## Robt. Lee Gets 1.55 Inches

A blustery thunderstorm moved into Coke County Monday afternoon bringing hard rains and high winds, but no hail was reported. The rain continued into the night and left a total of 1.55 inches at Robert Lee. Unseasonably cool weather accompanied the front.

Measurements in the Valley View community ran up to 2.5 inches. Reports indicated the rain was lighter north and west of town.

Bronte residents reported 1.5 to 1.8 inches in their rain gauges.

Farmers had several good days for harvesting wheat and oat crops and combines have been running like mad in an effort to get the bumper crops cut before they are damaged by rain, wind or hail.

The area southeast of here, including the hill country, San Antonio and Austin experienced more floods and millions of dollars of damage was done. A number of persons were drowned in the deep water. San Marcos was especially hard hit.

Judge Sims said there are two items on the agenda which will be presented to the commissioners: 1. the matter of employing another deputy sheriff and 2. consideration of a request from Colorado River Municipal Water

## Fisherman's Cove Purchased For Christian Camp Ground

Fisherman's Cove on Lake Spence has been sold and will be converted from a commercial enterprise into Rick's Christian Retreat and Family Camp Ground. The camp is being established in honor of Rick Fielding who was killed in a plane crash in December 1979. He was 26 years old.

A memorial fund was set up by young Fielding's parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Elvis Fielding of Abilene to finance the youth camp, which was a dream of their son, also a minister. The parents have agreed to match every contribution to the fund, dollar for dollar.

"Rick's devotion to young people or 'the kids,' as he referred to them, caused him to see they needed a place to have good, clean fun and to be led closer to the Lord," the parents said. "With the purchase of Fisherman's Cove at Robert Lee, we hope and pray this dream will come true and our son's death will have had a lasting purpose," they added.

In the beginning the plans were to donate the camp and grounds to their church district. However, it was eventually decided the project would be a non-denominational camp, and it would be a family camp, not just a youth camp.

The judge said he is very concerned with the rash of thefts and acts of vandalism which have occurred in the last several weeks. "It's really bad," he said, "and we must make some necessary arrangements to correct it. We need to do something or else abdicate and just let them (the thieves and vandals) have it."

All four of Coke County's commissioners were contacted by this newspaper and they were unanimous in their opinion that something needs to be done. However, there were some differences of opinion as to exactly how the problem can be solved.

The commissioners had complimentary words for the law enforcement officers of the county, but felt an additional deputy or something is needed to protect the lives and property of citizens.

Commissioner George Newby of Precinct I was pretty open with his opinion that an additional deputy is needed. "They're stealing everything that's loose and I'm for getting them law officers some help," Newby said.

Commissioner Finis Harmon of Precinct 3 said the county definitely needs something done and he is still thinking about just what the correct solution is. Harmon was of the opinion that the county

should not hire "just anybody" for the job. "We need to get an experienced lawman who knows the ropes. I think I could go along if we are sure we are getting somebody that can do the job," he said.

Commissioner Bobby Vaughn of Precinct 2 agreed that "we need to do something and 'if we can figure out something that will solve the problem, it's fine with me.'" Vaughn feels that "we need to take a hard look at this matter before making a decision." He pointed out that employing another deputy would entail considerable expense. "This wouldn't be just paying another salary," he said. "There's the matter of furnishing a car and keeping it in operation, additional social security and insurance and other expenses," he said.

Commissioner Jerry Parker of Precinct 4 said Tuesday night that, as of that time, he was not for hiring another deputy. He agreed with the other commissioners that "something needs to be done, but right now I don't know just what it is." He said another deputy might be a start toward solving the crime problem but he wasn't sure it would do the job. Parker indicated he wanted more information at the Friday meeting before he made up his mind on the matter.

From these interviews, it seems the judge and commissioners are in agreement that there is a problem and a solution is needed.

However, there may be some debate at Friday's meeting as to the best route to follow.

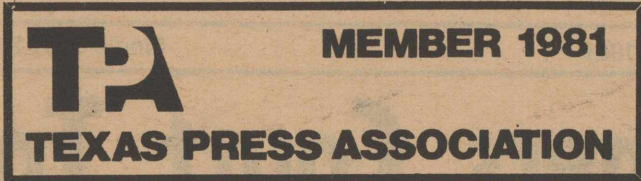

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## Wilson Bryan Puts In Many Hours Creating New Mini-Park

At about this time last year, 1980, Wilson Bryan, a member of Robert Lee's City Commission, became a familiar occupant of the corner of Austin and East 7th Streets, former site of a service station operated by Chig Brown and the late Freeman Clark. The city of Robert Lee had acquired the property, since it adjoined the lot on which City Hall is located, and Mayor Robert Vaughan appointed Wilson a "committee of one" to beautify the corner.

