from Muleshoe who thought up ECU's high-flying offense

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He hails from Muleshoe, Texas.

That's right, Muleshoe. Go ahead and make your jokes. East Carolina's Lincoln Riley has heard them all.

"I catch quite a bit of flack about it," he said.

Not so much anymore. For while Riley's humorously

named hometown was once all people wanted to talk about, now it's his birth date that makes him noteworthy. Specifically, it's the juxtaposition of that relatively recent date (Sept. 5, 1983) with his job title: offensive coordinator, Football Bowl Subdivision program.

Riley turned 27 on the opening day of the season. He's the youngest coordinator in the nation, on either side of the ball, by more than two years.

"I'm one of those guys who's not scared to go for broke..."

He runs an offense that is seventh in the nation in scoring, fifth in first downs and first in red-zone efficiency heading into Saturday's game at Virginia Tech.

It took luck, timing, talent and the work ethic and stamina of, uh, a mule, for Riley to become a prodigy of the X-and-O set.

It started in Muleshoe.

The farming and ranching town of about 5,000 near the New Mexico line is 75 minutes from Lubbock, where football mad scientist Mike Leach ran a passing-game lab at Texas Tech, putting up crazy numbers by slinging the ball all over the West Texas plains.

Like his father and grandfather before him, Riley quarterbacked

Muleshoe High, and though he received scholarship offers from small schools, he decided to walk on at Texas Tech.

"I like to do things big," he said. "I'm one of those guys who's not scared to go for broke."

Riley was one of just four walk-ons to make the team. Leach quickly surmised that his football gifts were more mental than physical. He told Riley he could compete to be the third-string

quarterback, but he might want to consider getting into coaching. Riley had an unusual grasp of the game.

Leach offered him a job as a student assistant. For someone who at the time thought he might go on to become a high school coach, it was a priceless opportunity.

At first, the job entailed running errands for assistant coaches: getting lunch, Continued on page 10

Feeder cattle up from 2009

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.55 million head on Sept. 1, up one percent from a year ago.

According to the monthly report released by the Texas Field Office, the estimate was one percent higher than the Aug. 1 level.

Producers placed 540,000 head in commercial feedlots during August, up six percent from a year ago, and up 32 percent from the August 2010 total.

Texas commercial feeders marketed 500,000 head during August, up four percent from last year and up six percent from last month.

On Sept. 1, there were 2.2 million head of cattle and calves on feed in the Northern High Plains, 86 percent of the state's total.

The number on feed across the area was up three percent from last

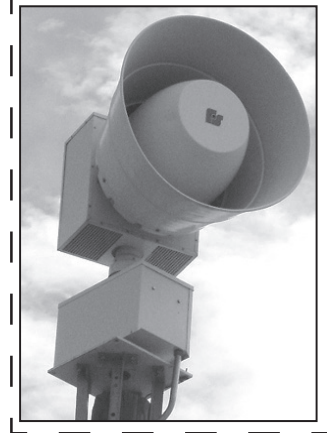
year but up one percent from the August total.

August placements in the Northern High Plains totaled 471,000 head, up 31 percent from the July total. Marketings were up nine percent from last month to 447,000 head.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States in feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 10.2 million head on Sept. 1, 2010. This inventory was three percent above Sept. 1, 2009.

Placements in feedlots during August totaled 2.27 million head, seven percent above August 2009. August placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds totaled 495,000 head; 600-699 pounds totaled 395,000 head; 700-799 pounds totaled 565,000 head; 800 pounds and greater totaled 815,000 head.

Marketings of fed cattle during August totaled 1.92 million head, seven percent above 2009.



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Editorial

Equal time on burn bans

A couple of weeks ago, the majority of the Middle East and even representatives of our own government were outraged by the announced plans of a Florida church to burn copies of the Koran.

First of all, let it not be said that we support the idea of "book burning," although we've seen more than a few books in our life time that deserved such treatment. But just because an editor or publisher was having a bad day and let a manuscript that actually "isn't worth the paper it's printed on" escape the discard pile isn't the same thing as burning a book for ideological reasons.

Be that as it may, the Florida church had the right to burn the books, just as others in this nation — and others — have the right to burn our nation's flag. We don't have to agree with what such a group is doing to recognize the right that supports the action.

On the same note, the church that was protesting the war in Iraq by demonstrating at the cemetery in which our honored military dead were being interred had the right to such public speech. Distasteful as their protests were, in our opinion, they are not as distasteful as the attempts of politicians to harness that right of free speech.

