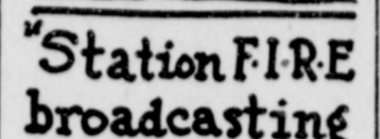

## TREES MAY BE BOUGHT CHEAP

Because the giant "shelterbelt" of trees from North Central to Southwestern states was not given sufficient financial backing by Congress, Scurry and other West Texas counties have an opportunity to purchase thousands of trees at extremely low prices.

Chinese elms, osage orange (bois d'arc) and honey locust, 18 to 24 inches, may be purchased for delivery in Snyder at approximately five cents each. Six to eight foot Chinese elms may be secured for about 20 cents each.

The small trees were planted at the Lubbock Experiment Station, two miles east of Lubbock, whence they will be transplanted.

County Agent W. R. Lacey should be contacted by anyone in this trade territory who wishes to purchase trees. The delivered price will depend to some extent on the number of purchasers here.

Extensive rural and urban beautification is expected to grow out of this wholesale offering of good trees at such low prices, Lacey said.