Since the lot had once been covered with caliche in order to create a parking lot, and later treated with poison to kill weeds, the outlook for a park seemed bleak. The committeeman, however, is good at visualizing improvements. (He surprised many people in 1978 by directing

activities that turned wasteland on Mountain Creek into a usable amphitheatre.)

As summer heat attacked Coke County in earnest, Wilson worked on while friends and strangers dropped by to visit and discuss the project. Gradually the overall plan became apparent except for an unsightly pile of dirt and rocks. "That?" he would shrug in answer to questions. "Can't you tell that's a waterfall?"

Great was the excitement of a small crowd one hot afternoon when electricity was turned on and "Cool, Cool Water" splashed over the fall into newly-created "Rocky Creek" below. Thanks to Monty Austin for helping with excavation, to West Texas Utility employees for electrical work, and to city employees, Randy Zelner, Bill Blanton, and Tio Torres for installation of the pump and other valuable assistance. Heavy wiring was donated by Earl Lindsey.

Wilson tells friends that his wife, Lucile, was boss during the six weeks he spent at the job. She admits helping at times, especially in decision-making concerning flower beds, but mostly she "verified that his plans were good." There were many others who helped, she explains.

The big red rock "down front" was once on a hill near Valley View cemetery and school house. Fern Havins and Martin Casey remember playing on it when they attended school there. The boulder had been pushed into a bar ditch by Fern in the early '30s when he worked for the highway department and helped build the San Angelo Highway. Later it was retrieved by the Bryans and

Placed at their concrete plant in Robert Lee. After Terry Frank Bryan bought the plant from his father and moved headquarters to San Angelo, he donated the red beauty to be used in the park. An employee at the plant, Tony Flores, delivered it with a loader. Indians who gouged out the holes on the rock's surface would be surprised to see the present location of their grain-grinding equipment.

V.H. (Vic) Collett, retired from many years of working on the Harris Ranch south of town, donated the marker indicating that San Angelo is "13 miles." Though it used to be on the "old Angelo road," Vic explains that he found it on the Harris Ranch which is farther than "S A 13." He does not know who moved it there.

Materials for the exposed-aggregate walk were donated by Terry Bryan, and Gene Hinnard, Richard Bryan, and Wilson constructed it. Doug and Grace Ditmore donated the red petunias that bloomed in the tire-rim planters at both entrances to the park and the miniature marigolds that grew under the oak tree. The oak stands at the exact location of Coke County in the Texas-shaped planter Wilson created for it.

The tree was purchased with donations from Ben Bessent Chevrolet, Alpha Kappa Pi and Alpha Omicron Nu Sororities, The '64 Study Club, Robert Lee--Silver Lions Club, and Hazel and Earl Lindsey.

Water lilies and gold fish that were of special interest to children had to be removed, sacrificed to kill algae which spoiled the beauty of the rocks of the "fall" and "Rocky Creek."

Alvin and Alice Lara donated many of the cacti in the rock bed,

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and the rocks from which the planter is constructed were acquired from numerous places, including a few of sentimental value brought by Weldon Fikes and Thelma Jo Hinnard. The "holey" rocks were spirited away from Edna Havins' yard, having been placed there by Mr. and Mrs. Sterling Lindsey when they built the house. It is with regret that no list was kept, and as of this writing some names escape memory and cannot here "be recorded for posterity." Any additional information will be welcomed at City Hall.

Wilson gathered most of the larger stones used in the water fall and in landscaping from Bryan Concrete's discard pile at the plant in Robert Lee and from the mountains on the S.E. Adams Ranch. Noel Gregston is constructing an unusual trellis on which the red Don Juan rose will climb.

Since the mayor has not inactivated the "beautification committee," his committeeman can still be seen applying T.L.C. (Tender Loving Care) and maintaining the area which he enjoyed creating. He and the other city commission members wish to

thank all who helped in any way to prepare the park and hope it may be enjoyed by all who visit it.

## No Shooting Or Dumping

Considerable dumping of trash and junk and shooting of firearms have been occurring at a site on the old Sanco Road north of Robert Lee. County Judge D.W. Sims said this week that complaints have been received and the county has been asked to put a stop to the practices.

The judge said he felt most of the shooting was being done by hunters who are using the area for target practice in getting the sights set on their guns.

He asked the cooperation of everyone in stopping the unlawful practice of both dumping junk and discharging firearms in the area.


