Governor in dog house

JACKSON, Miss. - Mississippi legislators may work like dogs, but that doesn't mean they want to share the Capitol with one.

The state's first pooch, Lance, has become a regular at the Capitol, trailing around Gov. Kirk Fordice at meetings and posing for pictures. But there have been the occasional mishaps, including doggy poop left behind in offices.

Now Lance's privileges are causing a stink with Sen. Alice Harden, who is proposing a ban on all pets in the Capitol except dogs for the sight-impaired. Fordice, a Republican, immediately defended his 2-year-old dog.

"Most people in Mississippi are pet lovers and certainly don't object to a dog that can behave himself," he said.

"I'd rather have the dog in the Capitol than the governor," said Democratic Rep. Steve Holland. "Maybe we ought to reverse that and kick the governor out and keep the dog."

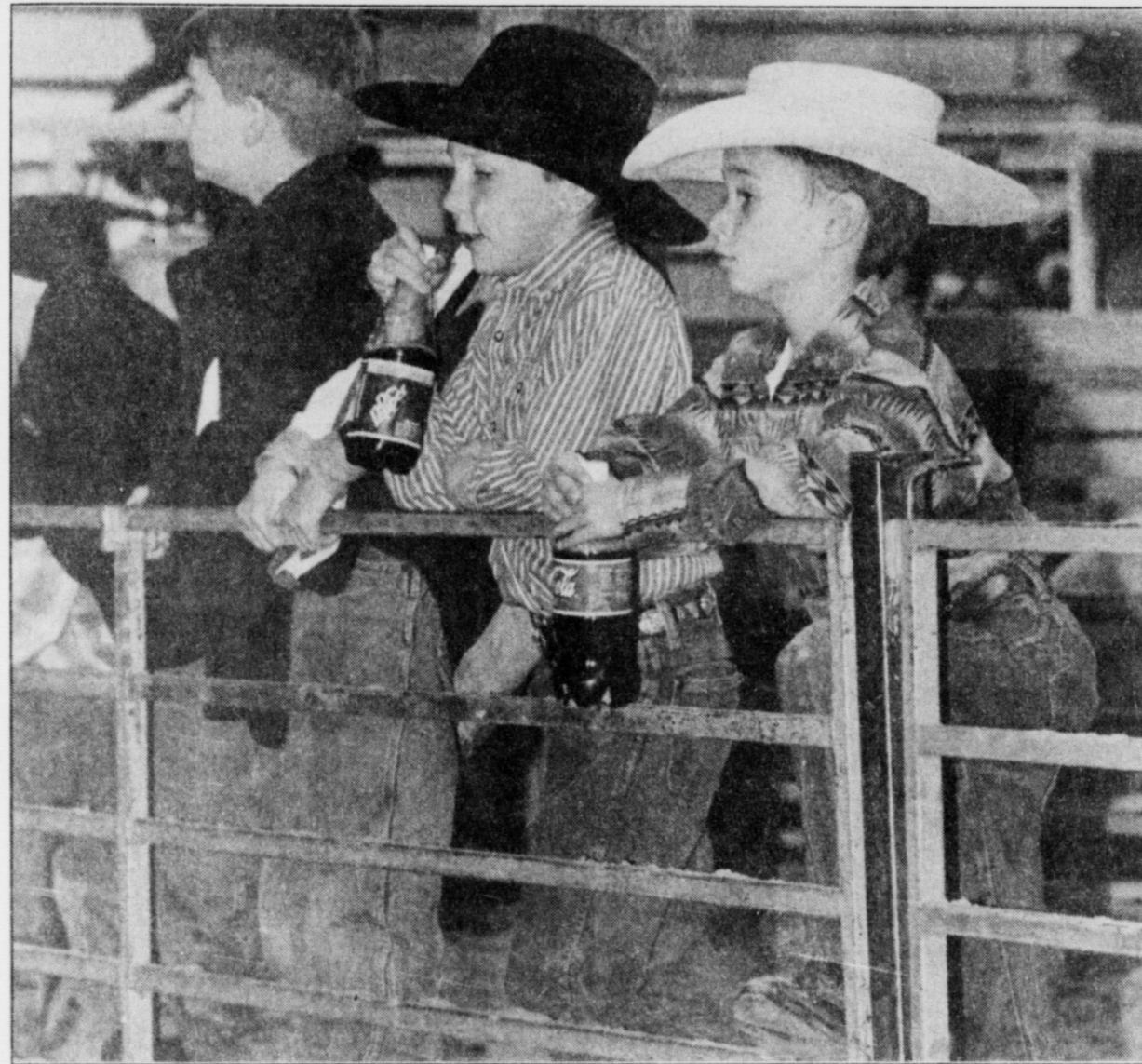

Black wins fourth-straight lamb title

Landon Black won his fourth consecutive Junior Market Lamb Show crown Friday at the Coliseum during the annual Bailey County Junior Livestock Show.

