

A FIRM STEER DEAL

TRADE RULED ACTIVE AFTER LATE START AT STEADY TO STRONG PRICES.

RANGE SUPPLY FALLS OFF

General Supply Only Moderate—Cows and Heifers Active—Bulls and Calves Steady—No Change in Stockers.

Receipts of cattle were moderate today, both locally and at outside markets. The local estimate called for 3,000 head, but actual arrivals fell around 2,500, as compared with receipts of 3,356 a week ago and 4,571 a year ago.

Trade was a trifle slow at the outset and developed better action as the session progressed and a seasonable clearance of both the native and western steers was effected.

Stocks and Feeders.

The buying element found that the task of persuading stockmen that any additional punishment in prices for stock and finishing cattle to that inflicted earlier in the week was due was a pretty hard proposition, and although a stubborn effort was made to further cheapen the cost for stockers and feeders in general, their bearish arguments were crowned with little success.

country. One of the surest and most reliable regulators of the beef market and, for that matter any market relative to the live stock trade, is the consumptive demand. It stands to reason that as long as the beef-loving American public continues to afford an outlet for beef that packing interest will absorb the nation's supply of raw material as fast as feeders can turn corn into beef, and at prices that will usually enable the man behind the gun to be able to put the balance on the profit side of the ledger.

STEERS THAT GAIN MOST. Denver Field and Farm: It is a matter of common observation that some steers gain faster than others. Breeders in their efforts to improve animals have sought to produce types that make the best carcasses and therefore bring a higher price than those that make the most economical gains.

IN WOMAN'S REALM. CIDER APPLE BUTTER. Take equal parts of thoroughly ripe Concord grapes and good tart apples. Peel and core apples and cook until they will cook up well. Pick grapes from stem, wash and boil in just enough water to cover, when sufficiently cooked, put through sieve or fruit press to remove seeds or skin. Tender and smooth, stir while cooking. Put grapes and apples together, add sweetener and spice to suit. Amount of sugar depending upon the sourness of grapes and apples, and cook until the proper consistency. It is excellent with or without spice.

SEEDLESS GRAPE PIE. Make a pie crust in the usual manner, line the pie tin, a deep one, and bake. Take blue grapes, Concord, wash and stem. (I take the loose ones and reserve those on the stems for table use. Place over a fire and allow to cook until the skins are well broken. Turn this into a colander or sieve with holes not large enough for the grape seeds to go through. Use the juice that is drained from this, without mashing, for grape juice, adding to suit the taste, and then press the grape pulp and skins through the sieve into another bowl. Mix this pulp with the yolks of two well beaten eggs, add one cup of sugar or enough to suit the taste, fill the baked pie crust, and place in the oven to bake for ten minutes. Beat the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth, add two tablespoonfuls of sugar, and spread over the top of the pie. Place in the oven until browned. One-half basket makes one deep pie, and those who have tasted this original recipe say it is fine, especially since it does away with seeds.

POPULAR RECIPES. Quick Coffee Cake—One tablespoonful lard, one pinch salt, one cupful sugar, one egg, beat all together; three and one-half cupfuls flour, two teaspoonfuls baking powder, add enough milk to make a stiff batter. Put sliced apples on top, sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Sliced peaches are also nice. Sour Cream Cookies—Two eggs, one and one-half cupfuls sugar, three-fourths cup of butter, three-fourths cup sour cream, or milk, one-half teaspoonful cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful nutmeg, one-fourth teaspoonful cloves, one table teaspoonful soda, a pinch of salt, three and one-

ATTENTION, STOCK CATTLE BUYERS! Your Assistance and Co-operation Needed in Combating Advanced Freight Rates. The notice of the different railroads in regard that the stock cattle rates to points east of the Missouri river would be advanced to the regular tariff rates after the first of October was taken up by the different live stock exchanges, and as a result the ruling was suspended until December 15th by the Interstate Commerce Commission. The commissioners have decided to bear those cases at two places, the first being at Omaha on the 20th and 21st inst, the other at Kansas City the 23rd and 24th inst. This is a matter of vital importance to all stock cattle buyers east of the Missouri river, as the rate heretofore existing was three-fourths of the regular rate charged on fat cattle coming to markets on the Missouri river. This they have always regarded as just and fair to the shippers and railroads alike. They have always looked upon stock cattle going to the country as raw material. The railroads are not required to make time, as they do with fat cattle to arrive on the market promptly, but are handled differently. Said cattle are fed by the feeders and returned to the market, on which the regular rates are paid. At these hearings the St. Joseph Live Stock Exchange will ask as many prominent stock cattle buyers as possible to attend the meeting at Kansas City on October 23rd, for the purpose of giving their evidence before the commissioners in regard to this matter. They should do so by all means, as the interests are identical in the northern states and Any who can or will attend, should notify M. F. Blanchard, Chairman of the Railroad Committee of the St. Joseph Live Stock Exchange on or before the 15th inst. The commission men should also take notice and furnish evidence by letter protesting against these advanced rates if they cannot attend in person. The chairman of the committee will appreciate prompt response from interested parties who will attend this meeting.

FRENCH MUSTARD

Slice an onion in a bowl, cover with vinegar, and leave two or three days; pour off the vinegar into a dish and add one teaspoonful of pepper, one teaspoon salt, one tablespoonful of brown sugar, and mustard enough to thicken. Smooth the mustard with a little vinegar, mix it, set on the stove, and stir until it boils. It is then done.

APPLE SNOW

Boil about five apples to a pulp, sweetening to taste. When cool place in a large bowl, together with the white of one egg, juice of one lemon, and one cup of sugar, add the mixture about thirty minutes with a wire egg beater. The result is three times the amount you started with, enough to serve ten people.

ference of the scientists and delegates at the recent conservation congress. He said the plan already had been approved by President Taft. It is first to be tried in the northern states and then extended over the entire country. "Our plan simply is this," he said. "For every 15,000 farms we propose to have a farm expert, who is to make a personal study and investigation of the soil, the climate and farm conditions of that district. He is to tell the farmer the results of his investigations through bulletins, the newspapers and through meetings at the school house. We propose to have the government pay half his salary and expenses and ask the state to join in paying the other half. He is to work jointly under the direction of the state and national agricultural departments. That expert is to be the prophet of scientific farming in his community, the leader or director. "But the plans of the federal department go even further. We want an expert in every county. We want that man to devote all his time to the study of farming in that county. He is to be the 'farmer confessor' as it were of the farmers in his community. He is to make a more detailed study of the soil through a soil survey; he is to make a study of the climatic conditions; keep in touch with the weather office so as to sound warnings to the fruit growers in case of frost; he is to tell the farmer if he wants his advice, how to diversify his crops so as to produce the most crops, best conserve the soil and at the same time conserve time and labor. "The national government will pay half the expense of this county expert, Mr. Spillman said. The state will be asked to pay one-fourth the expenses of the 'county farmer' and the county the other fourth. "If we only can bring that plan to its fullest realization with a county farmer in every county of our land," Mr. Spillman added, "then I believe we will have realized the redemption of the American farmer."

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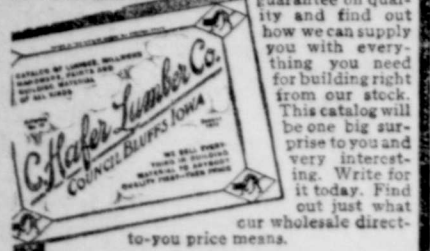
