Borden County toughest test yet

■ Longhorns one game away from 6-man state finals

Lazbuddie is trying to reach a new frontier, hoping to go where no Longhorn team has gone before — the state finals.

The Longhorns play unbeaten Borden County in a state six-man semifinal game

at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Tiger Stadium in Wolfforth. A win would earn Lazbuddie its first trip to the state finals in school history.

Lazbuddie (12-1) reached the state semifinals once before, in 1992, but were manhandled by then four-time state champion Fort Hancock 84-49.

"We were out of our league that year, but I think we've got a good shot against Borden County," Lazbuddie coach Mark Scisson said.

Lazbuddie will have to play better than they did last week in a 52-44

quarterfinal win against unheralded and unranked Sands, a game Scisson admitted the fourth-ranked Longhorns were lucky to win.

"We need to do what got us here," Scisson said. "It's going to come down to basic blocking and tackling."

Scisson called No. 3 Borden County (13-0) a virtual carbon copy of his team in size, talent and experience.

"They play great defense, and have exceptional athletes," Scisson said.

Four Mules earn All 1-3A grid honors

Ricko Aguirre drew the attention of opponents every week and the respect of coaches on the All-District 1-3A football team.

The Muleshoe High School senior lineman was a two-way selection on the all-district teams released Monday and a near unanimous selection on both sides of the ball, according to Muleshoe head coach David Wood.

Muleshoe also had three players selected to the second team: senior cornerback Carlos Del Toro, junior running back Gilbert Vela and junior wide receiver Manuel Campolla.

Wood said getting four players named to the first two teams "was about what I expected."

"You're not going to get a whole lot of votes when you're at the bottom of the totem pole and rising," said Wood, who led the Mules to a 5-5 record overall and a 4-3 district mark in his second season at

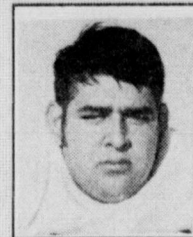

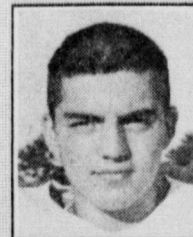

Weevils take bite out of cotton profits on the High Plains

LUBBOCK — Boll weevils caused an estimated 148 million worth of damage this year, according to cotton industry officials.

Insect inflicted damage resulted in an 18.4 percent drop in yields, according to an annual survey conducted for the National Cotton Council.

The survey found that losses by pest were 13.6 % for boll weevils, 1.5 % for boll worms, 1.5 % for cotton fleahoppers, with aphids, Lygus bugs, beat armyworms, thrips, spider mites, grasshoppers, European cotton borers and saltmarsh caterpillars making up the remaining 1.8 percent of the loss.

"The boll weevil accounted for 74% of the loss, with over fifty percent it occurring late in the growing season, according to Dr. James Leser, Extension Service entomologist at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Lubbock.

The late loss caught many growers by surprise when they defoliated and harvested their field, Leser said.

Leser reported that weevils could be found in 2.8 million acres, with 1.5 million acres receiving at least one chemical spraying application.

Last year, the numbers were 1.9 million acres infested and a half million acres treated.

"With record number of boll weevils over-

Muleshoe man killed Friday in ATV accident

A 38-year-old Muleshoe man died Friday when the ATV he was driving flipped over and landed on him.

Habell Rosas was transported to the Muleshoe Area Medical Center suffering from chest trauma, according to Bailey County EMS reports. He was pronounced dead shortly before 7 p.m.

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XL STEAKS



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Instant tenderness. The pipe dream of meat scientists slaving away in laboratories with gristle in the sink drains and walls the color of prison shower curtains.

But what kind of nightmare would happen if their dream came true?

In our quest for tender meat we have tried chemicals, hormones, enzymes, radon, lasers, embalming, Kenworths, massage, counseling and acid rain, plus other methods I'm too normal to think of. The latest stalagmite graph to hit the news was exploding meat.

Now, it's not that we don't know how to produce tender beef; youth plus grain plus carcass aging. But... we need a guarantee. Something instant, that breaks down muscle cell walls and renders the meat almost liver-like in texture.

So, let's say ACME Munitions and Sirloin invents a process that requires an extra 30 seconds on the kill floor, adds five dollars to the carcass price (which will be deducted from the live purchase price, of course) and guarantees at the final product will melt in your mouth.

Suddenly grass fat will be indistinguishable from prime beef. Arm roast will be as tender as filet mignon, Vold's rodeo roping cull will be equivalent to certified Angus beef. Six year old Holstein cows will cut like veal.

Considering this scenario, make note of the fact that 80% of the corn grown in the U.S. is used as livestock feed. But what's to say they couldn't be slaughtered at their logically most efficient point, say between 500 and 700 lbs.

Whoops, that would put feedyards out of the picture. But

cattle feeders could seek other thrills like Ag banking or the race horse business.

Packers would buy directly from ranches, farmers, stockers and sale barns. They would be dealing with thousands of independent suppliers instead of the hundreds of feedyards. More local packers would appear. The 'monopoly' would be broken.

Purebred breeders would go back to creating critters designed for regional geographies, calving ease and early performance. The grand champion fat steer would go the way of the Stanley Steamer.

