Patriots Jinx Owls



G. W. Chappell, President of the Silverton Young Farmers, and Mrs. Dan Herrington, President of the Silverton Young Homemakers, watched as Mayor Fred Mercer signed the official proclamation of September 15-21 as Young Farmer-Young Homemaker Week in Silverton.

The Valley High Patriots jinxed the Owls at Turkey last Friday the Thirteenth, and the Owls tumbled into a big 31-0 loss at the hands of the boys who had not won a football game in the two years since the Quitaque and Turkey schools were consolidated.

The Owls wanted the win, but apparently not as much as the Patriots did, and their mistakes laid end to end would have reached all the way from Turkey to Silverton.

Silverton kicked off to Valley to open the game, held the Patriots to little gain, and roughed the kicker when they punted, giving Valley a free first down. The Owl defense held Valley again and the Patriots punted. This time, Silverton fumbled, the Patriots recovered, and were back in business again. The Valley boys committed a couple of major infractions on these plays, but the referees missed seeing them, and Valley ran for a first down and made another on a 15-yard penalty against the Owls. After completing a pass to the Silverton-8, Valley scored on a run by Halfback Scotty Setliff with 5:38 remaining in the first quarter. The kick was no good, and Valley held a 6-0 lead.

The Owls could still have made up the deficit, but when the Patriots kicked off again, Silverton fumbled, Valley recovered and was back in business again at midfield. After making a first down, the Patriots saw the ball go over on downs. Silverton fumbled and recovered, and ended up punting back to the Patriots.

This time the Patriots made a couple of first downs and again the ball went over on downs as the second quarter began.

Still, the Owls could have recovered, but after making a first down the boys fumbled again, and Valley recovered with 12 seconds remaining in the quarter. After an incomplete pass, Valley fumbled and Carl Gallington gobbled it up for the Owls, but Silverton's efforts had become so jittery by this time that the players seemed confused with their own strategy.

The Owls punted again, and after making a first down, Valley got a holding penalty before sending Fullback Brian Wheeler in for another score with 6:14 remaining in the first half. Dean Ziegler blocked the PAT kick, and the Patriots were ahead 12-0. The Patriots scored again on a run by Setliff with 1:41 remaining in the second quarter.

Unfortunately for the Owls, the second half brought more of the same, with the Patriot momentum building with each play. Valley scored 13 points more, to beat Silverton 31-0.

Mickey Smith, a senior guard for Valley, was named Class B Player of the Week by the Amarillo Daily News, for his play in last Friday night's game. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Smith of Quitaque, and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Smith of Quitaque and Mr. and Mrs. Don Garrison of Silverton.

Fortunately for the Owls, they have other games in which to show their fans that they know how to play better football. They will be hosting the Motley County School Matadors, a tough Class B team, Friday at 7:30 p.m. The Pep Squad will be serving a hamburger supper in the school cafeteria before the game, and the Booster Club will open both concession stands at the game. These two clubs invite you to attend the game and enjoy good things to eat while you are there.

Elderly Texans Being Swindled By Con-Men

State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie Friday said fast-talking, high-pressure operators are at work swindling elderly Texans through bogus insurance deals.

Christie said a pre-trial hearing this week of two salesmen in Cuero refused attention to false and deceptive sales practices and gimmicked-up schemes.

Raymond Kelsie Townsend, 47, of Hurst and John Lee Bradley, 49, of Fort Worth face charges in DeWitt County for felony theft.

Christie said Wiley Cheatham, the district attorney in DeWitt County, reported Charles Anthony Smith, 24, of Fort Worth and Norman Paul Cowart, 32, also of Fort Worth, have been jailed on a total of five counts of felony theft.

Christie said the State Insurance Board would cooperate with law enforcement officials in providing technical assistance on insurance matters in the prosecution of criminal charges.

He said the Board would also take disciplinary action under the Texas Insurance Code for alleged violations of licensing and sales regulations.

"We are going to take a cold glance at the behind the scenes approaches of these smooth operators with corkscrew rhetoric and the companies they are supposed to represent."

Law enforcement officials in Victoria have also reported that two elderly residents were defrauded of more than \$1,500 in an insurance swindle.

