During the coming season many opportunities will be offered to secure horses, cattle, hogs and sheep from the herds and flocks of some of the most successful breeders in the country.

The South has made rapid strides in improving the class of live stock bred and raised during the past few years, and the stockmen of that section should still improve their stock, until they raise as good as can be produced anywhere.

INSECTS THAT DESTROY INSECTS.

The Department of Agriculture cultivates insects that destroy any and all crop parasites. The polygnathus hiemalis can whip any Hessian fly ever born; the typhlebus trieti is death on the green bug.

To one lady bug is due the destruction of the San Jose scale, which did millions of dollars' damage to the fruit trees of California. When the pest had become a positive menace the department heard of a species of bug in North China which was fatal to the scale.
