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## CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING

On the afternoon of August the fourteenth, 1861, W. R. Guinn and Miss Martha Harris were united in marriage.

Just fifty years later, on last Monday they celebrated, in their home fourteen miles east of Snyder, their Golden Wedding. Early in the day the children and grandchildren of this genial old couple might have been seen wending their way to the old home where they had spent so many happy hours with Grandpa and Grandma. They have lived in Scurry county twenty-one years having moved here from Ellis county. Their children are all living near them. Mrs. Jim Bailey, Mrs. Dick Boone, Mrs. J. B. Hudnall, J. A. Guinn and J. O. Guinn are the children living.

Mrs. Betty Love of Ft. Worth a sister of Mrs. Guinn and Mr. Jesse Harris of Haskell, a brother, were also present for the occasion.

There were thirty eight grandchildren and two great great children.

A few of the grand children were not present but in the group which was photographed there were forty four, all children and grand children.

After a sumptuous feast was partaken of, the neighbors and friends began to arrive until the house and yard overflowed.

The bride was dressed in a cool white dress and was indeed happy in the reunion of all of her loved ones.

The young folks were full of the spirit of the occasion and even the babies seemed as if they could not do enough to honor the dear old people, and many congratulations and substantial gifts were laid on the altar of love. The sons froze one freezer of cream after another and the laughing carefree girls served cream and cake to the crowd until all were ready to say enough.

Then luscious melons were sliced unmercifully and all feasted to their hearts content.

Then came the inevitable fight with the melon rinds and handfuls of ice were slipped down the collar of the unsuspecting. All

truly went at merrily as a marriage bell and at dusk the crowd adjourned to the Guinn school house where by an understanding unknown to the honorees a service was held to do honor to the sweet Christian characters of the noble old couple whom everyone loves. It was a veritable love feast and one long to be remembered by all present: In a few well chosen words Rev. Rowe explained why they had come and asked expressions from the crowd. This one said I was sick and they ministered unto me," that one "I was hungry and they fed me," the other was "naked and they clothed me." The organ was presided over by Miss Bessie Guinn and sweet songs well sung were freely interspersed with the talks. His eyes dim with tears, his voice husky with emotion, Grandpa Guinn with simplicity responded to the manifestation. Then Grandma Guinn, whose hand had soothed the fevered brow of many of those present when in trouble, rose and thanked the people but most of all thanked her Maker that she had been spared to see that day.

### Building Dermott.

The R. S. & P. commenced building their depot at Dermott Tuesday. Two car loads of material and a company of carpenters under Mr. Whitescarver of Snyder went up on the morning train to commence work immediately on the building which will be completed in about three weeks. This depot will compare favorably with the depots located along the line and will be about the same size as that one located at Wastella. It is understood that the contract has been let for two brick business houses and they will be built as soon as the material arrives. Also there will be built as soon as possible a brick school house. The business houses to be erected have already been leased for a term of five years.

### Will Soon Begin Work

Judge Smith received a telegram Thursday from the jail contractor that material for the new jail will be forwarded to Snyder on the 28th and it is expected that work will begin on the new building next week.

## BARN AND FEED BURNED.

### One of Snyder's Land Marks Goes Up in Flames

Dr. R. L. Howell's barn and a lot of feedstuff were destroyed by fire between 1 and 2 o'clock Friday night. It is not known how the fire originated. Besides the burning of the barn, the windmill and tank were quite badly damaged. Loss, probably \$600. Insurance \$300.

Mr. L. J. Nichols who is authority on the history of Snyder says that building was one of the land marks of Snyder. The house was built in 1883 and originally stood on the site of the ruins of the Snyder Mercantile building and it was in this house that Mr. Patterson and Mrs. Webb were married. The house was later moved further out on Scarborough street and then moved to the rear of the lot to give place to the residence in which Dr. Howell and family now live.

**FOR COUNTY TEACHERS.**

County Superintendent Horton Gives out Letter from State Superintendent Brally.

Under the new school laws of the State passed by the Legislature in January the first examination for applicants for teachers' certificates in Dallas county will be held at the Dallas county court house on Aug. 31 to Sept. 2. State Superintendent Brally has notified the County Superintendents that there are various changes in schedules for examinations; that the county can issue only second grade certificates, and that the State will issue first grade certificates, while no third grade certificates is now to be issued at all.

