A once promising dryland wheat crop is wilting in the wind.

Bailey County Extension Service agent Curtis Preston said Tuesday the area's dryland wheat is in dire need of moisture.

"The prospects for a good dryland crop were pretty good three weeks ago, but the wind has dried it out," Preston said. "It's not lost yet, but it's in need of immediate rain."

Irrigated wheat is in much better shape, Preston said.

"We still have a chance to have an above average crop if the irrigated wheat gets some rain because the winter moisture got it off to such a good start," Preston said.

Wheat is entering the critical

heading stage when the wheat \$2.75-\$2.85 a bushel. needs plenty of water.

Strong winds could make for weak dryland wheat crop

Preston estimated about 50,000 acres of winter wheat is planted in Bailey County, of which only about 10,000 is harvested.

Most of the wheat is used for grazing cattle or for hay.

The current market price for red winter wheat in Bailey County is

The statewide wheat forecast is favorable, according to the Texas Agriculture Statistics Services, which estimated a 5 percent increase in the wheat harvest over 1997 and a 66 percent jump from the drought-plagued 1996 crop.

The first national wheat forecast will be released May 12.

City Council discusses need for new emergency systems

Two local emergency communication systems are in desperate need of revamping, but the Muleshoe City Council is concerned that the city's already stretched budget may not be able to handle the needed overhauls.

During Tuesday's City Council meeting, Chief of Police Don Carter and Bailey County Emergency Management coordinator Todd Ellis both discussed the need to replace two different emergency communication systems that would cost the city around \$70,000.

Carter said the police department needs to replace the back up generator used by local law enforcement and 911 dispatchers during power outages. He told the council that the existing generator, which was used when it was purchased 18 years ago, is inoperable and a shock hazard.

Carter recommended that the City of Muleshoe invest approximately \$20,750 to replace the existing generator and install a battery backup system.

The Council agreed to solicit bids for a new system, however, Mayor Robert Montgomery said the city needs to seriously consider buying a salvaged system rather than a new one because of the city's current economic situation.

City manager James Fisher, not committing to any specific amount, said that if the cost is reasonable, this year's budget could probably be rearranged to cover the expense of replacing the emergency generator.

The second emergency communication issue con-

Muleshoe library receives foundation grant

The Muleshoe Area Public Library recently received a \$13,896 grant from the Tocker Foundation.

The grant will be used to refurbish the library's reference section, computer stations, and with other plans in making the library a better resource.

The grant will help the library provide patrons with access to computers and the Internet. Portions of the grant will be used to build two computer desks to house six stations. A Telecommunication Infrastructure Fund has provided the Internet connection, two new computers and a printer.

The grant will also be used to help provide a safer children's section with the purchase of eight new chairs. The current chairs are too short for the tables, and tip over easily.

Muleshoe librarian Dyan Shipley also plans to use the money to help make the library more user-friendly and welcoming.

Hanging signs, which will designate the different sections within the library, will be purchased to help patrons find books easier.

The library's reference section will also be enhanced by

the grant to provide a better information center to meet the patron's educational needs.

The Tocker grant will help purchase shelving for an increased reference section to be filled with materials purchased by the Texas Library Foundation grant awarded to the library last month.

Also being purchased is a new circulation desk to be built by Marshall Cook of Mule-

shoe. The desk will accommodate the circulation computer, laminating machine and two computer card catalogs, as well as the desk for assistant librarian, Linda Lopez.

The final expenditure allocated from the grant is an update of the library's electrical wiring to handle the inreased load created by the added computers.

Deadline nears for corn board position

Voting for a director's position on the Texas Corn Producers Board will end May 1.

Two producers have been nominated as candidates for an expiring director's post in TCPB Voting Region 2, which includes Bailey, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Hartley and Parmer counties.

The candidates are incumbent director Jimmy Wedel of Muleshoe and Leroy Burnett who lives near Friona, accord ing to Jerry Don Glover, TCPB executive director.

TCPB is conducting its biennial election in four of its eight voting regions to elect five board members where current members' seats are expiring.

"The election is under the guidelines of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law," said Glover. "We encourage Texas corn producers within the regions to take part in this important election."

Wedel farms about 1,200 acres of food corn and yellow feed corn near Muleshoe in Bailey County. He also farms cotton, wheat, grain sorghum and several specialty crops, along with raising stocker cattle. He is secretary of the Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership Alumni Associa-

Burnett's operation in parmer County includes corn, cotton, grain sorghum, wheat and cattle production on 480 acres. He has been in the farming business since 1956.

Producers are eligible to vote in this election if he or she is currently a producer of corn or has produced corn for at least one production period three years prior to May 1, 1998.

Ballots are available through TCPB, 218 E. Bedford, Dimmitt, TX 79027, grain elevators or a county extension office in the voting region.

TCPB is a research and promotion program for corn funded by a uniform corn checkoff collected on a refund basis from corn producers in every county of Texas.

cerned new emergency warning sirens for the city.

Ellis pitched a new threesiren alarm system to the council that would alert citizens of potential dangers, including storms, tornadoes, hazardous spills, and other threatening situations.

recommended installing three sirens throughout town. The sirens would have dual capabilities — being able to emit a siren or transmit a voice mes-

dents are alerted to potential danger by local radio and tele-

vision stations, by emergency personnel going door to door, and by blaring the sirens of emergency vehicles as they are driven through town.

The proposed new system, which would spread three sirens throughout the city, costs about \$54,000. Montgomery, in agreement with other coun-The emergency committee cil members, again said they are concerned about the city's emergency warning services, but realistically, a new system can not be in place overnight from a financial perspective.

"I'm definitely concerned about our citizens safety," said Montgomery, "but I certainly don't want to burden the public with more fees and more taxa-

In order to defer the expense, Ellis recommended the council might want to consider buying into the system gradually — one this year, a second siren next year or the year after, and a third one down the road.

Montgomery assured Ellis that during the next budget cycle the council will make an effort to try and set aside funds in the city's budget to at least get the project started.

With that ol'Dewey handed me the hook.

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
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Making things convenient

Mules snare title in record fashion

■ Three marks fall in District 1-3A junior high meet

Spurred by record-setting performances by Kyle Atwood and Stephan Shelburne Saturday, Watson Junior High School romped to the 8th-grade boystitle in District 1-3A South Zone track meet held at Benny Douglass Stadium.

Atwood, Jaime Mendoza and Lincoln Riley were all double winners as WJHS piled up 224 points. Dimmitt was second with 168 points.

In the seventh grade meet, WJHS finished third behind Friona and Dimmitt.

Atwood broke his own record in the 800 meters by nearly four seconds with a time of 2:07.52 and later captured the 400 with a time of 55.67.

Shelburne cleared 10 foot, 8 inches in the pole vault. The old record was 10-6.

Mendoza helped the Mules dominate the sprints, winning the 100 meters with a time of 12.04 and the 200 in 25.03. Teammate Fermin Gonzales

finished second in the 1200 and third in the 200.

Riley cruised to an easy win in the 110-meter hurdles with a time of 17.68 and added the 300-meter hurdles title with a time of 46.03.


WJHS also received wins from David Burciaga in the discus (116-5), Bradley Thomason in the shot put (43-11 3/4), Landon Kerby in the long jump (17-0) and in both relays.

The 400-meter relay team of Mendoza, Thomason, Daniel Johnson and Jesus Tovar took the top spot with a time of 48.99 and the 1600-meter relay of Tovar, Johnson, Riley and Atwood won in 3:58.74.

Friona dominated the 7thgrade meet, finishing with 227 1/2 points. Dimmitt was second with 161 points followed by Muleshoe with 94.