Black's champion Medium Wool was the choice of judge John Kearney of Big Spring. Josh Kitchens, the 18-year-old son of Larry and Rhonda Kitchens, had the reserve grand champion, also a heavyweight

medium wool lamb.

For Black, the 16-year-old son of Kim and Sheila Black of Muleshoe, it was the sixth major title at the Bailey County Show over a four-year stretch. Black swept both grand and reserve grand honors in 1996 and 1998 while taking home the grand champion banner in 1997.

In addition to his other honors, Black was also named the overall champion sheep showman, qualifying for the Jimmy

Dale Black Award competition.

Facing the champion showmen from the goat, steer and swine shows, Black earned the Bailey County Show's highest honor by capturing the Black Award, an honor a junior livestock exhibitor may only win once.

Also competing were Krystal Heathington (swine), Ky Kennedy (steers) and Robin

Kennedy wins another junior market steer title

Ky Kennedy swept the top honors for the second-straight year here Saturday during the Bailey County Junior Market Steer Show at the Coliseum.

Kennedy, the 17-year-old son of Steve Kennedy of Muleshoe and Sherri Kennedy of Lubbock, had the Grand Champion; a 1,178 lb. black Exotic Cross steer. He took Reserve Grand honors with a 1,275 lb. gray and white Simmental-Charolais-Maine cross.

Judge Dennis Pool of Gail, the Borden County Extension agent, found the Kennedy steers to be the cream of yet another solid crop of 38 steers exhibited during the annual event.

The pair stood above two other steers that qualified for the grand drive: the champion British, a Shorthorn steer exhibited by Robin Tooley of Three Way, and the champion American, a Santa Gertrudis steer shown by Lysie Black.

Before the grand drive, however, the Kennedy steers survived perhaps their most difficult test in the Exotic champion drive. Lindsey Altman had the first-place lightweight, while Jill Gladden had the top heavyweight on either side of Kennedy's two class winners. In addition, a powerful black steer shown by Hadley Henderson stood second behind the grand champion in the Light-Mediumweight class.

Kennedy completed his day by being selected as the overall champion steer showman and qualified to compete for the prestigious Jimmy Dale Black Award.

The show result was the same as it had been in 1998, when Kennedy won both grand and reserve grand with a pair of black Exotic crosses. It was his fourth consecutive year to bring home the reserve grand banner, having finished behind Jacen Claunch in 1997 and Jeffery Wheeler

Search begins for Muleshoe superintendent

The search for a new Muleshoe school superintendent has started.

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees Monday contracted with the Texas Association of School Boards to conduct the search to replace Bill Moore, who will step down as MISD superintendent in June after 8 1/2 years with the district.

Former superintendents and TASB employees Clyde Greer and Tom Jarboe (Friona ISD) will lead the search.

The application deadline is tentatively scheduled for March 24.

The school board expects to conduct initial interviews on April 6-8. The board hopes to have a new superintendent hired by early May.

