#### Moore comes up short

HOUSTON — There were two Moores to pick from, but neither one was named the Superintendent of the Year last weekend at the Texas Association of School Boards at the TASA/TSASB annual convention.

Brazosport ISD Superintendent Gerald E. Anderson was selected for the honor from among five finalists, which included Bill Moore of Muleshoe ISD and Bob Moore of Amarillo ISD.

Superintendent Anderson received a \$4,000 award for professional development and a Superintendent of the Year ring from Balfour, program sponsor. Runners-up each received a \$250 stipend for professional development.

Meetings are scheduled for Monday, Oct. 5 at 9:30 a.m. at the Springlake-Earth Auditorium and at 1:30 p.m. at the Lazbuddie school cafeteria. Also Tuesday, Oct. 6 at 9:30 a.m. at the Bailey County Coliseum and at 1:30 p.m. at the Morton

"The intent of the meetings is to inform people of some of the key elements that the consumers needs to watch for," said Duane Lloyd, president and CEO of Bailey County Electric Co-op. "In my opinion, there hasn't been enough effort to educate consumers on what deregulation is about."

Lloyd said he plans to discuss the pros and cons of deregulation and

how it will affect Bailey County Electric Co-op members.

Federal and state governments are working toward deregulation of the electric service industry, according to Lloyd. He said it's possible it could be done when the Texas Legislature meets in January.

The Texas Public Utility Commission is a strong proponent of

#### to business. Muleshoe hosts rival Dimmitt during homecoming Friday at Benny Douglass Stadium (8 p.m.) with the start of the District 2-3A season less than two weeks away. "It's been a fun month. Fun for the community and fun for the kids, who realized what they can do," Muleshoe coach David

The once-beaten Bobcats (3-1) figure to be the Mules' toughest test yet and a perfect lead-in to the district season. Dimmitt's loss was 14-0 to Friona two weeks ago.

Wood said. "But it's time to go

forward."

"We're going to treat it like a district game," said Wood, who is 0-2 against Dimmitt. "The seniors have never beaten Dimmitt, so it's a big game."

It's a classic match-up of Dimmitt's speed and quickness against Muleshoe's size and power.

"They've got unbelievable quickness," Wood said. "We're going to have to go right at them and maybe we can pound on them enough to wear them down."

Dimmitt coach Bruce Dollar is just as impressed with Mule-

"They're quick and have some speed in the right places," Dollar said. "And man, are they big. We're expecting a tough game."

Dimmitt's option offense is loaded with weapons, led by crafty senior quarterback Derek Buckley (231 passing yards, 5 TDs) and bruising senior fullback Beau Hill (481 yards). The Bobcats are averaging 342

In a small shed in the back of his home west of Muleshoe, Melvin Seymore painstakingly fills in the cracks of an old trunk that has belonged to his family for generations.

In the six years since he semiretired, Seymore spends countless hours repairing furniture and woodworking.

"If I see something in a magazine or at a store, I make it for the family," Seymore said. "A man could go crazy with nothing to do."

Seymore officially retired from farming this year.

In his spare time, Seymore slips off to a shed he converted into a workshop to tinker with a variety of projects — like furniture for his home.

Out of bits of wood and odd

parts, he crafts things like bird houses, wind chimes and lawn ornaments. He used a discarded license plate for the roof on a bird house that hangs in his carport. Nearby, a wind chime with wooden crow ornaments rings.

Seymore, 69, has lived in the same house with his wife Norma since 1949. He farmed cotton and wheat until retiring last year.

Modest to a fault, he said he doesn't sell his work, he just likes making things for his fam-

His neighbor, Nelda Hunt, works with Melvin from time to time on the trunks. "He has a lot of hidden talent, but is very quiet about it."

deregulation.

The deregulation of the electric industry would be similar to what happened in the phone industry. Lloyd said that if deregulation is passed, it would make it difficult for rural electric co-ops to survive.

"The smaller customers would take the biggest hit," Lloyd said. "We want to make sure everybody gets treated fairly."

Jerry Thomas:

The Bobcats use their quickness to get penetration and disrupt plays, according to Wood. "We're bigger than them, but we're really going to have to concentrate on technique and make sure we control the gaps.'

Muleshoe posted its fourthstraight shutout last week, holding Tulia to seven yards rushing in a 28-0 win.

Senior quarterback Matt

McClanahan rushed for 105 yards and two touchdowns in the win. But the Mules committed a season-high four turnovers and were a little flat.

## Ag funding tops Congress agenda

With only a few days remaining in this federal fiscal year and less than three weeks to go in the 105th Congress, there remains much uncompleted appropriations work. Several issues important to agriculture remain outstanding, with their futures now up to House and Senate conference committees.

