MISD receives passing grade

Most rate school system above average

More than half the community members surveyed gave the Muleshoe Independent School District a grade of "B" or "C" for its overall performance.

The survey, based on the response of 130 local residents, showed that 38 percent gave schools Bs, while 24 percent gave the school distrrict Cs.

The number of residents who gave the school district an A (13.5 percent) was almost the same as the number that gave it a D (12.7 percent).

The number of residents who rated the district's performance as B or better was 51 percent, which ranked well above the national average, according to Region 17 representative Phyllis Kinnison. Similar surveys from across the nations show 43 percent of community members giving their schools a B or better.


the Muleshoe Independent School District discussed the survey Monday during its regular bi-monthly meeting. The survey was taken late last year.

"We're surveying perception, not necessarily reality," MISD Superintendent Bill Moore said. "With the results, we know what areas need more communication."

When asked for additional comments, many surveyed said they do not believe schools are giving students from low income families, Hispanics, and "average" students proper attention.

"We have programs that serve as safety nets for students of all social and economic

County approves coliseum changes

The Bailey County Commissioners' Court Monday approved final changes to the operational guidelines of the Bailey County Coliseum.

The changes will allow individuals and businesses to rent the coliseum for commercial profit.

Commissioners also approved rental rates for commercial use of the coliseum.

The changes come after a local businessman approached a commissioner about his inability to rent the coliseum for busiOUNTY COMMISSION

ness purposes.

In other business, Donna Thompson, a volunteer with the Bailey County EMS, approached the court seeking financial assistance for EMS training courses.

Thompson told the court the cost of taking training courses is increased by the fact that most courses are as far as Lubbock or Hobbs, N.M., increasing traveling costs.

Thompson asked commissioners to help cover the costs of training seminars so that volunteers can devote their own money to

the personal costs of attending the meetings, such as food and lodging.

EMS volunteers can use the Internet to earn their certification hours, but Thompson said the hands-on training they receive at seminars is an invaluable tool.

"At the last session I went to, there were six doctors who discussed pediatric emergencies," Thompson said. "They showed us the latest burn treatments, which are always changing."

EMS volunteers are required to have between 40 and 80 hours of training per

County man indicted for manslaughter

A Bailey County grand jury Monday returned a manslaughter indictment against a Bailey County man accused of neglecting his mentallyhandicapped mother-in-law.

The manslaughter charge is part of a two-count indictment against Andrew Lee Shaw, 42, who is accused of causing the death of 54-year-old Ella Mae Osbend by neglect. The second charge against Shaw is a injury to disabled person.

In a separate indictment, Shaw was charged with injury to a disabled person involving Bobby D. Raybon, the 47-yearold brother of Osbend, who is also mentally handicapped.

Shaw is considered the livein caregiver for the siblings.

Bail was set at \$50,000 by District Court 287 Judge Jack Young.

Shaw, who has remained in custody since his arrest Jan. 23, will be arraigned Feb. 14.

The manslaughter indictment said Shaw recklessly caused the death of Osbend by failing to maintain proper care in sanitation, a properly heated environment and failure to provided sufficient food.

Bailey County Sheriff's deputies found Osbend dead the night of Jan. 18 at her home about a mile west of Muleshoe after Shaw asked a neighbor to call 911 to report a possible stroke.

Osbend's body was "malnourished and "dehydrated" and displayed other injuries, according to Bailey County Sheriff Department criminal investigator Benny Clifton. He said he would discuss those injuries after the report from a Jan. 20 autopsy was complete.

Raybon was hospitalized with hypothermia, dehydration and malnourishment, Clifton said. He has since been released from the University

Defense spurs Eagles to first district title since 1971

■ Three Way faces Springlake-Earth in bi-district playoffs

MAPLE — Three Way High School coach Shawn Harrison said defense is the reason the Eagles won their first district title in 26 years.

The Eagles captured the District 8-1A title Friday by edging Whitharral 54-50 at home. Both teams entered the game with 6-1 district records.

Jesus Perez scored a game-high 23 points for Three Way, including both ends of a one-and-one with 12 seconds left that sealed the win.

Three Way last won a district title in 1971. Behind the stingy man-to-man principles Harrison learned as an assistant coach at Tarleton State, the Eagles held district opponents to 41.2 points a game.

"Watch the teams that make the play-

offs and most of them play good man-toman defense," the first-year Three Way coach said.

The Eagles (14-10 overall) finished the season by winning 9 of its last 11 games.

"It took me half the season to sell them that defense wins games," Harrison said. "Then they started taking pride in shutting teams down."

Three Way plays Springlake-Earth (21-9) in the bi-district playoffs Feb. 20 at Whiteface. The Wolverines finished second behind Lorenzo in District 7-1A.

Harrison, in his first year as a head coach at any level, said the Wolverines are big and physical and like to push the ball up the floor.

"We have to keep them off the boards and keep it a halfcourt game," Harrison

Perez, an athletic 6-foot senior who can play inside and out, averages 18 points a game for the Eagles and senior point guard Kyle Kindle adds 10 points a game.



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
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

Muleshoe stems River Road surge

The fast-paced, physical game drew more whistles than Cyndi Crawford in a bikini.



"Hunt for Alien Worlds"

Scientists have made the first positive identification of planets orbiting other stars, a crucial first step to learning whether we might have alien company elsewhere in the universe. Nova covers the exciting story on "Hunt for Alien Worlds."

For years ET search parties have focused their efforts unsuccessfully — on detecting radio transmissions emanating from possible extraterrestrial civilizations. But according to NASA administrator Daniel Goldin, "Before we even think about people sitting on planets transmitting radio waves, shouldn't we see if there are planets?"

Easier said than done, since even with the most powerful existing telescopes it is impossible to see a tiny, dim planet in the glare of an immensely brighter star. But it is possible to detect the gravitational influence of one or more planets on a star, if the planets are sufficiently

One such planet turned up where the temperatures are probably close to that of warm tea. In fact, discoverer Geoff Marcy of San Francisco State University has his hopes pinned not on the planet, but on the moons he believes might be circling it — moons perhaps as large as Mars or even Earth — on which the slow crawl of biological evolution could be taking place.

"Curse of T. rex"


T. rex, the indisputable ruler of the dinosaurs, is still creating an uproar 65 million years after drawing its last living breath.

Nova investigates the dark side of the public's obsession with dinosaurs in "Curse of T. rex." This time around, the giant reptile is making mayhem in the courtroom, where public and private interests are battling for the rich fossil legacy of the past. The nearly perfect T. rex specimen, nicknamed "Sue," was discovered in the South Dakota Badlands in 1991.

The program covers the imposing FBI raid that confiscated Sue and gathered tons of evidence, allegedly implicating Sue's discoverers in widespread fossil theft from federal lands. Until recently, fossil collecting was pursued mainly by hobbyists and a handful of academic paleontologists, but now it is a lucrative business with international collectors and museums bidding up the price for the best specimens.

The case spotlights the plight of researchers who study dinosaurs and who are finding that science can't compete with the profit motive.






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