"We have reports that men represented themselves as agents and sold hospitalization and medical insurance as well as an "automobile warranty plan" which supposedly covers all repairs done to the victim's auto for a number of years," Christie said.

He said, "Salesmen have also conned victims into believing that they represented legitimate agricultural concerns with the use of picturesque, canned sales pitches describing potential insurance benefits to farmers and ranchers."

Christie said that reports of "twisting" policies—replacing existing ones with new ones of dubious value—will also be investigated.

"I hope that the local prosecutors will not be soft-hearted with those who exploit the elderly or cajole consumers into quick purchases. The Board intends to put a stop to "policies" that are as funny as the paper they are written on and to the con men preying on unwary citizens."

Christie said those who think they may have been swindled through bogus insurance deals should contact either the State Insurance Board or local law enforcement officials.

Mrs. Mary Smith Buried Wednesday

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Louise Smith, 83, were conducted at 3:00 p.m. Wednesday in the First United Methodist Church in Silverton. Officiating was the Rev. Ray Elmore, pastor.

Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home. Grandsons served as pallbearers.

Mrs. Smith died Monday, September 16, at 2:00 p.m. in the Tulsa Nursing Home where she had resided for 17 months.

Born December 13, 1890 in Vina, Alabama, she had lived in Briscoe County 45 years. The former Mary Ester, she married Milton Edgar Smith December 2, 1909, at Deck. The couple lived in Sweetwater a short time. They moved to New Mexico, where they homesteaded on 320 acres and lived at their claim. Later they moved to Seymour, where he was associated with a sand and gravel company for eight years. They moved to Quitaque to help install gravel machinery on the Tibbetts place south of Quitaque.

On October 28, 1928, they purchased the Cap Rock Grocery and Station nine miles east of Silverton, and lived there and operated the business until his retirement in 1967, when they moved into Silverton. He predeceased her in death August 22, 1972.

She was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Silverton.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. R. L. O. Riddell of Silverton; two sons, H. Glenn Smith of Silverton and Gerald L. Smith of Quitaque; four brothers, Donie Ester of Silverton, Porter Hester of North Hollywood, California, Charlie Hester of Sweetwater and Dow Hester of Dallas; five grandchildren and twelve great-grandchildren.

He was hospitalized in Lubbock Methodist Hospital before being transferred to Brooke Army Burn Center at Fort Sam Houston. The Owls scored first with 1:28 remaining to be played in the second quarter on a run by Fullback Douglas McJimsey. McJimsey's running conversion try failed, and the Owls held a 6-0 half-time lead.

With two minutes remaining in the third period, the Owls penetrated to the Matadors' one-yard line and turned the ball over. The Matadors ran three plays, failed to

net a first down and fumbled tried to punt it away. Owl Center Mitchell Simpson fell on the ball in the end zone for Silverton's second score. Quarterback Kirk Durham failed on the running conversion with 13 seconds remaining on the third quarter clock.

Eula Pyeat and Verna Thomas presented posters which informed and encouraged members to apply for scholarships.