Since all cuts of meat would be equally tender and, I assume, equal in flavor, restaurants would eliminate entrees like T-bone, rib eye and neck meat. They would adopt the Taiwanese clothing manufacturers designations of S, M, L, XL.

Consumers would get a consistent product. Steak is the most popular beef dish in American homes, hamburger is second. But since the shank is as tender as the New York cut, it could all be sold as an "ACME Tender Steak-size M. Everybody's happy.

I'm sure there are more possible ramifications of instant tenderness, but it would surely change the face of the cow business we know it. We've come a long way from the ancient native American method of tenderizing meat by hanging a haunch from a tree limb for three weeks and letting flies blow it, which would work, I'm told, but for the busy housewife, it just takes too much time.

from being realized," Leser said.

Leser suggests that growers closely follow the Extension

Service's guidelines for boll weevil management and target for an early crop if they hope to

dodge another bad boll weevil year.

More detailed information

will be available soon from county Extension agents and Plains Cotton Growers in an updated version of the publication, "Boll Weevil management in the Texas High Plains."

Longhorns avoid upset with poise

NEW DEAL — Brice Foster left a trail of bodies sprawled on the straw-yellow turf as he crossed the goal line.

The Lazbuddie senior's 53-yard run with 2:02 left had just shattered unheralded and unranked Sands' dreams of pulling off a major upset in Friday's Region I six-man championship game at Faubion Memorial Field.

Shrugging off being knocked woozy in the second quarter and having his right shoulder pop out of its socket late in the game, Foster ran for 168 yards and scored five touchdowns in a 52-44 win that moved the Longhorns into the state semifinals for the second time in school history.

The fourth-ranked Longhorns were able to escape with a win despite an inspired effort by Sands. Mustang coach Billy Barnett did a super job of having his team ready to play.

Sands steamrolled Lazbuddie for 30 first-quarter points by dominating the line of scrimmage and outthitting the stunned Longhorns.

But Lazbuddie managed to hang in the game, thanks to a pair of kickoff returns for touchdowns by Adam St. Clair and Foster.

Finally, Lazbuddie turned it around in the second and third quarters by simply lining up and running over the smaller Mustangs.

In the second half, the Longhorns used 6-6, 240-pound Jason Thomas as a lead blocker, which looked like a combine bearing down on a prairie dog.

"I wouldn't get in front of him," said Foster, who also scored on runs of 40, 19 and 5 yards.

Having already missed six games this season with a broken right arm wasn't about to miss any more time, Foster said.

"This is my senior year and I'm going to do what I have to do," said Foster, admitting he was still feeling the effects of taking a knee to the helmet at times during the second half.

A play of two from being blown out

in the first half, Lazbuddie found a way to win, the way champions do.

And there were plenty of unsung heroes.

Like quarterback Josh Morris, who ignored his worst passing effort of the year and a vicious first quarter hit to deliver the key kickoff block on Foster's game-breaking run.

Like St. Clair, a 1,500-yard rusher who has unselfishly slid over to let Foster get most of the carries.

Buckaroos bounce Perryton

LUBBOCK — A nightmare first half ended Perryton's bid to reach the state quarterfinals for the second time in five years.

Unbeaten Breckenridge (13-0) converted four Perryton first-half turnovers into 19 points and crushed the Rangers 54-17 Friday in a Class 3A regional playoff game at Lowery Field.

Workhorse Allan Adkison

finished a stellar senior season with 187 yards and two touchdowns on 28 carries as the District 1-3A runnerup Rangers finished the season 9-4.

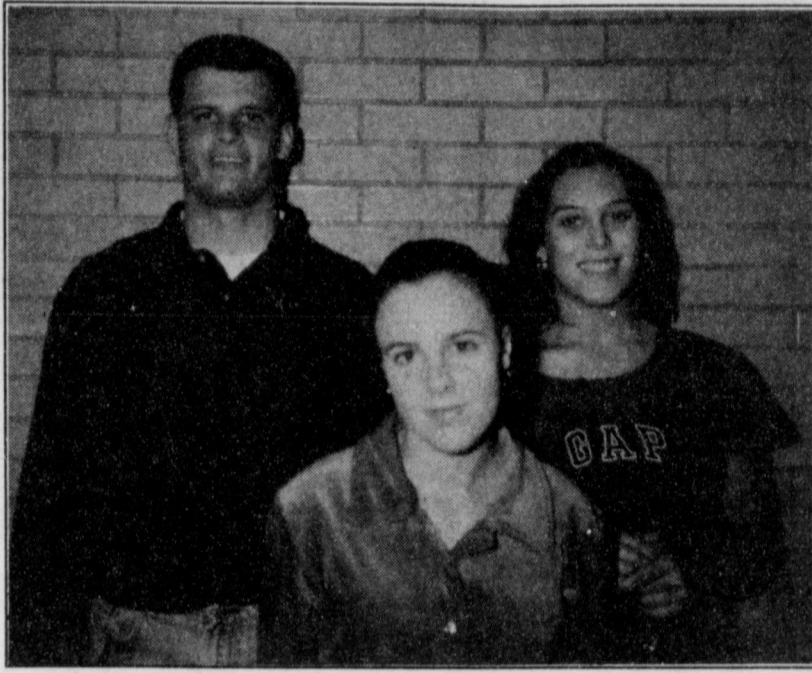

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
