Immunization Schedule

Following is a schedule of immunization for Rotan Schools:

March 10 — Diphtheria-Perussis-Tetanus (any combination)

March 26 — Typhoid

April 9 — Typhoid

April 16 — Typhoid

April 23 — Diphtheria-Perussis-Tetanus (any combination)

April 30 — Tuberculin Skin Test

May 7 — Smallpox

May 14 — Diphtheria-Perussis-Tetanus.

All immunizations are to be given in the basement of the East Wing of the hospital, beginning at 1:30 p. m. Pre-school children should come at 1:00 p. m.

Only one immunization will be given at a time and only the one listed. If a pupil is unable to take the vaccine because of illness, etc., he will be allowed to take it on the Friday afternoon following, if accompanied by a note from his principal.

The TB skin test will be given to all first and seventh grades, and to all new students in the system. If a pupil has redness or swelling at the site of the Tuberculin Skin Test, he should be seen by a school nurse 2 days following the test for evaluation. A record of the reaction reading recorded by the nurse and any recommendations for further evaluation be turned over to the family physician.

Students who did not receive the Oral Polio vaccine should be urged to obtain it from their family physician.

Latest recommendations for boosters are as follows:

(1) Diphtheria - Pertussis - Tetanus - every 5 years.

(2) Typhoid - every 5 years

(3) Smallpox, Challenge every 5 years.

A charge of 50c per shot will be made which will be collected at the time the shot is given only.

Washington, D.C. — It is almost axiomatic that one invites controversy when discussing religion or religious institutions unless in the confines of his own. It may, however, be acceptable to consider what appears to be non-religious aspects of an organization related to many of our churches.

Dr. J. Lester McGeen of Centenary United Methodist Church of St. Louis feels that words from some pulpits and some religious teachings outside doctrine is partially responsible for riots and disorders.

As Dr. McGeen is quoted: "We are seeking to reform the World rather than to convert the individual person. No, I don't think we are trying to reform the World, we are just doing our best to conform to the World. Many preachers have been finding of late that the gods of big Government, civil disobedience and the 'new morality' have feet of clay. Meanwhile, the moral fabric of our society has been torn asunder and a secularized church is baffled before the evils of our time."

Many devoted Christians were shocked recently at press reports that "a study committee of the National Council of Churches has reported that violence is an acceptable tool for use by victims of injustice."

Apparently some of the most active and dedicated promoters of big Government, civil disobedience, the "new morality," and the various social action groups were formed within or attached themselves to, the broad category of religion.

Over a period of time, the official publications of the National Council of Churches reveal that their "General Board" has issued policy statements on most controversial issues of the day. It is hardly likely that any real effort is made to learn the views of the millions of members whose churches are identified with the Council. The record indicates that the Council has supported practically all big Government spending schemes of the most liberal nature, such as an endorsement of the guaranteed annual income for everyone as a "matter of right." They have also called for legislation for the purpose of the "reallocation of national resources" to the "poor and powerless."

The Council has a very active lobby in Washington and exerts its pressures on Congress for big increases in programs which have failed to reach goals to any appreciable degree intended. The Council has recommended huge increases in foreign aid spending, most of which they would channel through agencies of the United Nations. Incidentally, it is the agency offshoots of the United Nations which have blurred and distorted its original intent of keeping World peace. Many of these organizations within the United Nations are like barnacles on the ship of good intent.

The Council favors admitting Red China into the United Nations and would reduce and weaken United States military strength in areas near communist China. At the same time they recommend "an increase in and tightening of economic sanctions and political pressures" against little Rhodesia who is trying to mind its own business.

The National Council through its "Youth Ministry" seems to take pride that they were at the Democratic Convention in Chicago and took part in the riots. In explaining their presence they say they assumed a new role—"not as an observer or a reconciler or even a 'presence' but one who identifies with and joins the cause." The Kerner Commission, in a milder form than the Council, found that "white racism" was a major factor in recent city

Special Tax Rule On Dependent

Dallas — Special tax rules apply when children jointly support their father or mother, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said today.

Even though not one of them provided more than half the parent's support for the year, tax laws provide that one of the children may claim the parent's exemption for tax purposes, Mr. Campbell said. To do this, the child claiming the exemption must have contributed at least 10 percent of the parent's support and the other dependency requirements must have been met.