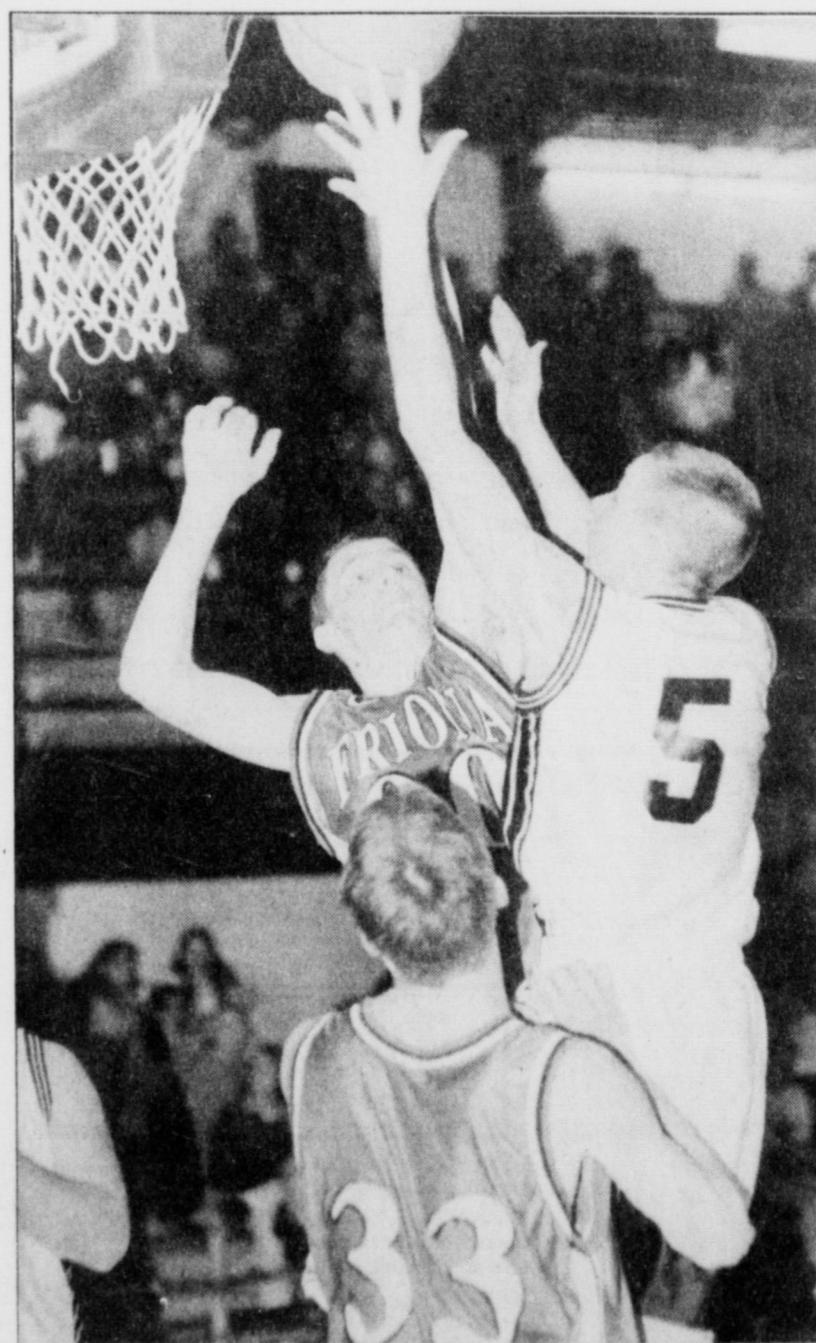
"We have a difficult task ahead of us," said MISD board president Cindy Purdy.

In other board business Monday, the board voted to establish a MISD scholarship fund, with two \$1,000 college scholarships awarded each year.

A family described as one of the founders of Bailey County donated \$20,000 to establish the scholarship. The family has chosen to remain anonymous.

The board also reviewed a quarterly report from the Employee Assistance Program, which

Bill proposes change in jury selection

A proposed change in the way juries are selected would have a minimal effect in Bailey County, according to local officials.

A bill filed last week by Sen. Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock) would have juries drawn only from voter registration lists.

Bailey County currently uses lists of licensed drivers, registered voters and utility customers to summon citizens for jury duty, according to 287th District Court clerk Elaine Parker.

"The current way we're selecting juries seems to be working fine," Parker said. "But we've never had trouble seating a jury."

Proponents of the bill cited the expense of sending out more jury summons than in the past as the main reason they backed the change.

Jury trials in county court are rare, according to Bailey County deputy clerk Regina Barrett.

Sen. Duncan said the state needs responsible citizens to

State comptroller forecasts slower growth in 1999

AUSTIN — The Texas Index of Leading Economic Indicators points to slower economic growth in 1999 than Texas has experienced during the last several years.

The November index is at 132.9, an increase of 0.8 percent compared to one year ago, but a decline of 0.2 percent compared to the month of October.

"As I pointed out to the Texas Legislature in my Biennial Revenue Estimate, the Texas economy is healthy, but future economic growth will occur at a slower, more moderate, pace," Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander said.

"On the bright side, the Texas economy will continue to grow at a faster rate than the U.S. economy," Rylander added.

Topping the November 1998 economic indicators is the Texas Stock Index. At 577.7, the TSI is 21 percent higher than a year ago. However, the TSI is down 15.7 percent compared to the previous month.

New home construction remains strong. Construction permits were issued for more than 12,000 new homes in November—up 13.1 percent compared to the same period last year, but down 5.2 percent compared to the previous month.

Texas consumer confidence was down 3.7 percent compared to one year ago, marking the third consecutive month of declining consumer optimism. Paradoxically, November retail sales in Texas rose 7.9 percent compared to the same period last year.