Paraphrasing Walter Matheau's line in the 1981 movie, *The First Monday in October*, "dirt has the right to be dirt."

What is most disturbing about the issue of burning the Koran, and the opposition from our national leaders is that to our memory similar outrage wasn't voiced when the friends of Islam chose to burn not just books and Bibles, but also churches and people.

Where is the outrage when Muslims and muslim nations either murder or call for the assassination of individuals based upon their concepts of blasphemy?

When Islamic clerics call for the death of a United States cartoonist, as we understand to have occurred a few weeks ago, it deserves more than a call from the Federal Bureau of Investigation urging the individual to go into hiding.

"Moving in was sort of the signal of the end of the 2006 bond expansion," Sheets said at Monday's regular school board meeting, about the efforts of the students, staff and faculty, who took part

in the event on Friday, Sept. 17.

While there is a long checkoff list of things that need to be corrected at the high school, the superintendent said, "We've given them a month to take care of things."

Then, at 7 p.m., the 2010 MHS Football Homecoming Queen

will be crowned at the renovated Benny Douglass Stadium.

This year's homecoming game, at 7:30 p.m. against Slaton, will be the varsity Mule's second gridiron battle on the AstroTurf™.

But that's not all that's scheduled to happen on Oct. 8!

Lt. Brandon Sheets,

the son of the superintendent, will be returning to DeShazo Elementary to speak to the students at about 9:30 a.m., bringing with him the film footage of his team's daring rescue of a severely injured hiker in Washington State, during which he flew his helicopter under a bridge.

The lieutenant will also be addressing students at Watson Junior High.

In other business, the school board:

- Discussed the district's enrollment report, during which board member Kelly Kettner raised a question about the difference in enrollment numbers between high school sophomores and juniors.

Assistant Superintendent Carl Krug explained how the district is trying to address the problem.

"A lot have been told they've got to go to work,"

Sheets said, referring to the students who don't return for school their junior year.

- Approved a budget amendment that dealt primarily with kitchen equipment for DeShazo. The superintendent explained that \$30,000 would be spent out of the district's food services fund, while \$65,000 of the amendment was for a federal grant the district had received for the new walk-in refrigerator.

- Approved the minutes from the Aug. 23 regular meeting, and the Sept. 15 special meeting.

be achieved.

In other business at the Sept. 15 special meeting: the school board approved an accelerated instruction timeline waiver that will allow the district to promote fifth and eighth-grade students that while close to passing are in danger of failure and provide additional instruction for them in the fall. "rather than try to do it in June or July."

"I think getting them in school in the fall then in the summer is much better," board member Daniel Guzman said.

Superintendent Dr. Gene Sheets said without the program, there was a greater chance the students would drop out at a later date. "We just think they need the break," he added, noting also it would be harder to get the students to return during the summer months.

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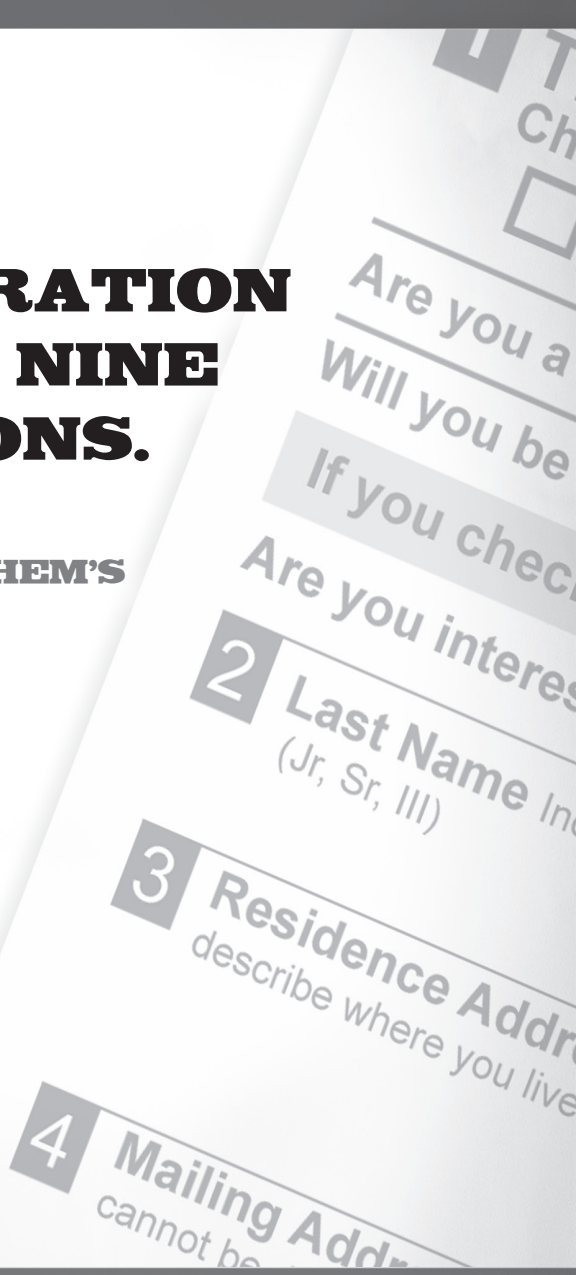

