It is hoped that the Clean Up project will be a continuing process throughout the entire year and then next Spring work will be much lighter.

James Robert Cave and Robert W. Doyle, Roby, were admitted to Sweetwater hospital Friday.

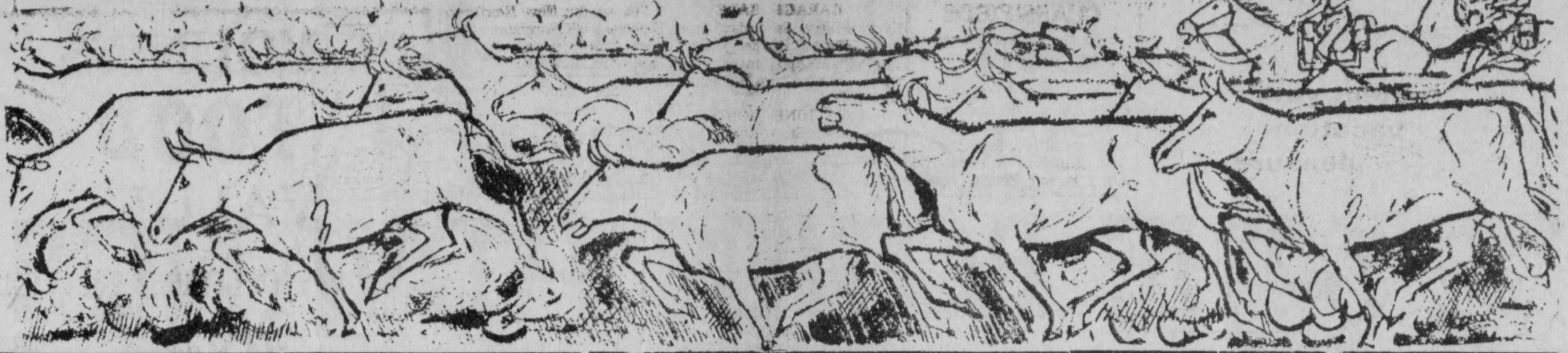
ROBY SEWER NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 10000
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS, DEFINING "JUNKED VEHICLES" DECLARING THE SAME TO BE PUBLIC NUISANCES, WITH CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS, PROVIDING FOR THE ABATEMENT OF SUCH PUBLIC NUISANCES; PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT OF COSTS OF ABATEMENT IN CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES; PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING OF A LIEN FOR THE COSTS OF ABATEMENT, AND PROVIDING FOR THE DISPOSITION OF ANY "JUNKED VEHICLES" IMPOUNDED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE TERMS HEREOF, PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING A PENALTY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, there are, or may be in the future, junked vehicles left about the City other than in junk yards or other appropriate places; and

WHEREAS, such condition tends to interfere with the enjoyment of and reduce the value of private property, invite plundering and theft, create fire hazards and other safety and health hazards to children as well as adults, interfere with the comfort and well being of the public, and create, extend and aggravate urban blight; and

WHEREAS, adequate protection of the public health, safety and welfare requires that such conditions be abated;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN:

SECTION I. DEFINITIONS.
As used herein the following words and phrases shall have the meanings set forth adjacent to them:

(a) Junked Vehicle: The term "Junked Vehicle" shall mean any vehicle which does not have lawfully affixed thereto both a valid Texas license plate or plates and a valid Texas Department of Public Safety Motor Vehicle Inspection certificate, and the condition of which is one or more of the following: Wrecked, partially or wholly dismantled, inoperative, abandoned or discarded.

(b) Person: The word person as used herein shall mean any individual, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

(c) City: The term "City" as used herein shall mean the City of Rotan, Texas.

SECTION II. JUNKED VEHICLES DECLARED PUBLIC NUISANCE; EXCEPTIONS:

The location or presence of any junked vehicle or junked vehicles on any lot, tract or parcel of land or any portion thereof, occupied or unoccupied, improved or unimproved, within the City of Rotan shall be deemed a public nuisance and it shall be unlawful for any person to maintain such a public nuisance or to permit or allow the same to exist on his property or on the property of another; provided that this section shall not apply with regard to a junked vehicle or junked vehicles in an enclosed building; a junked vehicle or junked vehicles on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner, when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise; a junked vehicle or junked vehicles in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the City; or to vehicles in operable condition specially adapted or constructed for racing or operation on privately owned drag strips or raceways.

SECTION III. ORDER TO ABATE.

