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THE FARM GREENHOUSE. In the east many farmers, and especially farmers' wives, who live close to large towns or small cities, find much pleasure and profit in a farm greenhouse, says Wallace's Farmer.

At a season of the year when farm women are confined closely at home, the greenhouse furnishes profitable occupation for spare hours. Violets, carnations, geraniums, chrysanthemums, and a host of other flowers may be grown to cheer the household during winter. The kitchen work may be made easier by the forcing of early radishes and lettuce.

REDUCING FOREST RESERVES. President Taft has issued proclamations changing the boundaries of the Missoula and Madison National Forests, Montana. From the former 4,940 acres are eliminated and from the latter 43,140 acres. These eliminations are the result of field examinations which the department of agriculture has been making in pursuance of a general plan to correct the national forest boundary lines.

LESS CATTLE FROM MONTANA. Secretary of State Board Predicts Decrease of 50,000 Head. Helena, Mont., Oct. 17.—Montana this year will ship to market 59,000 head less cattle than last season, according to an estimate made by D. W. Raymond, secretary of the state board of stock commissioners, based upon reports of inspectors, statements of stockmen and his own knowledge of conditions. The shipments last year aggregated 295,851 head.

EDUCATION VS. J. PLUVIUS. Speaking of the showing made by the farmers of the country this year Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture is quoted as saying: "The crops are the heaviest on record. The season has been favorable, but some credit is due to the wide efforts made in late years by the federal government and the states to help farmers throughout the country to get better returns from the average acreage. The world has been searched by the department of agriculture, and its scientists have been creating new plants by hybridization, suitable for the several localities; 28,000,000 pieces of literature have been sent out by the department in addition to the advice sent out from the state stations along these lines. So the farmers have been helped in producing their record-breaking crop."

KANSAS TEACHERS TO MEET. Association to Hold Its Fiftieth Anniversary in November. Topeka, Oct. 16.—The Kansas Teachers' association on Thursday and Friday, November 7 and 8, will hold its fiftieth annual meeting in Topeka. The association was organized September 29, 1863, about 20 months after Kansas was admitted into the Union. The first meeting was held at Leavenworth and was attended by 24 teachers.

It is expected that this year's meeting will be one of the largest ever held. Among the outside speakers

OSAGES TO ELECT GOVERNOR

Richest Nation Beginning to Discuss Matter of Successor to Harry Kopyay.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Oct. 17.—While the election of a governor of the Osage Nation, the richest nation on earth, is eighteen months away, the Osage citizens are beginning to discuss the matter of a successor to Gov. Harry Kopyay, a full-blood, who holds the office by the good graces of the Secretary of the Interior.

That Kopyay is a full-blood, a candidate seems to be in foregone conclusion and that he will incite into the campaign much of the white man's strategy and ginger is probable.

Being a graduate of Carlisle, Kopyay has the advantage of many other men of the tribe in political ability. Kopyay has been on the pay roll of the United States government as an employe in a clerical capacity in the office of the Indian Agent at Pawhuska for several years.

When the last biennial election was held, last June, Kopyay was selected as secretary of the Council. Bacon King, one of the sagmen of the Osages, was elected governor.

His alleged activities in the interests of the Uncle Sam Oil Company caused his removal by the Secretary of the Interior, and Kopyay was appointed acting governor to fill the unexpired term.

Bacon King succeeded Alf Brown, a party leader, who was one of the wisest men that has filled the executive chair in the history of the nation.

BIRD REFUGE SAVES EGRET

Island Bought by Mrs. Sage Will Prevent Extinction of Species.

New York, Oct. 17.—Mrs. Russell Sage, who has bought Marsh Island, Louisiana, for \$100,000 to make it a refuge for birds, will place the control of the property either in the hands of the federal government, the state of Louisiana, or an association organized for the purpose.

Marsh Island is the most important winter feeding ground for wild ducks and geese in the South with the possible exception of Currituck sound. Wild geese of the central United States go to it in winter for food and shelter when more northern streams and lakes are under ice. Millions of birds have been slaughtered there.

With the cessation of this wholesale killing of waterfowl, it will increase enormously in number, experts say.

The island is on the gulf coast, southwest of New Orleans. Herons, bitterns, loons, rails, and many varieties of shore birds as well as ducks and geese winter there. It is the most popular shooting ground in the south for market gunners. Eighteen miles long and nine miles wide at the broadest point, the island contains about 75,000 acres.

KEEP BOYS ON FARM.

Shortage of Labor Due to Lack of Amusements, An Editor Says.

Kirkville, Mo., Oct. 17.—Dr. Henry Wallace, a member of the Roosevelt Country Life commission and editor of Wallace's Farmer, said at the Missouri Rural Life conference now in session at Kirkville that the farmers themselves are responsible for the exodus of their sons and daughters from the farms and the consequent shortage of farm labor which confronts every farming community.

Dr. Wallace said that the remedy for present day conditions is the improvement of the country church through more liberality of the farmers, raising the school standards until they are as good as city schools, and establishing a social center to bind together all the interests of the community.

He said the only way to keep the farmer and small town boys from playing base ball Sunday was to give them Saturday afternoons to play in and to play with them. Dr. Wallace strongly condemned the 1-year lease custom, prevalent in the middle west, because it prevents the proper rotation of crops and hinders the development of the farmer's interest in the church and school district.

Prof. C. B. Hutchinson, University of Missouri. The importance of taking good care of seed corn has been proven by experiments at Columbia. Seed that was cared for in different ways was tested by the experiment station and the following results were obtained:

PLOW THE CORN LAND NOW