New business incorporations grew 2.5 percent compared to 1997, but business start-ups were flat from October to November. The average number of manufacturing hours per

work week showed a 0.9 percent decline compared to a year ago.

November 1998 unemployment claims were up 26.2 percent compared to the previous November, even though Texas' November unemployment rate dropped 0.3 percent during the same time period. Job seekers who turned to the want-ads found fewer opportunities. The Texas Help Wanted Index, a measurement of job listings in Texas news-

papers, declined by 5 percent in November.

Oil prices continue to be the weakest component of the Texas Index of Leading Economic Indicators. In November, a barrel of Texas crude was priced at \$11 — down 37.6 percent compared to November 1997.

serve on juries, and the first step toward being a responsible citizen is to register to vote.

Before the current law was passed, some residents wouldn't register to vote for the sole purpose of avoiding jury duty, Parker said.

About six juries a year are summoned, with only half actually serving on a trial, Parker said. Plus, there are two grand juries convened a year.

The district still draws its juries the old fashion way, drawing slips of paper out of a container.

Parker said she usually sends out about 100 to 150 jury sum-

mons for a trial, with only about half being returned.

The others have either moved, died or cannot be located, Parker said.

Similar legislation has been proposed by Duncan the past

two legislative sessions. Both times the bills got stuck in committee.

Duncan also filed another bill that raises the age for a person to be exempted from grand jury service from 65 to 70.

Lady Mules gain sole possession of second place

Muleshoe is eyeing its first playoff appearance in five years at the halfway point of the girls District 2-3A season.

The Lady Mules (9-15 overall, 4-1 in district) gained some breathing room and sole possession of second place Friday by holding off a third-quarter surge and beating playoff contender Friona 51-35 before a full house at WJHS gym.

Erin Wilhite led a balanced attack with 15 points and Muleshoe's sagging man-to-man defense held the Squaws (16-7, 3-2) to just 19 percent

Mules win another at buzzer

Carlton Lewis and the Muleshoe Mules are starting to make last-second wins look routine.

The Mules won their second-straight District 2-3A home game at the buzzer Friday when Lewis sank a 16-foot jump shot that capped a 38-36 come-from-behind victory against Friona before a packed house at WJHS gym.

Lewis also beat Littlefield with a baseline jumper as time expired in the Mules' district opener.

Muleshoe (16-7 overall, 4-0 in district) scored the game's last six points to overtake the pesky Chieftains (13-9, 3-1) in a battle of unbeaten district teams.

"When you win a couple of big games like this, it gives the kids a lot of confidence," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "We work on situations like that all the time in practice."

With the score tied at 36, Muleshoe called a time-out with 59 seconds left following a Friona turnover.

Pulling the ball out against token Friona pressure, MHS worked the clock down to 10 seconds before initiating its offense. Mason Sinclair drove the baseline, and when several Friona defenders converged on him, he kicked the ball out to a wide-open Lewis. The senior guard, who had spotted up at the right side of the key, found nothing but net on his second game-winning shot of the season.

"We decided to pull the ball out, and if (Friona) sat back in the zone, we'd play for the last shot. If they came out, we were going to attack and try to score," Mason said.

Muleshoe forced four-straight turnovers to get back in the game after Nathan King's fourth 3-pointer gave Friona a 36-32 lead with 3:30 left in the defensive struggle.

Two clutch free throws each by Jeff Bruns and Dustin Cleavinger pulled the Mules even at 36. MHS was a perfect 10 of 10 from the free throw line in the fourth quarter and 12 of 15 for the game.

Cleavinger led Muleshoe with 15 points, which is five below his season average.

Mason said he was surprised Friona didn't pull the ball out and work the clock after taking a four-point lead, its biggest of the game.

"I thought we might be in a little trouble," Mason admitted.

King (19 points) and Justin Daniel (16 points) kept Friona in the game almost all by themselves, combining for all but one of Friona's points.

After a quiet first half, Daniel came alive in the third quarter. The 6-4 senior forward scored 11 points in the period, including a conventional 3-point play that tied the game at 25 heading into the final eight minutes.

King's layup off a steal to start the fourth quarter gave the Chiefs their first lead of the game at 27-25.

Three-pointers by King and Daniel upped Friona's lead to 33-30 with five minutes left in the game before Muleshoe rallied for the win.

"I saw some signs of frustration," Mason said. "But these kids do a good job of keeping their

focus and are developing a lot of confidence."

The game looked like it was going to be a blowout early, with Muleshoe building a 15-4 lead 10 minutes into the game.

