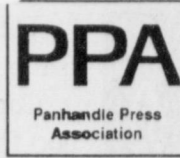

Tooley has three grand champions

MAPLE — Josh Tooley and Scott Pollard had the top entries in the annual Three Way 4-H and FFA Junior Livestock Show, held Jan. 25 at the Three Way School.

Pollard had the Grand Champion junior beef heifer, while Tooley carted off banners for the Grand Champion junior market steer, junior market lamb and junior market swine.

The day included the annual Three Way FHS stock show meal of barbecue brisket, sausage and all the trimmings. A sizeable crowd enjoyed the day's festivities, which also included a kids' pet show and a pee wee swine show.

Reserve Grand Champions were exhibited by Robin Tooley, who had the Reserve Grand beef heifer; Josh Tooley, who had the Reserve Grand steer and lamb, and Pollard, who had the Reserve Grand swine.

Chadd Edwards of Floydada judged the lambs and cattle, while Parmer County Agent Cody Hill judged the hog show.

Showmanship awards went to Josh Tooley, who was the champion steer showman; Nadine Webb, who was the champion lamb showman; and Monty Kirby, who was the champion swine showman. Reserve showmen included Daniel Reeves in the steers; Josh Tooley in the lambs and Marvin McCaul in the swine.

CRP criteria includes soil, air quality

WASHINGTON, DC — Plans for Conservation Reserve Program acreage will count Panhandle-West Texas blowing dust in two categories when reviewing acreage that landowners want to qualify for payment in lieu of planting.

CRP House Subcommittee Chairman Larry Combest (R-Lubbock) received confirmation that USDA agreed to his recommendation that keeping fields covered and not plowed is worth point for both air quality and erosion of soil from the region's strong winds.

Combest also said USDA revealed that expected CRP rental rates for each county in the Panhandle-South Plains region will range from an average of \$25 in Robert County to \$37

an acre in Cochran County, which includes the \$5 reimbursement to landowners for cover maintenance requirements.

Rental rates for Parmer and Bailey County average \$35.

Combest noted that the average county rates should compare to actual rental prices paid for comparable land in a county. Combest plans to call a review hearing on USDA proposals soon after USDA's expected publishing of final plans within two weeks.

"USDA has recognized the value of holding highly-erodible land back from agricultural production as both a means to maintain control over blowing

Scouts hold annual Pinewood Derby

On the floor of a small gym, wooden cars race across a large ramp.

The bleachers of the Mary DeShazo gym provide an overhead view as Muleshoe Cub Pack 620 holds its Pinewood Derby.

The boys, who worked diligently to construct the wooden racers, crowd the finish line. The elementary school aged boys are full of anxiety to see who will advance to the next level of the derby.

Each car, about a half-foot in length, has its own paint job, making it as unique as the scout who built it. Some cars are covered in multi-colored stripes. Others simply have the initials of the ones who built them.

The boys go to the ramps, two by two, where they hand their cars to the man operating the ramp. Before he can set the cars in place, the competitors are already running to the fin-

ish line about twenty yards away. They grab the prime viewing spots, where they will watch the cars complete the latest run.

The judges at the finish line give the signal, and the cars are released. They roll down, using gravity as their sole source of power. They remain neck and neck as they race down the curve of the ramp. Then the

two cars reach the straightaway, where one of the cars suddenly jumps into the lead, taking the win.

The boys' parents keep watch over the events of the race, marking the winner of each race.

The cub scouts who are not racing crowd one of the many exercise mats that dot the perimeter of the basketball court.

They talk about everything from who's going to win the derby to who's car has the best paint job.

The field of competition grows smaller as the derby runs its course. The victors remain humble, accepting the congratulations of their fellow scouts without boast or brag.

dust in the air and as the way to keep valuable topsoil from blowing off the land," said Combest. "However, I will closely scrutinize USDA's new erosion index criteria as well as other details in USDA plans to see that our unique Panhandle-South Plains soil conditions are recognized when landowners qualify their land for CRP contracts."

The 1996 Farm Bill included the overhaul of the CRP program, which by some estimates

could remove 1.5 million acres of CRP land from the federal program.

New proposals appear to be slanted toward water erosion and environmental issues rather agriculture concerns, critics claim.

Of the 4 million plus CRP acres in Texas, 40 percent are in Combest's congressional district, which covers 20 counties in the West Texas and the Panhandle.

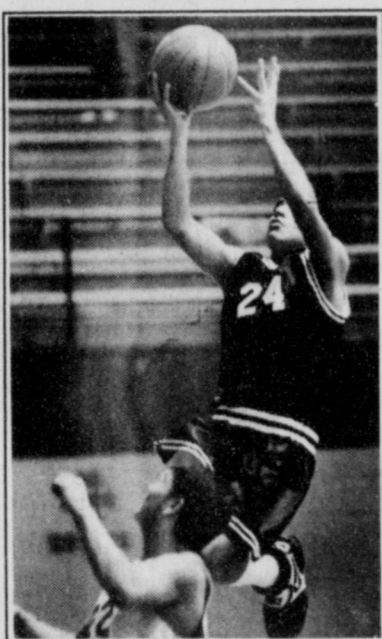

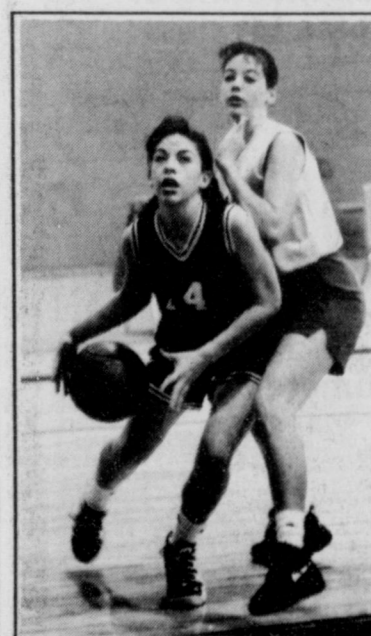

Mules stretch latest win streak to three

Wins are stacking up like tumbleweeds on a barb-wire fence.

