THE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE IN EVERY COUNTY.

Not every county can have a great institution like the Missouri college of agriculture located within its borders. But under a new plan devised by the college it is now possible for each county to have an agent or Farm Adviser located at the county seat and devoting his whole time to the agricultural interests of the county.

The college will be able to give instruction on soils, farm crops, orcharding, live stock farming, poultry keeping, and saving hogs from cholera but a demonstration farm will be conducted in co-operation with the county court for the purpose of actually demonstrating the most profitable methods of farm practice.

This plan has been approved by the Missouri Federation of Commercial Clubs, the Missouri Bankers' Association and farmers' organizations. At present only a limited number of Farm Advisers can be appointed, but it is expected that another year many counties can be organized under this new plan.

The college is now aiding Missouri farmers by holding branch short courses in agriculture, distributing hog cholera serum, conducting a soil survey, making soil investigations in seventeen different localities of the state, judging live stock at county fairs, making educational exhibits at state and county fairs and in many other ways, carrying directly to the

**HOE HANDY FARM IMPLEMENT**  
Most Useful Tool in Equipment of Gardener or Farmer.

So many people have a horror of using a hoe. It is the most comfortable implement to be found in the equipment of a gardener or farmer, and is handy to use for so many purposes that one cannot get along without it.

Probably one reason that people do not like the hoe is that most hoes explain at once how "dull as a hoe" came into proverbial use.

A dull hoe is certainly not a pleasant implement with which to work. The good gardener will keep his favorite hoe filed to a sharp edge all the time. It is impossible to grind a hoe on a grindstone because the level must be on the upper side of the blade when it is in use in order to make the hoe "bite" into the soil.

File your hoe, making the bevel about twice as wide as the thickness of the blade. Then keep it bright and when you go out after weeds the hoe slips through the soil so easily that hoeing is not much like hard work.

In hoeing a long slow movement should be made, if the soil is in good condition. Simply "seawing" half an inch of the top soil is enough to kill weeds and one can go over a lot of ground in one day if the hoe is sharp and bright and the strokes long and smooth.

With a sharp hoe one can cut thistles, dock, dandelions and other noxious weeds with quickness, dispatch and ease. It is light to handle, easy to use and more effective than any other implement for many purposes.

In choosing a hoe select one the blade of which lies not quite flat on the floor when you are standing erect with the hoe handle extending from your hand when in working position to the floor. The heel of the hoe should not quite touch the floor from this position.

Such a hoe will bite into the soil easily, when it is bright and sharp and will work smoothly and effectively.

Sharpen the hoe as soon as it gets noticeably dull. This will be hard on the hoe, but it saves muscle and hoes are cheap. Carry a small flat file in your hip pocket and do not allow a nick to stay in the hoe a minute after it is made.

**STOP LEAD PENCIL WASTE**  
Railroad Installs Device Which May Save Road \$7,000 Yearly.

Los Angeles Examiner: President E. P. Ripley of the Santa Fe railroad was standing in one of the local general offices and observed a clerk, working at a desk, throw into the waste basket a bit of lead pencil, probably one-fourth of the original pencil. The clerk drew another from his drawer and sharpening it, proceeded with his work.

Ripley picked up the piece of pencil that all the matter was included in his short length. In his mind he began figuring how much was lost in lead pencil stubs on the Santa Fe system, where thousands are in use every day, if every clerk did as this young man in the local office.

A few days ago there was received at every office on the Santa Fe system a consignment of lead pencil lengtheners, or savers, a handle the size of a pencil with a screw attachment at one end for the holding of short lengths of pencil and a kindly letter of advice requesting that the lengtheners be used.

All the clerks and officials and officers of the great system are included in this letter of advice and while the initial cost of the lengtheners is staggering in amount, it is estimated by President Ripley that the use of them will save his road the sum of \$999 a month, or more than \$7,000 in the course of a year.

**BENEFIT OF CROP ROTATION**  
Whole Supply of Soil Food Utilized and Organic Matter Maintained.

Advantages connected with the adoption of rotation are:

1. The whole food supply of the soil can be utilized. This is not possible when only one crop is grown, for some crops feed only in the surface soil, leaving stores of food deeper in the soil untouched.
2. The amount of valuable organic matter in the soil can be maintained and even increased.
3. The free trogen of the air can be made use of.
4. Insect, fungus and weed pests can be destroyed or controlled.
5. Provision can be made for the economical distribution of labor throughout the year.

The rotation suitable for the wheat farmer is one in which wheat is grown alternately with a fodder crop, says Rural Homes. This implies wheat growing combined with stock raising. On small holdings in most districts of 20 inches rainfall and over, this may be so arranged that a crop is grown each year. Such a plan, however, has the disadvantage of entailing that some of the land be prepared in great haste.

**SUDDEN CHANGES IN FEED**  
Going From Old to New Corn Quickly Disarranges Digestive Organs.

Sudden changes from old to new corn disturb the hog's digestive apparatus and make him subject to disease, even if they do not cause it.

Green corn fed with the old corn, effecting the change gradually, is very beneficial, cooling the hog and furnishing an appetizer. It may be at this time the hogs will neglect the old corn if their teeth and gums have been sore on account of its hardness; if so, soak it. A stalk of corn per hog, even when the corn is in silk, is good practice, as at this time the stalk contains most of the nourishment that will go into the ear. By the time hogs cease eating the leaves and stalks, the ear may be snapped for them. Such preparatory feeding is especially beneficial where corn has to be hogged down later, a practice which often has much to recommend it if the area is not so large as to allow the animals to waste the field.

**LAMB RAISING PAYS.**  
Sheep Industry on the Average Farm Is Considered Side Issue.

The farmer who will pay close attention to his breeding stock and raise native lambs of uniform size and breed, feed them intelligently and market them at the right time can make more profit from his flock than from any other farm investment. As a rule the "native" lambs sent to the

markets are so badly mixed as to breed and feeding, that they are a torment to the buyer and of little profit to the owner.

This is one of the reasons why the western range lambs find great favor in the big markets. They are more uniform in size as they are fed in large flocks and go to market practically in the same condition. Only a small portion of the "native" lambs that are sold in the eastern markets can be called prime, and his fact is entirely the fault of the farmer.

As a rule, sheep-raising on the average farm is merely a side issue and little attention is given to it. The remedy of the present condition of the native lamb market lies entirely with the men who produce the lambs.

Whenever the farmers are engaged in the producing of prime lambs for market at any season of the year, the business has proven highly profitable. Of course the best markets are just before Christmas and in the early spring; at this period the prices are always high.

America is becoming a great mutton-eating nation, and if the farmers will improve their flocks and their methods of feeding there is no reason why the native lamb market should not prove more profitable than that controlled by the range district.

In the production of rice and coffee the United States ranks tenth, compared with other countries of the world.

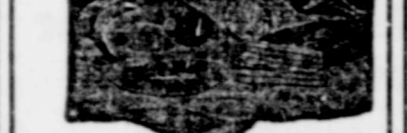

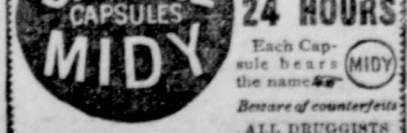