But MHS turned stagnant on offense and let the King-led Chiefs scrap their way back into the game. King scored nine in the first half, including a 3-pointer with a minute to go that got Friona within 18-12 at intermission.

"We had some shots rattle out and a couple of turnovers that

gave them some momentum," Mason said. "And they made a game of it."

"Even though we struggled a little early, I thought we were pretty consistent (offensively) throughout the game," Gruhlkey said after Muleshoe scored more than 50 points for the third time in its last four games. "We tried to give them some different looks by posting up a lot of people, hoping we could take advantage of our size."

Lindsey Field and Melissa Williams added 11 points each for the Lady Mules. Williams was especially effective early, scoring all of Muleshoe's seven first-quarter points.

Whitney Ellis paced Friona with 14 points, including a perfect 10 of 10 from the free throw line. April Pope had three 3s and nine points.

While the Lady Mules were efficient on offense, shooting 51.7 percent (15 of 29) from the field, it was at the defensive end where the game was won.

For the most part, Muleshoe dared Friona to shoot from outside in hopes of shutting down the Squaw's bread-and-butter post game. The move paid off as Friona was clearly hesitant to take the open 15-footer and wound up just 9 of 47 from the field.

After falling behind early, Muleshoe used a 10-2 run midway through the second quarter to go up 17-10. Freshman Britni Gartin's 3-pointer with 20 seconds left in the second quarter stretched the Lady Mules' lead to 21-10. But Pope swished a shot from just across halfcourt that cut the deficit to eight at the half.

Pope opened the third quarter with two more 3s as Friona mounted a charge. Ellis scored off a steal and added two free throws to pull the Squaws within 27-24 with three minutes left in the third quarter.

But Wood answered for MHS with a 12-foot jumper from the baseline. Wilhite added a pair of free throws and a pull-up jumper from eight feet, giving Muleshoe a 33-24 edge heading into the fourth quarter.

Wood's three-point play made it 36-24 and Muleshoe led by at least 10 points the rest of the way.