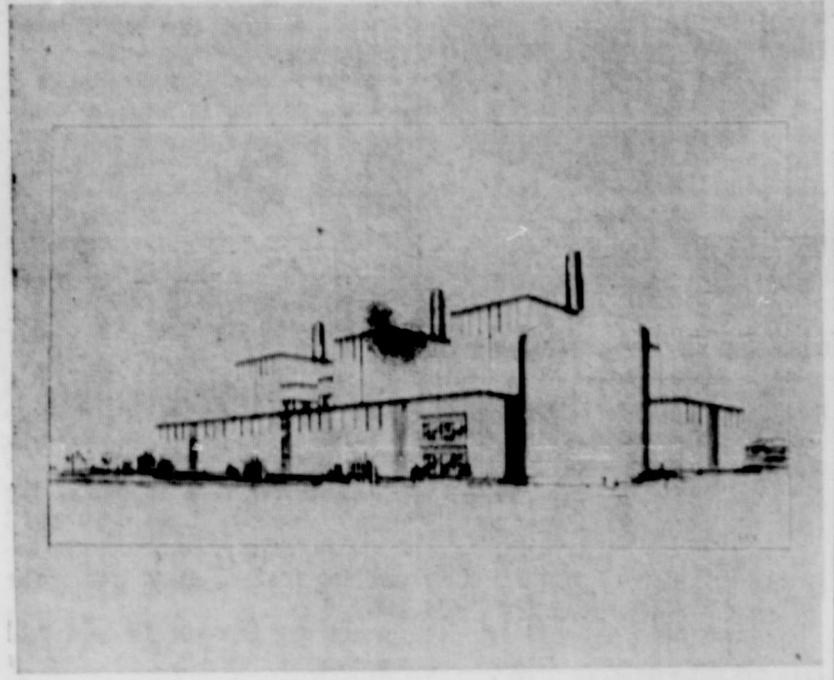

Nations First Breeder Unit To Be Built

Southwestern Public Service Company announced Wednesday the first step in a program which sets the stage for the company to take a lead role in the construction of the nation's first power plant to use a gas-cooled breeder reactor.

Roy Tolk, chairman and president of the electric company, said the Gas-Cooled Fast Breeder Reactor (GCFR) plant would have a generating capability of 300,000 kilowatts and would be located on a site provided by Southwestern.

"We have signed a letter of intent with General Atomic Company of San Diego, in which we would contribute \$100 million to the project. Substantial additional financial support will be required from the electric utility industry and the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission," Tolk said.

"Our long-range projections call for additional generating capability in the mid-1980's; so, this development program fits right into our growth pattern and could very well be our introduction to nuclear power. We will, of course, have a conventional generating unit in service to meet our customer's needs, if that is necessary, but are enthusiastic about the

Program Given On High Protein Hay

Joe Mercer, a representative of High Protein Feeds, Incorporated, from Phoenix, Arizona, was guest speaker for the Silverton Young Farmers Thursday night. His topic was Marvel Comfrey, a high protein hay.

Mercer stated that Comfrey could cut cattle feeding by 30 to 40 per cent. This can have a root harvest or it can be cut for hay. One test plot in Montana has produced 217 green tons per acre. Comfrey is not recommended for grazing because of the high protein content. It can also be used for human consumption, especially in health foods. Comfrey can be used for any kind of livestock.

Following the program, the Young Farmers had a business meeting in which they decided to bid on the Riding Club's loading chute. They also voted to sell the air conditioner from the drive-in show to Cecil Jones, and to sell the complete pressure pump system from the show grounds.

Mrs. Kirchoff Seeking Senate Seat

"Restoring integrity to government begins right where we are," declared Mary Kirchoff, candidate for the State Senate's 30th District. "We are the people who will be going to the polls on November 5. Let's elect to office those persons whose actions and past records demonstrate that they mean what they say."

Mrs. Kirchoff took her "Someone you can trust" campaign to Westbrook last week, meeting with the Golden Age group of that area, and expressing appreciation to them for the heritage they have given the present generation of Northwest Texans. "It is a Christian concept that 'To whom much is given, of him is much expected,'" she pointed out. "You have given us so much; we shall try not to let you down."

The wife of a farmer-cattelman and an active worker in rural Northwest Texas for twenty years, the candidate discussed briefly some of the problems of the area. "In our District—in fact, everywhere—inflation is one of the biggest problems. All of us are concerned by the inflation spiral in which we find ourselves today. We feel it everytime we go to the store. Our cattle sell for less than it costs us to feed them, yet our retail beef prices continue to soar.

"Government over-spending is the root cause of inflation. We will have proper restraint when we elect representatives who can exercise self-control in state spending. We must be progressive—but we must also know where the money is coming from before we vote a program. I commit myself to be as careful about spending your tax money as I am about spending my own.

"Another matter of concern is that of jobs—or should I say the lack of them. As an organizing member of the Small Towns Task Force, I began promoting small towns. My work there and the results of it—as well as the response of the people to the program—convinced me that as we develop our area in industry, training, and tourism, we shall begin to find answers to the twin problems of jobs and wages. We cannot expect our young people to remain in their home areas if there is nothing there for them."

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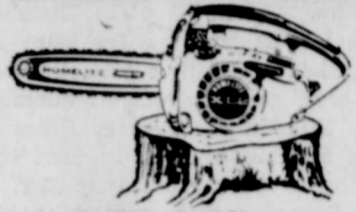
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
