Of the many great days in the history of our Country,  
none is more universally celebrated, none more filled with  
meaning to true patriots, than July 4, 1776, the birthday of  
the United States of America.

Thomas Jefferson was entrusted with the important work  
of writing what was to become the birth certificate of a new  
nation. No happier choice could have been made. Jef-  
ferson, though only thirty-three years of age, had been for  
some time a leader of the colonial cause in Virginia.  
The location of the house in which he wrote the Declara-  
tion has definitely been established, although it un-  
fortunately is no longer standing. It was on the southwest  
corner of Market and Seventh Streets in Philadelphia. The  
desk upon which he wrote has been preserved. More than  
one hundred years later, as a gift from the family, it became  
a treasured possession of the Department of State in Wash-  
ington.

Never in the history of political writing has the fun-  
damental basis of government been so clearly stated as in  
Jefferson's Declaration. The ideas were what the colo-  
nists all believed and were fighting for—but Jefferson  
possessed the ability of combining words and phrases that  
cling to the memory. To this day such phrases as  
"We hold these truths to be self-evident; that all men  
are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator  
with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life,  
Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness," are as true today  
as the day Jefferson wrote them. Have you read them  
lately?

## COUNTY AGENT NEWS

county agents column . . . . . Don't blame the farmer for higher food prices. In fact, explains Dr. Wm. E. Black, Extension economist at Texas A&M University, farmers are the consumers' best friend.

The American agricultural industry continues to produce more than commercial markets will absorb at prevailing prices and they can do even better if the situation should warrant.

This unparalleled production has kept food prices from rising higher than they are while the prices received by the farmer have averaged no more, most often considerable less, than those of 20 years ago.

But, the food marketing bill has more than doubled in the last 20 years. And there are lots of reasons. The increased population has upped the volume of food marketing services have jumped by one-half because consumers want and are getting more sorting, grading, trimming, packaging, processing and storage, more built-in conveniences and they are eating more and more away from home.

He also noted that labor costs account for nearly half of the total food marketing bill—have doubled. New plant and equipment costs along with transportation, materials for packaging, interest, rent and taxes keep climbing as do production costs for the farmer. Our agricultural producers are striving to meet this price-cost squeeze by producing more at lower cost and are today the most efficient producers in the nation. They too, are pushing hard for more efficient marketing and product promotion.

Consumers continue to be favored by increasing incomes while farm income lags. Despite higher food prices, consumers spend less of their incomes for food than any time in history and are getting the best.

For comparison, consumers might ponder these figures. For all items except food, the cost has increased 42 per cent; transportation is up 60 per cent; housing 42 per cent; rent 52 per cent and medical care 86 per cent; while all food, including eating away from home, has increased about 37 per cent over the past 20 years.

It's Black's contention that consumers should be ever grateful to this nation's agricultural producers who have stayed on the job, cutting expenses wherever possible and putting on the dinner tables of this nation the finest food in the greatest abundance ever known. Black doesn't believe many consumers would be willing to trade places with a farmer in order to have an opportunity to share the odds a farmer faces every day in the operation of his business.

Euonymus and other evergreen plants are frequently damaged by scale insects and heavily infested plants are often killed.

Adult scale insects form a protective layer of wax over the body. Female scale insects never move from under the scale; however, the male continues to move about, eventually mates with the female, and dies. The female soon deposits her eggs and dies shortly thereafter. From the eggs small "crawlers" or nymphs emerge. The crawlers then search out a place to start feeding, thus expanding the infested area. There are several generations of scale insects each year.

Control of scale insects can be obtained by spraying plants with malathion, diazinon or dimethoate in summer oil mixed with water. Repeated applications should be made until the scale insects are dead. This may be tested by running your finger over

er the infested stem or leaf; if you get a yellowish stain on it, the scales are still alive. If all you get are brown or white scales, the scale insects are dead.

An active ingredient having anti-cancer properties has been isolated from a plant extract and identified as lirioidenine by U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists. The material comes from dried wood and bark of Annona glabra, a relative of the custard-apple family of shrubs and trees found in Florida. Experiments conducted by the scientists have shown significant inhibition of human cancer cells in cell cultures.

An inexpensive by-product of the cotton-seed oil refining process has been found by Texas A&M University researchers to contain a factor which prevents common scours in calves. Dr. R. E. Leighton of the A&M Animal Science Department says excellent success has been obtained in the past two years with dairy calves fed a milk-replacer formula containing the substance.

## Hobbs Club Stresses Cotton

Hobbs Home Demonstration Club met June 26 in the home of Mrs. Sue Miers. In calling the roll each member was asked, "What Are You Wearing that is Cotton?" Bible scripture was read from Mark 12:28-31.

Program subject was, "Promotion of Cotton". Mrs. Opal Phillips reported on activities of an organization of women in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas, who are promoting the use of Cotton. Among other promotion activities they canvassed the stores and asked what was available in 100 percent Cotton. Then she published in the paper a list of stores saying "Here Are The Stores Where You Can Buy Comfortable, Carefree, Cotton Clothes." The thing that counted most was having 200 to 300 ladies demanding Cotton and absolutely refusing to buy anything but Cotton.

