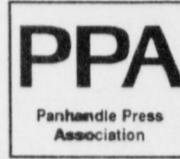

Reaching Austin a state of mind

■ Five Lady Mule tracksters headed for I-3A regionals

Cari Faver's quest to return to the state track meet her senior year never cooled — even during the blistering summer months.

Faver is one of five Muleshoe Lady Mules that will compete in the Region I-3A track meet Friday and Saturday at Ratliff Stadium in Odessa.

"I've worked so hard to get there," said Faver, a three-time regional qualifier in both the 1600 and 3200 meters. "When I think about it, this is what I have been working for since last June."

The top two individuals advance to the state meet, one of the biggest and best attended high school track meets in the country. The finals routinely draw 30,000 spectators.

Faver's best chance to advance is probably in the 3200.

"I feel good about the two mile (3200) because I've been running it consistently the last two to three weeks," Faver said.

Muleshoe coach Kim Zollinger agrees that Faver's best chance is in the 3200 meters.

Faver missed the state meet last year after finishing fifth in the Class 3A 1600 meters as a sophomore.

"There's no more next year," Faver said.

It's something that fellow senior JoBeth Gilleland also realizes.

Gilleland is making her second regional appearance, qualifying in the 100-meter and 300-meter hurdles.

"My hopes are a lot higher than last year," said Gilleland, admitting to being satisfied to just make regionals last year. "This year, it's not unrealistic to be looking toward state."

Gilleland won the 300-meter title at the District 1-3A meet, but probably needs to shave a second off her time at regionals to have a chance to advance. She said stamina in the last 100 meters will be the key.

Gilleland is both confident and nervous about the competition she will face.

"I run my best times along side somebody, but at the same time, not knowing what kind of runners I'll be facing, that's what is scaring me

Aguirre surprises even his coaches

Ricko Aguirre surprised a lot of people at the District 1-3A meet — including his coaches.

Using a spin technique for the first time in a meet, Aguirre uncorked his best throw of the season on his sixth and final attempt in the shot put.

The 50-7 3/4 inch toss earned the Muleshoe High School junior the district title and a spot in the Region I-3A track meet April 25-26 at Ratliff Stadium in Odessa.

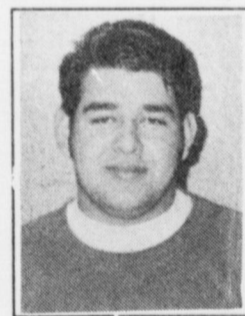
"It shocked us," Muleshoe coach Ted Johnson said. "Not the distance, but the technique."

Aguirre has worked on the spin

technique in practice, but up until the district meet didn't feel comfortable using it during a competition, Johnson said.

Aguirre normally stuck with the more traditional glide technique, Johnson said.

"At this stage, it's just whatever way he feels more comfortable," Johnson said, admitting he has no idea what to expect at the regional

meet.

Johnson was most impressed that Aguirre, down to possibly his last throw of the season, came through in the clutch.

"He knew he had to have a good throw to go to regionals and he came through," Johnson said.

Aguirre went over 52 feet in a practice meet using the glide technique last week.

"He's coming on as a thrower," Johnson. "If he stays in the ring and under control, I think he can throw 54 feet."

After all, Aguirre's full of surprises.

ODESSA — Muleshoe is in the middle of the pack after the opening round of the Region I-3A girls golf tournament Monday at Ratliff Ranch Links.

The District 1-3A champion Lady Mules are tied for eighth with Colorado City, 41 shots off the lead at 409.

Abilene Wylie holds a two-stroke lead over Monahans at 367 in the 16-team field. District runner-up Tulia is tied for 11th at 420.

The second round of the 36-

hole tournament was scheduled for Tuesday.

River Road's Sarah Valdez shot a 79 Monday and holds a three-shot lead after the first round. Valdez was the 1-3A runner-up.

District champion Keisha Whitt, a junior, led Muleshoe with a 93. Sophomore Nikki Sutton was one-stroke back for Muleshoe at 94.

DIMMITT — The Watson Junior High School and DeShazo Elementary academic teams combined efforts last week to win the University Interscholastic League® South Zone academic meet, held last Tuesday and Thursday.

"These are a good bunch of kids and they did a great job," WJHS Assistant Principal Ronnie Jones said.

"Where were you born?" The reporter asked one of my Colorado cowboy friends. "Iowa," he answered. "Iowa!" she said. "Why did you move?" "Because it's hard to be a cowboy in Iowa."

Well, it might be harder to be a cowboy in the Midwest but they've got a bunch of good ones anyway. No matter how much dependence modern cowmen place on man-made mechanical devices, there are times when nothin' beats a good roper a horseback.

Illinois is an anthill of bovine activity. They have an abundance of cow calf operations and the state has ranked in the top ten in numbers of cattle on feed. So a "loose cow" is not an unusual occurrence. That's when a good cowboy comes in handy.

Dr. Matt has his veterinary clinic in one of the many small towns that dot the northwestern Illinois country side. One afternoon he was processing a truckload of feeder steers in the back of his clinic.