**Examination of Teachers.**

Notice is hereby given that the examination for teachers certificates will be held in the District Court room in Snyder, Texas on August 31 and September the 1st and 2nd, 1911.

**Cotton Belt Improvements**

During the fiscal year ending June 30, the St. Louis Southwestern Railway, known as the Cotton Belt has added one hundred and fifty miles to its Texas lines and a large section of ties. The extensions are laid with 56 and 60 pound rail and the roadbed is of superior construction.

There are yet some sections of Texas that are a hundred miles and more from a railroad and Texas is the most important field in the union in the matter of railroad construction.

Phoenix, Ariz., Aug. 18.—I notice there are forty-six ocean steamers parked in the Gulf, made ready to haul of the Texas cotton as soon as it is delivered in Galveston.

I notice that the Iron Ore Railroad is building from Longview (an extension of the Santa Fe) to the red hemitte fields of Northeast Texas to haul of the iron ore of Port Boliver and ship it to Bethlehem, Pa., by water to be made up into the finished product.

This is the basis of my saying Texas makes more in quantity and in value of the raw material and less in finished products than any state or country on the map.

More raw material is shipped abroad and more finished product is brought back. If this pays, why wouldn't it pay to work up the raw material at home? The best places in the world are Beaumont and Wichita Falls, where there is plenty of fuel oil to burn and oceans of water.

There ought to be some concentration of home capital to do these things. It can't be done all over Texas, but it can be done at some two or three places. There ferson and others at Llano, Cotton Mills ought to be all along the ought to be a big furnace at Jeff Brazos, Sabine, Colorado and Llano rivers. Texas iron and cotton products ought to supply the entire Southwest, Cuba, Mexico and South America.

**Texas Farm Lands Increase 173 Per Cent.**

While taking the census reports Uncle Sam has been investigating the opportunities for investment, and he announces that money invested in Texas farm lands shows an increase in value of 173 per cent during the past decade.

The total value of farm land alone, not including buildings, was given in 1910 as \$1,613,513 as against \$591,551,000 in 1900; an increase of \$1,021,962,000 or 173 per cent.



### TEXAS INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

Young County is agitating a bond issue for \$100,000 to build good roads.

The re-organized I. & G. N. railway Company of Houston has filed its charter with the Secretary of State with a certified capital of \$11,500,000.

Work is being rushed on the railroad leading from Brownwood to Ray, Texas, and the owners of the road announce that it will be completed by the first of October.

Navarro county has added a modern, up to date traction engine to her road building outfit.

The Haskell Broom Factory shipped last week 7,626 brooms of its own manufacture. The shipment was made to El Paso firms.

Abilene will build a new express office at once. This building will be of brick and concrete and will cost fifty five hundred dollars.

Melisso is to have water works system. Contract has been let for a 25,000 gallon steel tank.

The International and Great Northern Railway is having repairing and building sheds constructed at Taylor, which will be the largest sheds in Texas, being fifty-five feet wide and 648 feet in length.

Ground has been broken on the Girls' Dormitory of Trinity University at Waxahachie. The new building is to cost fifty thousand dollars.

Sherman has raised \$10,000 for preliminary work on the Paris-Sherman Interurban. Paris will raise a like sum and intervening towns the remaining \$30,000.

The Clay county Cotton Oil Co. of Henrietta filed its charter with the Secretary of State last week. W. B. Worsham, J. B. Dale and J. T. Dale are the incorporators and the concern has a capital stock of \$67,000.

San Antonio capitalists are planning the construction of an interurban line from San Antonio to the big dam recently built on the Medina river.

The first American merchant ship to pass through the Panama canal will contain goods manufactured in Texas. The Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association are planning the project.

## WORST STRIKE IS THREATENED

### RAILROAD OFFICIALS AND UNION MEN FEAR RESULT OF TROUBLE

## A LONG FIGHT VERY LIKELY

### Shopmen of All Lines West of Mississippi Preparing to Make Demands

Houston Chronicle: Both the railroads and the railroad unions are preparing for a threatened strike which, if started, promises to become one of the most serious railroad strikes in the history of America.

The shop men of all lines west of the Mississippi river have been preparing for some time to make their demands for higher wages and shorter working hours.

The men are eager for an eight hour day. Now they are working nine and ten hours a day.

They are paid by the hour, but they figure that they ought to get as much money and work only eight hours. A seven cent raise is what they are preparing to demand.