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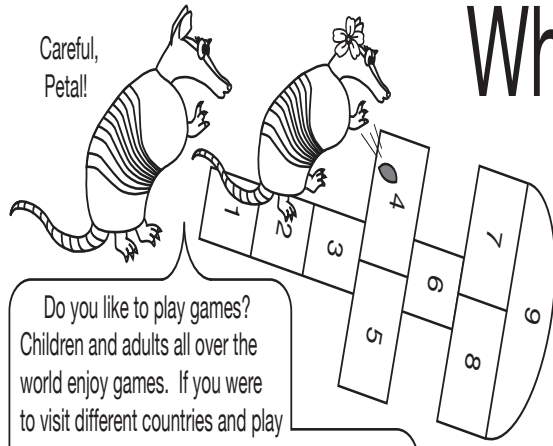

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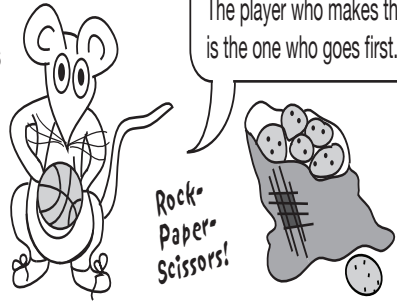

The Sudan Fire/EMS Annual Awards Banquet and Luncheon was held on Sunday, Sept. 19, at Sudan High School. There was a great turnout for the meal that was by donation only.

They started the awards ceremony with Bobby Phillips, the 2nd Asst. Fire Chief recognizing special guests including City of Sudan council members and the candidates for the Lamb County Judge position, Carolyn Harmon and Mike DeLoach.

Mike Hill, the Fire Chief, then delivered an update on Sudan Fire/EMS operations.

Hill included information about the grant successes since the 2003 fiscal year.

From 2003 to 2009, Sudan Fire/EMS has been awarded \$415,494 from state and federal grants with a local match requirement of \$26,299.50.

The local match requirements are achieved by funds from the City of Sudan and donations from area citizens.

DJ Provence, President and Training Officer,

presented an update of the 2009 Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Assistance to Firefighter's Grant Program (AFG) Sudan Fire/EMS received two AFG grants in 2009. One grant was used to purchase a Thermal Imaging Camera, 10 sets of personal protective equipment and a gas monitor.

The second grant will be used to purchase a Pumper/Tanker that will be equipped with a 1000 gallon tank and a 1250 gallon per minute pump.

James Conn, the Assistant Fire Chief and Fire Marshall presented incident information for Fire and EMS.

DJ Provence and Mike Hill presented a few members with service year pins. Morgan Harris and Rick LaCoss were presented one-year pins.

Brad Helton was presented his five-year pin. DJ Provence received a 10-year pin and Bobby Carson received a 35-year pin.

Dustin Provence, the 3rd Asst. Fire Chief and Certifying Coordinator, presented the EMS enhancements that were made over the past year.

One enhancement was the upgrading of our service to Basic Life Support with Mobile Intensive Care Unit capabilities.

The certification allows for more treatment to administered prior to arriving at an emergency department.

Another enhancement that is currently being installed is the use of mobile computers within our ambulances.

These devices along with specialized software allows for real-time documentation of patient treatment and condition.

Dustin Provence then presented DJ Provence, Brandon Hill, and Patty Hill with their State Fire Marshall's and Fire Fighter's Association's Basic Firefighter Certification.

This certification takes 180 hours of classroom and practical training.

Mike Hill presented Jackie Harris with a gift for her assistance in preparing the meal. Jackie is always willing to help in any way that she can and the firefighters appreciate everything she has done for them.

Mike Hill finished the ceremony by presenting the 2010 EMS Responder of the Year to DJ Provence and Firefighter of the Year to Rick LaCoss.

 gassing up their cars. In time, though, Leach let Riley work with his young quarterbacks and with the scout team. Riley dived in.

