





Many stores either "make it" or lose out during the Christmas season, depending on whether business is good or bad. This is because the entire year's operation is frequently geared to the increased volume of sales at Christmas time. If this volume does not

that this is where they must spend their money. Often they give

most part, prices are right, as good as anywhere else, and the merchandise is comparable. The stores are owned and operated by Fisher County people who pay local taxes and support local institutions, by people who genuinely appreciate your patronage. They are people whom you know, who will still be here to back up defective merchandise and make it good.

We fully realize that it is impossible to "shop at home" in all instances. If local merchants are not aggressive enough to stock what you are in the market for then you feel compelled to go where you can find the item to fill your order.

Fisher County businesses pay taxes that support our schools and churches and we feel that they are entitled to the "first crack" at filling your order. If they are concerned about your business they will let you know the merchandise they have and its' cost.

When a dollar is spent in Abilene or Sweetwater it is gone forever. When it's spent in Fisher County it is here to be spent again, and again, and again.

If you make your living in Fisher County why not give some thought to keeping Fisher County on the grow by "shopping at home". 

Byron's Favorite: Green's Chicken and Dumplings
1 large fryer, cut up. Boil until tender.
1 cup broth from chicken, cooled.
1 tsp. salt
2 tsp. baking powder

2 Tbsp. Crisco Flour enough to make stiff dough. Roll out on bread board until

real thin. Cut into strips about 1 inch wide, then cut into short er lengths. Drop into rapidly boiling chicken broth and cook until done.

Another Favorite: Fruit Cake Cookies 1 lb. dates 1/2 lb. candied cherries 1/2 lb. pineapple 1 lb. pecans 2-1/2 cups flour 1 tsp.each.soda.salt.cinnamon 2 eggs

> Cut fruit and nuts into large pieces. Sift together flour, soda, salt, and cinnamon. Use about 1/2 cup flour to dredge fruit and nuts. Cream butter and sugar. Beat eggs into the creamed mixture. Add fruits, nuts and remaining dry indredients and mix well, Drop by teaspoon onto ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 350 deg. until golden brown.

Mrs. Green's Favorite: Eagle Brand Fruit Cake 1 1b. pecans, chopped 1 1b. dates, chopped


 1 lb. coconut
 1/2 lb. candied cherries, cut in small pieces
 1/2 lb. candied pineapple, chopped

2 cans Eagle Brand Milk Pour Eagle Brand milk over chopped dates and let stand over night. Next morning, work dates and milk together well; add other ingredients. Mix well. Put into well greased and floured stem pan and place in cooker. Put a small amount of water in the cooker and steam for 2 hours. Remove from cooker and place in 250 deg.oven for 25 to 30 minutes.

Larry and Beverly Landes purchased an interest in the Landes Furniture Business in 1968.



A new mildew and leaf rustresistant, semi-winter barley--Tambar 401-- has been develop ed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Small Grains Section.

James H. Gardenhire of the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Dallas said Tambar is a six- rowed rough-awned barley with leaves that are wider and more up right and twisted than those of Cordova.

The new variety produced the highest average yield of all varieties grown in Central and North Texas tests from 1965 to 1971. It was particularly outstanding in the Rolling and High Plains areas.

Under irrigation near Bushland, Tambar averaged 103.9 bushels, compared to 88.2 bushels for Will, the best vielding commercial variety. It was equal to Cordova in average test weight for all locations but had a lower average test weight than did Rogers.

Tambar appears to equal Cordova in early fall and winter forage but may produce less forage in the spring.

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
