Second murder trial began Wednesday

The trial of murder suspect Michael Garcia is set to begin Wednesday, Jan. 19, with the jury selection in the morning, according to Bailey County officials.

Garcia has been charged in the July 4, 2010, murder of Roloando

"Rollie" Saucedo, 19, at 202 W. Fifth in Muleshoe, and has been incarcerated pending trial since his July 12 arrest.

In November 2010, co-defendant Daniel Mendoza was found guilty by a Bailey County jury for his involvement in the murder, and sentenced him to eight

years incarceration.

While Dist. Attorney Kathryn Gurley made no effort in the November trial to place the murder weapon in the hands of Mendoza, defense attorney David Martinez of Lubbock said it was his intent to place the gun in the hands of Wednesday's defendant,

Michael Garcia.

"You're not going to hear we know who fired the shots," Gurley said in her opening arguments in the Mendoza trial.

However, Gurley added that Mendoza and Garcia were the only two people who could have fired the shots from the alley across from 202

W. Fifth, one of which allegedly struck and killed Saucedo.

In his trial, Mendoza took the stand and denied ever possessing or even asking for the firearm.

"Michael Garcia had the gun," Mendoza testified from the witness stand.

- Received a report on the district's benchmark testing in which it was noted the results from DeShazo Elementary

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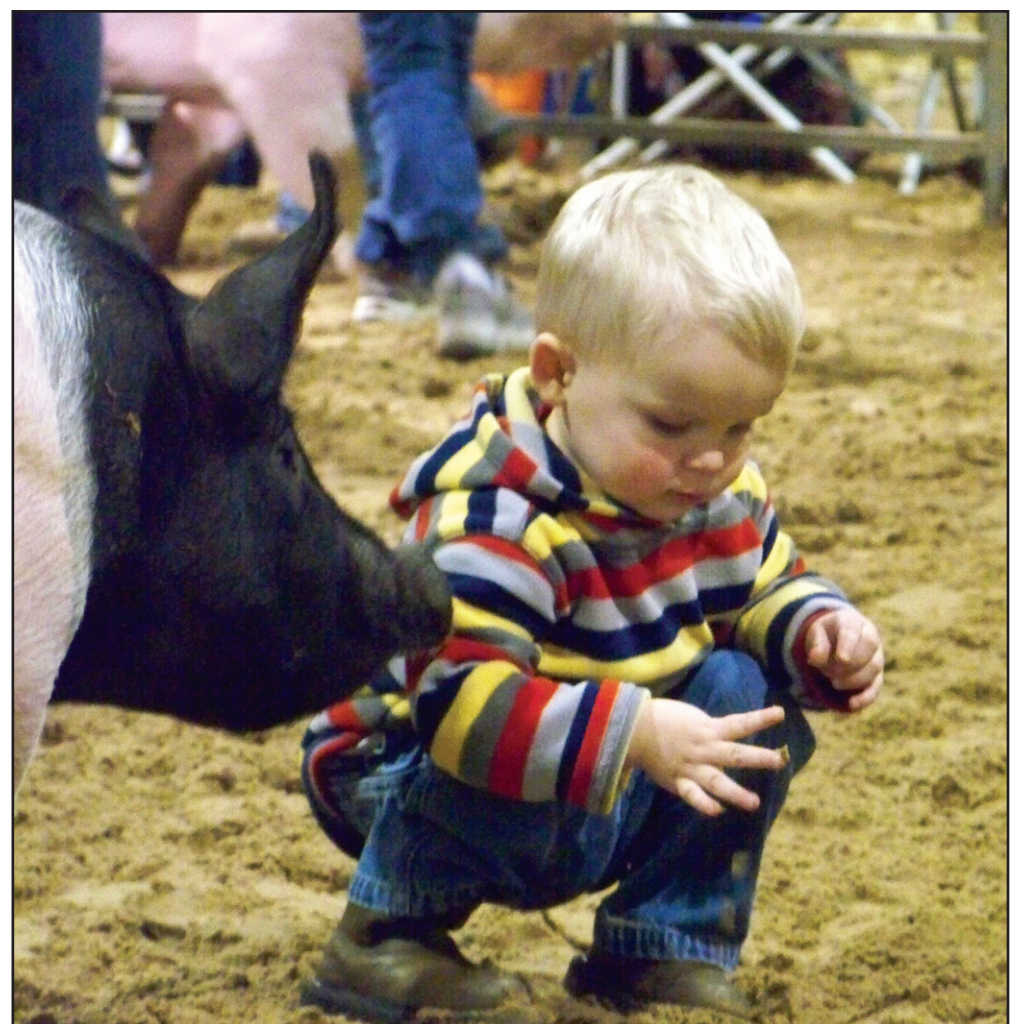

