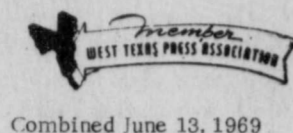

What is your favorite food, and who cooks it best?



"Um-m, good! Green is the best cook in the whole world."

Byron's Favorite: Green's Chicken and Dumplings
 1 large fryer, cut up, boil until tender.
 1 cup broth from chicken, cooled.
 1 tsp. salt
 2 tsp. baking powder
 2 Tbsp. Crisco
 Flour enough to make stiff dough.
 Roll out on bread board until real thin. Cut into strips about 1 inch wide, then cut into shorter lengths. Drop into rapidly boiling chicken broth and cook until done.

Another Favorite: Fruit Cake Cookies
 1 lb. dates
 1/2 lb. candied cherries
 1/2 lb. pineapple
 1 lb. pecans
 2-1/2 cups flour
 1 tsp. each, soda, salt, cinnamon
 2 eggs
 Cut fruit and nuts into large pieces. Sift together flour, soda, salt, and cinnamon. Use about 1/2 cup flour to dredge fruit and nuts. Cream butter and sugar. Beat eggs into the creamed mixture. Add fruits, nuts and remaining dry ingredients, and mix well. Drop by teaspoon onto ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 350 deg. until golden brown.

Mrs. Green's Favorite: Eagle Brand Fruit Cake
 1 lb. pecans, chopped
 1 lb. dates, chopped
 1 lb. coconut
 1/2 lb. candied cherries, cut in small pieces
 1/2 lb. candied pineapple, chopped
 2 cans Eagle Brand Milk
 Pour Eagle Brand milk over chopped dates and let stand over night. Next morning, work dates and milk together well; add other ingredients. Mix well. Put into well greased and floured stem pan and place in cooker. Put a small amount of water in the cooker and steam for 2 hours. Remove from cooker and place in 250 deg. oven for 25 to 30 minutes.

Mrs. Nancy Tandy is the fifteenth president of Gamma Tau Chapter of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society, International. She teaches seventh and eighth grade English in Rotan Junior High School. Mrs. Tandy says, "I chose teaching because I have always enjoyed working with other people, and I felt, that as a teacher, I could contribute something worthwhile to society." In addition to teaching, Mrs. Tandy finds time for her favorite hobbies. She says, "I like to sew, read and crochet." Mrs. Tandy was initiated into this honorary teachers organization in the fall of 1966 and has been an enthusiastic member since that time. She has served as chairman of various committees and was first vice president and program chairman for the preceding administration. When asked what she appreciates most about Delta Kappa Gamma, Mrs. Tandy replied, "There is something about this organization that gives one a boost. The opportunity for professional women to meet on a social basis as well as professional makes it different from any other group. I always seem to be motivated to become a better teacher and person. Since becoming president of this chapter I have become more aware of the many, many programs and projects that we are involved with. The scholarship program is marvelous perhaps it is our most important service to members. But there are others such as the Emergency Relief Fund to assist those who suffer losses in disaster areas. Delta Kappa Gamma's "Project North America" is unique in its method of aiding North American Indians. It is an effort in education that involves a two-way cultural understanding." Mrs. Eunah Holden, a past international president, wrote in OUR HERITAGE, "The Delta Kappa Gamma Society is unique in the annals of organizations. Its future can be determined in terms of the sustained efforts of its members in carrying out the program of work." Compared with many organi-

organizations, Delta Kappa Gamma is relatively young. It was organized on My 11, 1929 in Austin, Texas and since that time has spread throughout the fifty-one states, the Provinces of Canada, Norway, Sweden and Denmark. The phenomenal growth is witness that women educators have found it to be something more than just another professional organization. The twelve founders, led by Dr. Annie Webb Blanton, planned well before organizing the Delta Kappa Gamma Society. The purposes they initiated are as applicable today as they were in 1929. It would be impossible to evaluate the total impact of this Society upon education and upon the personal growth of its members. Gamma Tau Chapter of Fisher and Nolan Counties celebrated its thirty-first birthday on April 19, 1972. In looking back, it seems surprising that the Society was only twelve years old when Gamma Tau organized. Miss Eula Lee Carter of Fort Worth organized the chapter and has maintained a close bond of fellowship throughout the years. Mrs. Florine Miller (now Young) and Miss Josie Baird compiled a history of the chapter's first 4 years. It shows the trials of a small struggling chapter during the years of World War II which began that same year. Twelve Charter Members were presented a baby rattle by Miss Carter. It was to be used as a gavel until the membership reached twenty. When that was accomplished, Miss Carter promised the gift of a real gavel. Due to the constant turn-over in teaching personnel, as soon as a new member was initiated one moved away. At the end of four years there were only seventeen members. But eventually the chapter grew in numbers and the rattle was exchanged for the promised gavel!