Mrs. Dale Cave stated that the Cotton Council is making progress in its promotion of Cotton through the \$1 per bale collected for Cotton Research and promotion. The 1968 crop was 10,428,000 bales and Hobbs ginned 8,700 bales.

One of the things that has put Cotton growers in trouble is the fact that blends and synthetic fibers do not require much ironing. Some do not require ironing at all. The Cotton Council is making intensive research to produce Cotton fabrics that do not require ironing.

Other than clothing, there are many uses for Cotton, some of them are, stuffing for furniture, mattresses, thread, rope, string, sheets, towels, draperies, trapaulins, awning, tents, salad oil, margarine, shortening, soap, cosmetics, roofing material, linoleum, lacquers, paints, cattle food and many others.

By 1970 we have been promised more and better Cotton permapress materials that will stand up through laundering without ironing. Cotton is one of our principal businesses in Fisher County, and we need to support it. Ask for Cotton, Buy Cotton.

### THE CENTER OF THE GOOD NEWS.

The expectation of the coming of the Messiah was high among the Jews (also, the pagans of His time were expecting a great world-wide saviour), and most Jews could quote, or at least refer to the scriptures that predicted His coming. Isaiah 7:14 predicted his BIRTH by womanhood as a sign; Isaiah 9:6, predicted His GREATNESS; Deuteronomy 18:15, His authority as a LAW-GIVEN; Malachi, the fourth chapter predicted His INTRODUCTION by His forerunner, the "Elijah Prophet."

John the Baptizer (the Elijah Prophet), brought to the very highest degree the immediate and imminent expectation of the Christ. Thousands came from town to town in order to hear this dynamic preacher tell about the Messiah and His coming Kingdom that was "just around the corner." "John did baptize in the wilderness and preach the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins . . . saying, 'repent ye for the Kingdom of God is at hand.'" (Matthew 3:2-Mark 1:4)

Soon after the Christ had come, most of John's disciples left him and went to follow Jesus. Of course this was God's plan. (John 1:19-30) All through Jesus' life He created within His followers the anticipation of the coming Kingdom. He assured them that many who had left all to follow Him during His life would not die until they had seen the Kingdom established. (Mark 9:1)

But, first the apostles must be selected and taught the laws of the Kingdom. For three years He disciplined these selected 12 until after His resurrection and finally He sends these uneducated men to teach the entire population of the earth the story of His LIFE, DEATH, AND RESURRECTION. The only commission these men have (BEFORE ONE OFFICIAL WORD IS EVER WRITTEN DOWN AND CANONIZED AS SCRIPTURE), was the one Christ had given: "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father, the son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have taught you and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the world." (Matthew 28:19-20)

These were the MARCHING ORDERS of the first century church and so they are the orders of the modern church, IF Christ STILL is the Son of God, IF he still has ALL authority both in HEAVEN and on EARTH. This is the credential of the witnessing disciple today; this is THE CENTER OF THE GOOD NEWS. (Acts 2:22-38; 8:12; 8:27-40; 9:18; 10:47-48; 61: 31-33; 18:8; 19:5; 22: .aIG 22:16)

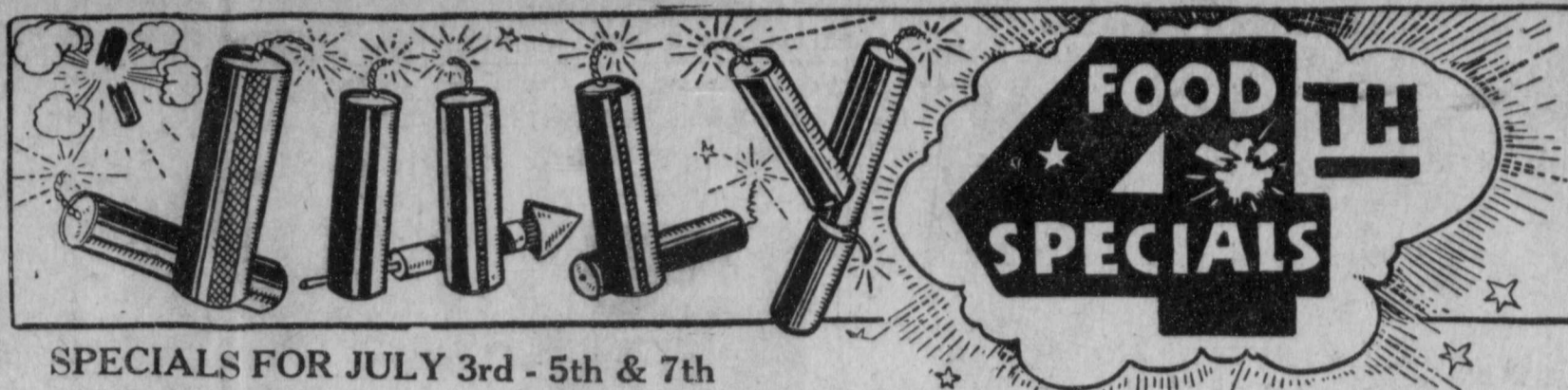
A business meeting followed with Mrs. James Cave presiding and roll call was answered with What Am I Wearing Made of Cotton.
