Ellis was the, banner cotton county of Texas for 1910, producing 99,391 bales ginnedup to January 1, 1911. Williamson county was second with 93,362 bales; McLennan third, with 91,394 bales, Harris county pro duced 3421 bales, Brazoria coun ty 3287, Matagorda only 589, Fort Bend 25,442, Jackson 2794, Wharton 16,383; Bee 11,169. All the rice belt counties will grow more cotton acreage this year. Cotton and corn are taking the place of rice in all these counties. The canal and mill middle men are gradually killing the goose that lays the golden eng The number of active coston spindles in the world increased 27 per cent from August 31,13 1909, to the same date in 1910 | 3 The United States produces about two-thirds of the world's cotton. 

Ellis was the banner cotton county of Texas for 1910, prolucing 99,391 bales ginnedup to January 1, 1911. Williamson county was second with 93,362 bales; McLennan third, with 91,394 bales, Harris county pro duced 3421 bales, Brazoria county 3287, Matagorda only 589, Fort Behd 25,442, Jackson 2794, Whar ton 16,383, Bee 11,169. All the rice belt counties will grow more cotton acreage this year. Cotton and corn are taking place of rice in all these counties. The canal and mill middle men are gradually killing the goose that lays the golden eng

The number of active cotton pindles in the world increased 27 per cent from August 31 1909, to the same date in 1910 13 The United States produces about two-thirds of the world's cotton. The consumption of cotton during the year ending August 31. 1910, was 18,321,000 bales of 500 pounds each. Massachu;cti. ranked first among cotton manufacturing states, North Caro lnia second, South Carolina third, Georgia fourth, New Hampshire fifth, Alabama sixth and Rhode Island seventh.

Nearly all the cotton imported into the United States is Egyptian, used in making thread knit goods and machine lace; and Peruvian used as a substitute for wool in making "woolen" goods. The United States department is experimenting with the growth make horses of themselves by place. So call and get your pick of Egyptian cotton in this country. Bulletin 200 of the bureau of plant industry gives details. Spinners say the Egyptian cotton west is as good as the imported. Texas growers might well send for bulletin 200 and study it.