Wouldn't Miss Estelle be happy to know that one of her first graders has grown up to be a torch bearer for Delta Kappa Gamma. 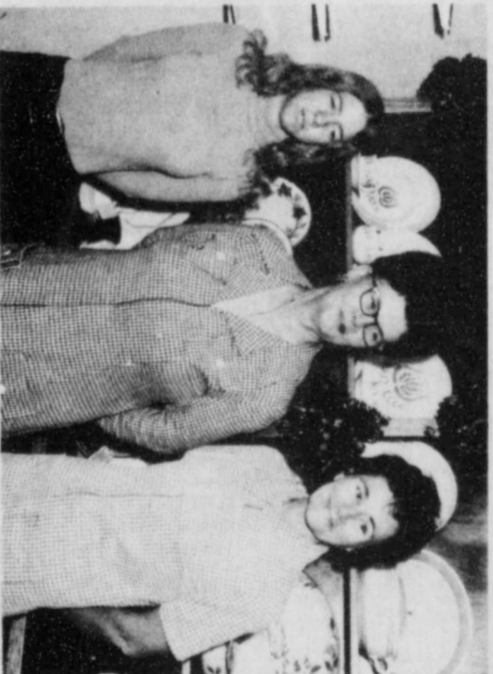

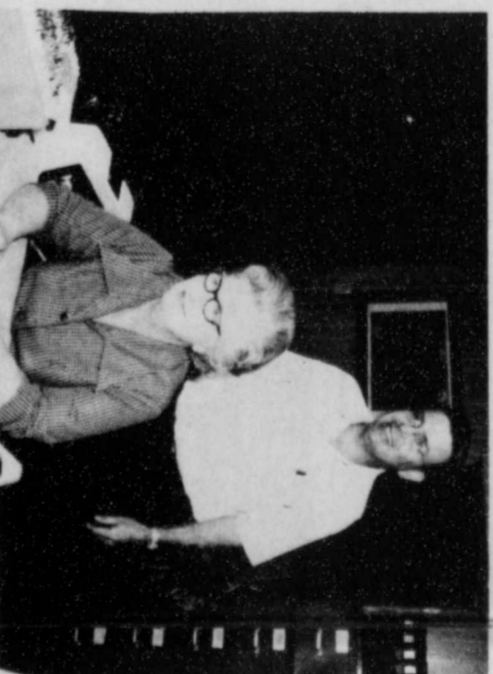

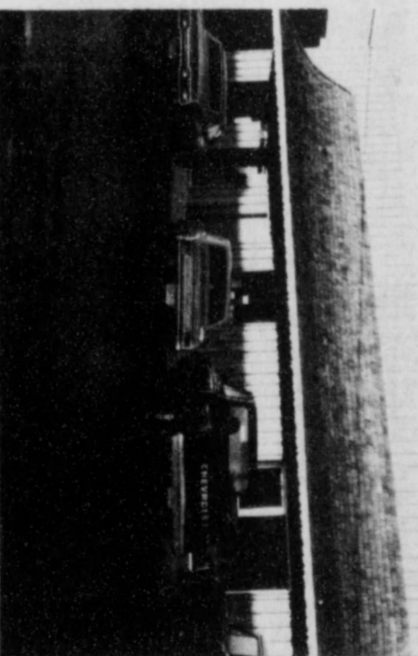

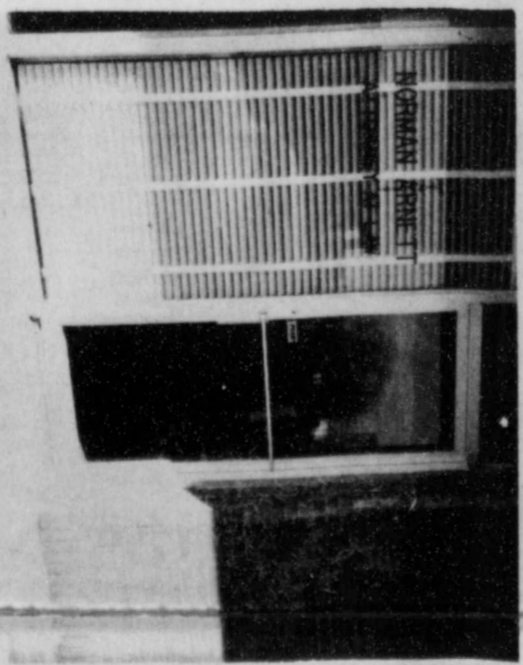

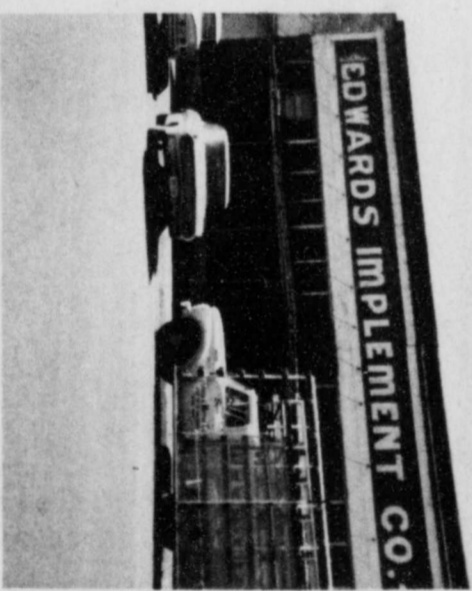

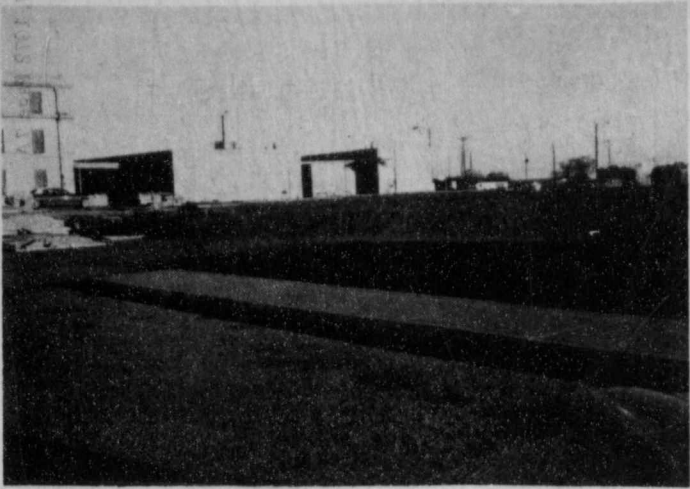

Today's parents know that play is one of the chief ways through which children learn, grow and develop.

Play is a great builder. First of all, it builds strong bodies by putting muscles to work. Play is one of the chief means by which a child acquires knowledge and learns to think. In play, children sort out their experiences and come to understand them. They play at being parents, teachers, doctors and at holding weddings and funerals. In this way they work over their ideas of life and its meaning.

Play develops a child mentally. It teaches him to think through and to solve his problems. The small child who builds a "House" with blocks is not only building but planning. The child who plays hide-and-seek has to plan and to think ahead to avoid getting caught and to catch others.

Play contributes to a child's emotional development in several ways. First, it should help him learn to express and control his emotions—anger, fear and jealousy. The child should learn to control his anger when he can't have his own way in a play group. Play provides wholesome and acceptable outlets for his aggressive and hostile feelings.

Group play is also important in the social development of a child. Every child has four sets of teachers—home, school, community and playmates. The latter plays a vital part in a child's development.