Mr. Campbell said that in these circumstances, the children can decide among themselves which will claim the tax exemption. The others are then required to fill out a special form stating that they will not claim the exemption. These forms are filed with the return of the one claiming the exemption.

IRS Publication 501, "Your Exemptions and Exemptions for Dependents," which furnishes more detailed information on this subject, and copies of Form 2120, Multiple Support Declaration, may be obtained by dropping a post card to Supply, Internal Revenue Service, P.O. Box 1738, Dallas, Tex. 75221.

The Council goes further. They contend that white racism and white resistance to black attempts to gain power "are the foremost cause of the 'crisis' in our Nation." The group supported the so-called "Poor Peoples March" on Washington last year.

Dr. Arthur S. Flemming, Council President, has labeled "police repression of social dissent" as "pagan." The policy line of the Council is "voluntary compliance" with those laws which are "just and equitably enforced" — an individual should obey only those laws which he favors. This line is followed up with one which would permit draftees to seek "exemption from a particular war" and that there should be no requirement of proof that objection to serving in the Armed Forces be based on any religious belief.

Evidently the Council is substantially financed from outside its affiliated churches. Observers conclude that it espouses causes of the liberal left much louder and more effectively than that of the church bodies it supposedly represents.

The Council is only one of a multitude of organizations representing a philosophy—a point of view—calculated to influence our Nation's affairs. If we, as citizens, dislike Federal legislation produced under these pressures, it is an indication we have lost control by default, of the institutions we support. To whatever organizations we belong, participation is necessary if we expect to shape and influence its policies.





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COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Shillingburg New PCA Head

The American Hereford Association is sponsoring a series of regional clinics to further acquaint all cattlemen with the Total Performance Records program. TPR is an excellent program and is providing breeders with a valuable tool for herd improvement. The TPR program will be explained in detail at the Pied Piper Farm in Hamlin on March 25. The program will begin at 10:00 a.m. and end at approximately 3:00 p.m. Leon Freeze, Texas Hereford Fieldman, will be on the program. All registered and commercial Hereford breeders are urged to attend.

Mr. Shillingburg graduated from Texas A&M College in 1935, majoring in Animal Husbandry and minoring in Agronomy. During his high school and college years he took an active part in livestock judging, winning honors in St. Louis, Kansas City and Chicago. He spent ten years teaching Vocational Agriculture in Ralls, Colorado City and Ballinger. In 1945 he was employed by the Soil Conservation Service as a specialist in farm and ranch conservation planning. Spent two years as Assistant Manager of the Ralph Collins Ranches located in Fisher, Coke, Sterling and Palo Pinto Counties, Texas and Eddy County, New Mexico. In October of 1955, he joined Sweetwater Production Credit Association as Assistant Manager. He brings to SPCA a varied knowledge and experience in all lines of agriculture and ranching.

Mike Herron, Fisher County 4-H Member, will compete in showmanship contest sponsored by the Texas Angus Association in Ft. Worth this weekend. Winners of the contest will receive a trip to the National Angus Futurity to be held in Kentucky this summer.

What does the calibration of equipment mean to a good farmer or manager? It means more money in his pocket and the reputation of being a better manager.

Calibration of equipment means knowing, for example, that a fertilizer distributor will spread 1,800 pounds to the acre and not 1,000 pounds or 2,500 pounds.

The calibration of sprayers is more critical than that of other equipment because the results can be more disastrous.

Under-planting or sowing means you are losing a definite percentage of your soil's production capacity. How long would you keep a low producing cow or a tractor that was running on 3 cylinders instead of 4? Over-planting or sowing means a waste of expensive seed and too much competition between plants.

Why not do something about the calibration if your planters, grain drills, fertilizer distributors, chemical applicators and spray rigs? Operator's manuals which come with most machines usually contain calibration instructions and they should be studied and understood.

A large healthy tree is a valuable and often irreplaceable asset to any property. But many such trees are damaged beyond repair because construction crews, supervisors or property owners are careless in excavation and construction activities.

The damage often results from lack of knowledge about proper precautions needed to protect the tree when the soil around it must be disturbed. The addition or removal of soil can upset the delicate balance between the soil and tree roots and can seriously damage or kill the tree.