Parmer County communities top sales tax list

Looking at the county averages for sales tax allocations puts Parmer County at the top of the list, with the three communities listed in the monthly sales tax allocation — Farwell, Bovina and Friona, at 37.69 percent.

At the bottom of the list is Castro County, with its single listed

community, Dimmitt, showing a loss of 4.38 percent, or \$1,100.76

Other single-community counties included Bailey, with a 2.46 percent increase for the City of Muleshoe compared to the sales tax allocation from the same period last year. And Morton, in Cochran County, with a 31.18 percent increase, the largest among the single-

community counties.

Of the Parmer County communities, Bovina shows the largest percentage of increase, 52.45 percent, representing an actual dollar increase of \$2,667.75. Friona followed with a 46.78 percent, or \$9,022.13, increase.

Of the Lamb County communities listed in the monthly sales tax allocation race, Earth,

with a 40.79 percent increase, or \$1,140.18, took the lead this month, followed by Sudan with a \$784.40, or 23.9 percent, increase.

Littlefield's receipts showed the smallest increase — a 3.07 percent drop in its sales tax allocation compared to last years totals at the same period.

'Sit back, relax, and enjoy this documentary'

The last thing I wanted to do on a recent trip to San Antonio was to have to think much.

Thinking is work and I do it poorly. I just wanted to relax. But my wife and I took a tour to a couple of the vintage San Antonio missions, and — here's the mistake — watched a documentary video, and...

The nice volunteer lady at the first mission did a pretty good job (in a bit of a ditzy sort of way) filling us in on some of the history of the place. Established in 1731, it really has some history.

We hurried through the tour so we could get back to the Visitor Center for the last movie about the missions of San Antonio. A good bit of it was quite well done, but I admit that I found myself increasingly bugged by the unacknowledged but very apparent philosophy behind the documentary.

What would you call it? Political correctness? Air-headed (and very intolerant) liberalism? Secular humanism? All of the above?

I wanted to ask our guide (who loved the video) some questions, but I thought better of it.

Are you sure that the Indians — I mean,

Native Americans — were always unfaithfully in the right?

I don't doubt the Christian missionaries at times made serious mistakes and worse, but do you really believe the native peoples never did?

I don't doubt that every culture has much to learn from other cultures, but aren't some beliefs and practices actually better than others?

I don't doubt that missionaries should respect and learn from the many customs of indigenous folks that are worthy of respect, but if they find folks drinking warm blood out of their uncle's skull, is it really a bad idea to encourage some better customs?

(Forgive me. I used the word "better," implying that there might actually be some objective standard of right and wrong and that some things, beliefs, and practices might truly be better than others.)

I don't doubt that in cultures other than our own folks have seen some genuine truth and that

some real diamonds may glimmer even within some largely pagan religions.

I don't doubt that people have at times truly worshiped the Creator even though they might not have known His real name, and that we can learn some things from them.

But — work with me here — "if" it is possible to actually truly know God's name, and "if" he really has actually in written revelation told us about the name and work of a genuine Savior, aren't indigenous peoples better off knowing his

name and being taught about that Savior?