Whenever any such public nuisance exists in the City in violation of this ordinance, notice of such violation shall be given, as applicable, to the owner of such vehicle, or to the owner or occupant of the premises upon which such vehicle is situated or to all such persons, as hereinafter provided. Such notice shall be in writing, shall specify the violation and its location, shall specify the corrective measures required, shall pro-

vide that any owner of such vehicle, or owner or occupant of such premises, may protest the determination that such vehicle is a nuisance by filing written notice thereof with the City Manager within ten days, and shall provide that failure to file such protest, within ten days, shall constitute consent to the removal and impoundment of such vehicle. A copy of the notice shall be served upon the owner or occupant of the premises and the owner of the vehicle, either by personal service; by mailing a copy, certified mail, return receipt requested to the last known address of such persons; or by attaching such copy to the vehicle in question. Any notice attached to any vehicle need not name the owner thereof, or the owner or occupant of the premises where it is situated, and any such notice attached to a vehicle shall constitute notice to the owner of the vehicle and to the owner and occupant of the premises where such vehicle is located.

SECTION IV. ABATEMENT OF NUISANCE:

If the owner or occupant of the premises, or the owner of such vehicle, fails, neglects or refuses to either file notice of protest or to comply with the terms of any notice issued under the provisions of the preceding section, within ten days after service of such notice by personal service, mailing, or attachment to such vehicle, appropriate City officials shall abate such public nuisance by removing the junked vehicle from its location and impounding the same. All expense incurred in the abatement of such nuisance, and costs of preserving such vehicle prior to final disposition, shall be charged against the owner, or owners, of the junked vehicle payable in Rotan, Fisher County Texas, and the City shall have a privileged lien on such junked vehicle, together with ten per cent (10 per cent) interest on the delinquent amount from the date of impounding such vehicle.

SECTION V. PROCEDURE IN EVENT OF PROTEST:

Should any person file a protest, in accordance with Section IV hereof, of the determination that any vehicle constitutes a nuisance under the terms of this Ordinance, the City Manager shall place such protest on the agenda of the City Council, give notice to the protestant of the time and place of the next meeting of the City Council, and state in such notice that the City Council will make a determination as to whether the protestant's vehicle constitutes a nuisance under the terms of this Ordinance, and shall invite the protestant to appear in person or by an attorney and present the reasons for his protest. If, after hearing the evidence and making such investigation as the Council deems necessary, the Council shall determine that the vehicle in question constitutes a nuisance, the Council may order the same removed from the premise, or, it may recommend prosecution in Corporation Court in accordance with the penal provisions hereof.

SECTION VI. OWNER MAY ACQUIRE POSSESSION:

The bona fide owner of any such junked vehicle or junked vehicles which have been impounded in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance may acquire possession of such junked vehicle or junked vehicles by paying the costs of abatement as shall have been computed in accordance with the preceding section and by paying a reasonable storage charge based upon the period of time such junked vehicle or vehicles have been impounded.

SECTION VII. ABANDONMENT AND SALE; SEVERABILITY:

In the event that possession of the bona fide owner thereof of any junked vehicle or junked vehicles impounded in accordance with the provision hereof is not acquired within ninety days from the date of such impoundment, such junked ve-



COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Cotton insect control is no longer simple and easy. We will continue to see greater difference in producers' management abilities as expressed by yield differences. These differences will be greater as the complexity of an intelligent control program increases. Basically, cotton insect control recommendations can be summarized as follows: 1. Maintain a knowledge of the insect population levels through regular field inspections. 2. Apply insecticides only on the basis of insect infestations and damage as determined by field inspections. 3. Carefully consider the immediate results, as well as the long-range effects, of any insect control program. 4. As early as possible following harvest destroy stalks in the field to reduce the food supply of potential overwintering populations of boll weevils, bollworms, tobacco budworms, and pink bollworms. In Fisher County in the heavy weevil areas it has been proven that spraying has paid for farmers. Fleahopper control has also put money in many of our farmers pocket.

Brush and weed control is necessary for greatest returns from forage production and for improving pastures and ranges in poor to fair condition.

Generally weeds are a minor problem on ranges supporting a vigorous and dense stand of grass. The problem is to properly balance weeds and grass by using management, control and grazing management to maintain forage production and sustained improvement.

While weedy plants furnish food and cover for wildlife and some young plants are utilized by livestock, other weeds at different growth stages are poisonous to livestock.

Brush and weed control programs should be planned to leave necessary food and cover for game animals and birds since wildlife is a valuable source of income. Thus, control, good grazing management and soil and water conservation should be worked into the overall plan for improving forage production and income from livestock and wildlife resources.