Despite good help and good facilities, accidents can happen. A gate was left open and shornuf, one of the steers escaped. And, according to Rule #1 in the Guidebook of Loose Cattle, the steer headed straight for the center of town.

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Texas Wildlife announces mule deer season

Bailey County is among the five counties in the South Plains that will have a five-day mule deer season this fall, according to the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department.

Public opposition to the five-day mule deer season in Andrews, Gaines and Cochran counties resulted in these counties being eliminated from the new regulation which takes effect during the 1997-98 hunting season.

The five counties which will have a 5-day mule deer season in November of 1997 are Bailey, Hockley, Lamb, Terry and Yoakum.

The season will run from Nov. 22 to Nov. 26. Bag limit is one mule deer buck.

The shortened, two-day season was proposed instead of the full-length season because mule deer habitat and numbers are relatively limited in the western South plains. In all

other West Texas counties where mule deer hunting is legal, the season length is 16 days.

If you are interested in managing your land for mule deer

and other wildlife, free technical assistance is available through the Private Lands Enhancement Program of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department.

Texas ag commissioner urges protection against sorghum fungus

AUSTIN—Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry is urging producers planting grain sorghum to use seed that has been treated against the fungus ergot.

Treated seed is one safeguard to prevent the disease from being introduced into their fields. The same precaution applies to hay susceptible to the fungus.

"This disease is new to the United States. While experience in other countries shows ergot can spread rapidly, we don't know how quickly it will spread in Texas," Perry said. "We know the first line of defense is to keep the fungus out of the fields. The most immediate safeguard is to plant seed that has been treated with a product that ensures this."

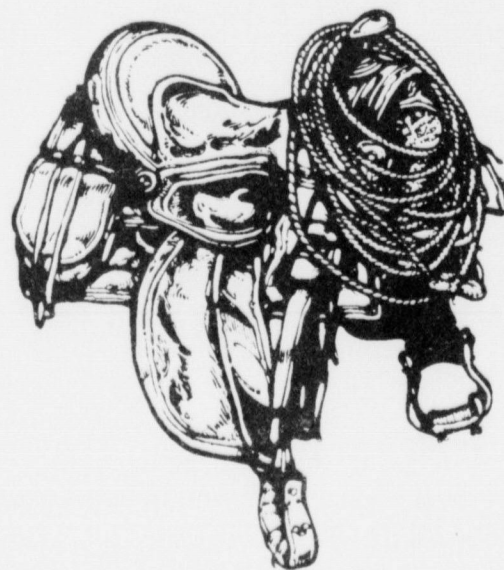
Sorghum fields planted for grain production are at lower risk of infection because plants are self-fertilizing hybrids.

Perry says that additional chemical treatments will be necessary to ensure that sorghum planted for seed production does not become infected.

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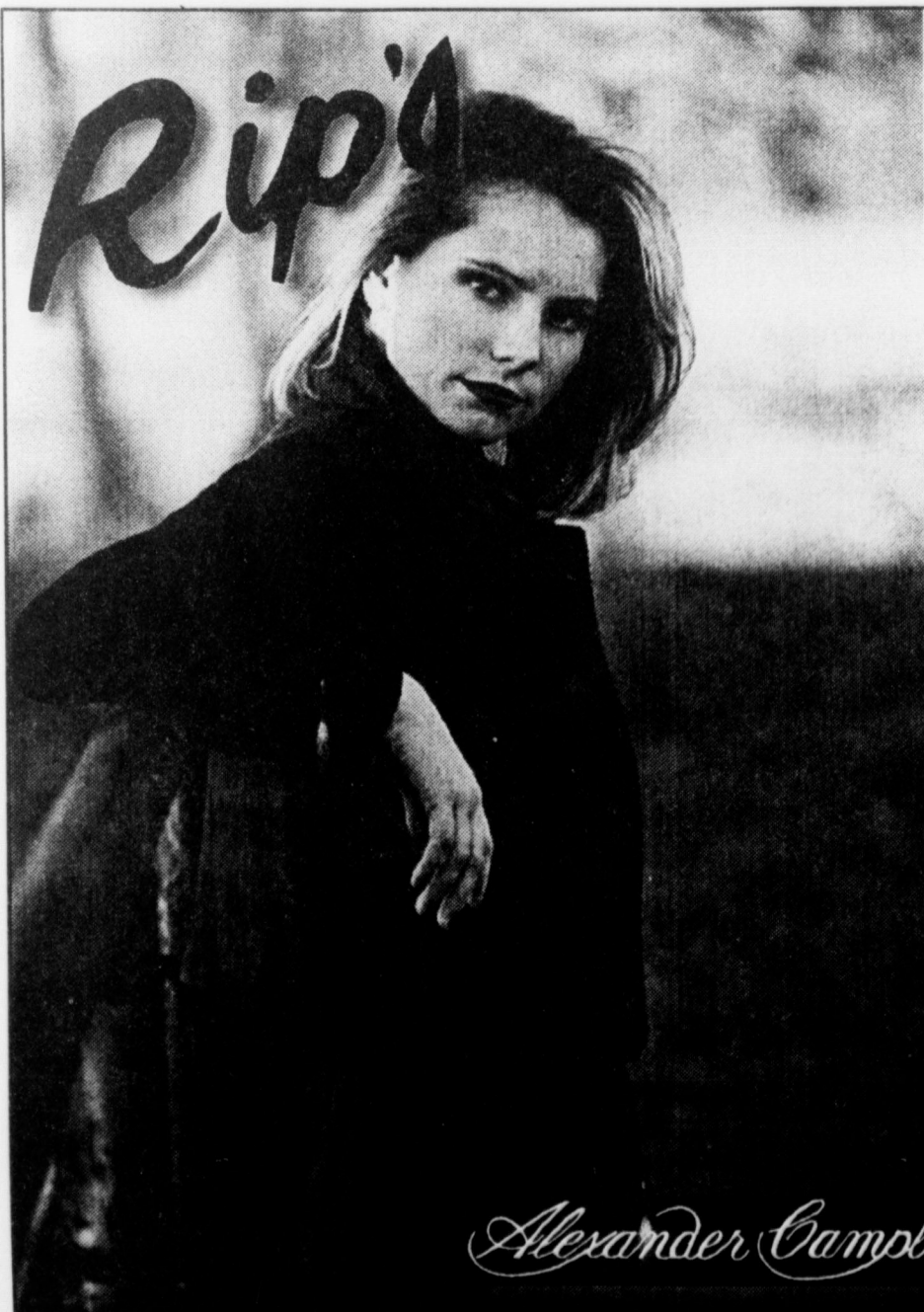