In most cases, the majority of the feeder roots of a large established tree and found within the top 18 inches of the soil below the existing grade. Normally, roots spread out in all directions to a distance equal to the spread of the tree's branches.

Another source of trouble is wounds caused by grading and excavation equipment, permitting insects or fungus diseases to enter the tree.

Heavy traffic by trucks, cars and equipment often compacts the soil tightly in the root zone, slowing down or stopping the movement of air and water to the roots, thus weakening the vigor of the tree.

Water and oxygen are essential to the health and well-being of a tree and many soil micro-organisms also require these vital materials for normal growth and development. The lack of oxygen in the soil results in a buildup of noxious gases and chemicals detrimental to healthy growth.

It is much easier to protect a valuable tree than trying to

R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, said today that any one who first became eligible for social security benefits under the 1967 Amendment to the law stands to lose some benefits if not applied for before 3-1-69.

Under the 1967 social security changes in the law, benefits may now be payable to the following:

1. Young disabled workers who previously didn't qualify for disability insurance payments because they had insufficient work credits.

2. Disabled widows and dependent widowers age 50-62; and

3. Children of women workers who were insured at the time of their death, disability, or retirement, but who did not meet the former recent work requirement.

Tuley said he is sure that there are some people in the Abilene area who may be in line for payments under the 1967 Amendments, but who have not yet applied for them. He said that despite extensive publicity given to the Amendments, some people still may not have heard about the changes in the law. Tuley urged those who believe they or a member of their family might qualify for these social security benefits to get in touch with the social security office before the end of February. 



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**ORDER FOR ELECTION
 PROCEDURE IN WATER
 DISTRICT DIRECTORS
 ELECTION**

THE STATE OF TEXAS
 COUNTY OF FISHER

On this the 13th day of February, 1969, the Board of Directors of Rotan Municipal Water Authority convened in regular session, open to the public, with the following members present, to-wit: W. I. Branch, President, Bill Hardy, Cecil Edwards, and the following absent: John Gray and Bartlett Strayhorn, constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings had by said Board of Directors was the following:

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas provide that an annual election shall be held in this District on the 1st Tuesday of April of each year for the purpose of electing members to the Board of Directors of said District and the next ensuing 1st Tuesday in April being the 1st day of April 1969;

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas provide that said Directors election shall be ordered by the Board of Directors of said District, and further provide that the notice of said election shall state the purpose of the election, the officers to be voted upon, the polling places and the names of the officers of election, and further provide that said notice shall be posted once a week for three consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the county or counties in which said District is located, the first publication being at least 21 days prior to the election, and not more than 35 days prior thereto;

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas provide that the statutes regulating voting are applicable to said Directors election in said District; Whereas it is anticipated that the order calling the above mentioned directors' election will be passed by this Board on the 13th day of February, 1969;

Whereas at the next above mentioned directors' election there will be elected three directors for this district;

Whereas the laws of the State of Texas do not fully set forth the procedure to be followed by candidates filing for said office of Directors of said District, and this Board has the power and authority to establish said procedure, and in order to comply with the above mentioned provisions, it is reasonable to require that all persons desiring a place on the ballot as a candidate for director of said district must apply at least 15 days prior to the date of election for his name to be placed in said ballot

THEREFORE be it ordered by the Board of Directors of Rotan Municipal Water Authority:

1. That all candidates for the Board of Directors of said District at the election to be held on the 1st day of April, 1969, filed their application to become a candidate with the Secretary of this Board at Rotan City Hall on or before the 15th day of March, 1969, said date being 15 days prior to the date when this Board of Directors will issue its order calling said election.

1 tblsp. olive oil
1/2 c. flour
1 tsp. prepared mustard
2 tsp. onion powder
1/2 tsp. dried basil
1/2 tsp. garlic powder
3/4 c. water

Melt butter in saucepan; re-
move from heat. Add flour
and stir until moistened. Add
remaining ingredients, except
water; stir until smooth.
Gradually stir in water.

To Use: Cook 1-pint pack-
age frozen beans in 1/2 c light-
ly salted water until tender.
Add 4 Tomato Sauce Cubes.
Stir and continue cooking un-
til sauce is smooth and thick.