Behind solid shooting and a game-breaking third quarter run, the Muleshoe Mules topped Dalhart 75-66 in a District 1-3A game Friday at WJHS gym.

Muleshoe (17-9, 6-2 in district) has won three straight games since losing to second-ranked Tulia two weeks ago. The Mules have already won

Tahoka won the team title with 37 points and Coahoma was second with 27 points. Seminole finished sixth with 17 points.

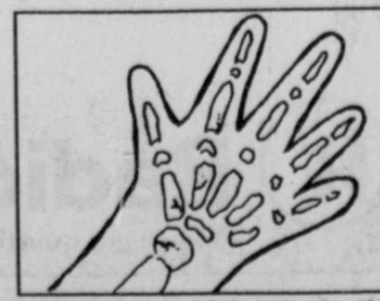

CITY ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE, TEXAS, WITH REGARD TO HEALTH OF CITY EMPLOYEES, PERTAINING TO SMOKING IN BUILDINGS AND/OR VEHICLES OWNED BY, OR UNDER CONTROL OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY; PROVIDING FOR A SAVINGS CLAUSE AND A PENALTY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the Surgeon General of the United States has reported that inhalation of tobacco smoke involuntarily can cause disease, including lung cancer, in healthy non-smokers; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Muleshoe believes that its employees should have the right to choose for themselves on an individual basis whether to smoke either actively or passively; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the City of Muleshoe to balance the interest of its employees who smoke against the potential hazard to its employees who are non-smokers in a manner that will result in the minimum possible burden on those persons regulated while still meeting the duty to protect the health of its employees.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE, TEXAS:

Section 1 - **SMOKING IN BUILDINGS AND/OR VEHICLES OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE**

A. Definitions.

The following definitions shall apply:
 1) **Buildings** means all of the enclosed area that is enclosed areas that is used by the city and its employees and general public, including but not limited to all or any part of the building used for any of the operations of the City, such as the City Hall, Police Station, Municipal Court, Library, Recreation Buildings, Airport Buildings, City Maintenance Facilities, Water Treatment Plant, and Waste Water Treatment Plant.

2) **Vehicles** means all

vehicles, machinery and/or equipment owned or under the control of the city of Muleshoe.

3) **Smoke, Smokes or Smoking** includes:

a) Carrying or holding alighted pipe, cigar, or cigarette of any kinds, or any other lighted smoking equipment or device, or

b) The combustion of any cigar, cigarette, tobacco, or similar article, or any other combustible substance in any manner, or in any form; or

c) Emitting or exhaling the smoke of a pipe, cigar, or cigarette of any kind.

B. Offense: Penalty

1) A person commits an offense if in a City building the person smokes and fails, or refuses, to extinguish smoking materials or move outside the building upon request by any person to do so.

2) Any person convicted of violating this provision shall be guilty of a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than one dollar (\$1.00), nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) as set by a judge or jury.

C. Signs

Signs shall be visibly placed at each public entrance to city buildings to notify persons entering the premises that smoking is prohibited. This provision does not include exits used exclusively as emergency exits.

D. Exceptions

Nothing herein shall provide the designation of the following premises as nonareas, but the restrictions contained herein shall not apply:

1) In the course of a Police Interview with a WITNESS, VICTIM or SUSPECT, it may be advantageous to allow that person to smoke for the purpose of relaxing. In such an event, the Police Officer conducting the interview may allow the individual to smoke in their office or work area during the interview only. This should not be construed as a method to circumvent the purpose of this ordinance, but to allow the police department the freedom to conduct criminal investigations in the most efficient and practical means possible.

Section 2 - **Penalty**

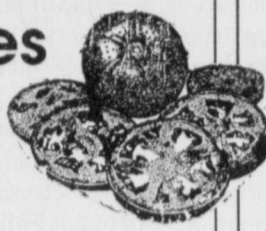

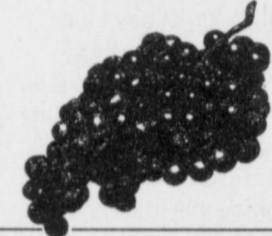

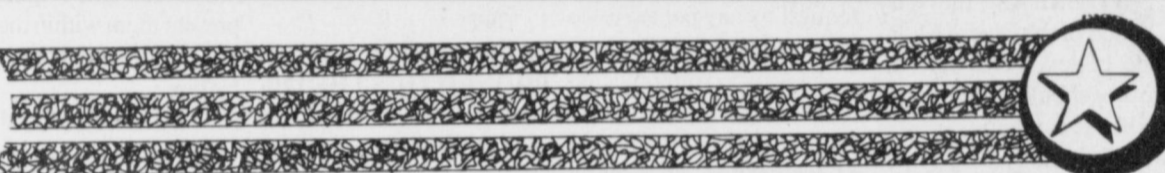
