Mendoza found guilty

Although found guilty of the July 4 murder of Rolando "Rollie" Sauceda, 19, a Bailey County jury came close to ignoring the request of Dist. Attorney Kathryn Gurley and sentenced Daniel Mendoza, 20, to only eight year incarceration.

Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding. 