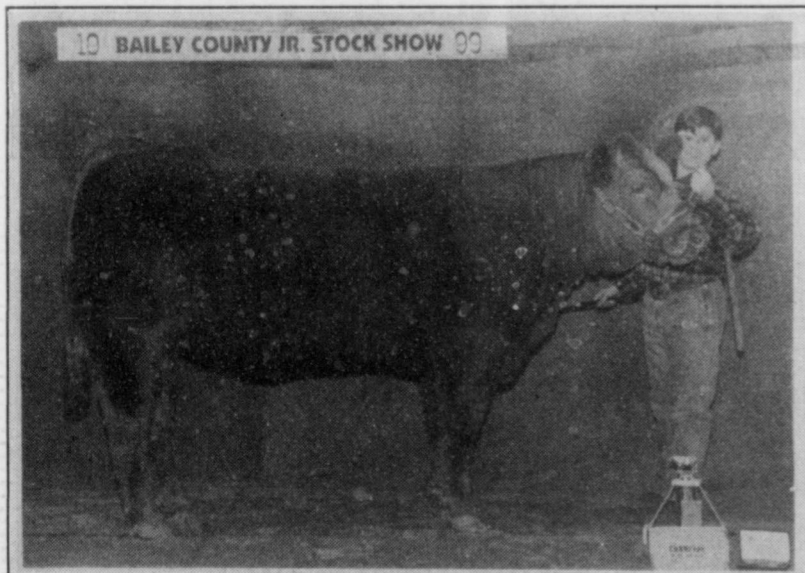

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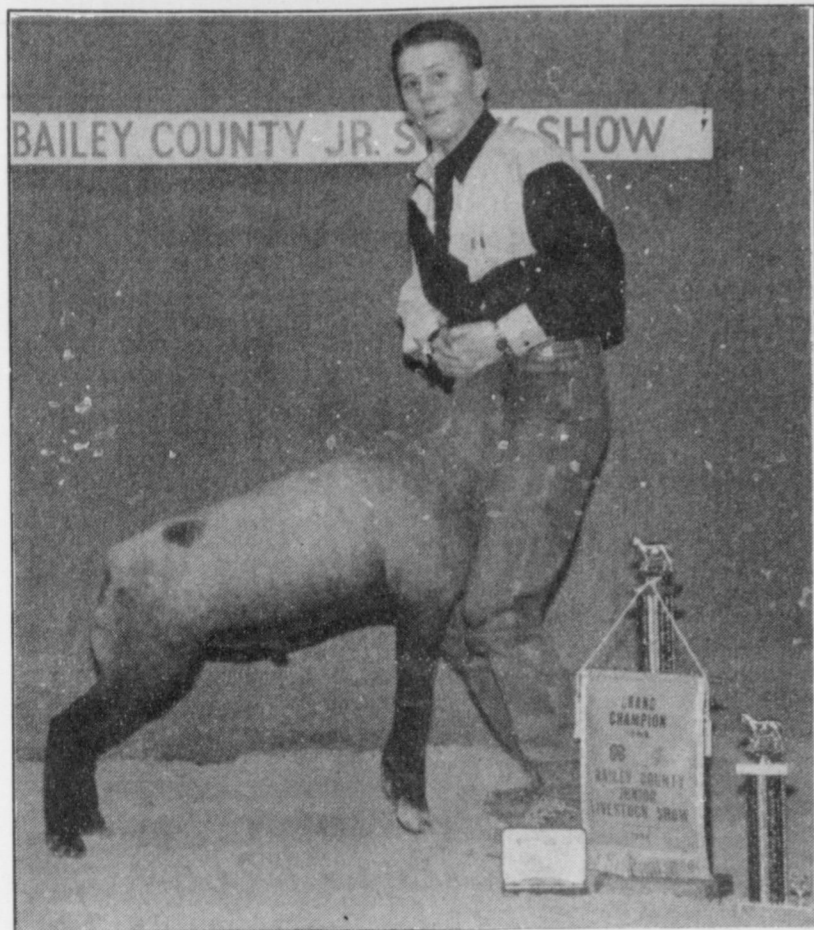

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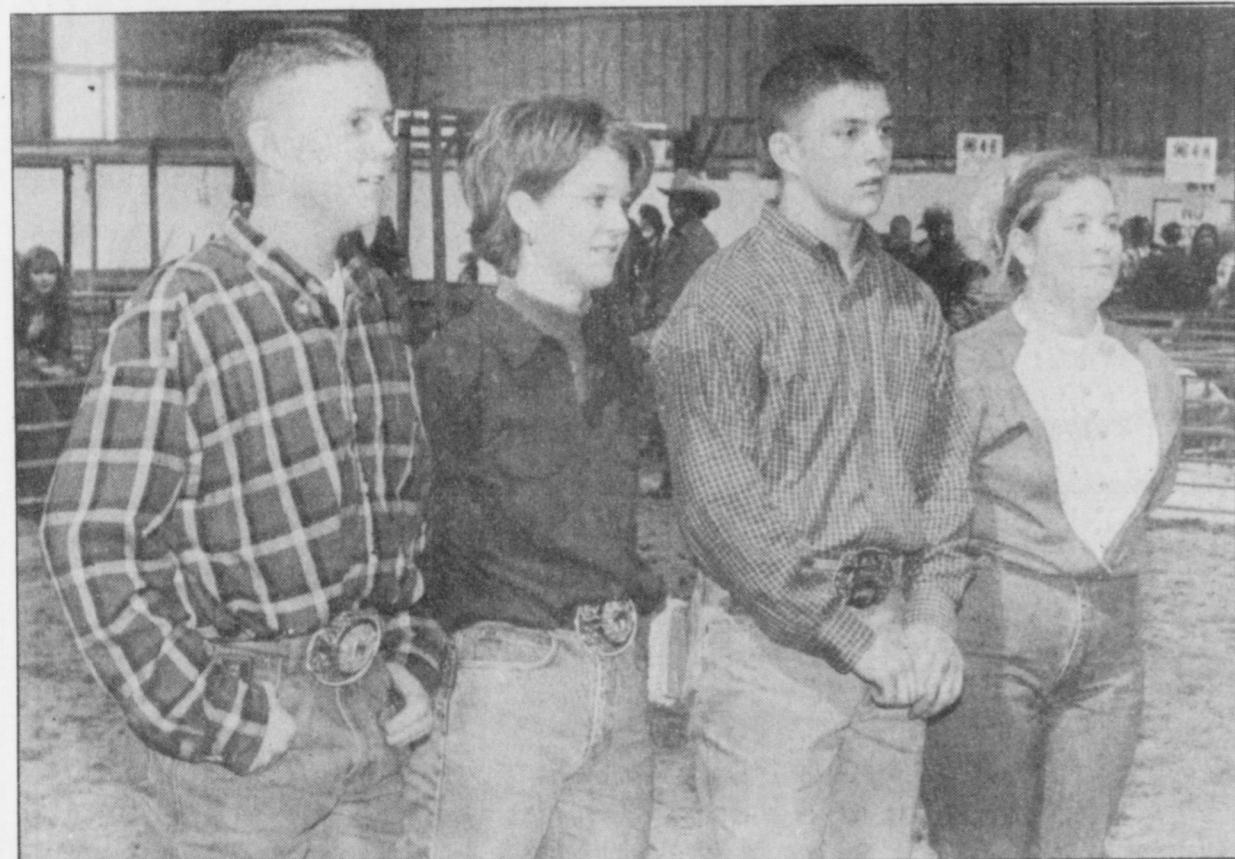

