OUT-LOOK BRIGHT TO THEM

Commissioner Neill Opposing Competition Said Association or Combination Was the Only Way to Counteract It.

Philadelphia, Apr. 11.-Industrial, sociological and political problems of the time were discussed at length here Friday at the annual session of the American Academy of Political and Social Science by men prominent in various walks of life. 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


