### It was in fact a dry year

Muleshoe received above average precipitation in 1998 compared to other South Plains

Based on data from the National Weather Service's network of cooperative weather observers, Muleshoe received 14.74 inches of precipitation, a little less than an inch more than the South Plains average. Just 19 miles south, the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge received only 9.82 inches.

On a whole, precipitation in the region was well below average.

The driest location on the South Plains was Seminole, which received only 7.85 inches. Silverton received the most in the area with a whopping 22.11 inches.

The 13.06 inches recorded in Lubbock made last year the driest since 1993 when 12.75 inches was recorded.

#### Pennies on the dollar

Muleshoe City Manager Rick L. Hanna discussed the possibility of building a correctional facility with the Bailey County Commissioners Court at their regular monthly meeting.

Hanna met with the Court on Monday to discuss their feelings on building a correctional facility in close proximity to the city.

He told the court that some of the myths that surround locating a unit like this near a community have not happened in other areas. He added there

# Cleavinger, Mason earn top honors

District champion Muleshoe had the top player and coach according to a vote of District 2-3A coaches.

Senior Dustin Cleavinger, who averaged 20.5 points and nine rebounds a game in district play, was named most valuable player and Muleshoe's Ralph Mason was named coach of the year.

The Mules, who this season won their first district title since 1957 with a 10-0 record, also had alldistrict picks in senior guard Carlton Lewis and junior wing Mitch Mason.

Senior guard Mason Sinclair was named to the all-defensive team. Littlefield, Shallowater and Lub-

bock Cooper all had two selections on the 11-member all-district squad.

Cleavinger, a versitile 6-6 post, was second on the team with 173pointers, shot 48.7 percent from the field and 80 percent from the free throw line during district. He is a four-time all-district pick.

Coach Mason, in his fifth year at Muleshoe, won his 200th game this year and led the Mules (24-8 overall) into the regional quarterfinals for the first time in more than four decades.

Lewis, a 5-7 point guard and four-year letterman, averaged 10.1 points, 6.7 assists, 3.4 rebounds and led the team with 25 steals.

Mason, 5-9, averaged 12 points 5.4 rebounds and led the team with 20 3-pointers in district play. He shot 45.5 percent from 3-point range and a 81.5 percent from the line in his first year as a starter.

Sinclair, 5-9, averaged 7.2 points and 3.2 rebounds and was key cog in the Mules' signature half-court press that helped force opponents into 15.9 turnovers a game.

### Pair of Lady Mules named to elite squad

District teams knew that beating Muleshoe meant shutting down Lindsey Field and Erin Wilhite.

But not many teams were able to do it.

Muleshoe's point guard-post tandem powered a young Lady Mules team to 8-2 record and a runner-up finish in District 2-3A.

Field and Wilhite were rewarded by being named to the all-district team selected by league coaches that was released this week.

Undefeated district champion Shallowater garnered the league's most valuable player award in senior Kelli Cox and three all-district selec-

is no evidence to prove crime rates have risen or that a rougher element of society will move into the area.

The Texas Legislature could approve the building of an Intermediate Sanction facility somewhere in the state during this years session according to Hanna. This type of facility would be for inmates who have been paroled or are about to be paroled but are not quite ready to be released into society he

According to an advisor to Hanna, the state could have a 1600 bed deficit in correctional facilities this year. This shortfall will be reduced to 600 after a 1000 bed unit in Garza County is opened later this year he added.

Hanna was involved in the establishment of that facility and one other in Garza County prior to becoming Muleshoe's city manager. Those facilities brought about 380 jobs with incomes of over \$20,000 per year to the Post community according to Hanna.

"The financing would be furnished with revenue bonds which would eliminate the financial liability to the city and

county," Hanna said. "Ownership would revert to the county after the obligation of the bonds were met."

"It's a can't lose situation and it sounds too good to be true," Hanna said.

A 500 bed facility could bring about 200 jobs in the \$20,000 range to the city according to Hanna.