The seven LHS students will now advance to the UIL state

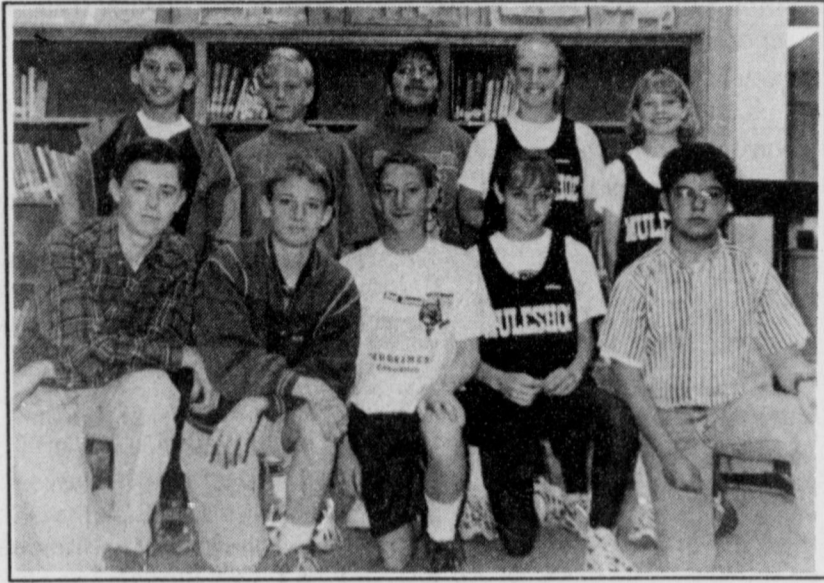
meet, which will be held in Austin May 1-3.

The computer science team used a fourth place individual finish by Cameron Turner and

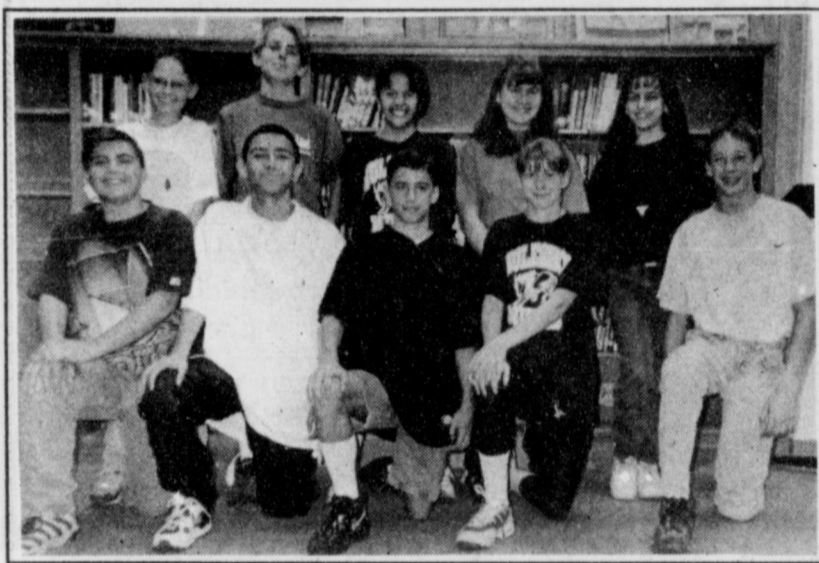