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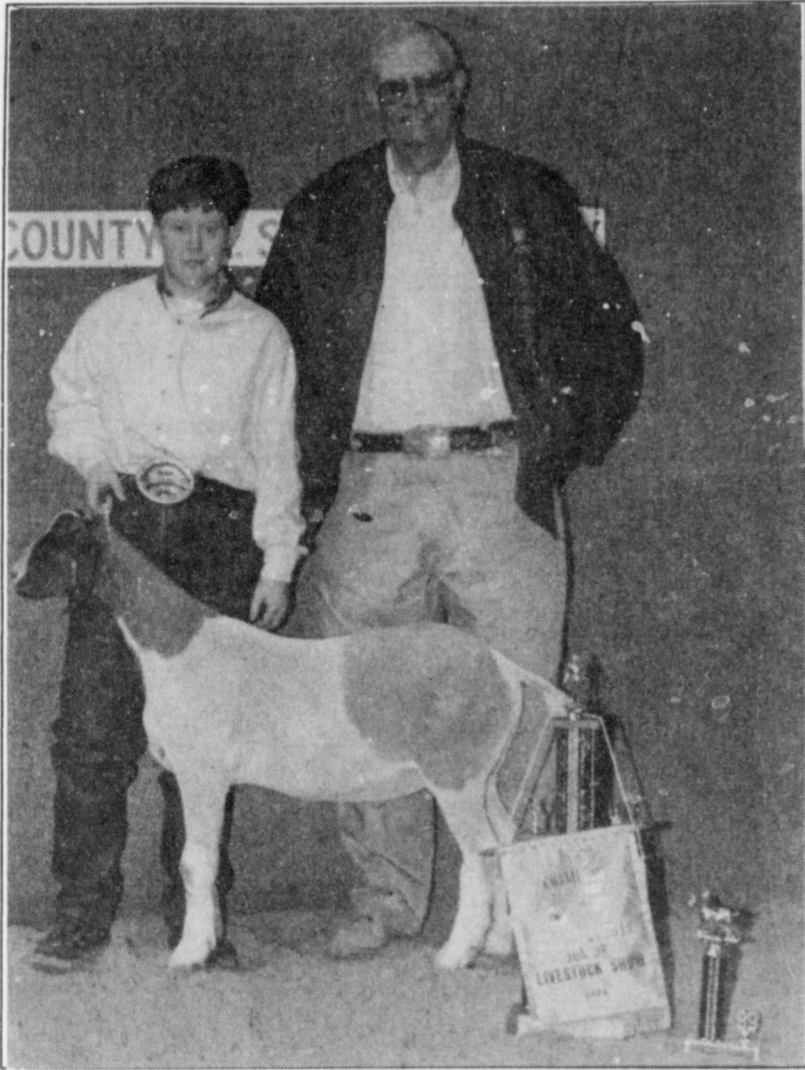

Financial help available to local hog producers through USDA

The United States Department of Agriculture will make approximately \$50 million in direct cash payments to small hog producers to help them weather the current economic crisis.

Producers qualify for the direct cash payments if their hog operation marketed fewer than 1,000 hogs during the last six months of 1998, and is still in operation.

Two restrictions apply. First, hog operations are not eligible for payments on hogs marketed under fixed-price or cost-plus contracts. Second, any operation whose gross income for 1998 was greater than \$2.5 million will not be eligible for payments. This is also true for USDA's crop disaster assistance programs.

Payments will be made through USDA's Farm Service Agency local offices. From

Feb. 1 to Feb. 12, FSA will conduct a sign up for the payment program.

Producers will be required to certify that they meet the eligibility requirements of the

program. FSA will have an application form that producers will fill out when they sign up for the program.

It is expected that the form will require producers to in-

clude the name of the operation and a list of persons involved in it, the number of slaughter hogs and feeder pigs marketed in the last 6 months of 1998, and the buyers of the hogs and pigs.

