CATTLE.

Steer Trade Active With Values Steady to Strong

The market for beef cattle, while not noting any strong advance in prices, was good and active today with values fully steady to firm. Offerings included some of the best cattle seen here since the holidays and prices made for them were fully in line with other markets, showing that when the goods are at hand the prices will be found right. Supply was not large here or at outside points, the live market total being but 25,000. The proportion of dressed beef and shipping grades of steers on the local market was comparatively liberal but the demand was quite good and trade active on a steady to strong level of prices compared with Monday or around a dime higher than closing days of last week. As already indicated the supply included some of the best cattle seen here since the holiday season, one load of finished and smooth Kansas fed steers of around 1,600 pounds average selling at \$5.75, the highest price made here since early in the winter. Other sales of fair to good medium to strong weight steers went in a range of \$4.75 to \$5.25 with fair to good light weight dressed beef steers also medium to strong weight of coarse quality at \$1.00 to \$1.25 with trashy, light killers going at \$1.00 to \$1.25. The market is considered to be in a good healthy condition although English reports are not favorable to lively export operations.

COWS, BULLS AND MIXED.

Considerable complaint was heard from buyers of the very common quality of the stock on offer this morning. Supply was not comparatively large and only scattering lots of attractive offering were seen. Quality considered, the market ruled about steady on the recent level of prices, which have shown a marked broadening out in range. Choice fat, corn-fed cows and heifers sell fully up to former prices but medium and common grades have been working lower and are off 20c to 25c from prices of ten days ago though for today they were fairly steady with yesterday. Very choice heifers sold around \$1.50 and choice cows were quotable around \$4.25, but the bulk of fair to good dressed beef cows and heifers sold within a range of \$3.25 to \$3.50 with canners and cutters dragging and unsatisfactory sale at \$1.25 to \$2.50 with bulk at \$2.00 to \$2.40. Bulls steady. Calves in light supply and steady at recent decline.

STOCKERS AND FEEDERS.

The local trade took on quite a load of young cattle suitable for this trade yesterday, but were on hand again this morning ready to take fresh arrivals around steady prices. The quality of fresh arrivals was not as good today as yesterday, and this, of course, will make an apparent difference in range of prices for sales reported. In a general way, however, there is a very good class of cattle on hand and of wide range as to weight, so that a very useful style of cattle can be had either for short feed or putting on grass for the summer. Prices are ranging at \$3.00 to \$4.25 for yearlings, with bulk at \$3.75 to \$4.25. Feeders are selling at \$3.00 to \$4.35, with bulk at \$3.00 to \$3.90.

PERISH IN FLAMES.

Between 50 and 75 Persons Burned in Factory Fire.

150 HORSE POWER BOILER EXPLODES

Building Filled with Factory Employees Falls and Ruins Catch Fire—Property Loss Reaches \$250,000.

Brookton, Mass., March 21.—The explosion of a 150 horse-power boiler in R. B. Grover & Co.'s large 4-story frame shoe factory in the Campello district today killed scores of employees, injured half a hundred others and destroyed property valued at \$250,000.

When the boiler exploded it passed upward almost perpendicularly, tearing a passage as it went, killing many on the way. After rising high in the air it descended half the distance and then swooping northward, cut its way like some huge projectile through a dwelling house fifty feet away and plowed another dwelling further along.

CHEROKEES WIN SUIT.

Court of Claims Decide Case for Indians—Amount Involved is \$4,500,000.

Washington, March 21.—The cases of the Cherokee Indians and of individual Cherokees against the United States were decided by the court of claims yesterday they involve a large amount of money and are of an unusual and extraordinary character.

ON TO HARBIN.

Russian Army, Is Using All Its Energies to Reach That Point—Much Suffering.

St. Petersburg, March 21.—The latest dispatches from Manchuria indicate that the retreat of the Russian army is being conducted uneventfully.

M. Tuluzakoff, an Associated Press correspondent who had been accompanying General Rennenkampf's corps of the Eastern army, and whose dispatches suddenly ceased with the beginning of the retreat, has arrived at Gushu pass, having been wounded in the early stage of the retreat and incapacitated from continuing his work.

According to an Associated Press dispatch from Gushu pass the appointment of General Linevitch has made a good impression with the army, the new commander enjoying the affection and confidence of the troops almost in the same measure as General Kuropatkin. Both are fighters and not carpet knights.

Tokio, March 21.—The remnants of that part of the Russian army retreating from the direction of Shingling are in a pitiable plight among the mountains. They are without food and are killing and eating their horses. They are almost completely enveloped by the Japanese.

HOCH IS NOT ALARMED.

Says Action of Standard Oil Company Was to Be Expected.

