By an order of the Commissioner's Court, which met February 8, Monday, the following notice is hereby given.

It has become necessary to expand the scope of Information and Referral Services relative to operation of the Senior Citizen

Van, and the Aging Program in general, the Commissioner's Court will interview applicants February 23, 1982 for a person to serve in that capacity.

The person selected will office in the courthouse. The position will pay the minimum wage of \$3.35 per hour-30 hours a week. The work will consist of dispatching services for the Senior Citizen Van, keeping files of clients served, and to be served, taking training so as to be able to help Senior Citizens with information and assistance regarding benefits and services to which they may be entitled, and other matters related to their general welfare.

Precinct Election Box Locations Given

With elections just around the corner with the primaries coming up in May, the following information on Commissioner Precincts and voting boxes is offered for the general public. It is to be kept in mind that a person may not vote in both the democratic and the republican elections.

Insofar as concerns the democratic primaries, persons living in Commissioner's Precinct One will vote in Voting Box One, which is located at the County Courthouse. Commissioner's Precinct One basically lies north of Highway 84 and embraces the Lenau and Country Club additions, together with what is generally known as the Hilltop

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area, with the following exception: a certain area formerly situated in Precinct One is to be transferred to Precinct Four. That embraces the area from the center of Birch Street south in the Lenau addition and the area lying west of Hwy. 21 north of the railroad, extending to the XIT Drive in Theater and west to the Cotton Compress.

All of Commissioner Precinct Two will vote at the Coliseum in Voting Box Two. The southeasterly boundary of Commissioner Precinct Two was changed from West Eighth Street to the center line of West Seventeenth Street. Therefore, all persons living west of the center of Seventeenth Street, together with those described in the area between Highway 84 and the railroad and between Odessa Street and the west side of the Coliseum are to vote in Precinct Two, Box Two, at the Coliseum.

Those persons residing in Commissioner Precinct Three, and who live in the southern rural area toward Three Way will vote in Voting Box Three at the Three Way School.

Those who live in town and are in Commissioner Precinct Three, will vote at Voting Box Four, which will be located at the High School Cafeteria or the Methodist Church. These places remain optional. Cont. Page 6, Col. 3

Taxpayers Need W-2 Form From All Employers

Persons who have not received their Forms w-2, "Wage and Tax Statements," from their employers must still file their tax returns by April 15, the

Internal Revenue Service advises.

To avoid delay in receiving the w-2, persons should furnish their employers with a current address. If employees do not receive the statement, they should contact their employer. After February 15, the employee should ask for help by calling the IRS office listed in the telephone directory.

The IRS reminds taxpayers that they must have a W-2 form for every employer they worked for during the year. Even if an employee is unable to get a W-2 before the filing deadline of April 15, a timely return must be filed. Report all income and attach a signed and dated statement explaining the tax computations for the missing wage and tax information, the IRS says.

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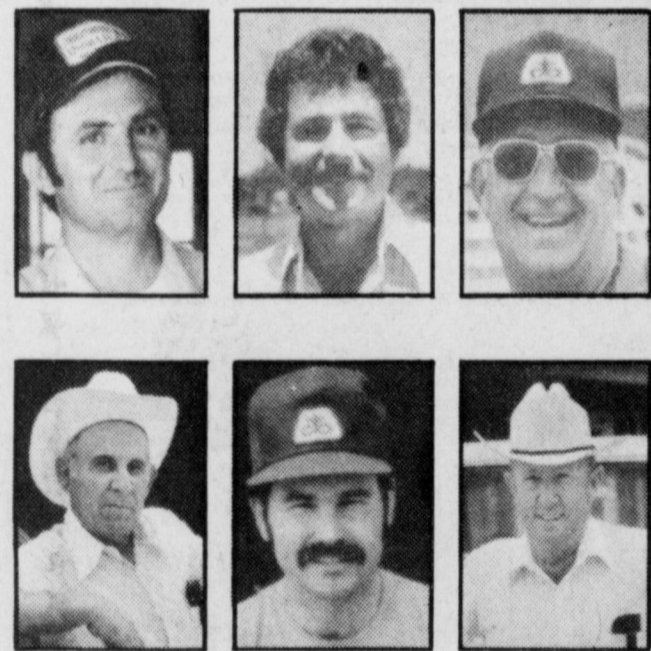

Choose the wall with fewest windows, doors and jogs — never the window and if possible not the entry wall. The accent wall is a major part of your color scheme. You should be able to view the whole effect as you enter the room.

The accent wall is a means of creating a center of interest or focal point where there is none. But if, by chance, your family room has a fireplace, that is your center of interest and becomes the accent wall.

Don't be tempted to paint two walls with your accent color — this divides interest, pulls the scheme apart and destroys the unity of the setting.

The southeasterly boundary of Precinct Three was moved to the center line of West Third Street with the exception of the two blocks situated between Avenues D and F; and those two remain in Precinct Three. The western boundary of Precinct Three was moved to the center line of West Seventeenth Street.

Those living in Commissioner Precinct Four, rurally and living in and around Bula Enochs will vote at the old Bula School or community center. This voting box is number five.

Those in the rural area of Baileyboro, Circleback or Needmore and who live in Precinct Four, will vote at the Needmore Community Center. This will be Voting Box Six.

In the city, those located in Commissioner Precinct Four will vote at Voting Box Seven, which is located in the City Hall. The northwestern boundary of Precinct Four runs along the center line of Highway 214 from the Crossroads to Avenue F; and then extends along the east side of East Houston Street and basically follows the city limits from there until it goes south to Highway 214. Absentee voting boxes for both the Republicans and Democrats will be located in the office of the county clerk at the courthouse.