"The court supported the idea 100 percent," said Bailey County Court Judge Marilyn Cox.

"I'm very much in favor of this and it would be wonderful for the community," Cox added.

In other business, the commissioners reviewed the Texas Department of Transportation road logs and graphic map for 1998. According to TxDoT, the county maintains approximately 750 miles of roads in Bailey County. This number represents a drop of 149 miles from previous years. The commissioners attribute this decline to Coyote Lake Feedyards taking over the maintenance of the roads on their property.

The loss in road miles would represent a reduction of approximately \$4,000 in assistance from the state according to Cox. Last year the county received nearly \$24,000 from the state in road maintenance assistance she added.

The commissioners approved the appointments of six people to the Bailey County Child Welfare Board. Appointed to three year terms were Tracie Leal, Stephen Claybrook and Tracie Claybrook. Appointed to two year terms were Pam Hancock, Kay Graves and Alice T. Hall.


The commissioners also passed two resolutions to be sent to the state legislature.

The first urges the state to create a program to pay all or part of the cost of crop insurance, take action to insulate local producers from the unfairness of competing with foreign producers which greatly benefit from no regulation and an absence of labor costs, and help to form a working partnership with banks, farmers/ranchers and state governments that would guarantee a certain percentage of farm/ranch loans to those who can qualify.

The court approved a resolution opposing the passage of House Bill 1398 relating to indigent health care.

The court also accepted a letter of resignation from County Judge secretary Rhonda Fennell, approved Budget Amendment 5, approved soil conservation worksheets and approved waiving probation as to salary only for Jodie Barrett, Precinct 4.

### County jail gets much needed facelift

The Bailey County Jail recently got a facelift thanks to a lot of elbow grease and hard work by county employees and inmates.

Jailer Peggy Bates and maintenance engineer Johnny Howard supervised the preparation and painting of the main cell of the jail.

"The jail really looked bad," Bates said. It hadn't been painted for nearly twenty years and the accumulation of tar and smoke residue turned everything brown. "There had been repairs and patches done over time but nothing was done to make them look good," she added.

"We are really quite proud of how the jail looks now," Sheriff Coy Plott said. "The two inmates were very willing to help with the work," he added.

The main cell portion of the jail includes the drunk tank, the regular cells, solitary confinement cells and trustee cells.

The inmates spent about one week sanding and preparing the jail for the painting. One of the inmates was familiar with using a power painter so the county rented one for the project. The inmates finished the painting in three days.

Plott estimated the whole job (paint, supplies, and rental of equipment) only cost the county about \$200. The exterior of the Sheriff's Department offices and jail will be painted soon.

"If the inmates spend time in a cell that looks good and smells good, they are more likely to take better care of the facility," Plott said. "I think this was a good investment of the taxpayers money," the sheriff added.

### Fire danger still lingering

LUFKIN — Texas Forest Service officials warn high plains residents not to develop a false sense of security because some rainfall has been received from the passing front. The rain showers have generally not been enough to provide long term relief from fire danger, particularly if very windy weather follows as forecast. In fact, agency fire control leaders note that the scattered showers may actually contribute to an increase in fires as a result of carelessness, due to the false

"Some people will think that because it has rained, they don't have to worry about wildfires any more," said Rogers. "If this false sense of security leads to an attitude of carelessness, a spurt in accidental wildfires may re-

"Fire danger will be lowered while precipitation is falling, but dormant vegetation has to get its moisture from the air," Rogers said. If very dry, windy weather immediately follows a rain, the dead vegetation will dry quickly and may become fire-prone once again in only a matter of hours.

Continued attention to outdoor fire safety practices will be needed if senseless wildfires are to be avoided, Rogers declared.

# Mules stumble at Brownfield

BROWNFIELD - Muleshoe coach Brad Hill remains optimistic even after Muleshoe dropped three games in the Brownfield Tournament.

District 2-3A foe Lubbock Roosevelt scored six runs in the top of the sixth inning and beat the Mules 12-6 Saturday in the seventh-place game.