"When I do something, it's full steam ahead," he said. "I don't hold back."

Riley graduated in 2006 and then benefited from "a really strange chain of events."

A graduate assistant's job opened up just as he graduated. He was in that job less than a year when the outside receivers coach left. Riley was hired. The next year, the outside receivers coach left. Riley was promoted, and worked with All-American Michael Crabtree, now with the NFL San Francisco 49ers.

Leach continued to give him more responsibility, and trust.

"If Mike had something off campus to attend, Lincoln took over the offense and ran it," said ECU coach Ruffin

McNeill, who was the defensive coordinator at Texas Tech.

When Leach was fired before last season's Alamo Bowl, McNeill was named interim coach. He had "no reservations" about naming Riley his offensive coordinator, he said.

Nor did he have any about bringing Riley to Greenville when he was named ECU's coach a few weeks later.

"Some people get caught up in the age thing, but I don't," McNeill said. "He understands the game very well from a technical standpoint and knows how to relate well, teach and motivate our kids."

Riley brought Texas Tech's fast-tempo, no-huddle, spread passing attack with him, and added some tweaks to fit the Pirates' personnel. He has taken advantage of the mobility of quarterback Dominique Davis. At Texas Tech, many of Leach's quarterbacks were stationary gunslingers.

Riley has also made good use of running backs Jonathan Williams and Giovanni Ruffin, a Hickory High graduate, and speedy inside receivers like Dwayne Harris on reverses.

"I think he's already one of the great football minds as a coordinator," Harris said.

ECU has scored 100 points in two games, but Riley thus far gives the offense a grade of "B."

They haven't executed as well as he's hoped, have yet to score on the game's opening drive and have made up for some sloppiness with big plays, he said.

Moving forward, he'll be game-planning against defensive coordinators who might have blitz packages older than he is. Two of his offensive assistants are also in their 20s and also have backgrounds at Texas Tech. Riley said they make up for their relative lack of experience with youthful energy, as well as a thorough knowledge

of the spread offense.

"When you start at 19, I feel like I've been doing this a lot longer than people realize," Riley said.

The people in Muleshoe, of course, are proud. Riley's dad runs a cotton compress and warehouse outside of town. His mother works as an interior designer. His younger brother, Garrett, is a quarterback

at Stephen F. Austin.

Good town, good people, good place to raise a family, Riley said. A former railroad depot, it is named after a nearby ranch that had a brand in the shape of a mule shoe. It boasts the world largest muleshoe - 27 feet tall, 17 feet at its widest point and 11 feet wide at the base, weighing 7-1/2 tons.

It also has a glass

sculpture of a mule that some people jokingly refer to by two words. One of them is "glass" and the other rhymes with that word and is also a synonym for mule.

"Muleshoe, Texas," McNeill said. "I know where it is. Pretty good little sandwich shop there, too."

Pretty good place to find an offensive coordinator as well.

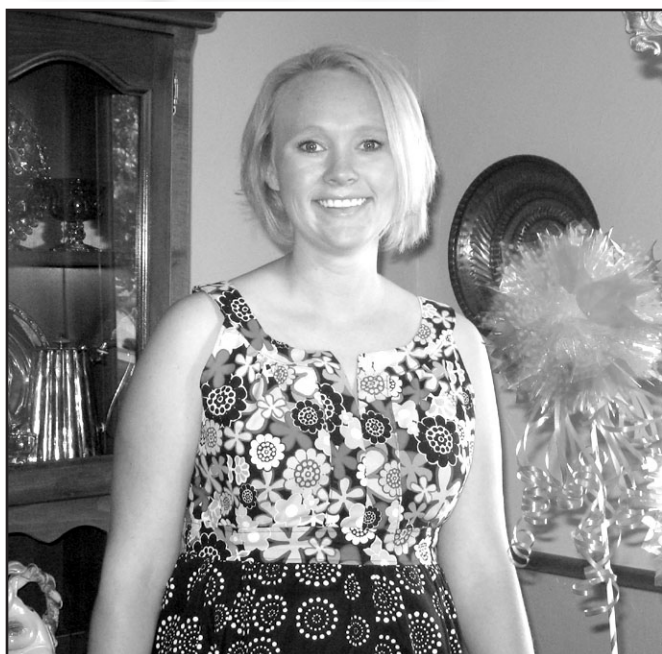

Texas milk production totaled 703 million pounds during August, down slightly from last year's production of 706 million pounds.

July 2010 production totaled 737 million pounds.