Topeka, Kan., March 21.—Gov. Hoch is not alarmed over the announcement of the Standard Oil company that it has erased Kansas from its map. He says that the Kansas producers will survive and that the state will be benefited in the end.

"It is what we have expected," said the governor to-day. "The Standard does not yet understand the character of the Kansas people and its officers hope to intimidate our people by this kind of foolishness. It has been expected for some time that the Standard would attempt to retaliate for the 'unfriendly' legislation of which its officers speak."

"What if the Standard does leave Kansas? The state will be benefited because the oil will remain here. If the company had continued to take our oil and reduce prices it would have taken our oil and left us nothing for it. The oil will not spoil in the ground and we will keep it until we get a market or until we can make a market for it. We cannot make a market for it. We cannot make a market at once that will take all of the production, but we will have one within a short time."

"Of course, hundreds of independent producers will be ruined before we can get a market for all of the oil, but that was to have been expected. The Standard undoubtedly would like to ruin all of the Kansas producers and many individuals will lose by this move of the company where the state will gain in the long run."

New vice chairman of the republican national committee and by reason of the appointment Mr. New would become acting chairman on his (Cortelyou's) retirement which will take place in a very few days. Mr. New's appointment, it is known, is entirely satisfactory to republican leaders throughout the country which have been consulted in the matter and have given the selection their approval.

Removed from Consular Service.

Washington, March 21.—W. R. Bigham of White City, Kas., is no longer consul general at Cape Town, South Africa. He has been superseded by Horace L. Washington of this city, who has been consul general in Geneva, Switzerland. Bigham was elected a member of the Kansas legislature in 1898 and his appointment as consul general in Cape Town was the first appointment obtained by Burton after he became senator in 1901.

Rubbers at Greenridge, Mo.

Sedalia, Mo., March 21.—The Missouri Kansas & Texas railroad station and four business houses at Greenridge, 12 miles south of here, were robbed Sunday night. Sacks of mail which had been received on the night train were cut open and the contents scattered over the depot floor. Some goods and a few dollars in money were taken from each of the four business houses. There is no clew.

Senator Warner Selects Secretary.

Kansas City, Mo., March 21.—Maj. Warner announced Monday afternoon that he had selected as his private secretary W. B. C. Brown, an attorney with an office in the Helst building. Mr. Brown was born at Sibley, in this county, during the Civil war and has been a resident of Jackson county ever since.

Kansas Physician Drowned.

Burlington, Kas., March 21.—Dr. Ross F. Kloock of Ottumwa, a town a few miles north of here, was drowned while attempting to ford the Neosho river between Strawn and Ottumwa about midnight Saturday and his body was not found until 11 o'clock Sunday night. The indications are that he drowned trying to save his buggy after getting the harness to help the horse out. Dr. Kloock was a graduate of a medical college of Kansas City. He knew that the ford was dangerous, but said that he must try to reach a patient.

Train Wrecked in Nebraska.

Beatrice, Neb., March 21.—Burlington passenger train No. 18 and an extra Rock Island freight collided at the crossing of the two roads near here this evening. The two engines were demolished and the train took up for 40 feet. Engineer Hickson and Fireman Pearson of the freight were severely but probably not fatally injured.

Will Not Return to Bench.

New York, March 21.—Former Chief Justice Alton B. Parker of the New York state court of appeals and democratic candidate for president of the United States in the last election said that he would not consider any proposition to return to the bench of this state.

MURDERED FOR MONEY.

Acad Woman Found Gagged and Strangled to Death in Her Home. St. Louis, March 21.—Mrs. Mary B. Page, a fortune teller, aged 70 years, was found dead in her home on Market street, having been bound, gagged and strangled to death, and the absence of jewelry that she was known to have possessed indicate that robbery had been the motive for the crime. Mrs. Page conducted a rooming house, and the discovery of the crime was made by a man who did the house chores. A towel had been bound tightly across her mouth and garroted her. It was plainly evident that her apartments had been ransacked. Four persons living in the house have been arrested but no specific charge has been placed against them.

Oklahoma County Loses Suit.

Washington, March 21.—In an opinion by Justice Holmes the supreme court of the United States to-day decided in favor of the state of Texas, the controversy between Greer county, Oklahoma, and the state of Texas over lands granted by that state to the county for school purposes when the county was part of Texas. The decision was based on the ground that Greer county, Oklahoma, is not the same person that Greer county, Texas, was and that it, therefore has no claim upon the Texas school fund.

Ask Change of Venue for Mrs. Myers.

Kansas City, Mo., March 21.—The attorneys for Mrs. Myers filed a motion for a change of venue as soon as the case was called and Judge Wofford announced that he would hear the motion Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock. The motion sets out that Mrs. Myers cannot have a fair trial in this county because of the prejudice of the people here against her.
