Scisson wearing two hats this fall

LAZBUDDIE — Like many who move into administration from coaching, Mark Scisson said the two professions share many of the same philosophies.

After seven years as head coach of the highly successful Lazbuddie football program, Scisson has taken over the responsibilities of school

principal this fall.

"My philosophies as a football coach are the same as teaching in the classroom," said Scisson, who replaces Hardy Carlyle, now school superintendent. "Every kid can learn, they just learn at different levels and different ways."

Again using a football analogy, Scisson said it's important

that he demands from his teaching and students only what he demands of himself — a 100 percent effort.

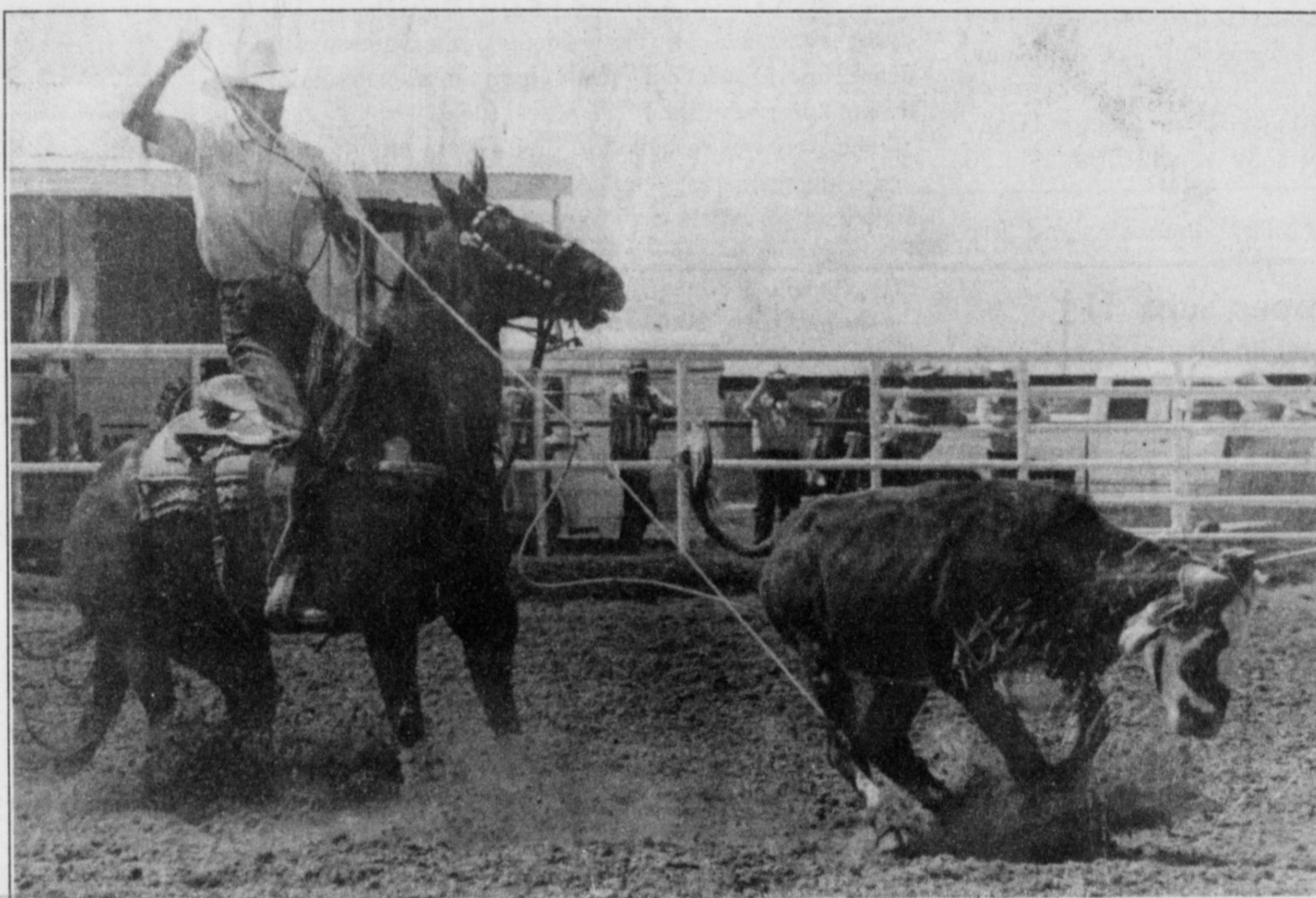
As Lazbuddie principal, he is responsible for kindergarten through grade 12 (about 200 students).

LABOR OF LOVE

Rotary Roping another huge success

No one welcomed Monday's holiday more than the members of the Muleshoe Rotary Club.

