Varsity Picks Up 4 Wins And A Trophy At CJC High School Tournament

The Baird Bears completed a successful week as they picked up 4 wins and the championship trophy at the Cisco Junior College High School tournament.

A narrow 65-63 win over class 3A Wylie started the weeks activities. The Bears trailed by 10 at half, but a balanced scoring attack brought about a come-from-behind win. Three players scored in double figures. Scott Norman led with 15, followed by Mark Harris with 12, and Ronnie Casey with 10. Junior point guard, Chris Graham chipped in 8 more and Te Howard added 6.

Following the Wylie win the Bears traveled to Cisco for 3 heart-throbbing victories as they captured the No. 1 trophy. Albany was the first to fall by a 69-53 tally. The key to the win was a hawking man-to-man defense put on by the Bears that held the Lions to just 13 first half points. Howard scored 20 and Graham put in 18 points to lead the Baird team. Norman and Harris each scored 11 to put 4 Bears in double digits.

Early proved a tougher foe, but again Baird won out by the ever so close score of 51-49. Graham hit a 20 foot jumper at the buzzer to put the Bears in the final game. Howard again led the team in scoring with 15.

In the final game the Bears had to overcome 30 fouls to squeeze out a 45-43 win over Callahan County rival Clyde. Harris was the big gun this time

45-43 win over Callahan County rival Clyde. Harris was the big gun this time pouring in 17 points. Graham and Norman each had 9; Casey had 6; and Howard had 4. Norman, Graham, and Howard were picked on the All-Tourney Team, as Baird carried out more heavy metal than any other team in the Classic.

J.V. BRINGS HOME 2nd PLACE TROPHY

The Bears J.V. Basketball team participated in the Winter's Basketball Tournament doing very well and bringing home the second place trophy. The first game matched Baird against Miles with Baird coming out on top 47 to 39. Oddie Freehling was the leading scorer with 19 and Scott Graham had 8. Sammy Cohn had 6 points; Mike Moore, Eric Penkert and Jeff Holland had 4 points; and Michael Cerda with 2. The second game of the tournament for Baird was against Winters which was a very close game won by the Bears on a last second shot by Michael Cerda to win the game 43 to 42. Scott Graham had a good game with 21 points followed by Oddie Freehling with 12. In the Championship game Baird played Ballinger with the Bears losing to a very good Ballinger team 67 to 21. Oddie Freehling was high point with 7 points.

The J.V. Bears will play host to Albany Tuesday and play in the Jim Ned Tournament Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The first game will be against Wylie Thursday at 5:50.

Request For Rate Increase Indicated By WTU In April

West Texas Utilities Co. rates will increase early next year by an average of 4.7 percent as result of a settlement agreement reached this past week.

WTU and all parties involved, including the Public Utility Commission staff and the Texas Municipal League, agreed on a retail revenue increase of \$10.2 million annually. WTU had proposed an increase of \$20.4 million.

WTU officials said the Company agreed to the settlement because it was in line with recommendations of the PUC staff, and that the Commission usually does not deviate so far from the staff's recommendations. The main difference between WTU's request and the amount allowed is the rate of return on common equity. WTU had sought 18 percent and received 16.25 percent, which is about the same percentage granted in WTU's last rate settlement last February.

"It is obvious that as result of this settlement we'll have to ask for another increase sooner than we had hoped,"

said Larry Cheshier, WTU local manager.

He said WTU management had indicated that a new rate case may be filed as early as April of 1983. The new rates are scheduled to go into effect Jan. 7 unless the PUC changes the date.

Effect on monthly residential bills, including both the base rate and estimated fuel cost charges, would be as follows:
For 600 kilowatt-hours—\$45.76 at 7.63 cents per kilowatt-hour, compared to \$43.39 at 7.23 cents per KWH under the present rates.

For 1,000—\$71.98 at 7.20 cents per kilowatt-hour, compared to \$68.30 at 6.83 cents per KWH under the present rates.

Residential rates vary, depending on whether the home has electric water heating, electric heating, or a combination or both, but the average increase for the residential customer classes will be 4.96 percent. The increase for commercial customers will average 5.55 percent and the increase for large power customers would average 2.95 percent.

also broken into weeks earlier, with burglars taking checks and cash.

Big Country Motors, 1 mile east of Clyde on I-20 was broken into Thursday night by 2 juveniles, who broke a lock off a desk and took keys to the cars on the lot.

The juveniles were later apprehended in Baird and taken to the Taylor County Youth Detention Center where they were later released into the custody of their parents.

Keys to the cars were later recovered in a field next to the car lot.