Such questions are, I know, hopelessly out of fashion. As G. K. Chesterton once wrote, "We are on the road to producing a race of man too mentally modest to believe in the multiplication table."

It seems so harsh to believe in objective standards. It seems so intolerant to believe that two times two always equals four.

But it is still true. If a thing is actually true, we should not be embarrassed about believing it and encouraging others to.

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ELAP deadline is Jan. 31

Kim Hanlin, executive director of USDA's Farm Service Agency in Bailey County, reminds producers they have until Monday, Jan. 31, to submit an application for payment under the 2010 Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honey Bees, and Farm-raised Fish Program (ELAP).

ELAP provides emergency assistance to eligible producers of livestock, honeybees and farm-raised fish who have losses due to disease, adverse weather or other conditions, including losses due to blizzards and wildfires.

ELAP assistance is for losses not covered under other disaster assistance programs established by the 2008 Farm Bill. FSA is authorized to spend up to \$50 million per year nationwide to provide emergency relief for ELAP eligible losses.

tax collections and January allocations to local governments represent sales that occurred in November.

According to information received

from the office of State Comptroller Susan Combs the state sales tax revenue in December was \$1.81 billion, up 9.4 percent compared to December 2009.

"This marks the ninth consecutive month of year-over-year improvement in sales tax revenues, with increases posted across the board," Commissioners

Combs said in a recent press release. "There were increases in the oil and natural gas and manufacturing sectors reflecting recovering business spending. Sales

tax in the retail trade and restaurant sectors were also up," she said.

"As I outlined in this week's Biennial Revenue Estimate, we forecast growth in sales tax revenue for the current fiscal year as well as the next two fiscal years."

This month, Combs' office sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their first sales tax allocations of 2011.

Local sales tax revenues of \$453.2 million are up 11.9 percent compared to January 2010.

Combs will send

January sales tax allocations of \$302.6 million to Texas cities, up 10.3 percent compared to January 2010.

Texas counties will receive sales tax payments of \$28.5 million, up 17.3 percent compared to last January.

In addition, \$18.9 million will go to 175 special purpose taxing districts around the state, up 16.8 percent compared to last January.

Ten local transit systems will get \$103.1 million in sales tax allocations, up 14.4 percent compared to the same period in 2010.

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

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
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

Ricky 'Rick' Joe Smallwood



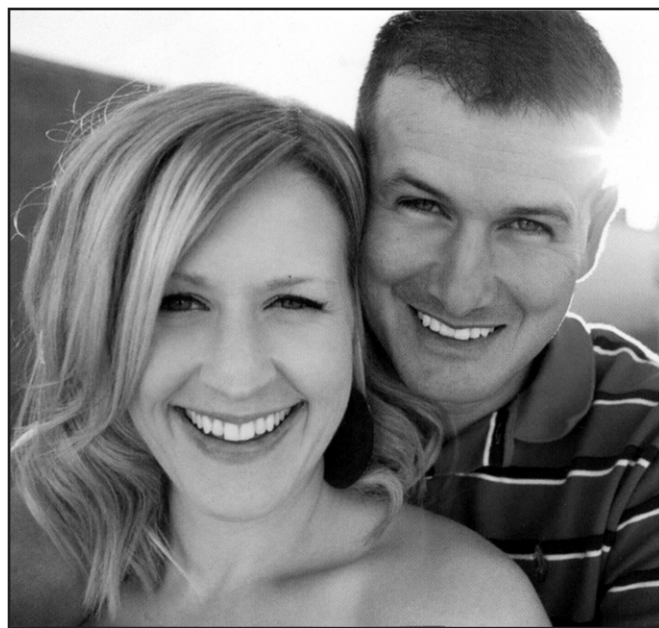

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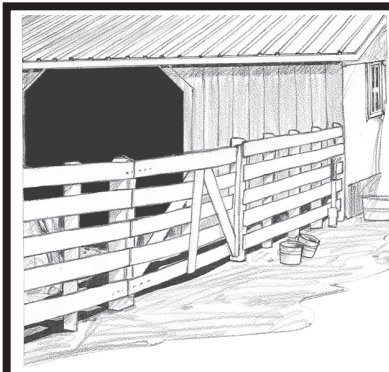
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A call for peace at Ephesus

A call for peace at Ephesus...