After the club's annual team roping drew 918 teams to Dusty Rhodes Arena over the weekend, it was truly a break from labor for the Muleshoe Rotarians.

The festivities began Saturday and continued past midnight, only to resume Sunday morning at 9 a.m. The final event of the weekend, the No. 6, ended about 2:15 a.m. Monday.

But the Rotarians' weekend didn't end there, as one service project ran into another. Faced with another short night of sleep before having to put up flags at area businesses for the holiday, the club and their wives banded together. They went straight from the roping to the streets to get the flags out before heading home for a needed rest.

"Things really went well," said Thurman Myers, a Rotarian who is also a partner in CLT Roping Productions, the stock contractor for the Rotary Roping. "The Rotary guys and their wives come to work and they stay hooked."

The Rotary Roping is the club's major fund raiser each year and has become one of the biggest events of its kind in the region, drawing ropers from as many as five states. Area businesses also pitch in with sponsorships, allowing the funds raised from the event to go to community projects.

While the number of teams was down slightly from the 1997 event, the decline is likely due to ropers being restricted to five different partners in each roping as opposed to a entry restriction of six a year ago.

Saturday night's events were made

for team roping enthusiasts. An open rodeo run kicked off the event, with some of the top ropers in the U.S. competing in a one-head, high-speed format. Matt Davis and Levi Garcia set the stage for what was ahead, coming tight in 6.46 on the first run of the night.

The time held through 21 teams before Jerad Norris and Travis Goad blistered the field with a 5.91 to claim first place and \$470 each. Davis and Garcia were second, claimed \$353 each, while former PRCA All-Around and Timed Event champion Jimmie Cooper and partner Walter Donnell were third in 6.85. They earned \$235 each. Kurt Kiehne and Scott Wilson were third with a 6.94 and won \$117 each.

The No. 11 that followed was also

DC poses big hurdle for Mules

Muleshoe's football program is no doubt on the rise, but still lacking the big win that will stamp the Mules as a legitimate playoff contender.

A win over perennial playoff contender Denver City Friday will take care of that.

Kickoff for the Mules' home opener at Benny Douglass Stadium is 8 p.m.

"Anytime you can beat a pre-season playoff team, it says a lot about your program and where it is headed," Muleshoe head coach David Wood said. "In order to obtain some of our team goals this season, we're going to have to beat Denver City or Dimmitt — or both."

The Mules (1-0) opened their season with a methodical 23-0 win against Portales, N.M. but face a much bigger task this week against the tradition-rich Mustangs.

Denver City, which rallied to beat Pecos 20-14 last week, has been one of the top Class 3A programs in the South Plains for eons.

"They're not a typical Denver City team," Wood said. "Overall, they're not as big as last year. But they're still a solid football team."

Wood said he expects a close, hard-hitting game.

"Our defense wasn't really tested last week," said Wood after the Mules manhandled Portales, holding the Rams' unimaginative and conservative offense to 52 yards and three first downs.

Denver City's slippery senior quarterback Luis Villegas will make sure the Mules' defense doesn't go unchallenged two weeks in a row.

Villegas rushed for 191 yards and three touchdowns last week against Pecos, including a game-winning 37-yard scamper with two minutes left in the game that capped a 14-point, fourth-quarter comeback.

Wood said Villegas will probably be the best quarterback the Mules will face all season.

"He makes them go," said Wood, comparing Villegas to former River Road quarterback Jerod Fikac. "You know he's going to make some big runs, you just don't want to let him kill you."

Denver City, which shutout

AUSTIN — Preliminary Department of Public Safety reports indicate at least 37 people died on Texas Highways during the Labor Day holiday.

At least four of the deaths were alcohol-related, according to the DPS.

More than one third of the 40 people who entered the contest this week picked at least 15 of the 18 games correctly as local favorites Muleshoe,

Lazbuddie, Three Way, Texas Tech and Dallas all won.

Games involving District 2-3A teams Littlefield and Shallowater gave contestants the most problems, along with Notre Dame's upset of Michigan.

a team roping work of art, featuring a six-head format, as opposed to the typical four-head at most team ropings. The pot was sweetened with \$1,000 in added money.

Royce Zybach and Shane Goad averaged 9.072 seconds on six head to claim first place with a 54.43 total time on six. They won \$1,466 per man.

Zybach and Goad had roped their first five head in 43.28 and held a margin of more than five seconds on the field going into the short round.

Second went to Clay Lewis

and Garcia, who came out of the sixth call back with an 8.82 for a 57.84 on six and won \$1,213 each. Garcia also won a share of third with Matt Davis. Each took home \$960.

Garcia, a native of Roy, NM, took home \$2,526 for his night's work.