The railroad officers on the other hand are preparing to give the men battle as they have never been fought before if they go out. The officials say that the many demands that have always increased their burdens have driven them to desperation. They say they cannot give anything more and exist.

### Every Hand Against Them:

Officials of the railroads say that every hand is against them. The people, they say have caused stringent laws to be passed and the men have continually tightened their demands for higher wages and shorter hours.

But the railroad officials know that they are treading on unsteady ground when they open up a war on the shopmen. There is no class of labor more tightly bound together than the shopmen of the railroads. Their organization is one that is managed secretly—in the dark—so to speak, and when they take action they move as one man.

The railroads remember the adage that it is the silent dog that bites. The shopmen are more to be feared than any branch of labor. And the shopmen claim too, that the conductors, engineers and firemen may be drawn into the trouble before it is over.

### Situation Admittedly Serious:

Wall street is looking for trouble to break. The threatening stand of the shopmen has been thoroughly discussed there. The officials admit that the situation is serious. All hands are hoping that the strike may be averted but none are too hopeful.

If it comes to pass it will be one of the worst, very likely, that has been thrust upon the nation. Some railroads hope that the loyalty of the older men and the sober heads will be used to bring about peace.

The Southern Pacific lines for the last ten years have been giving pensions to old and faithful employes who have worked for the lines over a long period of time. These pensions are for continuous and faithful service and the object is to insure the veterans a comfortable old age.

If they strike, however, they break the continuity of the service and lose their rights to old age pensions. For this reason the strike may have an effect more that would thrust upon the country more reaching than the troubles that would thrust upon the country temporarily.

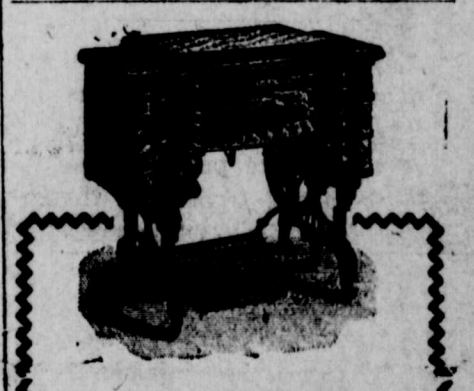

**Culberson On Reciprocity.**

Senator Culberson writing to a constituent in Texas, he reasons for voting for the Canadian reciprocity bill says:

1. Because reciprocity was endorsed by the Democratic caucus.
2. It is a movement in the direction of freer trade and the enlargement of America's markets.
3. It will operat against the vicious system of protection and serve to expose its fallacies.

"The farmers have heretofore been told and even now being told to influence them in favor of a protective tariff, that protective tariff duties on agricultural products will benefit the farmers. Not only is protection wrongful, because it is special legislation intended to benefit private enterprises at the expense of the general public, which is foreign to the purposes of the government, but in its application to the farmers it is false in fact, because it does not benefit them as producers. As a general rule, agricultural products are exported, not imported here, because a surplus is grown and produced, and in such cases tariff are useless either to raise revenue or afford protection. This is true of wheat, corn, cotton, meat and cattle, the principal agricultural products, and a duty on

them is merely dust in the eye of the farmers."

4. It benefits Texas and the South by procuring duty-free cotton seed oil into Canada, thus broadening the market for one of the South's farm products. It also in like manner broadens the market in Canada for the South's fresh fruits and fresh vegetables. Inasmuch as Canadian live stock cost 20 per cent more to raise than American live stock, free trade in live stock between the two countries in the United States, Culberson quotes Secretary Wilson as saying the United States produced 3,000,000,000 bushels of corn last year against 18,726,000 bushels in Canada. Climat forbids corn growing in Canada.

This country has consistently robbed Peter to pay Paul; it has paupered the the teaching profession. It has made great lawyers by illminating great teachers. It has advanced medicine and pushed education to the back ground Harsh though these statements be, they are true.

Take any Southern state and look over the records of its jurists and its doctors, and you will be amazed to find how many of them were teachers first. And so throughout the Union. These men were good teachers, and the most of them liked their work, but they found soon enough, all of them, that no career lay open before them in that line. So they turned to other professions. That is why teaching has become for men but a stepping stone. We fail to understand that we have virtually told every energetic and good teacher that if he wants to do anything in the world he will have to go in for some other line of work.