Parents, in co-operation with neighbors and community organizations, should see that children have adequate play-ground space and plenty of wholesome activities to engage in under the wise supervision of adults. Supervision should not be overdone. It adults dominate the child's play group too much its educational value for a child is apt to be lost. Opportunities for free play for children should also be provided. Parents can assist a child too, not only by helping him to learn through group play but also by helping him to enjoy being by himself occasionally. The child may also need help in learning that, at times, particularly in matters of right and wrong, he should be able to stand out from the group rather than sink his individuality in it.

The Sylvester Coop Gin, managed by Billy Jeffery, ginned 237 bales during the reporting period giving them a total of 420.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Agricultural finance and credit are essential to food and fiber production and marketing in Texas. And with Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Month in progress, a closer look at this phase of agriculture is in order. The financial needs of Texas farmers and ranchers continue to expand as they invest in new technology, enlarge their operations, and increase borrowing for personal items. Of course, a prime need for additional financing is the increased prices of capital goods, such as real estate, machinery and other inputs.

Who is providing this credit? Non-real estate type loans--those made to meet current operating and living needs--are supplied largely by banks, production credit associations and similar organizations, and the Farmers Home Administration. Considering credit supplied by merchants, suppliers and others, the non-real estate loans in Texas total well over \$2 billion. As far as real estate loans for Texas farmers and ranchers are concerned, such loans have totaled more than \$2 billion for several years. Credit institutions providing these loans include banks, federal land banks, Farmers Home Administration, life insurance companies and individuals.

As the production and marketing of food and fiber products continues to increase in Texas and financial needs continue to grow, credit institutions will play an increasingly important role in meeting these needs. And farmers and ranchers must continue to place more emphasis on management, record keeping and the projection of profit potentials. It's a sound idea to update your estate by considering the assets of land, machinery, buildings, livestock, and other personal effects that you have accumulated during your lifetime. Why? So that you can cut the erosions of your resources. Estate planning can assist farm and ranch families by creating an equitable compromise for minimizing the amount of taxes due, distributing property as desired to beneficiaries and assuring financial security. Determining assets is a vital part of estate planning. The value of personal effects, real estate, stocks, bonds, bank accounts, life insurance policies and other business interests make up a part of the gross estate which may be taxable. In considering the value of these holdings, families should become familiar with the term, "fair market value." This is the value determined at time of death or six months thereafter. It is the price at which property changes hands in a reasonable time between a willing buyer and a willing seller, both having reasonable knowledge of the facts.

This means that the present selling of land and real estate in an area helps establish the fair market value. Once this value is established in an estate, costs associated with taxes and the amount of ready cash needed to settle an estate can be determined. The value of farm and ranch land has increased 10 per cent during the past year and all indications are that this climb in value will continue.

When it comes to distributing property, a will is an invaluable document. Seek the legal advice of an attorney in this matter. A series of fact sheets on estate planning are available at the County Extension Office which provide guidelines for sound estate planning. A new mildew and leaf rust-resistant, semi-winter barley--Tambar 401--has been developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Small Grains Section. James H. Gardenhire of the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Dallas said Tambar is a six-rowed rough-awned barley with leaves that are wider and more upright and twisted than those of Cordova. The new variety produced the highest average yield of all varieties grown in Central and North Texas tests from 1965 to 1971. It was particularly outstanding in the Rolling and High Plains areas. Under irrigation near Bushland, Tambar averaged 103.9 bushels, compared to 88.2 bushels for Will, the best yielding commercial variety. It was equal to Cordova in average test weight for all locations but had a lower average test weight than did Rogers. Tambar appears to equal Cordova in early fall and winter forage but may produce less forage in the spring. A late-maturing variety, 401 heads about the same time as Rogers and Will, and approximately five days later than Cordova. Straw is large and fairly stiff. It lodges more than Cordova but less than Will and Rogers under normal growing conditions. Winter survival tests at Bushland indicate that 401 is less winter-hardy than Will but equal to Cordova. Foundation seed of Tambar 401 can be obtained from the Foundation Seed Section, Texas A&M University, College Station, and from the Dallas Center.