Sunday's schedule included four ropings, all with four-head formats. Jim Taylor trophy saddles were awarded to average winners in each roping.

In the No. 9, John Copeland of Lubbock and Sid Morris of Lazbuddie teamed for a 33.58 time

on four and won \$661 each in addition to the saddles. The fast team back, Copeland and Morris used a 9.08 in the short round to seal the win. New Mexicans Trey Wheeler and Kress Jones were close behind with a 33.97.

The No. 8 roping saw Brand Reysted and Shane Goad wrap up four in 33.37 to win \$912 per man. The duo was the second fast team back and had an 8.06 in the short round.

In the No. 7, the largest roping of the weekend (236 teams), Josh Morris of Lazbuddie and Leland Wood teamed up for a 35.63 time

on four and took home \$1,110 each. Their 8.79 in the short round held up easily after the fast team back missed their final steer.

Todd Hughes and Rick Meason used a 9.29 in the short round to claim the No. 6 roping and \$865 per man. They bested Chance Tatum and Toby Trammel, who were the second team back and had moved to first with a 9.56 run on moments before.

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Youngsters surprise winners of Goat Roping championship

Coli Hunt of Muleshoe and Sterling Via of Lazbuddie took home handmade buckles Saturday after winning the Joe's Boot Shop goat team roping world championship.

Representing the 10-13 age group, Coli and Sterling roped their short-round goat in 9.37, but were tagged with a five-second penalty for catching just one hind leg.

But the pair made it stand, as none of the other age-group winners managed a clean run. The closest team were 20-29 winners Todd McDaniels and Randy Davis, both of Hereford, who had a 15.66, including a five-second fine.

Just two of the remaining six teams (winners of the eight respective age groups made it to the championship round) managed a time. The 14-16 winners, Jojo Lemond of Andrews, TX and Jake Cooper of Monument, NM, went three loops to record a 19.44. They had posted the day's fastest time, a 2.73, in the first round.

The 6-under winners, Anderson Gruhlkey and Garrison Myers of Muleshoe, managed a 53.50 in the final

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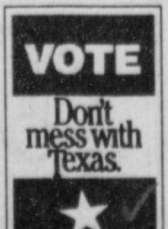

BROWNFIELD — Even a bout with mononucleosis can't slow Stacy Locker down.

The Muleshoe junior standout finished second at the Brownfield Jamboree Saturday in the Lady Mules' first cross country meet of the season while still recovering from the strength-sapping illness.

Shallowater sophomore Victoria Lomos won the meet, covering the 1.8 mile course in 11 minutes and 33 seconds. Locker finished three seconds back at 11:36.

In the boys meet, freshman Kyle Atwood began his promising high school career with a 10th-place finish.

Locker's runner-up finish plus a 25th-place finish by junior Lynsie Black (12:49) and a 28th-place finish by freshman Terrell Herington (12:54) helped the Lady Mules finish fourth with 126 points in the Class 3A-4A-5A meet.

District 2-3A favorite Shallowater, with five runners in the top 20, handily won the meet with 42 points. Dimmitt finished second with 76 points and Lubbock Coronado third

with 124 points.

Shallowater senior Ryan Cruz cruised to the boys Class 3A-4A-5A title, blistering the three-mile course with a time of 15:42 and winning by 39 seconds.

Atwood finished in 17:40. Jerrell Otwell placed 43rd (19:54) and Clint Black 50th (20:35) for the Mules, who finished sixth with 147 points.

Host Brownfield won the

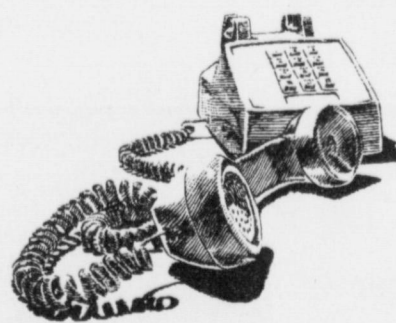

"Jesus Chapel is quick, has a lot of speed, and does a lot of things well," James said.

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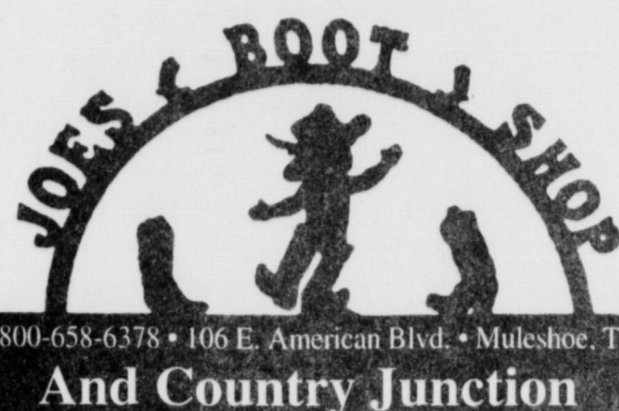

