According to Lt. Parker, Gary Cain, 49, of Muleshoe was riding a Harley-Davidson motorcycle in the vicinity of 17th Street and West American Blvd., when he was struck by a person



Feeder cattle up from 2009

feed for slaughter market from the August total. in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.55 million head on Sept. 1, up one percent from a year ago.

According to the monthly report released by the Texas Field Office, the estimate was one percent higher than the Aug. 1 level.

Producers placed 540,000 head in commercial 10.2 million head on Sept. feedlots during August, 1, 2010. This inventory was up six percent from a year three percent above Sept. ago, and up 32 percent 1, 2009. from the August 2010 total. Texas commercial feeders marketed 500,000 head during August, up four percent from last year and up six percent from last month. On Sept. 1, there were 2.2 million head of cattle and calves on feed in the Northern High Plains, 86 percent of the state=s total.

Editorial

Equal time on burn bans

A couple of weeks ago, the majority of the Middle East and even representatives of our own government were outraged by the announced plans of a Florida church to burn copies of the Koran.

First of all, let it not be said that we support the idea of "book burning," although we've seen more than a few books in our life time that deserved such treatment. But just because an editor or publisher was having a bad day and let a manuscript that actually "isn't worth the paper it's printed on" escape the discard pile isn't the same thing as burning a book for ideological reasons.

Be that as it may, the Florida church had the right individuals interested the MHS athletics program to burn the books, just as others in this nation — and others — have the right to burn our nation's flag. We don't have to agree with what such a group is doing to recognize the right that supports the action.

> On the same note, the church that was protesting the war in Iraq by demonstrating at the cemetery in which our honored military dead were being interred had the right to such public speech. Distasteful as their protests were, in our opinion, they are not as distasteful as the attempts of politicians to harness that right of free speech.

Paraphrasing Walter Matheau's line in the 1981 movie, The First Monday in October, "dirt has the right to be dirt."

What is most disturbing about the issue of burning the Koran, and the opposition from our national leaders is that to our memory similar outrage wasn't voiced when the friends of Islam chose to burn not just books and Bibles, but also churches and people.

Where is the outrage when Muslims and muslim nations either murder or call for the assassination of individuals based upon their concepts of blasphemy?

When Islamic clerics call for the death of a United States cartoonist, as we understand to have occurred a few weeks ago, it deserves more than a call from the Federal Bureau of Investigation urging the individual to go into hiding.



The guidelines that will be used to determine if, and how much the publication will cost is as follows: **Death Notices...**

Death notices may include the deceased's name, city of residence, age, date and place of birth, date and place of death. If the notice is to be published prior to any services, the time, date and location of services, and location of burial may be included. If publication will be after said services, the time will not be included. An example is as follows:

Basic obituary...

Basic obituaries printed in the Muleshoe Journal are printed at the basic rate of \$30, and may contain the following information: date and details of funeral and place of burial; date and place of birth and parents names; date of marriage; limited biographical information, including the highest level of schooling achieved, service in the Armed Forces, profession (and retirement information if applicable); names of parents, spouses or children who have preceded the person in death; names of survivors, including the spouse, parents, brothers, sisters and children. Only the number of grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-greatgrandchildren will be included; and where memorials may be directed. We will run a one column black and white photo at no charge.

Non-basic obituary...

A larger photo, or content that varies from that listed for a basic obituary — such as the names of grandchildren, or additional relatives or relationships - will require the obituary to be published at a rate of \$4.50 per column inch.