That seems to be the main purpose of Paul's writing to them. It is thought by some that it was not written exclusively for the church at Ephesus, but for some other churches also.

And briefly speaking he laid the foundation for peaceful living by his comments regarding marriage, some of which are; "wives submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord and husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it."

And he called on them "to be followers of God as dear children, and walk in love, as Christ hath also loved us." And we find the basis of his concern when he went to Ephesus, as recorded in Acts Chapter 20. So beginning with verse 17 we give study and thought to the end of the chapter.

"And from Miletus he sent to Ephesus, and called for the elders of the church. And when they were come unto him, he said unto them ye know, from the first day that I came into Asia, after what manner I have been

with you at all seasons. Serving the Lord with all humanity of mind, and with many tears, and temptations, which befell me by the lying in wait of the Jews."

"And how I kept back nothing that was profitable unto you, but have shewed you, and have taught you publicly, and from house to house, Testifying both to the Jews, and also to the Greeks, repentance toward God, and Faith towards out Lord Jesus Christ."

Paul then said he was going bound in the spirit unto Jerusalem not knowing the things that might await him except he would suffer bonds and afflictions.

"But none of those things move me, (wrote Paul). Neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, the ministry, which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God."

"And now behold I know that ye all, among whom I have gone

Preaching the Kingdom of God, shall see my face no more. Wherefore I take you to record this day, that I am pure from the blood of all men, for I have not shunned to declare unto you all the counsel of God." Note: "All the counsel of God."

It will not be possible to present all I have in mind in this one article, but I will try to complete it in the next one, which I hope will be next week.

I do however spend most of my time doing what I can in this type work, and helping others with their problems.

And I like to think of Paul as a guide, or as he said in Timothy, that Christ should show forth in him through all longsuffering a pattern to those that might hereafter believe on him to life everlasting.

So now we will return to the Book of Acts, and to Paul's comments as he made ready to leave. Beginning with verse 28.

"Take thereafter unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made thee overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood. For I know this, that after my departing grievous wolves shall enter in among you, not sparing the flock."

"Also of your own selves shall men arise, speaking perverse things to draw away disciples after them. Thereafter watch, and remember, that by the space of three years I ceased not to warn every one night and day with tears."

And I commend you to God and to the word of his grace which is able to build you up and give you and inheritance, he said.

And finally, as he prepared to leave he kneeled down and prayed with them all. They wept sore and kissed him, but they sorrowed most because they would see his face no more.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

In accordance with the provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code, Chapter 74, Subchapter D, and 4 Tex. Admin. Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a board election in the Northwest Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, in order to select a representative of the above-referenced zone to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The Northwest Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone consists of all of Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Lamb and Parmer counties; and that part of Randall County that lies north and west of a line running along Highway 60 from the Deaf Smith County line east to Interstate 27; then running north along Interstate Highway 27 to the Potter County line.

Any person eligible to vote in the board member election that resides in the Northwest Plains Zone and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place their name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below. Nomination forms are provided by the Department and must be signed by the nominee and at least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received by the Department at its office located in Austin by February 7, 2011, and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting the Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.

The board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed to cotton growers by February 22, 2011. All ballots cast by mail must be postmarked no later than March 9, 2011, in order to be valid. Any cotton grower having planted cotton in the year 2010 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and, if he or she resides in the Northwest Plains Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, can have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton intended to be commercial cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm, or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm or from an indemnity or other payment received from or related to the planting, growing, or failure of the cotton.