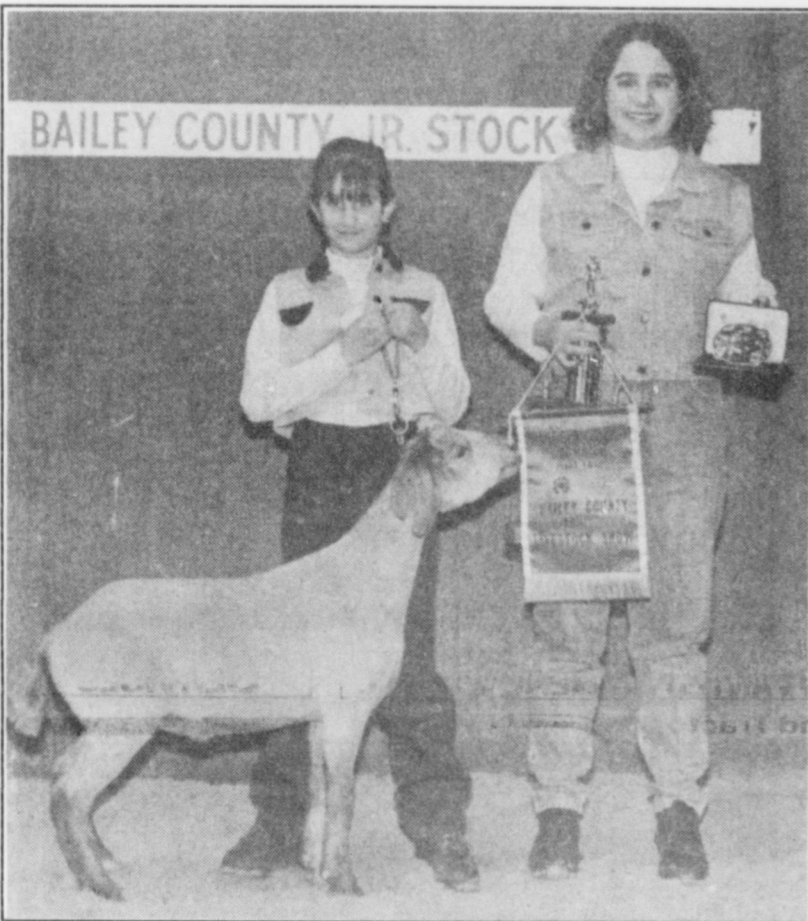



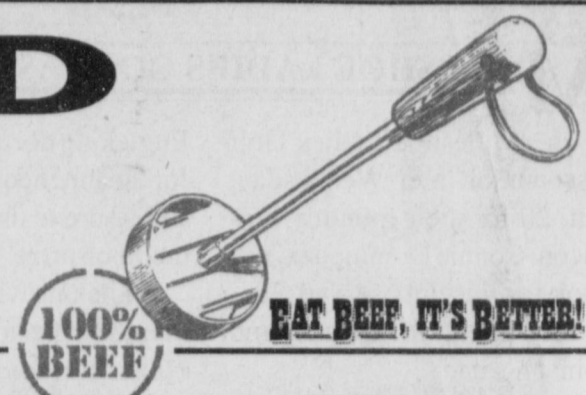

<p>NOTICE OF REFERENDUM In accordance with the provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code, Chapter 74, Subchapter D, and 4 Tex. Admin. Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a referendum on the proposition of whether or not cotton growers shall establish a boll weevil eradication program in the Northwest plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and pay a maximum annual assessment in the amount of \$12 per land acre of irrigated cotton and \$5 per land acre of dryland cotton, including skiprows, for up to eight years, plus a maintenance fee thereafter. The initiation of a program at this assessment level is contingent upon obtaining financing to allow an eradication program to operate within a maximum budget level of \$63.07/acre, the projected cost for a four-year eradication program. If approved, the program and assessment are expected to begin in 1999. If the necessary financing is not arranged prior to program commencement, the program will not be initiated and no assessment will be collected. Any state or federal cost-share funding received could either lower the per acre assessment or reduce the number of years for debt repayment. The Northwest Plains Eradication zone consist of all of Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Lamb and Parmer</p>	<p>(cont.) counties. If a program and assessment are approved by this referendum, growers in the zone shall vote again on whether or not to continue eradication efforts after four years of active program activities. Also, as part of the referendum, a representative of the above-referenced zone will be elected to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas. The referendum and board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed by February 19, 1999. All ballots cast by mail must be postmarked no later than March 12, 1999, in order to be valid. Any cotton grower having cotton production in 1998 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and, if he or she resides in the Northwest Plains Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, to have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton and receives income from the sale of cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm, or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm.