This year's record bumper corn harvests could mean deficiencies in another area: soil sulphur. The warning comes from an industry agronomist who says the sudden increases in yields from 1980 plus continued use of high analysis NPK fertilizers have created all the elements needed for sulphur deficiency. He explains not all corn producers need to use a sulphur-containing fertilizer but they should be aware of the high potential for deficiency. Today's concentrated grades of NPK fertilizers contain little or no incidental sulphur, unlike traditional forms of plant food. Sulphur requirements are closely related to those of nitrogen. Both are important to protein synthesis and are dependent upon each other for maximum benefit. The agronomist suggests a 5:1 ratio of applied nitrogen and sulphur fertilizer to help maintain the prescribed 10:12 parts nitrogen to 1 part sulphur ratio.

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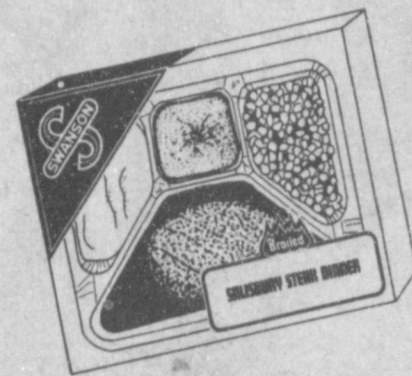

The welcome was given by Donna Horn and the prayer by Anne'te Crabtree.

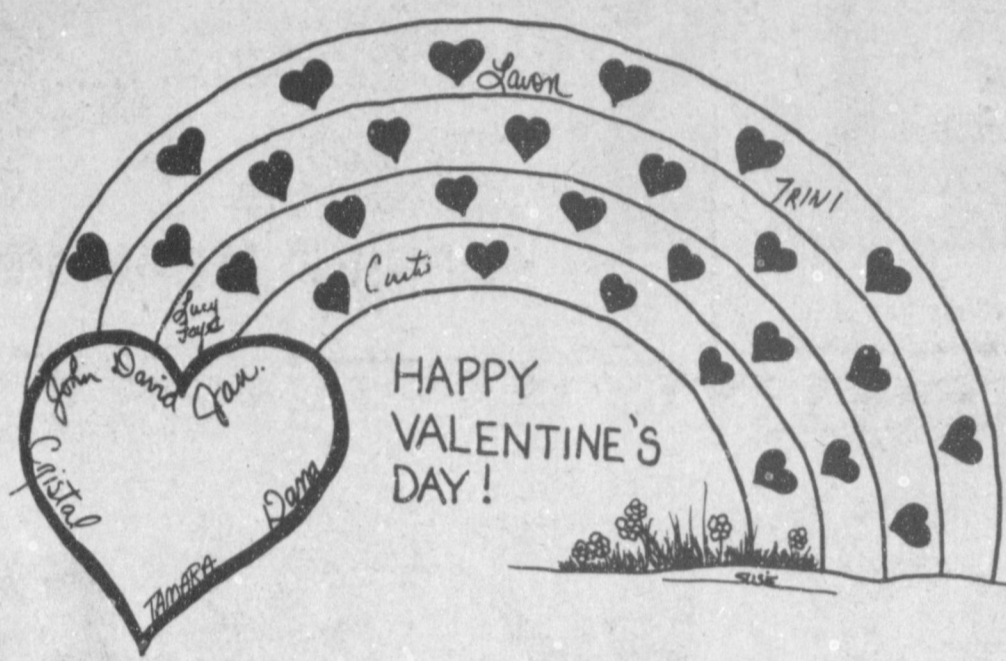

Students may sign up for the test in the principal's office. If enough interest is shown, a definite date will be set to give the test after contacting the Military people concerned.

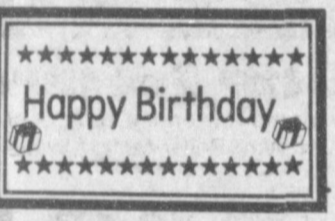

Angelo State Accepting Scholarship Applications

Applications from high school seniors are being accepted by Angelo State University for more than 300 Carr Academic Scholarships which may amount from \$2,400 to \$12,000 during a four year course of under-graduate study for students with financial need who have outstanding academic ability and leadership qualities.

The applications for 1982-83 scholarships may be requested by writing to the Carr Academic Scholarship Program, Office of the President, Angelo State University, Box 11007-C, ASU Station, San Angelo, Texas 76909, or by telephoning (915) 942-2103.

Students are encouraged to submit their application as soon as possible although applications from outstanding students may be considered up until July 1, 1982 to the extent funds are still available.

Supported by a multi-million dollar trust established in 1978 by Mr. Robert G. Carr of San Angelo, the Scholarships will range in value from \$600-\$3,000 per year for a maximum of four years for undergraduates, two years for graduate students.

In selecting recipients for Carr Academic Scholarships, priority will be given to students of high academic ability with fi-

nancial need who have demonstrated special qualities warranting honor, respect, and esteem. Carr Academic Scholarships are awarded without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, or national origin.

Scholarships may be renewed annually. In order to be eligible for renewal, a Carr Academic Scholarship recipient must maintain a minimum of a "B" average (3.0 GPA) on all course work attempted while enrolled as a fulltime student and must maintain an exemplary personal record which demonstrates that he/she is worthy and deserving of renewal of the scholarship.