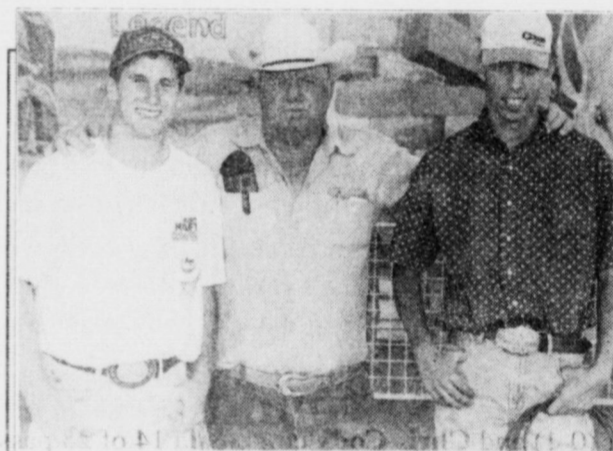

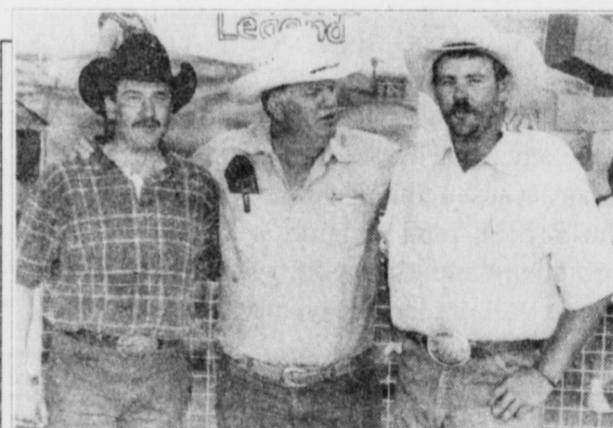

Changes in poultry processing

The Agriculture Department last week announced a new rule that would bar poultry processors from adding water to chicken carcasses without disclosing the extra weight to consumers.

Poultry producers have long complained that the practice is unfair because additional moisture in beef, pork or lamb is forbidden, and that poultry should fall under the same rules.

Producers contend the chilling process for chicken adds as much as 8 percent water to the carcasses, yet there was no requirement for processors to mention the extra weight on the food label. The new proposal would require processors

to disclose on the label the maximum water weight used in processing the poultry.

The USDA's proposal also would ban the addition of water unless processors can prove it is a byproduct of chilling and washing processes necessary to meet food safety requirements.

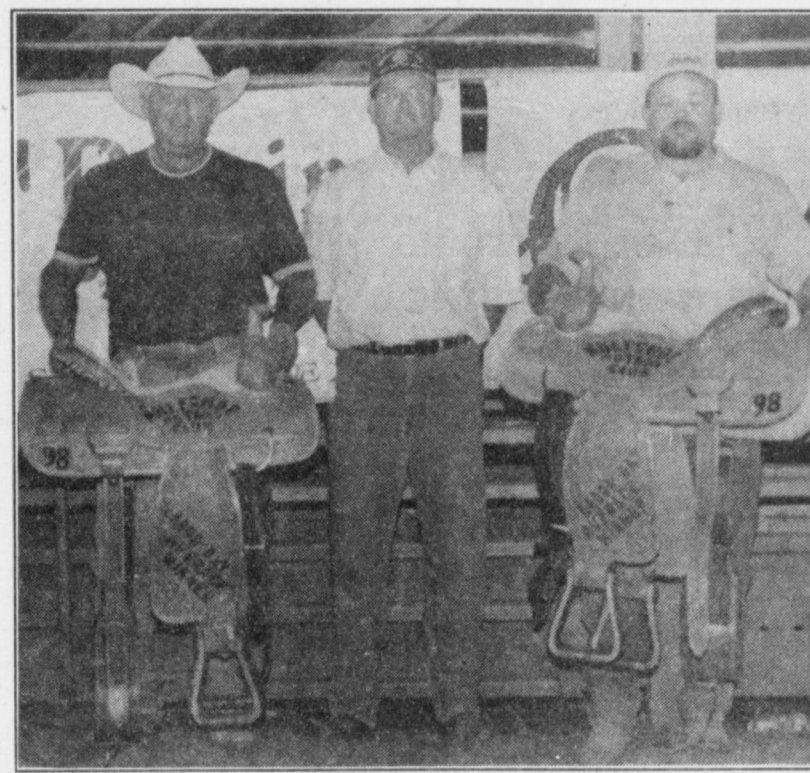