In the agriculture appropriations bill, conferees last week were slated to tackle a proposal to help boost the nation's farm economy. At the heart of the measure is a \$3.9 billion aid package. Farm Bureau last week renewed its call to lawmakers to tap the necessary funds from the emergency spending column and refrain from using existing program dollars.

Agriculture conferees also have been charged with ironing out the differences between the two chambers' language on agriculture research. The Senate research language included funding for the \$130 million program, while the House language did not. Farm Bureau has urged full funding for research programs.

Because the agriculture appropriations package has been viewed as extremely critical

for farmers and ranchers, Farm Bureau has also urged Congress to move the measure with the utmost speed to avoid funding the Agriculture Department under a continuing resolution.

Conferees to the foreign operations appropriations bill were scheduled last week to near completion on a measure to fund the International Monetary Fund. Farm Bureau has urged Congress to approve the administration-requested \$18 billion funding level. Senators heard the call and approved the full amount, but House appropriators allowed a \$3.4 billion contribution to the international lender.

Senators earlier this year adopted a Farm Bureau-supported regulatory reform measure that was attached to the treasury-postal appropriations bill. The organization called the legislation, which would require federal agencies to review the costs and benefits of their regulatory activities twice a year, long

Due to the tight schedule facing Congress, it is likely uncompleted appropriations bills will be folded into an omnibus package to allow funding to continue into 1999.





## Ageless mom amazes daughter

I want to tell you a bit about my mother, Jewel Pool.

She is a bright, fun girl at age 87. To call your mother a girl at 87 is the highest of compliments. By no means does she lack maturity or wisdom, it is her youthful mindset and outlook. She has always had the assurance of her faith and has moved forward from there.

When my husband and I moved from our home in Houston to the island of Saipan, we began telling mother how beautiful it is here, how lush the flowers and the jungle are. We described the beautiful colors of the water and the amazing sunsets.

She was the first to bring a flower shop to Muleshoe back in 1948. Knowing her love for flowers, I wanted her to see the wild orchids, hibiscus and birds of paradise.

I began to figure how to make it all happen. Could I get my brother to bring her or perhaps one of our sons? Should I fly home to accompany her? I talked with her about the possibilities. Then we received an e-mail saying that she had her reservations and no, she needed no help, she could make it on her own.

She landed in Saipan about an hour ahead of schedule. So, by the time we arrived, she had completely charmed the local Chomorro Customs Agents. They had never seen anyone like my mother. Elders in their community are in their 60s and for them to see someone in their 80s, is rare. For that 80-year-old to be traveling alone and be in command of her own business was amazing to them. "What kind of a daughter lets their mother travel all of that distance by herself?" What they

didn't understand was that I had no control over that strongwilled woman.

We were ready for her to rest a day or two to regain her energy. But, she was ready to see it all! She went to parties with the young attorneys in my husband's office, she went to the library and to the zoo. She had luncheons with the women of all nationalities, she saw the water, the flowers, the palm trees, the World War II memorials, and Bonsai Cliff. The only thing she did not do here was sky dive.

· How did we find ourselves out here in the Pacific? After living in the same house for over 25 years and Andy practicing law in Houston for over 30. years, we were ready for a change. We loved our friends,

our church, our neighbors, but still we felt we had no more to do. Andy had been to the Pacific when he was in the Navy and thought we could enjoy this island life-style. He accepted a job as an assistant Attorney General for the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands on the island of Saipan.

Mother stayed with us for 5 weeks. We loved having her here. She said that she believed that she could stay right here, When I asked her if she was ready to leave Muleshoe and come stay with us, she answered, "Not Yet".

Just thought you would enjoy knowing what strong women you grow in that part of the world.

#### Postal Service orders 10,000 ethanol vehicles

The U.S. Postal Service has ordered 10,000 ethanol-powered vehicles, which will become the largest such fleet in the country.

The new postal vehicles will be used to replace old equipment and will be able to operate either with ethanol or conventional gasoline.

"When fully deployed, the Postal Service will have the largest fleet of ethanol-capable powered vehicles in the country," said Nick Barranca, vice president of operations support for the postal service.

The customized vehicles will be manufactured by Ford Motor Company. Under terms of the \$204.6 million Ford contract, 500 new ethanol vehicles will be delivered in May 1999, and another 9,500 over the following 12

Earlier, the Postal Service had conducted tests of ethanol-powered vehicles in Illinois, Iowa and the District of Columbia. Those tests used Ford Windstar minivans powered by E85, a clean-air fuel made of 85 percent ethanol and 15 percent conventional gasoline.