No profession has had the choice of such intellect and genius as the teaching profession, and no profession has allowed so much in tellect and genius to get away from it. This indictment is true every day. The hundreds of this year's college graduates who will teach next year will become the tens who are teaching the year after. The brainy men drop out one by one, though luck or fortune keep a few of them still in the schools. Yet it is more important that we have good teachers than that we have good doctors or good lawyers. Good teachers means good lawyers and doctors later.

There can be no getting away from the facts, we have made teaching a sacrifice for the man doing it. We have refused him due reward. We take from him self respect very often and give him nothing in return. We force him to turn to professions where the financial return is at least great enough to keep body and soul together. Yet a great teacher must be more richly endowed than a great lawyer. Why does the one acquire thousands where the other acquires hundreds? Why does the salary of a teacher not keep pace with the cost of living? Why do we spend millions for education and not pay the pilots more than a pittance?

Is it any wonder that our school system and our educational system alike are being severely criticized both abroad and at home?—Charleston News and Courier.

### Texas Farms and Cities

Uncle Sam is proud of Texas and as he burns midnight oil over the adding machine computing the greatness of our State, he points with pride to our marvelous progress during the past decade.

The Federal Census Bureau announces that we have 416,377 farms and 312 cities in Texas. During the past decade we have opened up 64,187 new farms and built 121 new cities. No State in the union can approach us in agricultural and municipal development.

Even Democrats who are opposed to Senator Bailey may yet come to agree with him that a law to recall a public officer before his term expires is no Democratic doctrine and would lead to the destruction of free government. Mr. Bailey sounds alarm when he says that the law of recall will make cowards of public officers. Many an officer who would otherwise do his duty in opposition to a prevailing prejudice, would quake before the impeachment laws and should therewith be content.

A young man in Dallas, named Fitch, because of a love scrape attempted suicide, but is still alive. It looks like the suicide craze is spreading.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 21.—This is political kite season in Texas and many a queer craft can be seen floating in the breeze, and, lest the grand stand forget, a sky rocket now and then illuminates the horizon, but the signs ablaze in the political skies point to rough weather.

Investigation has been going merrily on and many a politician has been playing hand with the Goddess of Justice by confessing the sins of others. Many antis refuse to recognize the authority of the committee, and a constant to determin its jurisdiction is now on. Three members of the house were arrested Friday and a jail sentence was imposed in one instance, but the comittees recinded the action. The life of the present committee will end on August 30th, but a joint committee to continue the probing is contemplated.

The Appropriation Bill is about ready for the consideration of the Governor. As a whole, the bill is quite an improvement over anything of the sort passed in recent years and an examination of the items reveal that our solons tried to sieze the swift horse of progress by the bridle as it passed. Of course there is human nature all through it and many of the items have had bad latin upon them, but the legislature struck the trail of civilization occasionally. Another legislature, and Texas will be getting on its feet.

The state Senatorial and State Representative District Bill passed the House and Senate and the bill is as dry as a powder house. The Governor, however, may not approve the bill and the Pros have not a sufficient majority to pass over his veto. In the event of the failure of the Legislature to harmonize with the views of the Governor, it is likely that there will be no legislation at this session and the districts will remain as they are for the present.

There has been eighteen subjects submitted for general Legislation to date as follows:

Appropriation, Re-Districting, Repealing the Automatic Tax law, Payment of Deficiencies, Special Appropriation for Prosecution of Election Frauds; Prescribing a Uniform System of Text Books Prescribing and Fixing the Jurisdiction of the Supreme Court; Reforming and Revising the Civil and Criminal Codes; Creating a State Normal Board of Regents; Creating the Position of Public Highway Engineer; Amending the Fire Insurance Law; an Eightea Hour Law; Congressional redistricting; Correcting Errors in the Civil and Criminal Codes for the transfer of Process of Sale of State Lands on Mustang Island to the School Fund; Road Law Permitting Bonds to be Issued on a Majority Vote. Twenty-four local subjects also have been submitted.

The appropriation and Re-Districting Bill have passed both Houses. The Senate refused to repeal the automatic tax law and all other matters are under way. Of the legislation submitted the most important to the people is the ammendment of the road law permitting the issuance of bonds on a majority vote instead of a two-thirds vote as at present, and creating a position of public highway engineer to co-operate with the county and precinct officers in building public highways.

The Sunday School lessons of the last few weeks ought to awaken students to the general resentment of many people when they are held up in criticism for wrong doing. Judah's king had the prophet imprisoned for telling him the unwelcomed truth.

The railroad workers strike in England has been settled.