Insect stings can be deadly. Figures on a national basis show that more deaths result from bee stings than

hicle or junked vehicles shall be deemed to have been abandoned and may be sold by the City. Proceeds from any such sale shall first be applied to reduce or satisfy the storage charges computed in accordance with the above section, and any amount of such proceeds then remaining shall be applied to reduce or satisfy the lien perfected. Such lien shall remain in full force and effect with respect to any portion of the costs of abatement remaining unsatisfied.

SECTION VIII. PENALTY: The violation of any provision of this Ordinance relating to the maintaining of a public nuisance as described herein or in permitting or allowing such public nuisance to exist shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$200.00, and each day's violation thereof shall be, and is hereby declared to be a distinct and separate offense and punishable as such.

SECTION IX. EFFECTIVE DATE:

This ordinance shall become effective and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law, and it is so ordained.

from bites of poisonous snakes.

The list of stinging insects includes bees, wasps, hornets and yellow jackets.

While the reaction by most individuals is a sharp pain for a short time followed by swelling, the reaction by others may be acute allergy, a serious illness or even death for some people. Yellowbees and hornets are listed as the worst offenders.

Persons sensitive to insect stings must be extremely cautious when doing jobs which expose them to stinging insects.

It is suggested to use a good insect repellent or the wearing of protective clothing when working outdoors. Light colored clothing is suggested.

Avoid sudden motion. Motion and air movement will attract a mad bee. Bees and wasps most often sting when they are touched or their nests disturbed.

Persons sensitive to insect stings are advised to see the advice of a physician on what to do in case of a sting. It could save a life.

The most critical time for newly planted trees and shrubs is during the first summer. Because of the reduced root system, many plants have difficulty getting established. Rather than frequent watering, give the plants a thorough soaking to a depth of 8-12 inches. Al-

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Hobbs HD Club Studies V-D

Hobbs Home Demonstration Club met June 12 in the home of Mrs. James Nettleton. Roll call was answered by "Date of Last Physical."

Mrs. Nell Helms and Mrs. Doshia Cave gave a program obtained from the Texas Department of Health on "Venereal diseases in which it stated.

"The two most common venereal diseases in this country are syphilis and gonorrhea. They are spread by having sexual intercourse with someone who has the disease. In very rare instances syphilis may be spread by kissing. These germs are very fragile and can live only a few seconds there is no danger from toilet outside the body, therefore seats or eating utensils.

The American Medical Association recently announced, venereal disease now is the nation's most urgent communicable disease problem. One out of every four reported cases occurs in young persons under twenty. They are responsible for nearly half of all reportable communicable diseases in adults.

Syphilis is caused by a germ which can attack and damage any tissue or organ in the body, especially the brain, heart, liver and bones. The first sign of syphilis is usually a painless sore on the sex organs, which appears ten to ninety days after exposure. The sore will go away even if not treated. This leads many to believe the disease cured. Other signs of syphilis may be a rash on any part of the body, bald spots where patches of hair fall out, fever, sore throat and splitting headaches. The signs are so similar to other diseases that only a doctor can tell if a person has syphilis. After these signs disappear, the germ may be hidden for one to twenty-five years, before any damage shows up. Then suddenly, may develop

mental illness, blindness, crippled or develop heart disease. A blood test will detect hidden syphilis. Syphilis cannot be inherited, but an expectant mother who has syphilis can transmit the disease to her unborn child. The State of Texas requires couples have blood test before marriage.

Gonorrhea is caused by a bacteria called gonococcus. It can cause sterility, arthritis and blindness. Prompt and proper treatment is important to prevent serious body damage. The signs of gonorrhea will usually appear three to five days after exposure. Common signs are, 1. a pus discharge from the sex organs. 2. a painful burning sensation during urination for men. These symptoms are not always noticed in women and gonorrhea may not be discovered until it has caused serious damage.

Both syphilis and gonorrhea can be cured. The earlier treatment is begun the easier the cure. Self treatment is dangerous. There is no substitute for a licensed doctor. If money is a problem, most health departments have free clinics where good doctors and nurses are anxious to help.

Help is needed to eradicate these diseases. If you are a parent, learn the facts about syphilis and gonorrhea. See that your youngsters learn, also. If you are a teacher, don't be afraid to tackle these diseases in their proper context. If you are a member of an organization, motion pictures and speakers are available from the health department. If you are a responsible citizen, urge civic organizations, youth leaders, educators and others to support measures to eradicate these diseases and endorse venereal disease education in every Texas school."
